REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S COURTS AT BUCKINGHAM PALACE.

*By Her Majesty's Command.*

The number of Ladies and Gentlemen attending each Court will be limited to two hundred and fifty, including those who will be presented to Her Majesty.

It is expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at Her Majesty's Courts only when in attendance upon the Ladies of their families.

Those Gentlemen who have not been presented to The Queen will, under such circumstances, be eligible for presentation to Her Majesty at these Courts.

The presentation of Ladies and Gentlemen will be limited to one hundred at each Court.

Ladies and Gentlemen wishing to attend Her Majesty's Courts must send in their names and addresses to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, S.W., on or after Thursday the 1st of March, and these names will be submitted for Her Majesty's approval in the order of their receipt at the Office.

All applications must be made in writing, and no names will be received previous to the 1st of March.

Ladies and Gentlemen who desire to be presented to Her Majesty must, in like manner, send in their names and addresses to the Lord Chamberlain's Office within the days above-mentioned. A letter from the Lady or Gentleman by whom each presentation is to be made must in all cases be forwarded.

The Queen has been graciously pleased, with regard to these Courts, to dispense with the regulation that the Lady or Gentleman must attend the Court at which they propose to make presentations to Her Majesty.

The Lord Chamberlain will forward to all persons who can be received under the above regulations, cards for their admission to Buckingham Palace at the Court which Her Majesty shall be pleased to appoint for their reception.

In sending in their names Ladies and Gentlemen are requested to mention the Court which they would prefer to attend.

All those Ladies and Gentlemen who receive cards of admission to Buckingham Palace are requested to bring with them two large cards with their names clearly written thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in attendance and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to Her Majesty. In the case of presentation the name of the presenter must be inserted on the card.

The State apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court an hour previous to each Court.

#### REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEES TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

#### *By Her Majesty's Command.*

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levees, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

#### PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentation shall be made at the Levee, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

COPY of a Letter from the Earl of Clarendon to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty:

Foreign Office,  
February 25, 1866.

MY LORDS,  
HER Majesty being fully determined to observe the duties of neutrality during the existing hostilities between Her Catholic Majesty and the Republics of Chile and Peru, and being, moreover, resolved to prevent, as far as possible, the use of Her Majesty's harbours, ports, and coasts, and the waters within Her Majesty's territorial jurisdiction, in aid of the warlike purposes of either belligerent, has commanded me to communicate to

your Lordships, for your guidance, the following rules, which are to be treated and enforced as Her Majesty's Orders and Directions.

Her Majesty is pleased further to command that these rules shall be put in force in the United Kingdom and in the Channel Islands on and after Friday, the 2nd day of March next, and in Her Majesty's territories and possessions beyond the seas, six days after the day when the Governor or other chief authority of each of such territories or possessions respectively shall have notified and published the same, stating in such notification that the said rules are to be obeyed by all persons within the same territories and possessions.

I. During the continuance of the present hostilities between Her Catholic Majesty and the Republics of Chile and Peru, all ships of war and privateers of either belligerent are prohibited from making use of any port or roadstead in the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or in the Channel Islands, or in any of Her Majesty's Colonies or foreign possessions or dependencies, or of any waters subject to the territorial jurisdiction of the British Crown, as a station or place of resort for any warlike purpose or for the purpose of obtaining any facilities of warlike equipment; and no ship of war or privateer of either belligerent shall hereafter be permitted to sail out of or leave any port, roadstead, or waters, subject to British jurisdiction, from which any vessel of the other belligerent (whether the same shall be a ship of war, a privateer, or a merchant ship), shall have previously departed, until after the expiration of at least twenty-four hours from the departure of such last-mentioned vessel beyond the territorial jurisdiction of Her Majesty.

