REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEES TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levees, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve*

o'clock, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentation shall be made at the Levee, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

The State apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court at one o'clock.

THE following Notices have been received by the Clerk of the Council from the Local Authorities appointed under the Orders of the Lords of the Council relating to the "Cattle Plague," and are published in the London Gazette in conformity with the requirements of their Lordships' Orders:—

THE CATTLE PLAGUE.

Borough of Bedford.

IN pursuance of an Act of Parliament passed in the Session of Parliament, holden in the 11th and 12th years of the reign of Her present Majesty, for preventing, until the 1st day of September, 1850, and to the end of the then next Session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals, which Act has since been from time to time continued by subsequent Acts; and in pursuance of an Order of Her Majesty's Privy Council, dated the 23rd day of November, 1865, I, William Joseph Nash, Mayor of the borough of Bedford, hereby declare that it is expedient that,

until the 1st day of March next, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, shall be brought from any other part of Great Britain into the borough of Bedford by railway, nor shall any such animal be brought into the borough except for immediate slaughter, and except under the conditions herein-after imposed, viz.:—That the owner of every such animal shall make a written declaration before a Justice of the said borough, that such animal has been in the possession of the owner for twenty-eight days immediately preceding, and during such time has been in a healthy state; that the cattle plague does not exist, and for the space of forty-two days has not existed on the land or premises from which it is intended to remove such animal, or within one mile therefrom, and that the owner of every such animal shall also produce to the said Justice a certificate of the Veterinary Inspector of the Petty Sessional Division in which the said land or premises are situate, that to the best of his belief the facts stated in the said declaration are true. Every animal shall be slaughtered within seventy-two hours after it shall have been brought into the borough. I hereby revoke all Orders heretofore made by the local authority in the said borough in pursuance of the said Act, so far as such Orders respectively are inconsistent herewith. Every person offending against this Order will be liable to forfeit £20. The Veterinary Inspector is instructed to examine all cattle brought into the borough, and to demand the necessary declaration and certificate. The police have special instructions to see that this Order is rigidly enforced.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

County of Worcester.

Epiphany adjourned Quarter Sessions.

27th day of February, 1866.

THE JUSTICES assembled at the Quarter Sessions held at the County Hall, Worcester, in and for the said county, by adjournment, on the 27th day of February, 1866, by virtue of the powers vested in them as the local authority, in the county of Worcester, by the Orders in Council, dated respectively the 23rd day of November, 1865, the 16th day of December, 1865, the 20th day of January, 1866, and the 23rd day of February, 1866, or one of them, as well as by "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," with the view to prevent the spreading of the disorder generally designated as the "Cattle Plague," declare as follows:—

1. That by the said Order in Council of the 23rd day of February, 1866, the several declarations of this Court, dated respectively the 3rd and 30th days of January last, and the 6th, 13th, and 20th days of February instant, or so much of them as are still in force, are continued and will be in force until the same shall be altered or revoked by any further Order in Council or by this Court, subject nevertheless to the provisions contained in "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," or in any Act which may be hereafter passed.

2. That from and after the 1st day of March next, all notices published and orders made by any local authority in the several boroughs of Bewdley, Droitwich, Dudley, Evesham, and Kidderminster, or either of them, shall be and the same are hereby revoked; and that from and after the said 1st day of March next the several

declarations of this Court made on the 3rd and 30th days of January last, and the 6th day of February instant, shall be and the same are (so far as they are applicable) hereby extended to and shall be in force in the said several boroughs, notwithstanding anything in the said declarations, or either of them, to the contrary.

3. That from and after this 27th day of February, 1866, so much of the declaration of this Court, dated the 30th day of January last, as prohibits the removal of swine from one place to another within this county, except under the conditions therein mentioned, shall be and the same is hereby revoked. Provided that this revocation shall not extend to the several parishes or places of Knighton-on-Teme, Newnham, and Rochford, or either of them, or to the districts comprised within a radius of two miles from the Pool House Farm, in the parish of Tenbury, or the districts within the like radius of two miles from the farm-houses in the occupation of Mr. Peyton and Mr. Munn respectively, in the hamlet of Sutton, in the parish of Tenbury.

