**T**HIS day the Archbishop of Canterbury, accompanied by the Bishops and Clergy of the Province, waited upon Her Majesty to present the following Address:—

*Madam,*

WE, your Majesty's faithful subjects, the Archbishop, Bishops, and Clergy of the Province of Canterbury in Convocation assembled, approach your Majesty with the assurance of our loyal and affectionate attachment to your Majesty's Throne and Person.

We, in common with your Majesty's whole loyal people, rejoice, that you have resolved again to open, with the sanction of your august presence, the solemn deliberations of the estates of your realm in Parliament, and we thank God for the strength of body and resolution of mind vouchsafed to your Majesty.

We would express to your Majesty our humble and sincere condolence on the removal by death of your Royal friend and relation, full of years and honours, His late Majesty the King of the Belgians.

We rejoice with your Majesty in the prospect of happiness opening upon another member of your Royal Family, and pray that God may vouchsafe His richest blessings on the approaching marriage of the august Princess.

We open the deliberations, to which your Majesty has summoned us, with a thankful sense of the many blessings which God has graciously bestowed upon your Majesty and the church and people of this realm, with a grave estimate of dangers to be averted, and a hopeful presage of benefits to be secured, through the deliberations, which under your Majesty's Royal writ we are now commencing. We pray your Majesty to protect us in the ancient privileges and liberties of our national church, to form a favourable judgment of our efforts, to allow us from time to time to approach your Throne and address your Majesty on the various matters which may need your Royal sanction; and we pray your Majesty to believe, that trusting to the illumination and guidance of the Holy Spirit of God vouchsafed to His church through Our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, we shall address ourselves diligently to the consideration of such matters, either as your Majesty may be pleased specially to refer to us, or as under your Majesty's general licence, we may treat of, for the honour of God and the advance-

ment of His glory, for the faith, peace, and unity of His church, and for the advancement of the prosperity, the education, the liberties, and the piety of the people committed by God to the charge of your most gracious Majesty.

We cannot conclude this address to your Majesty without expressing our sense of the greatness of the calamity which has lately fallen upon the nation through God's visitation in the murrain among cattle, and our sympathy with those who have chiefly suffered from its ravages; and we pray that such wisdom may be vouchsafed to the legislature as may lead to the adoption of measures suitable to the mitigating the pressure of this national calamity.

To which Address Her Majesty was pleased to return the following most gracious Answer:—

"I receive with much satisfaction the renewed assurance of your loyal and affectionate attachment to My Throne and Person.

"I thank you for your expressions of condolence on the loss I have sustained by the death of My lamented Uncle, His late Majesty the King of the Belgians.

"I accept with sincere gratification your congratulations on the approaching Marriage of My Daughter the Princess Helena.

"I entirely concur in your feelings of sympathy with those who are suffering severely from the effects of the disease among cattle which prevails to so great an extent in many parts of this nation. I am thankful that a large portion of the United Kingdom is, as yet, free from this calamity, and I trust that its progress may be arrested by the Divine blessing on the means used for this purpose.

"You may be assured of My unceasing desire to promote the efficiency and maintain the liberties of the Established Church; and I earnestly pray that the blessing of Almighty God may abundantly rest on the faithful and zealous endeavours of its Prelates and Clergy for the advancement of true religion, and of the best interests of My people."

The Archbishop of Canterbury, the Bishop of Oxford, and the Prolocutor, were severally presented to Her Majesty by Sir George Grey, and had the honour of kissing Her Majesty's hand.

HER Majesty has been pleased to command that, after the present date, the Uniform of the Elder Brethren of the Trinity House, London, shall be as described in the following Order, in lieu of that at present in use:—

#### UNIFORM OF THE ELDER BRETHREN OF THE TRINITY HOUSE, LONDON.

##### FULL DRESS.

*Coat.*—Blue cloth, double breasted, with nine buttons of the Trinity House pattern in each row, four inches apart across the breast, stand-up collar, shewing half an inch of scarlet cloth in the back, and sloped off to a quarter of an inch in front, laced on top and front edges with one inch gold lace of four vellum navy pattern, three-quarter lace in bottom edge, scarlet cuffs, two inches and three-quarters deep, with inch lace along the top edge, scarlet pointed slash with three small but-

tons, and three-quarter inch lace along the outside edge, pointed blue flaps on the skirt, laced all round with inch lace, and three buttons under them, the skirts to begin at one-fifth the circumference from the front edge, and to be lined with white kerseymere, one button at hip and bottom of each plait.

*Trousers.*—Blue cloth, with one and a half inch gold lace of navy pattern down the outside seam.

*Cravat.*—Black silk.

*Hat.*—Cocked (naval size), with black silk cockade, bullion loop, button and tassels.

*Sword.*—Navy pattern, with Trinity House arms on the guard of the hilt, and bullion knot.

*Sword Knot.*—Blue and gold, with bullion tassell.

*Belt.*—Black morocco leather, with slings worked with three lines of gold embroidery, and clasp with Trinity House arms.

*Epaulettes.*—Gold bullion, three inches and a half deep, with arms and crest of Trinity House on shoulder plate and strap.

##### UNDRESS.

*Coat.*—In half dress, blue cloth double breasted, with eight buttons in each row, with turn-down collar, pointed flaps, with three buttons under them, round cuffs, with three notched holes of gold Russia braid and buttons, to be worn with or without epaulettes.

*Frock Coat.*—Blue cloth, double breasted, with eight buttons in each row, with padded turn-down collar, round cuffs, with three notched holes of gold Russia braid and buttons, a short side edge in each plait, ten inches long, with button at top and bottom.

*Waistcoat.*—White marcella, from first May to first October, and blue cloth from first October to first May, single breasted, rolling collar, with small buttons.

*Trousers.*—Plain blue cloth.

*Cravat.*—Black silk.

*Hat.*—Plain round black; or

*Cap.*—Of blue cloth, with black mohair band, and Trinity House arms embroidered thereon, the peak covered with cloth, and embroidered with oak leaves in gold.

*Sword.*—The same as in full dress.

*Belt.*—Black morocco, with slings and clasp, with Trinity House arms.

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty, and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the eighteenth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixteenth and seventeenth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty, and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for effecting an exchange of the patronage of a certain living belonging to the Crown, for that of a certain living belonging to the provost and scholars of King's College, within the University of Cambridge.

"Whereas your Majesty is, in right of the Crown, seized in fee of the advowson or perpetual patronage of, and right of nomination to, the rectory of the parish of Great Munden, in the county of Hertford, and in the diocese of Rochester.

"And whereas the provost and scholars of King's College, within the University of Cambridge aforesaid, are seized in fee of the advowson or perpetual patronage of, and right of nomination to, the united vicarage or benefice of Kew with Petersham, in the county of Surrey, and in the diocese of Winchester.

"And whereas the Right Honourable John, Earl Russell, First Lord of your Majesty's

Treasury, acting on behalf of your Majesty, has signified to us his desire, and the provost and scholars of King's College, within the University of Cambridge aforesaid, have also signified to us their desire, that the patronage of the said several benefices may be exchanged as hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas we have made due enquiry and calculation as to the circumstances of the proposed exchange, and the relative values of the said benefices and patronage, and we do hereby certify to your Majesty, that, after making all proper deductions and allowances, the values of the said benefices respectively are as set forth in the Schedule hereto annexed.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said John, Earl Russell, acting on behalf of your Majesty, as the patron in right of the Crown of the rectory of the said parish of Great Munden (in testimony whereof he has hereunto set his hand and seal), and with the consent of the provost and scholars of King's College, within the University of Cambridge aforesaid, as the patrons of the said united vicarage or benefice of Kew with Petersham (in testimony whereof they have hereunto affixed their common or corporate seal), we humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the advowson or perpetual patronage of, and right of nomination to, the rectory of the parish of Great Munden aforesaid, shall be transferred from your Majesty, and from your heirs and successors, and shall become and be vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the provost and scholars of King's College, within the University of Cambridge aforesaid, and their successors for ever; and that in exchange for the same, the advowson or perpetual patronage of, and right of nomination to, the united vicarage or benefice of Kew with Petersham, shall, upon and from the said lastly-mentioned day, be transferred from the provost and scholars of King's College, within the University of Cambridge aforesaid, and their successors, and shall in like manner become and be vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised by your Majesty and your heirs and successors.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament.

