The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the fifteenth day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Swithin, situate in the township of Kennington, in the county of Berks, and in the diocese of Oxford.

"Whereas the said township of Kennington comprises certain portions of the parish of Sunningwell, and of the parish of Radley, both in the county and diocese aforesaid, which said portions lie contiguous one to another, and contain a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such respective parishes.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parish of Sunningwell and of the said parish of Radley, comprised within the township of Kennington, as aforesaid, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Swithin, situate in such township as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consents of the Right Reverend Samuel, Bishop of the said diocese of Oxford, and of Sir George Bowyer, of Radley Park, in the said county of Berks, Baronet, the patron both of the rectory of the said parish of Sunningwell and of the cure of the said parish of Radley (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Sunningwell, and of the said parish of Radley, which are comprised within the township of Kennington as aforesaid, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Swithin, situate in the same township as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Swithin, Kennington,' and that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of such consolidated chapelry should belong to and be exercised by the said Samuel, Bishop of the said diocese of Oxford, and by his successors, bishops of the same diocese, for ever.

"We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Swithin, Kennington, being:—

"All those portions of the two parishes of Sunningwell and Radley, both in the county of Berks, and in the diocese of Oxford, which are comprised within and are co-extensive with the limits of the township of Kennington."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Oxford.

THE Justices of the Peace of the county of Bute, by virtue of the power conferred on them by the Order of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated 20th January, 1866, do hereby declare, in addition to their declaration of date the 27th November last, that it is expedient for the period from the date of this notice to the 1st day of March, 1866, that no raw or untanned hides, or skins, and no horns, or hoofs, of any animals, as defined by the Order of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council of 23rd November, 1865 (viz., any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine), except such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America, and no offal of any such animals as aforesaid, and no dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter likely to propagate infection, shall be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place within the county of