4. The said several declarations of this Court in respect of such diseases, designated as the Cattle Plague, made on the 3rd, 23rd, and 30th days of January last, and the 6th, 13th, and 20th days of February instant, are to the foregoing extent only hereby altered and varied.

Every person offending against the tenor hereof will for every offence forfeit any sum not exceeding twenty pounds, which the Justices before whom he or she shall be convicted may think fit to impose.

"THE CATTLE DISEASES PREVENTION ACT, 1866."

NOTICE is hereby given, that at a Court of the Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesses of this borough, held on Wednesday, the 28th day of February, 1866, it was resolved and ordered, that on and from the 1st day of March, 1866, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, sheep, goat, or swine, shall be removed to any market or fair, parish or place whatsoever, within the jurisdiction of this borough, for the purpose of exhibition or sale.

And it was further ordered, that on and from the said 1st day of March, 1866, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf shall be brought or removed from any place without the jurisdiction of this borough to any place within the said jurisdiction, nor be on, nor pass over, along, or across any highway or public road within the said jurisdiction; provided always that nothing contained in this order shall make it unlawful for any person to send or carry, bring or remove, any such animal on, over, or along any highway or public road within the said jurisdiction, from one part of a farm to another part of the same farm, provided no disease exists, or, for the space of six days prior to such removal shall have existed in any animal on such farm, and provided the distance along such highway or public road shall not exceed four hundred yards.

And notice is hereby given, that until further notice the above orders will be strictly enforced.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

NOTICE.

East Riding of the County of York.

At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Sovereign Lady the Queen, held at the Sessions-house, in Beverley, in and for the said Riding, on Tuesday, the 2nd day of January, 1866, and continued by several adjournments to the Sessions-house, in Beverley aforesaid, and there held on Tuesday, the 27th day of February, 1866, before the Honourable Arthur Duncombe, Chairman, the Right Honourable Lord Wenlock, and other Justices there,

The following letter was read from the Secretary of State for the Home Department:—

Whitehall, 22nd February, 1866.

"Sir,—In am directed by Secretary Sir George Grey to call your attention to the 'Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866,' a copy of which is enclosed.

"You will see, on reference to the 6th section of the Act, that where the Quarter Sessions in any county are not adjourned to some day not later than Tuesday next, they are adjourned by the operation of the Act to Monday next, the 26th instant.

"No time, therefore, should be lost in giving notice, when necessary, to the Justices.

"It will be observed that provision is made in the 8th section for the formation of a Committee or Committees, which may exercise such powers as may be given to them by the Court of Quarter Sessions, with the exception of the power of making a rate.

"The local authorities, as defined by the 3rd section of the Act, differ somewhat from those which have been constituted under the Orders of Council, published under the authority of the Act of the 11th and 12th Victoria, cap. 107, it having been necessary, for the purposes of the rate to be levied under the Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, that boroughs assessed to the county rate of a county should be included within the jurisdiction of the Quarter Sessions of that county.

"The provisions of the Act with respect to the slaughter of diseased animals, their burial, and the cleansing and disinfection of the premises, and of all articles by which infection may be spread, will be found in the 12th, 13th, and 14th sections.

"A large discretion is left to local authorities with respect to the slaughter of animals not actually diseased, but which have been in the

same shed or stable, or in the same herd or flock, or in contact with the animals affected with the cattle plague. Sir George Grey does not doubt that this discretion will be carefully exercised, and that the slaughter of animals not affected by the disease will be avoided unless there is good reason to apprehend that they will be the means of extending it to others.

"For the purpose of assisting local authorities in securing the effectual disinfection of premises, &c., by which infection may be spread, the Lords of the Council have requested the Royal Commission upon the cattle plague to frame instructions, copies of which will be forwarded to you as soon as they are received from the Commission.

"A further communication will be addressed to you, with respect to the information which, under the 25th section of the Act, is to be supplied by local authorities to the Privy Council.

"I am to request that you will lay this letter before the Chairman of the Quarter Sessions.