II. If any ship of war or privateer of either belligerent shall, after the time when this order shall be first notified and put in force in the United Kingdom and in the Channel Islands, and in the several colonies and foreign possessions and dependencies of Her Majesty, respectively, enter any port, roadstead, or waters, belonging to Her Majesty, either in the United Kingdom, or in the Channel Islands, or in any of Her Majesty's colonies or foreign possessions or dependencies, such vessel shall be required to depart and to put to sea, within twenty-four hours after her entrance into such port, roadstead, or waters, except in case of stress of weather, or of her requiring provisions or things necessary for the subsistence of her crew, or repairs; in either of which cases, the authorities of the port, or of the nearest port (as the case may be), shall require her to put to sea as soon as possible after the expiration of such period of twenty-four hours, without permitting her to take in supplies, beyond what may be necessary for her immediate use: and no such vessel, which may have been allowed to remain within British waters for the purpose of repair, shall continue in any such port, roadstead, or waters, for a longer period than twenty-four hours after her necessary repairs shall have been completed: Provided, nevertheless, that in all cases in which there shall be any vessels (whether ships of war, privateers, or merchant ships), of the said belligerent parties in the same port, roadstead, or waters within the territorial jurisdiction of Her Majesty, there shall be an interval of not less than twenty-four hours between the departure therefrom of any such vessel (whether a ship of war, a privateer, or a merchant ship), of the one belligerent, and the subsequent departure therefrom of any ship of war or privateer of the other belligerent; and the times, hereby limited,

for the departure of such ships of war and privateers respectively, shall always, in case of necessity, be extended, so far as may be requisite for giving effect to this proviso, but not further or otherwise.

III. No ship of war or privateer of either belligerent shall hereafter be permitted, while in any port, roadstead, or waters subject to the territorial jurisdiction of Her Majesty, to take in any supplies, except provisions and such other things as may be requisite for the subsistence of her crew; and except so much coal only as may be sufficient to carry such vessel to the nearest port of her own country, or to some nearer destination; and no coal shall be again supplied to any such ship of war or privateer, in the same or any other port, roadstead, or waters subject to the territorial jurisdiction of Her Majesty, without special permission, until after the expiration of three months from the time when such coal may have been last supplied to her within British waters as aforesaid.

**W**HEREAS by an Act passed in the session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, intituled "An Act to prevent until the 1st day of September, 1850, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders amongst sheep, cattle, and other animals," which Act has since been from time to time continued by divers subsequent Acts, and lastly by an Act passed in the session of the twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and nineteen, it is (amongst other things) enacted that it shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time, to make such Orders and Regulations as to them may seem necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal, to or from such parts or places as they may designate in such Order or Orders, of sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals, or of meat, skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals, or of hay, straw, fodder, or other articles likely to propagate infection, and to make any other Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act, and

again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations; and that all provisions for any of the purposes aforesaid in any such Order or Orders contained shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in the said Act; and that all persons offending against the same shall for each and every offence forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding twenty pounds, or such smaller sum as the said Lords or others of Her Majesty's Privy Council may in any case by such Order direct:

And whereas a contagious or infectious disorder now prevails among cattle within that part of the United Kingdom called Great Britain, which disorder is generally designated as the "Cattle Plague:"

And whereas with a view to check the spreading of the said disorder, an Order, dated the 23rd of November, 1865, has been made, under the authority of the said Acts, by the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, consolidating and amending certain Orders previously made for that purpose; and the same has since been altered and amended by subsequent Orders, bearing date the 16th day of December, 1865, the 20th day of January, 1866, and the 6th day of February, 1866, which Orders cease on the 1st of March next:

And whereas it is expedient to continue the said Orders, so far as the same are consistent with an Act passed in this present session of Parliament, intituled "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," by which provisions have been made for the slaughtering of cattle affected with the cattle plague, and for other purposes:

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council do hereby, in exercise of the powers given under the said Act, so continued as aforesaid, order as follows:

I. The Orders of the Lords of the Council, dated the 23rd of November, 1865, the 16th of December, 1865, the 20th of January, 1866, and the 6th of February, 1866, are hereby continued; and where any local authority, under any powers given by any of the said Orders of the Lords of the Council, has published notices, or made orders within its district, all such notices or orders which may be in force when this Order comes into operation, are hereby continued until the same shall be altered or revoked by any further Order or by any local authority, subject nevertheless to the provisions contained in "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," or in any Act which may be hereafter passed.

