**W**HEREAS by an Act passed in the present session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to amend the law relating to contagious or infectious diseases in cattle and other animals," it is, amongst other things, enacted, that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by Order in Council, from time to time to continue, or to renew, if expired, all or any of the provisions, in the first part

of that Act contained, for such time as shall be specified in such Order.

And whereas it is provided in the second paragraph of the seventeenth section of the said Act, which section is in the first part thereof, that "no cattle shall be moved on any railway before the twenty-fifth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six:"

And whereas it is expedient that the prohibition of the movement of cattle, by railway, should be continued beyond the said twenty-fifth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the power vested in Her by the said Act, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the said recited provision, contained in the second paragraph of the seventeenth section of the said Act, be continued on and after the said twenty-fifth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, and that "no cattle shall be moved on any railway" before the sixteenth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS it has been represented to Her Majesty, that certain contagious or infectious disorders are now prevalent among cattle, in the dominions and territories situated in Europe, belonging to His Majesty the King of the Netherlands, and that there is danger of the said disorders being introduced into this country by means of cattle from such countries or places: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that on and after the twenty-eighth day of March instant, no cattle shall be imported or introduced into the United Kingdom, which shall come from, or shall have been at, any place within the aforesaid territories and dominions, situate in Europe, belonging to His Majesty the King of the Netherlands; and also that on and after the said twenty-eighth day of March instant, no cattle shall be imported or introduced into

the United Kingdom which shall be, or shall have been, on board any vessels at the same time with any cattle which shall have come from, or shall have been within, the aforesaid territories and dominions.

And Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth hereby further order, that, in the event of any cattle being landed in any portion of the United Kingdom, contrary to the provisions of this Order, all such cattle, the importation or introduction whereof is so hereby prohibited as aforesaid, shall, upon their arrival in this country, be destroyed or otherwise disposed of, as the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Customs may direct.

This Order shall continue in force until revoked by any further Order.

The word "cattle" shall include sheep as well as bulls, cows, oxen, heifers, and calves.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

**W**HEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, intituled "An Act to prevent until the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals," and from time to time continued by divers subsequent Acts, and lastly by an Act passed in the Session of the twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and nineteen, it is (amongst other things) enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time, to make such orders and regulations as to them may seem necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal to or from such parts or places as they may designate in such Order or Orders of sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals, or of meat, skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals, or of hay, straw, fodder, or other articles, likely to propagate infection, and to make any other Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations; and that all provisions for any of the purposes aforesaid in any such Order or Orders contained shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in the said Act.

And whereas a contagious or infectious disorder, generally designated as the "Cattle Plague," has lately appeared, and now prevails, amongst cattle in England and Wales:

And whereas divers Orders have been made by the Lords of the said Council in relation to the cattle plague, and it is expedient to consolidate, amend, and add to the said Orders:

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council do hereby, in exercise of the powers given under the said Act so continued as aforesaid, order as follows:

*Preliminary.*

1. Part I. of this Order, with the first schedule hereto, and the regulations 26 and 27 of Part II. which relate to the isolation of infected places, and the rules with respect to infected places, shall come into operation immediately. The residue of this Order shall not come into operation until the 16th day of April, 1866. The whole of this Order shall remain in force from the time of its coming into operation until it is revoked or altered.

2. This Order shall apply to England and Wales only.

**PART I.**

*Definitions.*

3. In the construction of this Order the following terms shall have the meanings herein-after assigned to them; that is to say,

"Person" shall include a Body of Persons, corporate or unincorporate:

"Cattle" shall mean bull, bullock, cow, ox, heifer, or calf:

"Animal" shall mean cattle as above defined, sheep, lambs, goats, and swine:

"Disease" shall mean the cattle plague:

"Diseased" shall mean affected by the cattle plague:

"England" shall include Wales:

"Privy Council" shall mean the Lords and others of Her Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, or any two of them:

"Borough" shall mean any place for the time being subject to an Act passed in the session holden in the fifth and sixth years of the reign of King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-six, intituled "An Act to provide for the regulation of Municipal Corporations in England and Wales:"

"County" shall not include a county of a city or county of a town, but shall include any riding, division, or parts of a county having a separate Commission of the Peace:

The Liberty of St. Alban's, and the Liberty of the Isle of Ely, and the Soke of Peterborough, shall respectively be deemed to be separate counties, but all other liberties and franchises of counties shall be considered as forming part of the county by which they are surrounded, or if partly surrounded by two or more counties, then as forming part of that county with which they have the longest common boundary:

"The Metropolis" shall include all parishes and places in which the Metropolitan Board of Works have power to levy a main drainage rate, exclusive of the City of London and the Liberties thereof.