1. Whereupon it is ordered—That in exercise of the powers contained in section 8 of the Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866, one General Committee be now appointed, consisting of all the Acting Justices of the Peace of this Riding, to be called "The Cattle Plague General Committee."

2. That for the more effectually carrying into effect the provisions of the said last-named Act, a Committee be also formed for each Petty Sessional Division of the Riding, to consist of the Acting Justices for each division, and of three other persons qualified as required by the 8th clause of the said Act, and that the following be such Committee, that is to say:—

For the Division of Buckrose.—The Acting Justices of the Peace for such division, together with Robert Wise, of Auburn Hill, Norton; John Lett, of Scampston; and Robert Topham, of Mowthorpe.

For the Division of Dickering.—The Acting Justices of the Peace for such division, together with Robert Crowe, of Speeton; Joseph Barugh, of Charleston, near Boynton; and John Simpson, of Hunmanby Field.

For the Division of South Holderness.—The Acting Justices of the Peace for such division, together with Robert Charles Metcalfe, of Patrington; George Cole Francis, of Keyingham; Wm. Thompson, of Burstwick.

For the Division of Middle Holderness.—The Acting Justices of the Peace for such division, together with Jno. Taylor Dickinson, of Humbleton; Henry Cautley, of Hedon; Thos. Barber, of Sproatley; and the Mayor of Hedon.

For the Division of North Holderness.—The Acting Justices of the Peace for such division, together with John George Ainsley, of Dunnington; Richard Taylor, of Sigglesworth; and Thos. Harrison, of Leven Hall Garth.

For the Division of Holme Beacon.—The Acting Justices of the Peace for such division, together with Thomas Mitchell, Market Weighton; Fras. Brough, Goodmanham; and Wm. Kempsey, Thorpe-le-Street.

For the Division of Howdenshire.—The Acting Justices of the Peace for such division, together with Mr. Stephenson, Metham; Jas. Banks, Wressle; and Mr. Coulson, Howden.

For the Division of North Hunsley Beacon.—The Acting Justices of the Peace for such division, together with Robert Fisher, Leckonfield; Edmund Riley, South Dalton; John Paul Duggleby, Beswick; and the Mayor of Beverley.

For the Division of South Hunsley Beacon.—The Acting Justices of the Peace for such division, together with John Danby, Weedley; John Burstall Thompson, Anlaby; and John George Weddell, North Hall, Faxfleet.

For the Division of Ouse and Derwent.—The Acting Justices of the Peace for such division, together with Roger Barker, Dunnington; Thos. Lanley Dodsworth, Wheldrake; and Thomas Keeley, Elvington.

For the Division of Wilton Beacon.—The Acting Justices of the Peace for such division, together with Wm. Kirby, Skirpenbeck; John Byass, Huggate; and Chas. Watson, Seaton Ross.

For the Division of Bainton Beacon.—The Acting Justices of the Peace for such division, together with Thomas Hopper, Kelleythorpe; Geo. Angas, Beeford Grange; Simpson Staveley, Tibthorpe Manor House.

3. That all the powers vested in this Court as the local authority for the said Riding, by clauses 12, 13, 14, 15, and 16, of "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866" (except the power to make a rate), be and the same are hereby delegated to such several Petty Sessional Committees, to be exercised by each Committee in and for its own division.

4. That power be and the same is hereby delegated to the several Petty Sessional Committees to hire land, as authorised by clause 26 of the said Act, for the purpose of burying therein animals dying of cattle plague, or slaughtered under the said Act.

5. That all appointments of inspectors under the Order of this Court of the 30th day of January last, be, and the same are hereby, revoked, and that the following Veterinary Surgeons, or duly qualified persons, be and they are hereby appointed inspectors, for the purpose of carrying into effect the regulations of the said Orders in Council and of this Order, and the provisions of the said Act within the several districts following, that is to say:—

For the Petty Sessional Division of

Buckrose.—Mr. Jonathan Ringrose, Weaverthorpe.

Bainton Beacon.—Mr. Thomas Bowman, Croome, Sledmere; Mr. Frederick Danby, Driffild.