II. The powers given by the said Orders, and by this present Order, to the local authority, shall be exercised, from and after the time when this Order comes into operation, by the local authority constituted under and for the purposes of "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," and not otherwise; save that, in any place in which there shall not be any local authority duly constituted under and for the purposes of the said last-mentioned Act, until after the time when this Order comes into operation, the local authority, for the purpose of exercising the powers aforesaid, shall in the meantime, and until the constitution of a local authority under the said Act, continue to be such as is defined by the said Orders of the 16th day of December, 1865, and the 6th day of February, 1866, respectively.

III. So much of the said Orders of the 16th day of December, 1865, and the 6th day of February, 1866, as is inconsistent with this present Order, is hereby revoked.

IV. This Order shall come into operation immediately on the publication thereof in the London Gazette, and shall continue in force until revoked by any further Order.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Lord President of the Council, a copy of an Ordinance passed by the Royal Court of Guernsey on the 17th instant, prohibiting the importation into that Island, of cattle, sheep, and pigs, shipped at British ports.

The above Ordinance, which came into operation on the 21st instant, also prohibits the said animals being brought to the Island of Guernsey with the intention of importing them.

The Master of any vessel infringing the provisions of the said Ordinance will be subjected to the penalties therein specified.

THE following Notices have been received by the Clerk of the Council from the Local Authorities appointed under the Orders of the Lords of the Council relating to the "Cattle Plague," and are published in the London Gazette in conformity with the requirements of their Lordships' Orders:—

#### CATTLE PLAGUE.

*Borough of Liverpool.*

I, THE undersigned John Farnworth, Mayor of the borough of Liverpool, in the county of Lancaster, being the local authority in that behalf, do hereby declare that it is expedient, in order to prevent the spreading of the disease, called the "Cattle Plague," within the said borough, to give the notice, and make the order hereinafter specified, that is to say:—

I do hereby give notice and order that, when and so often as there shall have appeared any case of cattle plague in any shippon, cowhouse, byre, shed, or other place within the said borough, no person shall bring into any such shippon, cowhouse, byre, shed, or place, nor shall any person receive therein, any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, sheep, or lamb, unless such shippon, cowhouse, byre, shed, or place is certified by a Cattle Plague Inspector duly appointed for and acting in the said borough, as being in a fit and proper condition for the reception of any such animal as aforesaid therein.

And, further, that every person offending against this Order shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £20 for every offence.

#### CATTLE PLAGUE.

*County of Kincardine.*

At a Meeting of the Justices of the Peace for the county of Kincardine, held at Stonehaven, on the 22nd day of February, 1866, whereof Sir Thomas Gladstone, Bart, was Chairman:—

It was resolved under the powers conferred by the several Orders of Her Majesty's Privy Council, dated respectively the 23rd day of November, and the 16th day of December, 1865, and the 20th day of January, 1866, and with reference 1st to their Order or Notice of 1st February, 1866, the Justices hereby resolve and give notice as follows:—the sixth resolution of said Order or Notice of 1st February, 1866, is hereby rescinded and recalled *in toto*. And with reference 2nd to their Order or Notice of 3rd February, 1866, the Justices hereby resolve and give notice as follows:—The second resolution of said Order or Notice of 3rd February, 1866, is hereby rescinded and recalled *in toto*, and the following resolution substituted in its place:—That notwithstanding the terms of the 1st resolution of said Order or Notice of 1st February, 1866, it shall be lawful to bring or send any sheep, lamb, goat, or swine from any other part of Great Britain into any place within the said county of Kincardine, provided such animals are so sent or brought with a certificate from the Inspector, or a Justice of the Peace of the district from which they are sent or brought, that they are free from cattle plague, and have not been in contact with animals suffering from it, such certificate to be countersigned by a Delegate of the parish to which they are to be taken, and provided also that the said animals shall not be allowed to rest at any steading where the cattle disease exists or has been during the previous three months.

#### CATTLE PLAGUE.

*Borough of Aberavon, in the county of Glamorgan.*

By virtue of the authority of an Order of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, bearing date the 16th day of December, 1865.

