

Archduke of Austria, King of Hungary? To which it was as often answer'd, by an Universal Consent, *Let Him be Crowned.* Then the Archbishop put on him the Royal Robe of *St. Stephen*, and girt on his Sword, putting the Scepter into his Hand, and the Crown on his Head, which were delivered to the Archbishop by the Palatin and Marshal, and then he was proclaimed King of *Hungary* by the loud Acclamations of all the Assistants, by the Noise of Drums, Kettle-Drums, Trumpets, and other Warlike Musick; And by the Discharge of the Artillery round the Town and Castle. After that, his Majesty was Re-conducted to his Throne, and *Te Deum* was Sung; which ended, the Archbishop went on with Divine Service; at the Reading of the Gospel, the Emperor stood up, holding his Scepter in one Hand; and the Globe in the other. The New King received the Communion from the Archbishop, who, after the Mass ended, made a Speech in Latin, in which, having in proper terms set forth the great Reason that the whole Kingdom had, in general, to rejoice at the Elevation over them, of a Prince so qualifi'd and accomplish'd, He particularly blessed God, That had been pleas'd to continue him to perform the Sacred Offices on that solemn Occasion; which coming from a Venerable Prelate of 86 Years of Age, who concluded with a passionate *Nunc Dimittis*: As it drew Tears from himself, so it had the same effect on several there present, who could not but be sensibly affected with so grave and suitable a Discourse. The Speech ended, their Imperial Majesties retired, to disrobe themselves, but the King marched on Foot, in Procession, to the *Recollers Church*, where, on a Scaffold erected, he performed the Ceremony of creating Knights of several Nations. Then mounting on Horseback with the Cavalcade already mention'd, and besides the Ten Standards carried by Ten Noblemen, Count *Drafskowitz* bearing the Truncheon, Count *Serini* the Sword, Count *Erdodi* the Dove, the Ban of *Croatia* the Globe, Count *Cziaki* the Scepter, and the Palatin *St. Stephen's Cross*. He marched out of Town at the Port *St. Michael*, where the Regiment of Foot of *Starenberg*, and Count *Palfi's* Regiment of Cuirassiers were drawn up in Battalions and Squadrons, and alighted again before the Convent of the Brothers of *Mercy*, where, on a Throne, and under a State of Cloth of Gold, the King took his Oath, to preserve the Privileges of the Kingdom, in the manner as it had been agreed on, at which the Cannon were again discharged. From thence the King went on Horseback towards another Gate of the City, called, *The Fish-Gate*, near to which he Rid Full Speed, with his Sword drawn, making the Sign of the Cross towards the Four Quarters of the World, as a Token of his Resolution to defend that Kingdom against all its Enemies, from what part soever they should invade it. He was followed to all these Stations, by Officers that threw out Money and Medals amongst the People, with the Inscriptions which have been already mention'd; and then all the Ceremonies being performed, the King returned with the same Pomp to the Castle. It has been thought worthy of Remembrance, as an Expression of an ominous Significancy, which was occasionally spoke by the King on the way to the Castle, when seeing his Robe cover his Sword, he said, in *Italian*, *Let my Sword be seen.* What remain'd to complete the Joy of that Day, was the great Entertainment which was carried on through a good part of the Night, of which it is sufficient to say, that there were Provisions enough to furnish above 200 Tables. And thus this Ceremony concluded, every one seriously congratulating so happy a turn of Affairs; that an unjust War, which in the beginning threaten'd no less than the Ruine of the whole Empire, should in the course of it, produce the Recovery and Uniting of almost all *Hungary*, (after having been dismember'd above 140 years) under the Government of a Prince so able to preserve and enlarge it.

Paris, Jan. 7. They write from *Rome*, That the Pope's being taken ill with a Defluxion had put off the holding of a Consistory; That the Marquis *de Lavardin* had sent, on the 19th Instant, to demand a second Audience; but that Monsieur *M. Giacchi* had returned the same Answer as formerly, and that there appeared no Disposition in his Holiness to depart from his first Resolutions. The Envoys of the Reformed Cantons are return'd home: The ordinary Presents were offer'd them, of Gold Chains and Medals; but they excus'd their not accepting them, that since they had not the Honour to be admitted to his Majesties Presence, they could not receive the customary Gratifications bestow'd on those whose Characters had been acknowledged. It is said that the business they came about is refer'd back to the Determination of the Parliament of *Dijon*, as belonging properly to their Cognizance.

Whitehall, Jan. 3. The King has been Graciously pleas'd, in Consideration of Sir *Roger Strickland's* Long and Faithful Services at Sea, to confer upon him the Honour and Trust of Rear-Admiral of *England*.

Whitehall, Jan. 4. This day the Marquis of *Bedmar*, General of the Horse in *Flanders*, and Envoy Extraordinary from *Spain*, to make the Compliments of Condo-

ance on the Death of Her Highness the late Dutchess of *Modena*, had Audience of His Majesty, being conducted by Sir *Charles Cottrel*, Master of the Ceremonies. He was accompanied by several Persons of great Quality, whom he presented at the same time to His Majesty.