Dickering.—Mr. George Bourdass, Bridlington. Middle Holderness and South Holderness.—Mr. Joseph Freeman, Keyingham; Mr. J. B. Douthwaite, Swine; Mr. J. Hoskisson, Patrington.

North Holderness.—Mr. John Ireland, North Frodingham.

Holme Beacon.—Mr. Job Cooper, Market Weighton.

Howdenshire.—Mr. Thomss Faulkner, Howden.

North Hunsley Beacon.—Mr. William Douthwaite, jun., Beverley.

6. That power be, and the same is, hereby delegated to each Petty Sessional Committee to dismiss any of such inspectors, or to appoint such additional and duly qualified inspectors for their respective divisions as they think proper, and to supply any vacancies which may from time to time arise in the office of inspectors for their respective divisions, provided that no larger sum than one guinea per day, with travelling expenses at the rate of threepence per mile each way, be in any case allowed to such inspectors.

7. That it be an instruction to each Petty Sessional Committee to cause notice to be forthwith given to every township in each division, requiring the ratepayers in each township, in meeting assembled, to return to the clerk of each such Petty Sessional Division the name of a competent ratepayer of such township, to act as valuer of all animals slaughtered in such township under the authority of the said Act, and that such person so nominated be appointed, by the Petty Sessional Committee, as an officer of such Committee, and that he, with the assistance (if required by the owner of the animal slaughtered or to be slaughtered) of the valuer appointed for any adjoining township, shall assess the value of all animals ordered to be slaughtered in such township, pursuant to clause 16 of the said Act.

8. That the clerk of each Petty Sessional Division be the clerk of each Petty Sessional Committee now appointed, and that it be the duty of each such clerk to keep the accounts of all expenses incurred under the Act, and to report the same with such information as may be required by the Privy Council, under section 25 of the Act, to the Clerk of the Peace, and that the salaries and allowances to be made in respect of such services be hereafter determined by the General Committee.

9. And pursuant to, and in exercise of, the power and authorities in this behalf vested in and conferred upon them by and in certain Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, the said Justices in Quarter Sessions assembled do hereby revoke and rescind so much and such parts only of the order made by this Court with reference to the cattle plague on the 30th day of January last, as may be inconsistent with the order hereinafter mentioned, and with the said Act and by virtue of the said Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council do hereby declare that (with a view to prevent the spreading of the said disorder) it is expedient to prevent the removal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, or swine, between this date and the 15th day of April, 1866, to any public fair or market, or to any place whatever in the said Riding (including the boroughs of Beverley and Hedon), for the purpose of exhibition or sale, except under the conditions next hereinafter imposed. And the said Justices do accordingly declare and order that, between the dates aforesaid, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, or swine, shall be brought or sent into any such public fair or market, or place as aforesaid, unless with the licence in writing under the hand of a Justice of the Peace acting in and for the said Riding, dated at the time of issue, specifying the number and description of animals to be brought or sent, and the place from, and the public market or fair, or other place to which the same shall be brought or sent, and the time during which the licence shall remain in force, such licence to be lodged by the person using the same, with some East Riding Police Constable, or at the East Riding Police Station nearest the fair, market, or other place to which such animal shall be brought or sent,

within twelve hours after the expiration of the time for which the licence was granted; and unless such cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, be marked by the hair being clipped off the end of the tail by the officers of the said fair or market, or in case there be no such officer, by the person or persons selling the same; and also unless such cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, or swine, be slaughtered within twenty-four hours after the same shall have been so brought or sent in such fair or market, or the town or place in which the same is held, and be not allowed to leave such town or place alive; but no such licence shall be issued unless the animal to be removed shall have been at least twenty-one days then last past in the possession of the applicant.

10. And the said Justices declare that (with a view to prevent the spreading of the said disorder) it is expedient, and they do accordingly order that it shall not, between the dates last aforesaid, be lawful for any person to bring any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, or swine, or any raw or untanned hides or skins, or any horns or hoofs, of any such last-named animals (except such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs, as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America), or the offal of any of such last-named animals, or any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, from any part of Great Britain beyond the said Riding into any place within the said Riding, except only any of such animals as may be sent or carried by railway through the said Riding, after the 25th day of March next, and provided that nothing contained in this clause of this Order shall make it unlawful for any person to bring or send, with the licence of any two Justices acting in and for the said Riding any such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or other articles as aforesaid, from any land and premises in his own occupation and beyond this Riding to any other lands or premises in his own occupation within this Riding, during a time to be specified in such licence.

