REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card

with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentation shall be made at the Levee, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

The State apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court at one o'clock.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the eleventh of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, in the words following; viz:—

"Whereas your Majesty was graciously pleased by your Order in Council, dated the 9th September, 1865, to direct that the admission of inmates into Greenwich Hospital should be restricted to such petty officers and seamen of your Majesty's Navy, and such non-commissioned officers and privates of your Majesty's Corps of Royal Marines as may be infirm or helpless: And whereas we are of opinion that it would be expedient to establish more definite regulations with respect to the persons who should be considered eligible to appear before us as candidates for admission into

Greenwich Hospital; we beg leave to recommend that your Majesty will be pleased by your Order in Council to sanction the establishment of the following regulations. The admission of inmates into Greenwich Hospital to be confined to the undermentioned persons:

"1. All petty officers and seamen of your Majesty's Navy, and all non-commissioned officers and privates of your Majesty's Corps of Royal Marines, who have been granted pensions either for long service, or for injuries received or disease contracted in your Majesty's Service, and who may be infirm or helpless.

"2. All petty officers and seamen of your Majesty's Navy, and all non-commissioned officers and privates of your Majesty's Corps of Royal Marines, who have served, with good characters, for ten years continuously, or with short intervals, and who may be infirm or helpless.

"3. All petty officers and seamen of your Majesty's Navy, and all non-commissioned officers and privates of your Majesty's Corps of Royal Marines, whose claims may be special and exceptional, not coming within the above mentioned classes.

"All or any of such inmates to be discharged at the discretion of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty."

Her Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed: And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

THE following Notices have been received by the Clerk of the Council from the Local Authorities appointed under the Orders of the Lords of the Council relating to the "Cattle Plague," and are published in the London Gazette in conformity with the requirements of their Lordships' Orders:—

CATTLE PLAGUE.

County of Carnarvon.

By virtue and in pursuance of certain Orders by the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, dated respectively the 23rd day of November, the 16th day of December, 1865, the 20th day of January and the 23rd day of February, 1866, made in pursuance of the several Acts of Parliament therein mentioned. We, Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace, for the county of Carnarvon, assembled in Quarter Sessions, held at Carnarvon, in and for the said county, on Saturday, the 3rd day of March, 1866, being the local authority constituted under and for the purposes of the Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866, do now by this notice, order and declare that until further notice no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, goat, or swine, or any raw or untanned hides, skins, horns, or hoofs of any such animals, or the offal of any such animals, or any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, shall be removed or taken from any part or parts of the county of Carnarvon, lying to the east of the River Conway, into any other part or parts of the same county, for any purpose or under any conditions whatever, except as hereinafter provided.

And that until such further notice, no such animals as aforesaid, or any such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or other articles as aforesaid, shall be removed or taken to any market or fair within any part of the said county, for the purpose of exhibition or sale.

And that no such animals, or any such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or other articles as aforesaid, shall be brought into the said county, or any part thereof, from any place or places whatsoever (except that cattle, sheep, and pigs for immediate slaughter, or hay, straw, and fodder may be brought by road only into the said county from any part of the county of Anglesey, except the parish of Holyhead).

Provided always that (with the exception of cattle as defined by Section 3 of the said Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866), it shall not be unlawful for any person to send or carry sheep, goats, or swine, or any hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or other articles as aforesaid, by railway through the said county.

Provided also that it shall not be unlawful for any person to remove or take hay, straw, and fodder, by road only, and for the purpose of feeding only, but not for sale, from any part or parts of the county of Carnarvon lying to the east of the River Conway, into any other part or parts of the same county, with a licence signed by two Justices of the same county, during a time to be specified in such licence.

Provided also that it shall not be unlawful for any person to bring or carry into the said county of Carnarvon any hay or straw from the county of Merioneth, if the person or persons so bringing the same shall have the licence in writing thereunto of two Magistrates of the said county of Carnarvon.

Provided also that it shall not be unlawful for any person to bring or send (with a license signed by two Justices of the same county), any such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or other articles as aforesaid, from any land or premises in his own occupation, beyond the jurisdiction of the said county, which shall be free from the cattle disease, to any other land or premises in his own occupation, within the jurisdiction of the said county, during a time to be specified in such licence.