**W**HEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England, beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-ground or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require), that after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time, as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish;

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representations, has made representations stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein with the modifications hereinafter specified:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the third day of February

last, to give notice of such representations, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the fifteenth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that burials in the undermentioned parishes shall be discontinued (except as is herein otherwise directed), as follows; viz.:

**LEIGHTON BUZZARD.**—Forthwith in the burial-ground of Lake-street Chapel, except upon the following conditions: that no coffin be exposed or remains disturbed, and that every coffin buried in it be enclosed by brickwork or masonry properly cemented, or by concrete not less than six inches thick.

**GREAT DRIFFIELD.**—Forthwith wholly beneath the church, and beneath the Independent Chapel and Schoolroom, and also (except for the widowers and widows of those already buried therein) in the churchyard and in the Baptist burial-ground.

**NEWLAND, COLEFORD, GLOUCESTERSHIRE.**—Forthwith wholly in the church and in that part of the churchyard (except for the burial of widowers or widows of those already buried therein) which is south of the footpaths from the Lychgate and the Grammar School to the church porch. Also, with the like exceptions, interment to be limited to the dead from the tithings of Newland and Coleford, and after the thirtieth of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, interment to be limited to the dead from Newland tithing alone.

**W**HEREAS by an Act passed in the present session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to amend the law relating to contagious or infectious diseases in cattle and other animals," it is, amongst other things, enacted, that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by Order in Council, from time to time to continue, or to renew, if expired, all or any of the provisions, in the first part of that Act contained, for such time as shall be specified in such Order.

And whereas it is provided in the second paragraph of the seventeenth section of the said Act, which section is in the first part thereof, that "no cattle shall be moved on any railway before the twenty-fifth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six:"

And whereas it is expedient that the prohibition of the movement of cattle, by railway, should be continued beyond the said twenty-fifth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the power vested in Her by the said Act, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the said



recited provision, contained in the second paragraph of the seventeenth section of the said Act, be continued on and after the said twenty-fifth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, and that "no cattle shall be moved on any railway" before the sixteenth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS it has been represented to Her Majesty, that certain contagious or infectious disorders are now prevalent among cattle, in the dominions and territories situated in Europe, belonging to His Majesty the King of the Netherlands, and that there is danger of the said disorders being introduced into this country by means of cattle from such countries or places: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that on and after the twenty-eighth day of March instant, no cattle shall be imported or introduced into the United Kingdom, which shall come from, or shall have been at, any place within the aforesaid territories and dominions, situate in Europe, belonging to His Majesty the King of the Netherlands; and also that on and after the said twenty-eighth day of March instant, no cattle shall be imported or introduced into the United Kingdom which shall be, or shall have been, on board any vessels at the same time with any cattle which shall have come from, or shall have been within, the aforesaid territories and dominions.

And Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth hereby further order, that, in the event of any cattle being landed in any portion of the United Kingdom, contrary to the provisions of this Order, all such cattle, the importation or introduction whereof is so hereby prohibited as aforesaid, shall, upon their arrival in this country, be destroyed or otherwise disposed of, as the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Customs may direct.

This Order shall continue in force until revoked by any further Order.

The word "cattle" shall include sheep as well as bulls, cows, oxen, heifers, and calves.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

THE following Notices have been received by the Clerk of the Council from the Local Authorities appointed under the Orders of the Lords of the Council relating to the "Cattle Plague," and are published in the London Gazette in conformity with the requirements of their Lordships' Orders:—

#### CATTLE PLAGUE.

*Borough of Wenlock.*

By virtue of the powers vested in it by divers Orders of Her Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, and by the Cattle Diseases Prevention

Act, 1866. The local authority for the borough of Wenlock hereby gives notice and declares:

1. That all notices heretofore published by the Mayor of this borough, in respect to the cattle plague, are hereby revoked, except only as regards offences already committed.

2. That from the date of this notice it shall not be lawful to bring or send any animal, as defined by the said Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866, or any raw or untanned hides or skins, or horns or hoofs of any such animal from any other part of Great Britain into any place within the said borough.

3. That from the date of this notice, no animal shall be brought, removed, or taken to any market, fair, or Smithfield within the said borough, for the purpose of exhibition or sale.

4. That from the date of this notice it shall not be lawful to remove from place to place within the said borough any animal, except between the hours of six in the morning and seven in the evening, with the licence of two Justices of the Peace, founded on the declaration of the owner or other satisfactory evidence, that such animal is free from disease, and has not been kept in or within three miles by the Ordinance Map, of any place affected by the cattle plague, or been in contact with any diseased animal, for two months prior to such declaration.

Every person offending against the said Orders in contravention of this notice, shall for each offence incur a penalty of £20.

#### CATTLE PLAGUE.

*County of Warwick.*

At an Adjourned Sessions held at Warwick, on Saturday, 17th day of March, 1866, for the county of Warwick, the Local Authority do hereby order and declare:—

1st. That Order 2, and Exception 5 under Order 3, of 20th January, 1866, shall be, and the same are hereby revoked.

2nd. That it shall be lawful for any Justice acting in and for any division, upon the application of any occupier of land within the division, to grant a licence to such occupier to move, within a time to be specified, in the day time only, and to a place to be named, along any public road leading through the jurisdiction of the local authority, any store cattle (that is to say, any bull, cow, ox, heifer, or calf) which he may have purchased by private contract, or at any sale of stock, the exclusive property of the seller (the said sale not having taken place in any market or fair), upon a certificate from the seller, to be produced to the Justice and to be retained by him, that the said cattle have been in the possession of the seller for at least one month last past, are healthy, and free from cattle plague, and that there has been no cattle plague on his farm and premises, nor within two miles thereof, for a month last past: Provided always, that no such licence shall be granted to any drover or cattle dealer, or to any person to move any cattle to or from any fair or market, or to bring within the jurisdiction of the local authority any cattle which may have been at a fair or market in any other part of Great Britain, or which may have been brought from a distance by railway.

3rd. It shall be lawful for any Justice of a division, upon the application of the owner, being

an occupier of land in the division, to grant a licence to move home to his farm, or homestead, any cattle which he may have in some separate place on hire, or tack, or under any agreement, for a longer or shorter time, during the winter, upon a declaration made by the owner (or by some person authorized by him), before the said Justice, to be retained by him, that the said cattle are the property of the applicant, have been in his possession for a month last past, are healthy, and free from cattle plague, and that there has been no cattle plague in or within two miles of the place from whence they are to be removed; the licence shall specify the number and description of the cattle, and the day on which they are to be moved.

4th. It shall be lawful for the Justice to whom application shall be made to grant a licence under either of the two preceding orders, if he shall think fit, to extend the said licence so as to enable the person to whom it is granted to bring the cattle therein described to a place within the jurisdiction of the local authority, from a place beyond the jurisdiction: Provided that such extension of the licence be not inconsistent with any rules and orders in force in the adjoining jurisdiction, and shall have the sanction of a Justice thereof, to be signified by his endorsing his consent upon the licence.

5th. The order of 17th of February, amending Order No. 1, of 3rd February, relating to the removal of raw and untanned hides from and out of the boroughs therein enumerated, into the jurisdiction of the local authority; shall be extended to include that part of the borough of Tamworth which is in the county of Warwick. And it is further ordered and declared, that all expenses of disinfecting hides and skins, and obtaining the certificate thereof, required by the said order of 17th February, shall be paid by the owners of the hides and skins.

6th. These orders now made and declared, together with all former orders of the local authority, of the respective dates 20th January, 3rd, 17th, and 26th days of February, 1866 (except in so far as they may have been amended or revoked by any subsequent order), shall be, and continue in full force and effect, to all intents and purposes, until they shall hereafter be amended or revoked by the local authority, or by operation of any future Order in Council.

7th. Any wilful infringement of the said order, or any act wilfully done in contravention of them, any false declaration or certificate made or given under them, shall render the offender subject to the penalty under the Statutes not exceeding £20.

8th. That it be delegated to the several local committees to see that the orders be carried out and enforced in their respective districts; and with respect to Sect. 15 of "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," that it be left to the discretion of the local committee to order the slaughter of animals which may have been in contact with infected animals, according as the committee shall think necessary, or otherwise, in the particular circumstances of the case.

N.B.—The orders of 17th March relate only to the removal of "store" cattle from place to place; the removal of "fat" cattle for slaughter remains, as before, under the order of 17th February.

It has not been deemed necessary by the local authority to make any general order to include sheep in the orders and restrictions respecting

cattle, except by the order of 3rd February, in places infected by cattle plague; but farmers are recommended to be cautious in buying sheep for stock, especially sheep which may have been exposed in fairs or markets, particularly the Metropolitan Market.