11. And the said Justices do by this order further declare that (with a view to prevent the spreading of the said disorder) it is expedient and they do accordingly hereby order that it shall not be lawful, between the dates last aforesaid, for any person to remove any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, or swine, from place to place in the said Riding, except for the purpose of slaughter, and with the licence of a Justice of the Peace, as hereinafter mentioned, and every such animal shall be immediately marked by the hair being clipped off the end of the tail by the vendor, and shall on no account be allowed to leave the premises of the purchaser alive. And the said Justices further order that it shall not be lawful between the dates last aforesaid, for any person to remove from place to place in the said Riding any raw or untanned hides or skins, or any horns or hoofs of any of the last-named animals, except such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs, as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America, or the offal of any such named animals, or any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection.

12. Provided always, that upon obtaining the written licence of one Justice of the Peace acting in and for the said Riding, it shall be lawful for any person to remove any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, or swine, which is uninfected, from any uninfected lands or premises in his own occupation, to any other uninfected lands also in his own occupation, in the same or an adjoining township, and with the like licence to drive or

take a cow or heifer to a bull, or any sow to a boar, on any other farm or lands, or any uninfected swine from any uninfected farm or lands to any other uninfected farm or lands. Provided also, that any Justice acting in and for the said Riding may, by order in writing, allow any uninfected fat cattle, on any uninfected lands or premises within the Riding (on application by or on behalf of the owner thereof, and upon being satisfied that the said last-named cattle have been on the owner's uninfected premises for twenty-one days, and are then in good health), and that no "Cattle Plague" exists, and has not existed on the said premises at any time during the twenty-eight days then next preceding, to be removed to any slaughter-house within such Riding, for slaughter within twenty-four hours after their arrival at such slaughter-house. And provided further, that nothing herein contained shall render it unlawful, after the 25th day of March next, with the like licence, for any person to send or carry any such uninfected animal from uninfected premises along any highway to the nearest convenient railway station, nor to prohibit the sending or carrying such animal, or any such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or other articles as aforesaid, by railway through or out of this Riding, nor the sending or carrying any such animal, or any such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or other articles as aforesaid, if brought by sea, from any place out of Great Britain into this Riding, to the nearest convenient railway station for the purpose of carrying them through or out of the Riding. Provided that nothing herein contained shall authorize the removal of any such animal as hereinafter mentioned between an hour after sunset and an hour before sunrise; that no hoof or hide shall be removed without first being disinfected, and a licence being obtained for the said removal; and that every drover or person removing any cattle shall, on demand, produce his licence, and show the same to any Justice, police constable, or Inspector requiring the same.

13. It is expedient, and the Justices recommend, that all dogs be tied up or kept confined on the premises to which they respectively belong.

14. That the occupiers of lands in each township in the Riding be earnestly requested to co-operate with the authorities in enforcing the foregoing orders.

15. That this order be deemed published by notice in the Eastern Morning News newspaper of Wednesday, the 28th day of February instant.

Pursuant to the foregoing orders of Sessions, I do hereby give notice thereof accordingly.

It is ordered that, in pursuance of "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," Mr. Abraham Sherwood, of this town, Veterinary Surgeon, be, and he is hereby appointed Cattle Inspector for the borough of Faversham. It shall be the duty of the said Inspector, at the request of the Mayor, or his deputy, to inquire into and report upon every case of cattle plague, or supposed cattle plague, arising within this borough; and at the like request, to give any certificate that may be required for the purposes of the Act, or to enable the Mayor, or his deputy, to grant any licence for the removal of cattle, either into the borough, or from one part of the borough to any other part thereof. That the Cattle Inspector shall be paid for his services such remuneration as the Cattle Plague Committee shall think just and reasonable.