Every person offending against the above Order is liable to a penalty of not exceeding £20.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

THE Magistrates and Town Council of Arbroath as the Local Authority under the Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866, do hereby, in virtue of the powers conferred upon them by Orders of the Privy Council and of the said Act, declare that it is expedient that the following animals, videlicet:— every cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox and calf shall be excluded from the weekly cattle markets within the said burgh and also all other places within the jurisdiction of the said Magistrates and Town Council for the purpose of exhibition and sale until the 1st day of April next, unless this Order be previously recalled with this qualification, that animals to be removed from the said market direct to the public shambles of the said burgh and there slaughtered under the directions of the Inspector, shall not be so excluded; and that it will not be lawful for any person after the publication of this notice to bring or send any animal of the said

description into the said markets or to any place within the jurisdiction of the said Magistrates and Town Council for the purpose of exhibition or sale, or to receive, exhibit, buy, or sell any such animals so brought or sent except under the qualification aforesaid, and that any person in any way offending therein will for every offence be liable in a penalty of twenty pounds sterling.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

Borough of Devizes.

NOTICE is hereby given, that at a meeting of the Council of the said borough of Devizes, in the county of Wilts, held in the Council Chamber of the said borough, on Friday, the 2nd day of March, 1866, it was ordered and declared:—

1. That no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, nor any raw or untanned hide or skin, nor any horn, hoof, or offal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf (except such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America), nor any dung likely to propagate infection, be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place within the borough; and that no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf be removed along any highway, or the sides thereof, within the borough, for a distance greater than 440 yards, except as hereinafter mentioned, viz.:

- (i) It shall be lawful for any person to remove any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, bonâ fide his or her property, from land in his or her own occupation, in any adjoining parish or place within the county of Wilts, to land also in his or her own occupation in the said borough, provided that no such animal shall, during such removal, traverse any highway, or the sides thereof, for a greater distance than 440 yards.
- (ii) It shall be lawful for any person to remove into the said borough, under the superintendence of the police, any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, fit for immediate slaughter, or the hide, or skin, or the horns, hoofs, or offal of any such animal, from any land in his or her own occupation, in the county of Wilts (every such animal having been marked by the police by clipping the hair off the end of the tail previously to removal, and to be slaughtered to the knowledge of the Inspector of the Police within 48 hours of reaching its destination); or any bull or cow for breeding purposes; or any calf in a covered cart or waggon for the purpose of being weaned; or any cattle on change of tenancy, or for the purpose of stocking a farm or land (such cattle being in every instance the bonâ fide property of the person removing the same), under the following conditions, that is to say:—
 - (a) That an order in writing for such removal be first obtained from two or more Justices of the Peace assembled in Petty Sessions for the said borough, and which shall be executed within seven days after the date thereof.
 - (b) That no such order be granted except on the production of a declaration in writing from the owner that the cattle proposed to be removed are in a healthy condition, and have for twenty-one days previously been in the possession of the said owner. And of a

like declaration by such owner, and a certificate in writing from the Superintendent of the Police for the division in or out of which it is proposed to remove such cattle, that the cattle plague does not exist, nor within the space of thirty days previously has existed, within two miles of the parish or place, whence it is proposed to make such removal; such order to be shown on demand to the police, or any ratepayer in such division or borough by any person in charge of the said cattle.

2. That no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, goat, or swine be removed, brought, or sent for exhibition or sale to any market or fair within the borough.

3. That no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, goat, or swine, nor the raw or untanned hide or skin, nor any horn, hoof, or offal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, or goat, (except such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs, as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America), nor any dung, likely to propagate infection, shall be brought into the borough, or removed from any farm, or along or across any highway or the sides thereof, in any parish or place within the borough, after the Inspector shall have certified that the cattle plague exists, or within the space of thirty days previously has existed, within the borough.

4. That no removal of any animal under any of the foregoing Orders be made, except between the hours of seven in the morning and five in the afternoon.

5. That the Mayor, the Chamberlains, Mr. Simpson, Mr. Tyrrell, Mr. Reynolds, and Mr. W. Brown be, and they are hereby appointed and formed a Committee (three of them to be a quorum), to carry out the provisions of the said "Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," and that all powers conferred on this Council by the said Act, excepting the power to make a rate, be delegated to such Committee.

6. That Mr. Henry Hussey, of Devizes, be, and he is hereby appointed, Inspector for the said borough, to act within the said borough, for the purpose of carrying out this Order.