## CATTLE PLAGUE NOTICE.

*Northamptonshire, to wit.*

At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Sovereign Lady the Queen, held at Northampton, in and for the county of Northampton, on Wednesday, in the first week next after the 28th day of December, to wit, the 3rd day of January 1866, and after several adjournments, ultimately by adjournment on the 22nd day of March, 1866, before William Smyth, Esq., The Right Honble. Charles Lord Southampton, General Cartwright, and others, their fellows, Justices of our said Lady the Queen, assigned to keep the Peace in the county aforesaid, and also to hear and determine divers felonies, trespasses, and other misdeeds, done and committed within the same county.

The Court having taken into consideration the Act of Parliament of the 11th and 12th Vic., cap. 107, being an Act to prevent the spreading of infectious disorders amongst sheep, cattle, and other animals, and the several Acts of Parliament continuing the same, also the several Orders of Her Majesty's Privy Council, made under the authority of the said Acts, and also the several notices and orders made by this Court under and by virtue of the said Orders of Council, doth order and declare that on and after this 22nd day of March the following orders shall take effect:—

First. That in all cases where hides, skins, horns, or hoofs, of any animals can now be moved upon the licence of two Justices, they may be moved on the licence of one such Justice.

Second. That a calf not being more than six weeks old may be moved with a licence in a cart or vehicle from the premises of the breeder thereof, to a distance not exceeding 10 miles therefrom to the premises of the purchaser thereof, provided that such calf be not moved to or from or within 500 yards of any place where cattle plague or sheep pox then exists, or may have existed at any period within 30 days previous to the removal of such calf.

Third. That on a declaration in writing and on a licence signed by one Justice of the Peace for this county, any cow or heifer may be moved for breeding purposes to any place where a bull is kept, and back again, whether such place be within or without the jurisdiction of this Court, for a distance not exceeding 6 miles from where such cow or heifer may be when the licence is applied for; and a bull may also on a similar declaration and licence be moved for breeding purposes not more than 20 miles to any place where a cow or heifer may be, whether such place be within or without the jurisdiction of this Court, and may be moved back again on a similar declaration and licence, provided always that in any such removal the orders made by the local authority of any place out of the jurisdiction of this Court where such cow, heifer, or bull may be, are complied with, and do not prevent or forbid such removal.

Fourth. That upon a declaration and licence swine may be driven along any highway for a distance not exceeding 5 miles, provided such swine do not pass or come within 500 yards of any

place where the cattle plague or sheep pox exists or has existed as aforesaid.

Fifth. That breeding licences may in the discretion of any Justice be granted for a period not exceeding fourteen days.

Sixth. That on the 26th day of March instant, and during fourteen days then next ensuing, cattle may be moved upon a declaration and licence from place to place within the jurisdiction of this Court, provided they be not moved to or from any farm or place in which cattle plague or sheep pox exists or has existed as aforesaid, or within 500 yards of the same, and provided that such cattle do not pass within 500 yards of any place where cattle plague or sheep pox exists or has existed as aforesaid.

Seventh. That except as above mentioned the orders now in force are continued.

### CATTLE PLAGUE.

*Northamptonshire January Sessions, 1866, held by adjournment, 14th March, 1866.*

An Order was laid before the Court, founded on the Resolutions of the Court of Quarter Sessions, held yesterday, and of which Order the following is a copy:—

THE Court having taken into consideration the Act of Parliament of the 11th and 12th Vic., cap. 107, being an Act to prevent the spreading of infectious disorders amongst sheep, cattle, and other animals, and the several Acts of Parliament continuing the same, also the several Orders of Her Majesty's Privy Council made under the authority of the said Acts, and also the several notices and orders made by this Court under and by virtue of the said Orders of Council, doth order and declare, that on and after the 15th day of March instant the following orders shall take effect:—

First. That in all cases (except as hereinafter mentioned) where animals can now be moved upon the licence of two Justices, they may be moved upon the licence of one such Justice.

Second. That on a declaration in writing, and on a licence signed by one Justice of the Peace for this county, any cow or heifer may be moved for breeding purposes to any place where a bull is kept and back, for a distance not exceeding six miles from where such cow or heifer may be when the licence is applied for. And a bull may also, on a licence and declaration, be moved for breeding purposes, not more than twenty miles, to any cow or heifer, and be moved back again on a similar licence and declaration.

Third. That sheep, lambs, and goats may be moved without licence in any parish where cattle plague or sheep pox does not exist at the time of their being so moved, and has not existed for thirty days immediately preceding: Provided that in such removal they do not pass or come within five hundred yards of any place where cattle plague or sheep pox exists or has existed as aforesaid.

Fourth. That in any parish in which cattle plague or sheep pox exists or has existed for thirty days immediately preceding the application for a licence under this clause, no sheep, lambs, or

goats within such parish shall be moved except by a licence granted by any two members (one of them being a Justice) of the Sub-Committee appointed for each of the several Petty Sessional Divisions of the county under the orders of the Committee constituted under the 28th and 29th Vict., cap. 2: Provided that the person or persons so applying for a licence do prove to the members as aforesaid that he has given two days' notice to the occupiers of the adjoining land to which such sheep, lambs, or goats are proposed to be moved, of his intended application for such licence to such two members, and provided no objection be made thereto.

Fifth. That sheep, lambs, or goats may be moved, with a licence, from place to place within this county, or from place to place not more than ten miles distant from this county, provided they do not pass within five hundred yards of any place or field where cattle plague or sheep pox exists or has existed as aforesaid.

Sixth. That swine may be moved, in a cart or other vehicle, without licence, provided such swine be not moved to or from any farm or yard in which cattle plague or small pox has existed as aforesaid.

Seventh. That, except as above mentioned, the orders now in force are continued.

The Court approved of and adopted the said order, which is to take effect on and after Thursday, the 15th instant; and it is ordered that the same be filed with the proceedings of these Sessions.

It is further ordered that the said order be advertised in the "Times," or some other paper circulating in the county, on the 15th instant, and that the same be also printed in the form of a large placard, and be posted up throughout the county.

It is ordered that these Sessions be now adjourned to the Grand Jury Room, adjoining the County Hall, to be held there on Thursday, the 22nd instant, at twelve o'clock at noon.

### CATTLE PLAGUE.

*County of Dumfries.*

NOTICE is hereby given, the County Board of the county of Dumfries, constituting the local authority of the said county under and for the purposes of "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," and as such invested with the powers conferred by the Orders of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, deeming it to be expedient, with a view to prevent the further spreading of the disorder generally designated the "Cattle Plague," to consolidate, alter, and amend the resolutions previously declared and published by Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the said county, have resolved and declared, and hereby declare, that subject to the exceptions and conditions after mentioned, it is expedient, with the said view, on and after the 21st day of March current, and until the 15th day of April next, or until the present notice shall be revoked,

I. That no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, and no raw or untanned hides or skins, horns, hoofs, or offal of any such animals, and no dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, shall be brought

or sent from any place in Great Britain beyond the jurisdiction of the said County Board, into any place within such jurisdiction :

Excepting and providing always that sheep, lambs, goats, and swine, and such articles as aforesaid, may be brought or sent by any person, with the licence of any two Justices of the Peace acting in and for such jurisdiction, from any land and premises in his own occupation beyond, to any other land or premises in his own occupation within such jurisdiction, during a time to be specified in such licence ;

II. That no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, and no raw or untanned hides or skins, horns or hoofs, or offal, of any such animals, and no dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, shall be removed from any infected farm, premises, or place within the said jurisdiction, or from any point within a radius of a mile from the nearest part of any infected farm, premises, or place ;

III. That no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf shall be removed from any particular part of the said jurisdiction to any other part thereof, or from place to place within the same generally, excepting to the extent and effect and subject to the conditions following, viz. :—

1. Any such animal may be moved from place to place upon the farm of the occupant thereof, to whom such animal belongs :
2. Any cow or heifer may be moved to and from any place where a bull is kept ; any bull may be moved to a farm where cows and heifers are kept ; any calf may be moved, for the purpose of being reared, from one place to another ; and fat cattle may be moved along any public road for the purpose of immediate slaughter, provided that a licence in the printed form prescribed by the said Board, for the movement of every such cow, heifer, bull, calf, or fat animal, shall be first obtained from a member of the Committee appointed by the said Board, acting in the division of the said county in or to which the animal is to be moved.