It is ordered that, in pursuance of "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," the Superintendent of Police for the borough be, and he is hereby appointed Cattle Reporting Officer. That it shall be his duty, at all times, to report to the Mayor, or Deputy Mayor, any cases of cattle plague, or supposed cattle plague, occurring in this borough, or any contravention or breach of any of the orders now made, or any other order to be made, by the local authority under the provisions of the said Act; and to carry out the instructions of the Mayor, or his deputy, and of the Cattle Plague Committee, and that his remuneration shall be fixed by such Committee.

It is ordered that from the 2nd day of March, 1866, it shall not be lawful for any person to bring or send any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, or calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine to any market or fair, or to any place whatever, within the borough, for the purpose of exhibition or sale.

It is ordered that on and from the said 2nd day of March, 1866, no cow, heifer, bullock, ox, or calf, shall be brought from any place without the said borough to any place within the said borough; nor be on, nor pass over, along or across, any highway or public road within the said borough.

It is ordered that on and from the 2nd day of March, 1866, to the 15th day of April next, no dung, offal, horns, bones, raw or untanned hides, or skins of any sheep, cow, heifer, bull, bullock,

or calf, horse, swine, or any other animal (except as by the Orders in Council excepted) shall be unloaded within the borough from any barge, boat, or other vessel, or from any railway truck, or cart, waggon, or other vehicle, or be sent or brought into the said borough in any way from the Metropolis, as defined in the "Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," or from any other place where the cattle plague is existing or has existed within the last six months previously.

It is ordered that the Mayor, or Deputy Mayor, shall have power, at all times, hereafter, to grant to any person licence to move any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, not affected with the cattle plague, to any place within this borough, or from one place in this borough to any other place within this borough, and that such licence shall be in force for such time only as shall be specified therein. That the Mayor, or Deputy Mayor, may require any person applying for such licence, to produce the certificate of the Cattle Inspector that the cattle to be removed is not affected with the cattle plague.

It is ordered that any person desirous of obtaining any such licence must apply, in the first instance, to the Cattle Reporting Officer, who will forthwith report thereon to the Mayor or Deputy.

It is ordered that in pursuance of "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," the following members of the Council, viz:—the Mayor, the Deputy Mayor, Messrs. Hogben, Coulter, Spong, Anderson, jun., and Cresswell, be, and they are hereby appointed a Committee, under the said Act, for the borough of Faversham, and that the said Committee shall be called "The Cattle Plague Committee," and subject to the foregoing orders, all the powers conferred by this Act on the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses, acting by the Council, shall be delegated to the said Committee, excepting the power to make a rate. That the said Committee shall have power to revoke or alter any of the foregoing orders, and to make others in lieu thereof as often as they shall deem it expedient so to do.

It is ordered that the town clerk shall, by the direction of the Mayor, or his Deputy, convene a meeting of the Cattle Plague Committee as often as necessary.

It is ordered that the foregoing orders should be printed and distributed in the town and neighbourhood, and advertised in the Faversham Mercury and East Kent Gazette.

By virtue and in pursuance of certain Orders by the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated respectively the 23rd day of November, the 16th day of December, 1865, the 27th day of January, and the 23rd day of February, 1866, made in pursuance of the several Acts of Parliament therein mentioned, we, Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the county of Carnarvon, assembled in Quarter Sessions, held by adjournment at Carnarvon, in and for the said county, on Wednesday, the 28th day of February, 1866, being the Local Authority constituted under and for the purposes of the Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866, do now by this Notice order and declare, that until further notice, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, goat, or

swine, or any raw or untanned hides, skins, horns, or hoofs of any such animals, or the offal of any such animals, or any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, shall be removed or taken from any part or parts of the county of Carnarvon lying to the east of the River Conway into any other part or parts of the same county, for any purpose or under any conditions whatever, except as hereinafter provided.

And that until such further notice, no such animals as aforesaid, or any such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or other articles as aforesaid, shall be removed or taken to any market or fair within any part of the said county, for the purpose of exhibition or sale.