Every place that is not, according to the foregoing definitions, a borough, a county, or a part of the metropolis, or is not separately mentioned in the first schedule hereunto annexed, shall be deemed to form part of the county, as herein-before defined, to the county rate of which

it is assessed, or, if not so assessed, of the county within which it is situate.

*Local Authority.*

4. For the purposes of this Order, "District," "Local Authority," "Local Rate," and "Clerk of Local Authority" shall respectively mean the places, bodies of persons, rate, and officer in the first schedule hereto annexed in that behalf mentioned.

5. Any Local Authority may from time to time form one or more Committee or Committees consisting wholly of its own members, or partly of its own members and partly of such other persons, being rated occupiers in the district and qualified in such other manner as the Local Authority may determine, and may delegate, with or without conditions or restrictions, to any Committee so formed, all or any powers conferred on the Local Authority by this Order; and may from time to time revoke, add to, or alter any powers so given to a Committee.

A Committee may elect a chairman of its meetings. If no chairman is elected, or if the chairman elected is not present at the time appointed for holding a meeting, the members present shall choose one of their number to be chairman of such meeting. A Committee may meet and adjourn as it thinks proper. The quorum of a Committee shall consist of such number of members as may be prescribed by the Local Authority that appointed it, or, if no number be prescribed, of three members. Every question at a meeting shall be determined by a majority of votes of the members present, and voting on that question; and in case of an equal division of votes the chairman shall have a second or casting vote.

The proceedings of a Committee shall not be invalidated by any vacancy or vacancies amongst its members, or, in case of a Committee appointed by the General or Quarter Sessions of a county, by the termination of the Sessions by which it was appointed.

A Local Authority may from time to time add to or diminish the number of the members or otherwise alter the constitution of any Committee formed by it under this Order, and may dissolve any such Committee.

Any Committee formed under the provisions of the Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866, shall be deemed to be a committee of a Local Authority for the purposes of this Order, within the district of such Local Authority as defined by this Order.

6. The Local Authority of any borough which is assessed to the county rate of any county may, with the consent of the Local Authority of such county, such consent being testified in writing, by a letter signed by the clerk of such last-mentioned authority, declare, by notice published in any newspaper circulating within such county, that such borough is annexed to such county for the purposes of this Order, and from the date of the publication of such notice such borough shall, for the purposes of this Order, form part of the district of the Local Authority of such county.

7. Every Local Authority shall perform all such duties as are imposed upon it by this Order, and shall make such reports to the Privy Council as the Council may from time to time require.

*Appointment of Officers, &c.*

8. Every Local Authority shall from time to time appoint such inspectors or other officers as it thinks necessary to carry into effect the provisions of this Order within its district; it shall assign them such duties and award them such

salaries and allowances as it thinks expedient, and may revoke any appointment so made.

9. Every inspector or other officer appointed by a Local Authority previously to the date of this Order, for any purpose relating to the cattle plague, and holding office at such date, shall be deemed an inspector or officer for the purposes of this Order within the district of such Local Authority as defined by this Order, and be subject to the provisions thereof, in the same manner as if he had been appointed thereunder.

10. Every inspector shall furnish the Privy Council with such information in regard to the cattle plague as they may from time to time require.

11. Every Local Authority may provide and supply, without charge, printed copies of any documents or forms requisite for the purposes of this Order.

12. All expenses incurred by a Local Authority in carrying into effect this Order shall be defrayed out of the local rate.

13. Any person appointed or to be appointed by the Privy Council an Inspector for the purposes of this Order shall, throughout the whole of England, have all the powers which an Inspector appointed by a Local Authority has within his district, and any direction of the Privy Council shall, as respects such Inspector, be of the same validity as a direction of a Local Authority in the case of an Inspector appointed by it.