7. That the foregoing Order, declaration, and appointment, be and continue in force until the same shall be altered, or revoked by any further Order.

At the Annual General Sessions of the Peace, holden (by adjournment) at Maidstone, in and for the county of Kent, on Monday the 26th day of February, in the year of our Lord 1866, in pursuance of "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," before the Right Honourable Charles Earl of Romney (Chairman), the Right Honourable William Pitt Earl Amherst, John Farnaby Lennard, Esquire, and others their associates, Justices of our Lady the Queen, assigned to preserve the Peace of our said Lady the Queen in the said county, and also to hear and determine divers felonies, trespasses, and other misdemeanors done and committed therein.

1st. It is ordered, that pursuant to "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," the Right Honourable John Robert Viscount Sydney, Lord Lieutenant and Custos Rotulorum of the county,

be and they are hereby appointed a Committee under the said Act for the whole of the said

county as defined in the said Act, and that all the powers conferred on this Court by the said Act be delegated to such Committee, excepting the power of making a rate.

And it is further ordered, that the said Justices whose names are set opposite to the Divisions for which they respectively act, be and they are hereby appointed Committees for the respective Divisions set opposite their respective names, and that all the powers conferred on this Court by the said Act, be delegated to the said Committees in their respective Districts, excepting the power to make a rate, subject nevertheless to the proviso that such powers be exercised by the Committees of the Divisions, subject to the directions of the Committee for the whole county.

And it is further ordered, that every parish, liberty, and place, in this county, which is not a borough or a part of the Metropolis, as defined by the said Act, shall for the purposes of this order be deemed to form part of, and be attached to the Petty Sessional Division of the said county in which the said parish, liberty, or place is situate, or which it adjoins, or to which it is annexed by the orders of this Court.

And it is also further ordered, that the first meeting of the said Committee for the whole county, be held at the Sessions House, at Maidstone aforesaid, on Saturday next, the 3rd day of March, 1866, at half-past twelve o'clock in the afternoon.

2d. It is ordered that so much of the notice and order of this court of the 9th day of January last, as provides that the Chief Constable of this county be appointed Chief Inspector for the purpose of carrying into effect the rules and regulations made by the Orders of the Lords of the Privy Council, of the 23rd day of November and 16th day of December last, and the notices given by the Court within their jurisdiction, and that the Superintendents and Sergeants under the command of the said Chief Constable, be appointed Inspectors for the respective Divisions to which they are for the time being attached, be and the same are hereby revoked.

3rd. It is further ordered, pursuant to "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," that the Chief Constable of the county be, and he is hereby appointed Chief Cattle Constable under the said Act, and that the Superintendent and Sergeants of the County Police Force under the command of the Chief Constable be, and they are hereby respectively appointed Cattle Constables for the respective districts to which they are attached, and that they shall carry into effect the provisions of the said Act, subject nevertheless, in all respects to the orders and directions of the Committees appointed by order of Court of this day.

Whereas this Court deems it expedient that the notice and orders of the 9th of January made by this Court be relaxed, and that the following orders be now made:

4th. It is ordered that on and after 1st day of March next, to the 15th day of April next, any person may move any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, in his possession, if sound, from any farm or land in his occupation, across any highway, or along any highway, for a distance not exceeding 200 yards along the same, to any other farm or land in his own occupation; and every such animal shall be deemed to be sound which is not affected with the cattle plague, and has not within thirty days been in contact with any animal so affected, and has not within thirty days been in, or on any building, or yard, or field, where any animal so affected had been kept, unless that building, or yard, had been effectually cleansed and disinfected, at least

thirty days previously to such first-mentioned animal being placed in or on the same.

5th. It is further ordered, that in order to allow for the breeding of stock, a cow or heifer, if sound, as defined in the last previous order, may be moved with a breeding license on any public highway, for any distance not exceeding three miles to and from any place where a bull is kept; that such license be granted by a member of the Committee appointed for the District, pursuant to "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," which has authority over the place from which the said cow or heifer is to be sent, and that such license be in force for a period not exceeding three days from the date thereof.

6th. It is further ordered, that on and after the 1st day of March next to the 15th day of April next, the order and notice of this Court, of the 9th day of January last, which forbids any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox or calf, from being on, or passing along, or across any highway, or public road, shall not be deemed to prohibit the occupier of any field or enclosed land from allowing any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox or calf, depasturing in such field or enclosed land, and in the possession of such occupier, from being on, or passing along, or across, any footpath or bridleway in such field or enclosed land.