And that no such animals, or any such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or other articles as aforesaid, shall be brought into the said county, or any part thereof, from any place or places whatsoever (except that cattle, sheep, and pigs for immediate slaughter, or hay, straw, and fodder may be brought by road only into the said county from any part of the county of Anglesey, except the parish of Holyhead).

Provided always that (with the exception of cattle as defined by Section 3 of the said Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866), it shall not be unlawful for any person to send or carry sheep, goats, or swine, or any hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or other articles as aforesaid, by railway through the said county.

Provided also that it shall not be unlawful for any person to remove or take hay, straw, and fodder, by road only, and for the purpose of feeding only, but not for sale, from any part or parts of the county of Carnarvon lying to the east of the River Conway, into any other part or parts of the same county, with a license signed by two Justices of the same county, during a time to be specified in such license.

Provided also that it shall not be unlawful for any person to bring or send (with a license signed by two Justices of the same county), any such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or other articles as aforesaid, from any land or premises in his own occupation, beyond the jurisdiction of the said county, which shall be free from the cattle disease, to any other land or premises in his own occupation, within the jurisdiction of the said county, during a time to be specified in such license.

2. That it shall not be lawful for any person to bring or send into, or expose for sale, at any of the markets or fairs, or any other place within the said jurisdiction, except upon his own premises, any animal of the description above mentioned (except sheep and swine).

3. That the Justices of the Peace acting in and for the First Petty Sessional Division of the said county be, and they are hereby appointed a committee of the local authority for the said First Division. And that the Justices of the Peace acting in and for the Second Petty Sessional Division of the said county be, and they are hereby also appointed a committee of the local authority for such Second Division. Such committees respectively to have power to appoint a certain number of other persons being ratepayers within their respective divisions to form part of such committee.

Light Vessel at Entrance to Saigon River.

The light is a *fixed* white light, at an elevation of 32 feet above the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 10 miles.

The vessel has one mast, moored head and stern N.W., and S.E., in $5\frac{1}{2}$ fathoms water, close to the right bank of the river, N.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., distant $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Cangiou point, and N.W. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., $8\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Ganh-Ray point.

Vessels should steer for the river with the two points of Cocoa-tree bay in line, or with the north point on with the south summit of the bluff of Ganh-Ray, so as to bring the light vessel to bear N.W. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., then steer for the light vessel, endeavour to maintain the bearing, and leave her on the port hand for the two points at the entrance of the river; when the middle of the river may be followed without difficulty.

Rock off Great Palm Island.

THE following information has been received at the Admiralty, relative to a dangerous rock recently discovered by H.M.S. "Salamander," Acting Commander D. Young, of the north-east point of Great Palm Island, on the east coast of Australia.

The rock, which has been named the Hayman, is in lat. $18^{\circ} 43' 30''$ S., long. $146^{\circ} 43' 30''$ E., rather more than 2 miles off the north-east point of Great Palm Island, and nearly in the track of vessels; when first observed, a slight break of the sea only was visible, but on a nearer approach the rock was distinctly seen. Its north-east part is awash at low water, and from it the centre of the White Rock—off the south-east point of the Great Palm Island—bears S.E. $\frac{1}{4}$ S., distant 3 miles; the south-east point of Great Palm Island S. $\frac{1}{4}$ E., $2\frac{1}{4}$ miles; and the north-east point of Great Palm Island W. $\frac{1}{4}$ N., $2\frac{1}{4}$ miles.

From its north-east part the rock extends in a S.W. direction at least 100 yards and about 20 yards in breadth, with 3 and $4\frac{1}{2}$ fathoms water on it shelving to 9 fathoms. Between it and Great Palm Island there are 10 and 13 fathoms; and eastward of it 15 fathoms, mud. No landing could be effected on account of the sea. The approximate rise of tide at springs may be 8 or 10 feet.

When bound to the northward and closing the Palm Islands, bring the centre of the northernmost island to bear N.W. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., and steer for it until the north-east point of Great Palm Island bears W. by S.; then keep a little westward to avoid the Zebra and other doubtful shoals on the north.

Fixed Light on Double Island.

The Secretary of State for India has given notice, that on the 4th day of December, 1865, a light was established on Double Island, coast of Tenasserim, Gulf of Martaban.