### THE CATTLE PLAGUE.

Notice in lieu of existing Notices.

*County of Flint.*

NOTICE is hereby given, that Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace acting in and for the county of Flint, assembled in General Quarter Sessions, at the County Hall, in Mold, in the said county, on Wednesday, the 21st day of March, 1866, do, with the view of preventing the spreading of the contagious or infectious disorder designated the "Cattle Plague," order, declare, and direct as follows :—

1. That from and after the 24th day of March instant, the three several notices relating to the cattle plague, given by order of this Court, bearing date respectively the 4th and 26th days of January last, and the 26th day of February last, together with the Orders thereby revoked, shall be revoked.

2. That it is expedient that no bull, cow, ox, heifer, or calf, shall from the 24th day of March instant, until the 1st day of May next (unless in

the meantime this notice shall be altered, modified, or revoked), be removed from place to place along any public highway within the county of Flint, subject nevertheless as hereinafter mentioned.

3. That it is expedient from and until the last-mentioned period to prevent the removal of sheep, lambs, goats, and swine, to any market or fair, or to any place whatever within the said county, for the purpose of exhibition or sale.

4. That it is expedient that no sheep, lambs, goats, or swine, shall from and until the last mentioned period be removed from place to place, along any public highway, within the said county (subject nevertheless as hereinafter mentioned), unless the person having charge thereof shall have in his or her possession, an order in writing authorising such removal signed by a Justice of the Peace, which order shall be granted by the said Justice at his discretion after enquiring into the circumstances of the proposed removal, but in any case the said Order shall remain in force for a period of three days only, inclusive of the day on which it is issued.

5. That it is expedient that no raw or untanned hides and skins, or the horns and hoofs of any bulls, cows, oxen, heifers, calves, sheep, lambs, goats, or swine (except such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America), or the offal of any such animals as aforesaid, or any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, shall from and until the last mentioned period be removed from place to place along any public highway within the said county, unless the person having charge thereof shall have in his or her possession an order in writing authorising such removal, signed by a Justice of the Peace, which order shall be granted in the same manner and shall remain in force for the like period as the Order mentioned in paragraph 4 of this notice ; provided always that no order shall be necessary to authorise the removal of dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, from any farm, lands, yard, buildings, or premises, at or in which there has been no case of cattle plague within thirty days next preceding the day of the proposed removal.

6. That the restrictions contained in this notice relating to the removal of the before-mentioned animals shall be subject to the following exceptions :—

A.—Any person may, without an order, move a bull, cow, ox, heifer, or calf in his possession, if sound, from any farm, land, buildings, or premises in his or her occupation, across any public highway, or along any such highway for a distance not exceeding (by road) one mile to any other farm, land, buildings or premises in his or her own occupation, and every such animal shall be deemed to be sound which is not or has not been affected with the cattle plague, and has not within thirty days been in contact with any animal so affected, and has not within thirty days been in or on any building, yard, or field, where any animal so affected has been kept, unless the building or yard has been effectually cleansed and disinfected at least thirty days previously to such first mentioned animal being placed in or on the same.

B.—Sheep, lambs, goats, and swine may be removed, without an order, across or along any public highway, to or from lands and premises in the occupation of the owner or owners of such sheep, lambs, goats, and swine.

C.—That in order to allow for the breeding of stock a cow, heifer, or sow, if sound as defined in exception A, may be removed without an order along any public highway for any distance not exceeding (by road) two miles, to and from any place where a bull or boar is kept, provided that such cow, heifer, or sow shall not in being removed pass within 200 yards of any farm, land, or place, on or at which any animals have been affected with the cattle plague within the space of thirty days next before the day upon which such cow, heifer, or sow is being removed.

D.—Persons having cows, heifers, or sows which they may desire to remove for breeding purposes, and who cannot comply with the terms of exception C, must apply to a Justice of the Peace, acting for the Petty Sessional Division in which their farms, lands, or premises are situate, and in or upon which such animals are kept, for an order to remove such animals, and it shall be at the discretion of the Justice after hearing the application to grant or withhold such order, as he may think desirable.

E.—Calves, sheep, lambs, and swine, for immediate slaughter, may be conveyed without an order along a public highway in carts or other vehicles.

F.—That with the view of facilitating the removal of stock on a change of tenancy, a Justice of the Peace may by an order in writing authorise the removal of any of the above mentioned animals, being sound as above defined, from and to any farm, lands, or premises, which order shall be granted in the same manner and shall remain in force for the like period as the Order mentioned in paragraph 4 of this notice.

7. That for the purposes of this notice, all commons and unenclosed lands, being part of a mountain or otherwise within the county of Flint, shall be deemed and taken to be places from or to which it shall not be lawful to remove any of the above named animals; or any hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, as mentioned in paragraph 5 of this notice.

8. That, notwithstanding anything herein contained, it shall not be lawful, until further notice, for any person to remove any of the above named animals into the Petty Sessional Divisions of Holywell, Caerwys, Prestatyn, and Rhuddlan, or into the parishes of Halkyn and Cileen, or any of them, from any other part of the said county; neither shall it be lawful for any person having removed any such animals from such Petty Sessional Divisions and parishes, or any of them, into any other part of the said county, to remove them back again into such divisions and parishes, or any of them.

And notice is hereby given, that all who offend against any of the provisions contained in this notice will be liable, for every offence, to a penalty of £20.

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Tuesday, the 27th day of February, in the twenty-ninth year of the reign of our Sovereign Lady Victoria, before the Honourable Charles Rolle Trefusis and John Sillifant, Esq., and others their Fellows, Justices of our said Lady the Queen assigned to keep the Peace of our said Lady the Queen within the county aforesaid, and also to hear and determine divers felonies, trespasses, and other misdemeanors within the said county committed; and from thence continued by several adjournments until this 22nd day of March, 1866, and now held before John Sillifant, John Garratt, Daniel Bishop Davy, and Shilston Calmady Hamlyn, Esqrs., and others their fellows, at the Castle of Exeter aforesaid:

The said Justices under and by virtue, and in exercise of the powers given to them by the several Orders of the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated respectively the 23rd day of November, the 16th day of December, 1865, the 20th day of January, and the 23rd day of February, 1866, do order and declare as follows:—

That from and after the 26th day of this month of March, and until this order and declaration shall be altered or revoked by any Order of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or by the General or Quarter Sessions of the Peace for this county, it is expedient that no raw or untanned hides or skins, or horns, or hoofs of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, nor the offal of any such animal as aforesaid, nor dung, hay, straw, fodder or litter be brought from the borough of Plymouth or from the borough of Devonport into any part of the said county within the jurisdiction of this Court.

The foregoing order and declaration does not extend to such hides, skins, horns or hoofs as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America.

And the said Justices hereby give notice that every person offending against the terms of this order and declaration will for every offence be liable to a penalty of £20.

#### CATTLE PLAGUE.

*City of Rochester, in the county of Kent.*

At a Meeting of the Town Council of the said city, holden (by adjournment), at the Guildhall, in and for the said city, on Monday, the 19th day of March, in the year of our Lord 1866:—

1st. It is ordered, pursuant to "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," that from and after this date the whole of the Members of the Council form and constitute the Committee for the said city, and that all the powers conferred on this Council as the local authority by the said Act, except that of making a rate, be delegated to such Committee in respect of the said city.

2nd. It is further ordered, pursuant to the Orders of the Privy Council in this behalf, that no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, nor any raw or untanned hide or skin, nor any horn or hoof of any such animal, excepting such hide, skin, horn, or hoof of any such animal as is directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America, nor any offal of any such animal, nor any dung, shall be removed from any farm or premises within the said city during the existence of the cattle plague thereon, nor

until thirty days shall have elapsed after the cattle plague shall have ceased on the said farm or premises, and the said farm or premises and all buildings, yards, and fields, on the same shall have been effectually cleansed and disinfected; nor shall any such hide, skin, horn, or hoof, except as aforesaid, nor any offal as aforesaid, nor any dung be sent or brought to any place within the said city from the metropolis, as defined in the said Act, or from any place without the said city in which the cattle plague is existing, or has existed for six months previously: provided that nothing in this Order contained shall make it unlawful for any person to send or carry any such hide or other article as aforesaid by railway from the metropolis, or from such other place as aforesaid through the said city, nor for any person to bring or send with the licence of any two Justices acting in and for the said city, any such hide or other article as aforesaid, from any land or premises in his occupation in the metropolis, or such other place as aforesaid, beyond the said city to any other land or premises in his own occupation within the said city, during the time to be specified in such licence.