I, EVAN EVANS, Esquire, Mayor of the said borough, do, by this notice, order and declare, with a view to prevent the spread of the disorder designated the "Cattle Plague," that it is expedient, that after the due publication of this notice, and until the 1st day of March next, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf shall be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place within the said borough; and I further order and declare, that it is expedient that, from the time of the publication of this notice, and until the 1st day of March next, no sheep, lamb, or swine, except such sheep, lambs, or swine, as are brought only for the purpose of being slaughtered, and are slaughtered within twenty-four hours after their arrival in such borough, shall be removed to any place whatever within the said borough, and except the owner thereof shall, previous to removal, obtain a Licence of Removal from a Justice of the Peace, upon proving by a declaration that the animals lastly hereinbefore specified, have been in his or her possession for at least twenty-one days previous to his or her application, and that no animals have been suffering from the cattle plague on land in his or her occupation at any time, such licence to have effect for a period of three days, inclusive of the day on which it is issued.

Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall make it unlawful for any person to bring or

send any animal through the said borough by railway.

### CATTLE PLAGUE.

#### *Inverness-shire.*

At Inverness, the 21st day of February, 1866, in a meeting of the Justices of the Peace for the county of Inverness, in special sessions assembled, it was unanimously resolved, That it be declared, that from this date (21st February), in consideration of the modifications adopted by the Local Authority of the county of Elgin or Moray, those parts of said county lying to the south and east of the River Spey, and south and west of the River Avon, be excepted from the operation of the notice of the Local Authority of the county of Inverness, on the 2nd of February current, declaring that it be expedient that for the period to the 1st day of March next, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, and no raw or untanned hide or skin, and no horn, hoof, or offal of such animals, nor any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, shall be brought into the county of Inverness from the parts of Great Britain therein specified, and the said notice is hereby modified and altered accordingly, of all which notice is hereby given.

### CATTLE PLAGUE.

#### *County of Elgin.*

NOTICE is hereby given, that the Justices of the Peace for the county of Elgin, assembled in Sessions at Elgin, on the 20th day of February, 1866, under the authority of the Orders pronounced by the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated respectively 23rd November and 16th December, 1865, and 20th January, 1866, relative to the Cattle Plague, unanimously resolved as follows, viz. :—"The Justices of the Peace for the county of Elgin, in Sessions assembled at Elgin, on the 20th day of February, 1866, in exercise of the powers conferred upon them as the Local Authority within the said county, by the Orders of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated respectively 23rd November and 16th December, 1865, and 20th January, 1866, relative to the Cattle Plague, do hereby, with a view to prevent the spreading of the said disorder, declare that it is expedient, that for the period from this date to the 1st day of March next:—1st, That no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine shall be brought into the county of Elgin or Moray from any place in Great Britain, either by sea or land, other than from places within the counties of Nairn, Ross, Cromarty, Sutherland, and Caithness, and those parts of the county of Inverness comprehended within the parishes of Cromdale, Abernethy, and Duthil, declaring that the resolution of the Local Authorities of the county of Elgin, of date 5th January, 1866, in so far as it prohibits the introduction of said animals

from the parishes of Abernethy and Cromdale on the east or south side of the River Spey, into the other parts of the county of Elgin is hereby recalled; 2nd, That subject to the exceptions and provisions of the Privy Council Order of date 20th January, 1866, no raw or untanned hide or skin, and no horn, hoof, or offal of any such animal shall be brought into those parts of the county of Elgin or Moray lying on the south and east side of the River Spey, and south and west of the River Avon, from any place in Great Britain other than the counties and the parts of the county of Inverness respectively above-mentioned; and, 3rd, That no dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, shall be brought into those parts of the county of Elgin or Moray lying on the south and east side of the River Spey, and south and west of the River Avon, from any other part of Great Britain.

This notice to be without prejudice to the notice by the Local Authority of the county of Elgin or Moray of 22nd December last, regarding suspension of markets; to that of 6th January last, with reference to that part of the county of Elgin or Moray situated to the east of the River Spey and to the north of the River Avon; and to the notice of 30th January last; and of 9th February current, in so far as not altered by this notice.

Persons offending against the said Order in Council, shall for each offence forfeit a sum not exceeding Twenty Pounds, which the Justices before whom he or she shall be convicted may think fit to impose.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Ambassador at Vienna, reporting that the duties fixed by the Austrian Special Tariff on salted herrings, &c., imported into Austria, are as follows:—

	DUTY, florin kr.
Herrings, salted, barrel (tonne)	1 50
„ smoked, 1 centner gross	0 50
Stockfish, 1 centner gross	0 75

Salted herrings in small packages under a quarter of a barrel, as well as those altogether in irregular packages, will be charged a duty of 50 kreutzers per gross centner.