The light is a *fixed* white light, seen through an arc of $164\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ or when bearing from about N. $\frac{3}{4}$ W., round by east to S.S.E.; the former bearing passes $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles westward of Kalegouk or Callagouk Island, and the latter $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles westward of the Patch buoy off Amherst. The elevation of the light is not given, but it is said to be seen in clear weather from a distance of 19 miles.

A strip of light shows from the Patch buoy eastward as far as Amherst point.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses, of the first order.

Double Island is in lat. $15^{\circ} 52' 30''$ N., long., $97^{\circ} 36' 30''$ east of Greenwich. Amherst point bears from the light N. $\frac{3}{4}$ W.; the Patch buoy N. by W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W.; and the west point of Kalegouk Island S. by E.

Vessels making the light should endeavour to keep it between the bearings of S.E. and N.E., paying particular attention to the tides, as at springs they run about 5 knots an hour, parallel with coast. Vessels standing too close to the land will lose sight of the light, but so long as the light is in sight there will be no danger until 10 miles northward of it, when approaching the Goodwin sands, where the tides set very strong. The anchoring ground in the vicinity of Double Island is good, but, on account of the strength of the tides, vessels should avoid as much as possible the risk of anchoring in such deep water.

To the Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the Parish of Chesham, in the county of Buckingham;—

To the Clerk or Clerks to the Justices of the Petty Sessions held for the division or divisions in which the said parish is situate;—

And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS the population of the parish of Chesham, in the county of Buckingham, according to the last census, exceeds two thousand persons.

And whereas, at a meeting of the vestry of the said parish, held in the vestry room in the parish church, on Thursday, the 6th day of July last, in pursuance of notice duly given, it was resolved unanimously—

“That application shall be made to the Commissioners for administering the laws relating to the poor in England to make an order under their seal of office, that the Act passed on the 5th of August, 1850 (the 13th and 14th Victoria, chapter 57), intituled ‘An Act to prevent the holding of vestry or other meetings in churches, and for regulating the appointment of vestry clerks,’ shall be applied to and be put in force within this parish of Chesham, as regards that portion only of the said Act which relates to the appointment of a vestry clerk; and that the said Commissioners be requested to assign to the said vestry clerk (notwithstanding a collector of poor rates for the said parish of Chesham may be appointed), in addition to the duties which will devolve upon him in pursuance of sec. 7 of the 13th and 14th Vic., c. 57, the duty of making out all the poor rates of this parish, and the procuring the same to be allowed, and giving the notices thereof required by law; and that for the duties to be performed by such vestry clerk, it is the opinion of this vestry that he be paid a salary of thirty pounds a year.”

And whereas the Churchwardens of the said parish have made their application in writing to the Poor Law Board, pursuant to the above resolution,

Now, therefore, we, the Poor Law Board, under the authority of the several Statutes in that behalf made and provided, hereby order and direct as follows:—

ARTICLE I.—That so much of the said Act passed in the fourteenth year of the reign of Her Majesty, intituled “An Act to prevent the holding of vestry or other meetings in churches, and for regulating the appointment of vestry clerks,” as relates to the appointment of a vestry clerk, shall forthwith be applied to, and be put in force within, the said parish of Chesham.

ARTICLE II.—That the vestry clerk for the time being, appointed under the authority of the statutes in that behalf and this order, shall per-

form the following duties, in addition to those set forth in the said Act:—

To make out the poor rate for the said parish as and when the same shall become requisite; to procure the same to be allowed; and to give notices thereof as required by law.

ARTICLE III.—That an annual salary of thirty pounds shall be paid to such vestry clerk by the Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the said parish.

ARTICLE IV.—That the salary of such vestry clerk shall be payable up to the day on which he ceases to hold such office, and no longer, and shall be paid by quarterly payments at the several quarters ending at the usual feast days in the year, namely, Michaelmas-day, Christmas-day, Lady-day, and Midsummer-day, with a proportionate sum to be paid to his executors or administrators, in case he shall die while holding such office.

ARTICLE V.—That a copy of this Order shall be published in the London Gazette.