3rd. It is ordered, that until the 25th day of the present month, no sheep or lamb within the said city shall be put on any railway within the same and conveyed thereon; provided that nothing in this Order contained shall make it unlawful to send or carry any such animal if brought by sea from any place out of Great Britain into the said city to the nearest convenient railway station for the purpose of carrying it out of the said city.

4th. It is ordered, that no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine be removed from any place or premises within the said city, through any part of the said city to any market or fair, or to any parish or place whatsoever within or without the said city, for the purpose of exhibition or sale; provided, nevertheless that sheep and lambs may be removed from any such place or premises to any market within or without the said city, until the Committee appointed under the said Act, shall by notice made public or inserted in a newspaper circulating in the said city prohibit the removing of sheep or lambs within the said city to such market; provided also, that nothing in this Order contained shall make it unlawful to send or carry any such animal, if brought by sea, from any place out of Great Britain into the said city to the nearest convenient railway station\* for the purpose of carrying it through or out of the said city.

5th. It is ordered that no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, shall be brought or removed from any place without the said city to any place within the said city; provided that nothing in this Order contained shall make it unlawful for any person to make such removal under the licence of two Justices of the said city, from premises without to premises within the said city in the same occupation, when such removal can be effected without the cattle being on, or passing across, or along any public highway within the said city; nor shall any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf be on, nor pass over, along, or across any public highway within the said city, except as is permitted by the following Orders of this Council: provided that nothing in this Order contained shall make it unlawful for any person to send or carry any such animal by railway\* through the said city, or to send or carry any such animal, if brought by sea, from any place out of Great Britain into the said city, to the nearest

convenient railway station\* for the purpose of carrying it through or out of the said city.

6th. It is ordered that this last-mentioned Order shall not be deemed to prohibit the occupier of any field or enclosed land from allowing any such cattle depasturing in such field or enclosed land, and in the possession of such occupier from being on, or passing along, or across any footpath or bridleway in such field or enclosed land.

7th. It is ordered, that any person may move any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf in his possession, if sound, from any farm or land in his occupation, within the said city, across any highway, or along any highway, for a distance not exceeding 200 yards, to any other farm or land in his occupation without any licence, and for a distance not exceeding two miles under the licence of an authorised person.

8th. It is ordered to make due provision for the breeding of stock, that a cow or heifer, if sound, may be moved on any public highway within the said city for any distance not exceeding five miles to and from any place where a bull is kept, under the licence of an authorised person.

9th. It is ordered that any calf, if sound, and under three months old, may be moved in a cart or wagon from the premises within the said city where the said calf has been bred, any distance not exceeding five miles along any highway in the said city to the premises of any purchaser of the said calf, under the licence of an authorised person.

10th. It is ordered, that any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf which has been the property and on the premises of the same person for thirty days immediately preceding its sale, if sound, and if *bonâ fide* sold, may, if there be no cattle plague in the said city, be removed from the said premises any distance not exceeding ten miles along any highway, but not by railway, to any premises within the said city belonging to the purchaser, under the licence of two authorised persons.

11th. It is ordered that the owner of any cow or heifer, out for winter keep, may move the same, if sound, with its calf, or calves, if any, along a highway for any distance not exceeding five miles to any premises in his occupation within the said city under the licence of an authorised person.

12th. It is ordered, that the owner of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf may move the same, if sound, on and from the 25th day of March instant to the 12th day of April next, from any premises on which it has been kept during the winter, to any premises in his occupation, or from any premises within the said city which he has ceased, or is about to cease to occupy, to any other premises within the said city, which he has begun or is about to begin to occupy, under the licence in either case of two authorised persons.

13th. It is ordered, that no animal shall be deemed to be sound within the meaning of the Orders of this Council which is affected with the cattle plague, or has within thirty days been in contact with any animal so affected, or has within thirty days been in or on any building, or yard, or field, where any animal so affected has been kept, unless that building, or yard, or field had been effectually cleansed and disinfected at least thirty days previously to such first-mentioned animal being placed in or on the same.

14th. It is ordered that all the Members of the Council be persons authorised to grant breeding and removal licences in respect of the said city, and that every such licence shall be obtained before removal of the animal, and be dated the day on which it is issued, and shall be in force for



three clear days from its date and no longer, and shall be granted without expense to the applicant, who shall act according to its terms and conditions, or be deemed not to have a licence.

15th. It is ordered that the above orders, with the exception of such of them as specify the time during which they are to have effect, shall be in operation from this date to the 15th day of April, 1866.

16th. It is ordered, that notice of the aforesaid Orders of Court be published in the usual newspapers.

NOTES.—Any person acting in contravention of any of these Orders incurs for each offence a penalty not exceeding £20.

\* By "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," s. 17, no cattle shall be moved on any railway before the 25th day of March, 1866, nor can any cattle brought by sea into any town or place in Great Britain be removed alive from such town or place except by sea.

### CATTLE PLAGUE.

#### *Selkirkshire.*

NOTICE is hereby given that the local authority for the county of Selkirk, under the "Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," have repealed all former rules and regulations respecting the movement of animals within the county as enacted by the former local authority.

And the local authority, as now constituted under the Act 29 Vict., cap. 2, resolve that no animal, as defined in the said Act, shall be admitted into the county, except under an order signed by the Chairman or Clerk of the Local Authority, and that no cattle be allowed to move on any road or highway, except with a licence as hereby directed, except also the cattle of any owner or occupier, who will require no such licence for the removal of his cattle from one part of his farm to another part thereof; that the above regulations, so far as regards sheep, shall not apply to those parishes of the county of Roxburgh immediately adjoining this county.

### CATTLE PLAGUE.

#### *Durham (to wit).*

At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Lady the Queen, holden at Durham, in and for the county of Durham, by adjournment, on Saturday, the 3rd day of March, in the twenty-ninth year of the reign of our Sovereign Lady Victoria, by the grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, in the year of our Lord 1866, before Rowland Burden, Chairman, John Fawcett, William Scurfield Grey, Esquires, and others their fellows, Justices of our said Lady the Queen, assigned to keep the peace of our said Lady the Queen, in the said county, and also to hear and determine divers felonies, trespasses, and other misdemeanors done and committed in the said county.

First. Pursuant to and in exercise of the powers and authorities in this behalf conferred upon and vested in them the said Justices in General or Quarter Sessions assembled, in and by "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," whereby they are constituted the Local Authority for the county of Durham, they the said Justices do resolve and order, that henceforth until the 25th day of March next, no bull, cow, ox, or heifer be brought from any other part of Great Britain, into



any part of the county of Durham over which this Court has jurisdiction, except by sea.

Second. That until the 15th day of April next, no bull, cow, ox, heifer, calves, or sheep, be removed from any place within the jurisdiction aforesaid, to any other place within the same jurisdiction; but any person may with the previously written consent of two Justices remove any such animals as aforesaid, from one part of a farm to another adjoining part of the said farm, within the jurisdiction aforesaid, although in order to effect such removal it may be necessary to drive or convey such animals over a public highway, for a distance not exceeding 200 yards; or any person may remove any such animals as aforesaid, from one farm to another farm *bonâ fide* in his or her own occupation, however distant from each other such farms may be (the term "occupation" being considered as including the eatage of grass or turnips by sheep, on a detached farm, or pasturage taken) or may, with the similar consent of one Justice, drive or take a cow to or from a bull on another farm within such jurisdiction, and may take or remove calves or sheep in a cart; provided such consent in all the above cases be granted only on proof to the satisfaction of such Justices or Justice, that Cattle Plague does not exist at or in the neighbourhood of the place from whence such removal is proposed to be made, or along the route on which it is proposed to drive, take, remove, or convey the said animals.

Third. Provided also that any person may bring a bull from without the jurisdiction aforesaid into the same jurisdiction, or from one part of such jurisdiction into another part of the same jurisdiction, if a certificate be previously obtained of the perfect health of such bull from two of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace, and an Inspector acting for the place or district from which such bull shall be brought, with the consent of two of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace, and an Inspector acting within the jurisdiction into which such bull is to be brought.

Fourth. Where a farm is situate partly in the county of Durham and partly in another adjoining county, animals may be removed from such part of the farm as is without the county of Durham to the adjoining part of the farm within the said county.