For the application of the duty of 1 florin 50 kr. per barrel, the gross weight, must not exceed 350 lbs., and that of the half and quarter barrel must not exceed 175 and 88 lbs. respectively, otherwise the package will be considered as irregular and the duty of 50 kr. will be charged.

**THE COUNTY COURTS' ACT.**

9 AND 10 VICT., c. 95.

NOTICE is hereby given, that Earl Cawdor, Lord of the Manor, Lordship, or Liberty of Kidwelly, comprising the Commotts of Kidwelly, Carnawllor, and Iskemen, in the county of Carmarthen, in respect of each such Commotts; and Lord of the Manors of Porfeld, Gwinfe, and Fabon, in the aforesaid county, having Courts in right thereof in which debts or demands may be recovered, has surrendered to Her Majesty under the powers of section fourteen of the above Act, the right of holding any of such Courts for any such purpose.

**CATTLE PLAGUE.—ISLE OF MAN.**

WHEREAS by an Act passed by the Legislature of the Isle of Man, entitled "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1865," it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of any two Members of the Council, from time to time to make such Orders and regulations, and to take such measures, as may appear to be necessary for preventing or regulating the importation of animals from parts beyond the seas.

Now, therefore, the Lieutenant-Governor, by and with the advice and consent of two Members of the Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers given by the said Act, hath ordered as follows:—

I. That the expression "animal" in this Order shall include any bull, cow, ox, heifer, steer, calf, tup, sheep, wether, or lamb; and that the expression "meat" shall include the flesh of any animal.

II. Before any animal to be imported into this island from that part of the United Kingdom called Ireland shall be landed, the following certificates in writing must be handed to the Collector of Customs at the port of entry:—

1. From a Government inspector at the port of embarkation that the cattle when embarked were free from any symptom of the cattle disease, generally known as the rinderpest.
2. A written certificate from an inspector appointed by the Lieutenant-Governor that there is no symptom of the said disease amongst any of the animals to be landed.
3. A written certificate from the master of the vessel that she has not been employed in carrying cattle, except from that part of the United Kingdom called Ireland, for a period of three months previous to the date of the said certificate.

III. In the event of the inspector certifying in writing to the Collector of Customs that the rinderpest exists on board any vessel importing animals, none of the animals on board such vessel shall be allowed to land.

IV. In the event of any doubt existing on the mind of an inspector whether any of the cattle being imported are affected by the rinderpest, two more inspectors shall be called in, and their decision, given in writing, shall be final.

V. In the event of the decision of the inspectors being that the symptoms are not those of rinderpest, then, upon this being certified in writing to the Collector of Customs, permission will be given for the animals to be landed; those, however, respecting which a doubt exists to be separated, and landed at such place and kept



within such limits as the inspectors may direct, for a period of six days, at the end of which time, on the inspector certifying that there is no appearance of the rinderpest, they may be removed by the owner.

VI. The owner will be responsible for the animals being provided with necessary food during this period.

VII. In the event of the rinderpest breaking out amongst any of the animals while in quarantine, the inspectors shall seize and slaughter, or cause to be slaughtered, and to be buried within the limits of the quarantine ground, or in such other place as the inspectors may appoint any animal labouring under such disease. And the animals that were in immediate contact or within the same yard or inclosure as the animal or animals so infected shall be removed to another part of the quarantine ground, and the quarantine of six days to commence afresh from the day of such removal.

VIII. In the event of any hay, straw, or other article, the importation of which is prohibited by the said Proclamation, being used for the packing and preservation of merchandise, the importers before the removal of their goods shall be required to give an undertaking in writing to the Collector of Customs at the port of entry that they will destroy or cause to be destroyed by fire, in the presence of a constable, within twenty-four hours

from the delivery of the goods, all such prohibited articles.

IX. No meat shall be imported without a certificate in writing from a Government inspector at the port of embarkation that the meat is free from disease and fit for human food.

X. These Orders to take effect from the 20th day of February, 1866.