7th. It is further ordered, that any of the aforesaid orders numbered 4, 5, and 6, respectively, embodying relaxations of the order of this Court of the 9th of January last, is to cease to have any effect in any parish or place, on publication in some newspaper circulating in or near such parish or place, of a notice of the Committee of the District having jurisdiction over such parish or place, that it has deemed it expedient that such order ought to cease to be in force, in consequence of any outbreak, or threatened outbreak of the cattle plague within its jurisdiction.

8th. It is ordered, that on and from the 1st day of March next to the 15th day of April next, no dung, offal, horns, bones, raw or untanned hides or skins of any sheep, cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, horse, swine, or of any other animal (except as by the Orders in Council excepted), shall be unloaded within the county from any barge, boat or other vessel, or from any railway truck, or cart, waggon, or other vehicle, or be sent or brought into the said county in any way from the metropolis, as defined in "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," or from any other place in which the cattle plague is existing, or has existed within six months previously.

9th. It is ordered that notice of the aforesaid Orders of Court be published in the several newspapers circulating within the jurisdiction of the said Court in which the county advertisements are usually inserted, and in the newspapers in which the previous orders of this Court relative to the cattle plague have been inserted.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

Durham to wit.

At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Lady the Queen, holden at Durham, in and for the county of Durham, by adjournment, on Saturday, the 3rd day of March, in the twenty-ninth year of the reign of our Sovereign Lady, Victoria, by the grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, and in the year of our

Lord 1866, before Rowland Burdon (Chairman), John Fawcett, William Scurfield Grey, Esquires, and others their fellows, Justices of our said Lady the Queen, assigned to keep the Peace of our said Lady the Queen, in the said county, and also to hear and determine divers felonies, trespasses, and other misdemeanors done and committed in the said county.

First.—Pursuant to, and in exercise of, the powers and authorities in this behalf conferred upon and vested in them, the said Justices, in General or Quarter Sessions assembled, in and by "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," whereby they are constituted the local authority for the county of Durham, they, the said Justices, do resolve and order, that henceforth, until the 25th day of March next, no bull, cow, ox, or heifer be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any part of the county of Durham over which this Court has jurisdiction, except by sea.

Second.—That, until the 15th day of April next, no bull, cow, ox, or heifer be removed from any place within the jurisdiction aforesaid to any other place within the same jurisdiction; but any person may, with the previously written consent of two Justices, remove any such animals as aforesaid from one part of a farm to another adjoining part of the said farm, within the jurisdiction aforesaid, although, in order to effect such removal, it may be necessary to drive or convey such animals over a public highway for a distance not exceeding 200 yards; or any person may remove any such animals as aforesaid from one farm to another farm *bonâ fide* in his or her own occupation, however distant from each other such farms may be (the term "occupation" being considered as including the estate of grass or turnips by sheep on a detached farm or pasturage taken), or may, with the similar consent of one Justice, drive or take a cow to or from a bull on another farm within such jurisdiction, and may take or remove sheep or calves in a cart: provided such consent in all the above cases be granted only on proof to the satisfaction of such Justices or Justice, that cattle plague does not exist at or in the neighbourhood of the place from whence such removal is proposed to be made, or along the route on which it is proposed to drive, take, remove, or convey the said animals.

Third.—Provided also, that any person may bring a bull from without the jurisdiction aforesaid into the same jurisdiction, or from one part of such jurisdiction into another part of the same jurisdiction, if a certificate be previously obtained of the perfect health of such bull from two of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace, and an Inspector acting for the place or district from which such bull shall be brought, and with the consent of two of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace, and an Inspector acting within the jurisdiction into which such bull is to be brought.

Fourth.—Where a farm is situate partly in the county of Durham and partly in another adjoining county, animals may be removed from such part of the farm as is without the county of Durham to the adjoining part of the farm within the said county.