Fifth. That it shall not be lawful, without the previously written consent of two such Justices as aforesaid, to bring into any place within the said jurisdiction, or to remove from place to place within such jurisdiction, any raw or untanned hides, skins, horns, or hoofs of any animal, except such as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America; or the offal or dung of any animal, or any litter, hay, straw or fodder which has been used about any animal and is likely to propagate infection: Provided always that it shall be lawful to send or carry any such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or other articles as aforesaid by railway through such jurisdiction, or to send or carry any such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or other articles as aforesaid, if brought by sea, from any place out of Great Britain into such jurisdiction, to the nearest convenient railway station, for the purpose of carrying them through or out of such jurisdiction.

And also, that it shall be lawful with the licence of two such Justices as aforesaid, upon proof given to their satisfaction, by the certificate of the Inspector or otherwise that such articles have been properly disinfected, to remove from place to place within such jurisdiction, during a time to be specified in such licence, any such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or other articles as aforesaid. Provided further that it shall not be lawful to remove the contents of ash-pits or privies belonging to butchers or tripe-sellers, unless with the licence of two Justices as aforesaid, upon proof by the certificate of the Inspector or otherwise that such contents have been previously properly disinfected.

Sixth. That the person in charge of animals, or other substances, matters or things, permitted to be removed as aforesaid, shall carry with him, and when thereunto required, shall produce to all Inspectors, Policemen, Constables, Overseers, and other public officers requiring the same, the certificates, order, or consent for such removal.

Lastly. Every person offending against the tenor hereof, is liable to a penalty of not less than £20.

Ordered, that this Court be now adjourned to Saturday, the 17th day of March next, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, for the further despatch of business in reference to the cattle plague.

## CATTLE PLAGUE.

### *Oxford Local Board.*

#### "Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866."

At a meeting of the Oxford Local Board, held at the Town Hall, in Oxford, on Tuesday, the 20th day of March, 1866.

Whereas John Caldecott Cavell, Esquire, Mayor of the city of Oxford, being then the Local Authority for Oxford, constituted for the purposes of the several Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, now in force under the Act (since continued by several subsequent Acts) to prevent, until the 1st day of September, 1850, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders amongst sheep, cattle, and other animals, on the 6th day of February last did (by notice duly published under his hand) declare it to be expedient that for and during two calendar months from the 6th day of February, 1866, no bull, bullock, ox, cow, heifer, or calf, nor any raw or untanned hides or skins, nor any horns or hoofs, or offal of any such animals as aforesaid, nor any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter likely to propagate infection, should for and during the same period be brought from any other part of Great Britain into the city of Oxford or its suburbs within his jurisdiction; and, further, that no bull, bullock, ox, cow, heifer, or calf, nor any raw or untanned hides or skins, nor any horns or hoofs, or offal of any such animals as aforesaid, nor any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter likely to propagate infection, should be removed from any place in the city of Oxford or its suburbs to any other place therein.

And whereas by "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," the Local Board in Oxford was constituted the local authority for executing that Act within the district of the Local Board.

And whereas by virtue of an Order of the Lords of the Council, dated the 23rd day of Feb-

ruary, 1866, the several Orders in Council dated respectively the 23rd of November, 1865, the 16th of December, 1865, the 20th of January, 1866, and the 6th of February, 1866, were severally continued, and the said recited notice of the 6th of February, 1866, was continued until the same respectively should be altered or revoked by any further Order in Council or by the Local Authority, subject, nevertheless, to the provisions of "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," or of any Act which might thereafter be passed.

And whereas the Local Board hath determined to revoke the said notice of the 6th of February last, and to re-enact as follows:—

Now, therefore, the Oxford Local Board doth hereby declare (by this notice to be published on the 24th day of March, 1866, in newspapers circulating within the city and county of Oxford)—

1. That the said notice of the 6th of February last shall stand and be in force until the 24th day of March now instant, and that the same on that day stand revoked.
2. That on and after the 24th day of March, 1866, until revoked or altered by an Act of Parliament, or by an Order in Council, or otherwise according to law (except as hereinafter provided), no bull, bullock, ox, cow, heifer, or calf, nor any raw or untanned hides or skins, nor any horns or hoofs, or offal of any such animals as aforesaid, nor any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, shall be brought from any other part of Great Britain into the city of Oxford or its suburbs within the jurisdiction of the Oxford Local Board; and, further, that no bull, bullock, ox, cow, heifer, or calf, nor any raw or untanned hides or skins, nor any horns or hoofs, or offal of any such animals as aforesaid, nor any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, shall be removed from any place in the city of Oxford or its suburbs to any other place therein.

Provided, nevertheless, notwithstanding the order above made, that it shall be lawful to remove in and through any part of the said district any uninfected cattle, or any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, which has not been produced or used by, in, or about, or been in any way connected with any infected cattle along the uninfected part of any highway from any uninfected place or farm, to any other uninfected place or farm, subject to the definition and restrictions hereinafter declared (that is to say):—

1. That no part of any road or driftway shall be considered to be uninfected which on either side adjoins any land or field being part of an infected place, or which is within a mile of any infected place.
2. That no animal shall be considered to be uninfected (within the meaning of this notice), unless it shall have been in an uninfected place for thirty consecutive days immediately preceding the date of any licence for its removal; excepting that every calf under the age of thirty days, being the produce of an uninfected cow, and not having been separated from such cow, shall be considered to be an uninfected animal.
3. That no removal (as above authorized) of any animal shall take place without a licence signed by two members of the committee of the Local Board, and that every such licence shall be in the form and verified in the manner indicated by the subjoined schedule. But it shall be entirely in the discretion of

the members of the committee either to grant or refuse a licence.

4. That any person offending against these presents will, for every offence, forfeit such sum not exceeding twenty pounds, as the Justices before whom he or she shall be convicted may impose.

## CATTLE PLAGUE.

*Borough of Birmingham.*

"The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866."

NOTICE is hereby given, that the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the Borough of Birmingham, in the County of Warwick, in Council assembled, at a meeting held in the Council Chamber, in the public office, in Moor-street, in the said borough, on Tuesday, the 6th day of March instant, resolved and ordered as follows, that is to say:—

"Resolved,—That for the purpose of putting in force 'The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866,' this Council, as the Local Authority, hereby resolves and orders that all animals affected by the cattle plague within the borough be slaughtered."

And notice is hereby also given, that the said Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses in Council assembled as aforesaid, under and in pursuance of the 8th section of the said "Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," did further resolve as follows, namely:—

"Resolved,—That 'The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866,' be referred to the Markets and Fairs Committee, with instructions to take the necessary measures for bringing the provisions of the said Act into operation within this borough, and that for such purpose the said committee be, and it is hereby invested with all the powers and authorities conferred upon this Council by the said Act, except those of making a rate and appointing committees."

And notice is hereby also given, that the said Markets and Fairs Committee of the said Borough of Birmingham, under and in pursuance of the powers contained in the said Act of Parliament, and all other powers enabling them in that behalf, did, on Friday, the 9th day of March instant, duly appoint Robert Lewis Hunt and Joseph Marston Parker, of Cannon-street, and of the Hagley-road, in the Borough of Birmingham, Veterinary Surgeons, to be the Inspectors under the powers of "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," for the Borough of Birmingham, and authorised and instructed the said Inspectors to carry out the provisions of the said Act.

And notice is also given, that the said local authority of the said Borough of Birmingham do hereby order and declare that from the day of the date of this order until the 31st day of March instant, or until further order shall be made by the said Local Authority, under or in pursuance of any Orders of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, or otherwise,

No cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf (hereinafter referred to as cattle), shall be brought within the limits of the said Borough of Birmingham.

That no person shall turn out, or suffer to be turned out, any cattle for pasturage or any other purpose, in any pasture, or other field or meadow, within the said borough: provided that, with a certificate from one of the Inspectors of the borough, signed by a Justice of the Peace of the borough, that such cattle are free from cattle plague, and come from an uninfected place, any cattle may be removed from one part of the borough to another part thereof, for milking, slaughtering, or breeding purposes; but all cattle so removed shall be marked by the Inspectors with a distinctive mark; and all cattle so removed for the purpose of slaughtering shall be slaughtered within forty-eight hours after the hour of 12 o'clock at noon of the day on which such order shall be signed by such Justice: provided, also, that no cattle shall be removed within the said borough between the hours of six

o'clock in the evening and six o'clock in the morning.

That no hay, straw, or fodder shall be brought into the said borough, for sale or transit, unless accompanied by a declaration of the owner, duly signed in the presence of a Justice of the Peace, that the same has been brought from a district free from cattle plague.

That no raw or untanned hides or skins, nor any hoofs or horns (except such hides, skins, hoofs, or horns as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America), will be allowed to be removed from any premises in the borough, without being first limed, salted, or otherwise effectually disinfected:

And further order and declare, that no raw or untanned hides or skins, nor any hoofs, or horns (except as aforesaid), shall be brought into the said borough unless accompanied by a certificate of an Inspector of the district from whence the same shall be brought, signed in the presence of a Justice of the Peace, that the said hides, skins, horns, or hoofs have been limed, salted, or otherwise effectually disinfected.

And notice is hereby further given, that if any person acts in contravention of any of the provisions in the said Act contained, or of any order made by authority of the Council of the said borough, in pursuance of the said Act, he will for each offence incur a penalty not exceeding £20; and where any such offence is committed with respect to more than four animals a penalty not exceeding £5, for each animal may be imposed, instead of the penalty of £20.

And notice is hereby further given, that full printed particulars in reference to the said Act of Parliament, and the powers and authorities of the said Inspectors, may be obtained by all persons interested, free of charge, from Mr. W. Hanman, the Superintendent of the Smithfield Market, in the said Borough of Birmingham.

## CATTLE PLAGUE.

*Lincolnshire, Lindsey, to wit.*

At an adjourned General Quarter Sessions of the Peace holden at Lincoln, in and for the parts of Lindsey, in the county of Lincoln, on Friday, the 16th day of March, 1866, before Sir Charles Henry John Anderson, Bart., Chairman, and 13 others, Justices of the Peace of the said parts.

The Court having had under its consideration the several Orders of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council concerning the disorder commonly designated the "Cattle Plague," and also the several declarations, orders, and notices made and given at the several Quarter Sessions of the Peace holden for the said parts on the sixteenth day of January, the second day of February, the twenty-first day of February, the twenty-eighth day of February last past, and the tenth day of March instant, respectively, with a view to prevent the spreading of the said disorder, and considering that from the more advanced state of the season and with the prospect of several changes of tenancy in the said parts during the present month of March and the month of April next, it has become necessary to revise and materially alter and amend the said declarations, orders, and notices, it was thereupon resolved and ordered, that with a view to such

revision, alteration, and amendment, all the declarations, orders, and notices made and given at the said several Quarter Sessions of the Peace, or any of them, from and after the 20th day of March instant, be and the same are hereby revoked, except as to any penalties that have been incurred, or any appointment of an inspector or inspectors that have been made, and any orders, rules, and regulations that have been made under the provisions of an Act passed in the present Session of Parliament, (the 29th Vict., cap. 2) "to amend the law relating to contagious or infectious diseases in cattle and other animals," at the General Quarter Sessions holden at Louth on the twenty-eighth day of February last past, and at Grimsby on the tenth day of March instant.

And Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace here present do declare, that with a view to prevent the spreading of the said disorder, it is expedient and they do accordingly declare and give notice as follows, that is to say:—

First.—That from and after the 20th day of March instant no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, goat, or swine shall be brought or sent to any public fair, market, or place within the said parts of Lindsey, for the purpose of exhibition or sale.

Secondly.—That from the said 20th day of March instant no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, goat, or swine, nor any sheep or lambs except as hereinafter provided, nor any raw or untanned hides or skins, nor any horns or hoofs of any such animals not previously disinfected, nor any offal of such animals, nor any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter which shall be likely to propagate infection or shall be brought from an infected yard or premises, shall be brought from any place whatever out of the said parts of Lindsey to any place within the same.

Provided that nothing contained in this resolution shall make it unlawful for any person to bring or send any sheep or lambs, with the licence of a Justice of the Peace of the parts, division, or county from which such sheep or lambs shall be removed, from any place whatever out of the said parts of Lindsey to any place within the same, in which licence the Justice shall certify and state all the particulars contained in the licence to be granted by a Justice of the Peace of the parts of Lindsey hereinafter mentioned; that the form of such licence shall be obtained from the Superintendent of Police of the district into which the sheep or lambs are to be brought, and the duplicate of such licence, when signed by the Justice granting the same, shall be returned by the applicant to the said superintendent, such licence to be in force 48 hours from the date thereof and no longer.

Provided also that nothing contained in this resolution shall make it unlawful for any person to bring or send with the licence of a Justice of the Peace of the said parts as hereinafter described, any such animals, or any such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, dung, or litter, or other such articles as aforesaid, which shall not be liable to propagate infection, and shall not be brought from an infected yard or premises from any lands or premises in his own occupation, whether permanently or hired for pasturage or agistment, beyond the said parts of Lindsey, to other lands or premises in his own occupation within the said parts.

Thirdly.—That from the said 20th day of March instant no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, or swine, nor any raw or untanned hides or skins (except sheep skins from any uninfected

yards or premises), nor any horns or hoofs of the animals above mentioned, nor the offal of any such animals, nor any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter which shall be likely to propagate infection, or brought from any infected yard or premises, shall be removed from place to place within the said parts of Lindsey, over, across, or along any public highway except as hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:—

Any cattle or swine for the purpose of immediate slaughter, which may be removed with the licence of a Justice of the Peace hereinafter described, to any place which he may think suitable and convenient for such slaughter, and which cattle shall, before the removal, be marked by part of the hair being conspicuously clipped off in the form of a cross from one of the hind quarters.

Any hides, skins, horns, and hoofs of any slaughtered cattle which have been previously effectually disinfected, which may be removed by a like licence from and to any place which the Justice granting such licence shall direct and appoint.

Any cattle or swine which may be removed from a farm or lands not being affected with the cattle plague to another farm or lands in the occupation of the same person also not so affected, any distance along a public highway not exceeding 200 yards, and with a like licence any distance not exceeding five miles.

Any cow or heifer which may be removed to a bull, or any bull which may be removed to a cow or heifer, from any farm and premises not affected with cattle plague to any farm and premises not so affected, any distance along such public highway not exceeding five miles, with the like licence.

Any sow which may be removed to the boar, or any boar to the sow, any distance not exceeding five miles, with a like licence, so that such sow or boar be removed in a cart or other vehicle and not otherwise.

Any healthy milch cow, calf, or swine which shall have been the property of the person proposing to remove the same three calendar months or from the time of its birth, which may be removed with a like licence along a public highway any distance not exceeding five miles, so as such calf or swine be removed in a cart or other vehicle and not otherwise.

And any cattle or other animals which may be removed on a *bonâ fide* change of tenancy, or upon a *bonâ fide* sale upon the premises and not otherwise, or for the purpose of pasturage, with the licence of the Justices of the Peace for the district from which such removal is intended to take place, in Petty Sessions assembled, and signed by the majority of the Justices present at such Petty Sessions, along such public highway any distance which the said Justices granting such licence shall in their discretion permit.

Fourthly.—That all such licences (except the licence last above mentioned) shall be printed or in writing and in duplicate, and signed by the Justice granting the same. That they shall state the name of the person requiring the same, and specify the animals or other articles to be removed, and the place and person to which they shall be removed, and shall certify that the Justice has been satisfied by evidence that the animals or other articles to be removed are healthy or effectually disinfected, that they have

been in the possession of the person applying for the licence 30 days at least immediately preceding such removal, and that no case of cattle plague has occurred upon or within half a mile from the premises from or to which such removal is to take place 28 days immediately preceding such removal, such licence to be in force 48 hours from its date and no longer. That one part of such licence shall be delivered to the person applying for the same, shall accompany the removal, and be produced to any person requiring to see the same, and shall be returned to the Justice granting the same on the next day after the expiration thereof, and the other part shall be sent by the Justice granting the same by post to the Superintendent of Police of the district in which the person requiring the licence shall reside.

Provided that nothing in any of the foregoing notices, orders, and resolutions shall authorize any removal therein permitted or provided for between the expiration of one hour after sunset and the commencement of one hour before sunrise.

Ordered that this Court be and the same is hereby adjourned, to be held at the Central Police Station, at Lincoln, on Friday, the 23rd day of March instant, at the hour of 12 at noon.

### CATTLE PLAGUE.

#### *County of Haddington.*

NOTICE is hereby given, that the Local Authority of the county of Haddington, under "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," at a meeting held at Haddington on the date hereof, in terms of the powers conferred on them by said Act and by the Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, of date 23rd February, 1866, resolved as follows:—

That whereas it is expedient that the former orders of any local authority for the county with regard to the removal of animals, and raw or untanned hides or offal of such animals, or dung, under the Order of the Lords of the Privy Council, respecting the Cattle Plague, should be amended, and further orders made, and that the whole so far as relates to removal, be consolidated and set forth in one notice for the convenience of the public. And whereas the cattle plague no longer exists in the county of Haddington, and has not existed in the said county for more than 30 days, it is not expedient any longer to prevent the removal of any bull, cow, heifer, bullock, ox, or calf, except by licence, within the said county.