Fifth.—That it shall not be lawful, without the previously written consent of two such Justices as aforesaid, to bring into any place within the said jurisdiction, or to remove from place to place within such jurisdiction, any raw or untanned hides, skins, horns, or hoofs of any animal, except such as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America; or the offal or dung of any animal, or

any litter, hay, straw, or fodder which has been used about any animal, and is likely to propagate infection: provided always, that it shall be lawful to send or carry any such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or other articles as aforesaid, by railway through such jurisdiction, or to send or carry any such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or other articles as aforesaid, if brought by sea from any place out of Great Britain into such jurisdiction, to the nearest convenient railway station, for the purpose of carrying them through or out of such jurisdiction. And also, that it shall be lawful, with the licence of two such Justices as aforesaid, upon proof given to their satisfaction, by the certificate of the Inspector, or otherwise, that such articles have been properly disinfected, to remove from place to place within such jurisdiction, during a time to be specified in such licence, any such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or other articles as aforesaid. Provided further, that it shall not be lawful to remove the contents of ash pits or privies belonging to butchers or tripe sellers, unless with the licence of two Justices as aforesaid, upon proof by the certificate of the Inspector or otherwise, that such contents have been previously properly disinfected.

Sixth.—That the person in charge of animals, or other substances, matters, or things permitted to be removed as aforesaid, shall carry with, and when thereunto required, produce to all Inspectors, policemen, constables, overseers, and other public officers requiring the same, the certificates, order, or consent for such removal.

Lastly.—Every person offending against the tenor hereof, is liable to a penalty of not less than twenty pounds.

Ordered, that this Court be now adjourned to Saturday, the 10th day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, for the further despatch of business in reference to the cattle plague.

be appointed Inspectors for the respective divisions to which they are, for the time being, attached. And that all Inspectors already appointed by any person or persons acting as such local authority as last aforesaid, be hereby re-appointed Inspectors for the respective division in which they were Inspectors immediately before the said 15th day of January instant.

3rd. Whereas this Court deems that it is expedient that the following orders should be made:— It is now hereby ordered that on and from the 15th day of January instant to the 1st day of March next, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, sheep, goat, or swine shall be removed to any market or fair, or parish or place whatsoever within the jurisdiction of the Court, for the purpose of exhibition or sale.*

4th. It is further hereby ordered that on and from the 15th day of January instant to the 1st day of March next, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf shall be brought or removed from any place without the jurisdiction to any place within the jurisdiction of this Court, nor be on, nor pass over, along, or across any highway or public road within the said jurisdiction. Provided always that nothing contained in this order shall make it unlawful for any person to send or carry any such animal by railway through or out of such jurisdiction, or to send or carry any such animal, if brought by sea, from any place out of Great Britain, into such jurisdiction to the nearest convenient railway station, for the purpose of carrying it through or out of such jurisdiction.

5th. It is further ordered that the authorities of corporate towns and boroughs within the county be invited to co-operate with this Court.

6th. It is further ordered that the Chairman of this Court be requested to apply to Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Home Department, for power to increase the police force for temporary purposes by any number of men not exceeding 30.

7th. It is further ordered that the said Chairman of this Court be requested to write to Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Home Department further to call his attention to the inadequate provisions relating to sheep, swine, and other animals, and also as to the transit of skins, hoofs, hides, horns, offal, and manure, and to express the opinion of this Court that the movement of live cattle by rail ought as soon as possible to be stopped, and more stringent measures adopted with regard to the Metropolitan markets.

8th. It is further ordered that notice of the aforesaid Orders of Court be published in the several newspapers circulating within the jurisdiction of the said Court in which the county advertisements are usually inserted.

Animal—Shall mean cattle as above defined and swine.

two of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the said county, one of whom shall be a Justice usually acting in the division from which such animals or articles are to be removed, and the other usually acting in the division to which such animals or articles are proposed to be taken.

Every person offending against the said Order shall for every such offence forfeit any sum not exceeding twenty pounds.

Provided always, that it shall not be unlawful for any person to bring or carry into the said county of Merioneth any hay or straw from the counties of Cardigan and Carnarvon, if the person or persons so bringing the same shall have the licence in writing thereunto of three magistrates of the said county of Merioneth.

TREASURY WARRANT.