I. It is ordered that any bull, cow, heifer, bullock, ox, or calf, may be removed from and to any place within the said county of Haddington, and within the jurisdiction of the said local authority, without a licence: Provided always, in the event of the cattle plague breaking out again in any place within the county, it is hereby ordered that no bull, cow, heifer, bullock, ox, or calf shall be removed from or to any place within the jurisdiction of the local authority, without a licence, to be granted by the local authority at a meeting assembled.

And whereas the cattle plague continues to exist in other parts of Great Britain and the continent of Europe, with a view to prevent the said cattle plague being brought again into the county of Haddington.

II. It is ordered, that no bull, cow, heifer, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, or any raw or untanned hide, or any horn or hoof of any such animal, excepting the hide, skin, horn, or hoof of any such animal as is directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America, or any offal of such animals, or any dung, shall be imported or brought into the county of Haddington, unless the owner shall previously make a solemn declaration before the local authority, at a meeting assembled, that such animal or animals have not been kept on any farm, or in any place where cattle plague is in existence, or has existed within the last three months, and that such raw or untanned hide, horn, or hoof, or offal of such animals, or dung, has not been taken from any animal affected by the cattle plague, or from any place where the said plague has existed within the last three months, excepting such dung as has already been permitted by the said local authority to be brought within their jurisdiction; and shall obtain from the local authority a licence for importing and bringing into the county such bull, cow, heifer, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, or any raw or untanned hide, or horn or hoof, or any offal of such animals, or any dung; and that such licence authorizing the entrance into the said county of such animal or animals, and such raw or untanned hide, horn, hoof, offal of such animals, or dung, shall contain a description of such animal or animals as are intended to be brought within the county, and the place to which they are to be sent, and such licences to bring said animal or animals, or such raw or untanned hide, horn, hoof, offal of such animals, or dung, shall be in duplicate, and one of said licences shall be delivered to the chief constable, or at the nearest police station, 24 hours before such animal or animals, or such raw or untanned hide, horn, or hoof, or offal of such animal, or dung, are brought into the county. Such licence shall be held good for seven days only from the date thereof, and if the animal or animals, hide, horn, hoof, offal, or dung, therein described be not brought into the county within the said number of days, it shall be incumbent on the owner or owners to procure another licence.

III. These orders shall take effect from and after the 28th day of March, 1866, and shall continue in force till further notice.

IV. All previous notices which relate to removal of any bull, cow, heifer, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, or any raw or untanned hide, or any horn or hoof, or any offal of such animals, or any dung, are hereby cancelled, except as herein provided.

Every person offending against the above orders shall, for every such offence, forfeit a sum not exceeding £20.

## NOTICE.

At a meeting of the Council of the borough of Folkestone, held at the Town Hall, in the said borough, on Wednesday, the 7th day of March, 1866, it was resolved that the Mayor for the time being, the Deputy-Mayor (John Gambrell), Aldermen Robert William Boarer and Ham Tite, and Councillors James Kelcey and Hunt Jeffery (Coolinge), be, and they were thereby appointed a Committee under and for carrying out all and every the provisions of "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," and that all the powers conferred on the Council by the said Act (excepting the power to make a rate), and by the Rules and Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council should be and were thereby delegated to and should and might be exercised by such Committee. And that three be a quorum.

At a meeting of the Committee, held on the 22nd day of March, 1866, the following orders were made by the Committee, viz. :—

1st. It is ordered that the orders made by Charles Doridant, Esquire, Mayor of the borough of Folkestone, on the 4th day of August, 1865, appointing Mr. William David Hogben, of Uphill, Folkestone, veterinary surgeon, to be an Inspector for the purposes of carrying into effect, within the said borough of Folkestone, the rules, regulations, and provisions made by the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, be, and the same are hereby revoked.

2nd. It is further ordered that Mr. William David Hogben, of Uphill, Folkestone, veterinary surgeon, be, and he is hereby appointed Inspector for carrying into effect the provisions of the said Act within the borough of Folkestone.

3rd. It is further ordered that the orders made by the said Mayor, on the 9th day of February, 1866, and the notice given thereof be, and the same are hereby revoked.

4th. It is further ordered that the Chief Superintendent of Police of this borough be, and he is hereby appointed Chief Cattle Constable under the said Act, and that the sergeant and constables under his command be, and they are hereby respectively appointed Cattle Constables, and that they shall carry into effect the provisions of the said Act within the said borough, subject, nevertheless, in all respects to the orders and directions of the Committee.

5th. It is further ordered that no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, or any hide, skin, horn, hoof, or offal of such animals, or any dung, or litter of such animals, shall be brought or removed from any place without the said borough of Folkestone to any place within the said borough; or from any place within the said borough to any other place within the said borough; or from place to place generally within the said borough, nor be on, pass over, along, or across any street, highway, or public road within the said borough, except with the previous licence (in writing) of two members of the Committee for such distances and time as such two members may deem expedient, and name in such licence, and which licence, it is ordered, may from time to time be revoked by the Committee.

6th. It is further ordered, that nothing contained in the said 5th order shall prohibit the removal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, between the hours of seven o'clock and nine o'clock in the morning, from any place within the borough to such place only within the said borough where such animal shall be removed or taken to be slaughtered, if such animal shall have been first examined by the Inspector before its removal, and the sanction of the Committee, countersigned by such Inspector for such removal, shall have been given in writing. And such animal shall be slaughtered within 24 hours from the time of such removal.

7th. It is further ordered that nothing in the said 5th order contained, shall make it unlawful for any person to remove any animal for breeding purposes within the said borough, provided such person shall have a breeding licence (in writing) for such removal to and from any place where a bull is kept, and that such licence be granted by a member of the Committee, and be in force for a period not exceeding three days from the date thereof.

8th. It is further ordered that the Mayor of the borough of Folkestone, for the time being, shall be the Chairman of this Committee.

9th. It is further ordered that the aforesaid orders be published in the local newspapers circulating within the borough of Folkestone, and be sent to the Clerk of Her Majesty's Privy Council, to be published in the London Gazette.

#### CATTLE PLAGUE.—ISLE OF MAN.

WHEREAS by an Act passed by the Legislature of the Isle of Man, intitled "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1865," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of any two Members of the Council, to make such orders and regulations, and to take such measures as may appear to be necessary for the purpose of preventing the introduction of any infectious or contagious disease amongst animals into the said Isle:

Now, therefore, the Lieutenant-Governor, by and with the advice and consent of two Members of the Council, hath, by virtue and in exercise of the powers given by the said Act, ordered as follows:—

I. That the Proclamation bearing date the 12th February, 1866, so far as the same prohibits the importation of manure, shall be, and the same is hereby varied.

II. That from the date of this order, no manure, and from the 26th day of March, 1866, no guano, shall be imported into this Isle, or into any of the ports thereof, until affidavits and certificates to the following effect have been handed to the Collector of Customs at the port of entry:—

1. That no carcase, blood, or any animal matter (except bones entirely free from all flesh) has been used in the preparation or manufacture of the manure.

2. That all such bones have been imported into Great Britain from India, South America, or Australia.

3. That all the bones used in the manufacture of the manure have been subjected to some process sufficient to destroy any infection which might otherwise be conveyed by such bones.

4. That the manure has not been in any railway truck, nor in any manner conveyed by railway.

5. That the manure has been shipped in new or disinfected bags, directly from the works or premises where such manure has been prepared or manufactured, and that neither such bags nor manure have been in contact with anything whatever likely to propagate cattle plague or any infectious disease.

6. A certificate from some eminent chemist that the manure does not contain any infectious matter, and may be safely conveyed from place to place, and freely used without conveying or spreading cattle plague or any infectious disease.

And with respect to guano, the following affidavits will be required:—

1. That the guano does not contain any animal matter foreign to guano, or anything whatever likely to propagate cattle plague or any infectious disease.

2. That the guano has not been in any railway truck, nor in any manner conveyed by railway.

3. That it has been shipped in new or disinfected bags, directly from the place where it has been

stored, and that neither such bags nor guano have been in contact with anything whatever likely to propagate cattle plague or any infectious disease.