And whereas it is expedient to alter the rates of British postage now payable upon certain letters in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers vested in us in and by the said recited Acts and each of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners, by the authority of the statute in that case made and provided, order, direct, and declare as follows:—

1. All letters exceeding half an ounce in weight, posted in any part of the United Kingdom or in any British colony or foreign country, addressed to any place within the States of the German Postal Union, Borneo, Java, Madagascar, the United States, Brazil, Uruguay, the Argentine Confederation, or the Sandwich Islands, or posted in any of such last-mentioned countries or places, respectively addressed to any part of the United Kingdom, or to any British Colony or foreign country, and respectively transmitted by the post between the United Kingdom and any of the States of the German Postal Union, Borneo, Java, Madagascar, the United States, Brazil, Uruguay, the Argentine Confederation, or the Sandwich Islands, shall, in lieu of being charged with the postage payable thereon in respect of such transmission thereof, as aforesaid, according to the scale of weight and number of rates contained in or referred to by any Warrant or Warrants of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, or otherwise, now in force relating to any such letters, be charged with the postage payable thereon under such Warrant or Warrants respectively, or otherwise, according to the scale of weight and number of rates contained and set forth in the 3rd clause of this present Warrant.

2. All letters exceeding half an ounce in weight posted in Japan, or at any foreign port in China, or on the West Coast of Africa respectively, addressed to any part of the United Kingdom, or to any British colony or foreign country, and respectively transmitted by the post from Japan, or any foreign port in China, or on the West Coast of Africa, to the United Kingdom, shall, in lieu of being charged with the postage payable thereon, in respect of such transmission thereof as aforesaid, according to the scale of weight and number of rates contained in or referred to by any Warrant or Warrants of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, or otherwise, now in force relating to any such letters, be charged with the postage payable thereon under such Warrant or Warrants respectively, or otherwise, according to the following scale of weight and number of rates, that is to say:—

3. On every such letter exceeding one half of an ounce in weight, and not exceeding one ounce in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid two rates of postage:

And on every such letter, if exceeding one ounce and not exceeding one ounce and one half of another ounce in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid three rates of postage:

And on every such letter if exceeding one ounce and one half of another ounce, and not exceeding two ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid four rates of postage:

And for every additional half of an ounce in weight of any such letter above the weight of two ounces there shall be charged, taken, and paid one additional rate of postage, and every fractional part of such additional half of an ounce in weight shall be charged as an additional half of an ounce in weight, and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this Warrant shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such letter would be charged with under any such Warrant or Warrants, or otherwise, as hereinbefore mentioned, if not exceeding one half of an ounce in weight.

4. Nothing in this present Warrant contained shall be construed to interfere with or affect the rates of postage now payable upon letters transmitted between the United Kingdom and any of the States of the German Postal Union, via France, or upon letters transmitted between the United Kingdom and any of the countries or places specified in the first clause of this Warrant, the sea conveyance of which is by French packet boat.

5. The term "German Postal Union" used in this Warrant, shall include the States and countries of Prussia, Austria, Bavaria, Saxony, Hanover, Wurtemberg, Baden, Luxemburg, Brunswick, Mecklenburg-Schwerin, Mecklenburg-Strelitz, Oldenburg, Lubeck, and the countries and places comprised in the postal districts of the Prince of Tour and Taxis; viz., Frankfort-on-the-Maine, the Grand Duchy of Hesse, Hesse-Electoral, Hesse-Homburg, Schaumburg-Lippe, Lippe-Détmold, Nassau, Reuss, Saxe-Coburg-Gotha, Saxe-Meiningen, Saxe-Weimar, Eisenach, Hohenzollern, Schwartzburg-Rudolstadt, and Schwartzburg-Sonderhausen; the term "by the post" used in this Warrant, shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as the like term used in the said recited Acts; and the several other terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as they would have had if inserted in the said Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the third and fourth years of the reign of Her Majesty, for the regulation of the duties of postage.

6. The Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury may, by Warrant under their hands, duly made at any time hereafter, alter, repeal, or revoke any of the rates of postage hereby altered, or any of the orders, regulations, conditions and restrictions hereby made, and may make and establish any new or other rates, orders, regulations, conditions or restrictions in lieu thereof, and from time to time may appoint at what time the rates which may be payable are to be paid.

7. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six.

(Vesting of the Glebe Lands and other Property in Ecclesiastical Commissioners—Income to present and future Vicars—Augmentation of Income of certain Churches and Chapels—Provision as to Service in Cemetery and in certain Churches—Application of Funds—Sale of Glebe Lands by Commissioners—Repeal of Acts relating to Leases of Vicarage Lands—Certain Districts constituted Vicarages—Substitution of Christ Church, Todmorden, for Old Parochial Church—Reduction of number of Churchwardens and Sidesmen in Rochdale.)