PART II.

*Diseased Animals.*

14. Every person having in his possession or under his charge any diseased animal shall forthwith give notice thereof to such officer as may have been appointed by the Local Authority of the district to receive such notices; or, if no such officer has been appointed, to a police constable, whose duty it shall be to report without delay to the Local Authority the fact of such notice having been given to him. Any person failing to comply with this regulation as to giving notice shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

15. Every person having in his possession or under his charge any diseased Animal shall, as far as practicable, keep such animal separate from animals not diseased. Any person failing to comply with this regulation shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

16. No diseased animal, and no animal which has, within the preceding twenty-eight days, been in the same shed or stable or in the same herd or flock or in contact with a diseased animal, shall be removed alive from the premises where such animal may be, except with a licence from the Local Authority of the district, which licence shall only permit the removal of such animal to some place within the district of such Local Authority where it can be conveniently slaughtered, or kept apart from all other animals until such Local Authority is satisfied that there is no reasonable probability of such animal propagating disease; provided that no such licence shall authorize such animal to be removed in contravention of the 17th regulation of this Order.

If any animal is removed in contravention of this regulation, the person causing, directing, or permitting the removal of such animal, and also the person removing the same, shall respectively be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

17. No diseased animal, and no animal that has within the preceding twenty-eight days

been in the same shed or stable, or in the same herd or flock, or in contact with a diseased animal, shall—

1. Be placed or kept in any common or unenclosed land, or in any field or other place insufficiently fenced :
2. Be sent or brought to any fair or market, or exposed for public sale :
3. Be driven along or allowed to stray upon any highway or the sides thereof :
4. Be sent or carried by any railway, canal, river, or other inland navigation, or by any coasting or sea-going vessel.

If any animal is dealt with in contravention of this regulation, the owner of such animal, and also the company or person other than the owner dealing with the same in contravention of this regulation, shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

18. Where any offence is committed with respect to any animal under the 14th, 15th, 16th, and 17th regulations of this Order, or any of them, the Local Authority of the district, and any authority of a fair or market in which such animal may be, may, by themselves or their officers, cause such animal to be slaughtered and buried, and recover from the owner in a summary manner all expenses so incurred.

19. All diseased animals, whether they have been slaughtered or have died of the disease, shall be buried by the owner as soon as practicable in some proper place, with their skins slashed in such a manner as to prevent their being made of any use, and with a sufficient quantity of quicklime or other disinfectant, and shall be covered with at least five feet of earth, or shall be otherwise disposed of in such manner as may be directed by any regulations made by the Local Authority, and approved by the Privy Council.

If any diseased animal is not buried or otherwise disposed of in pursuance of this Regulation, the owner of such diseased animal shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order, and it shall be lawful for the Local Authority to bury or otherwise dispose of any such animal, and to use any convenient place on the premises of the owner for that purpose.

The Local Authority may recover from the owner in a summary manner any expenses incurred by it under this regulation.

20. No person shall dig up any diseased animal, or part of a diseased animal. Any person acting in contravention of this Regulation shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

21. Every Local Authority shall within its district, at its own expense, cause the premises in which diseased animals have been to be thoroughly cleansed and disinfected; and the occupier of such premises shall give all facilities for such cleansing and disinfecting. Any occupier of premises failing to give such facilities shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

22. No fresh animal shall be admitted into any yard, shed, stable, field, or other premises in which a diseased animal has been kept while affected by disease, or has died, or been slaughtered, until the expiration of thirty days after the cleansing and disinfecting of such premises. If any fresh animal is admitted into any yard, shed, stable, field, or other premises in contravention of this regulation, the occupier of such yard, shed, stable, field, or other premises shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

23. The dung of a diseased animal, and all hay, straw, or litter, or any other article that has been in contact with or used about a diseased animal, shall be destroyed, or, with the sanction of the Local Authority, shall be disinfected and dealt with to the satisfaction of the Inspector. If such dung, hay, straw, litter, or any other article is not destroyed or disinfected and dealt with in pursuance of this regulation, the Local Authority may cause the same to be destroyed or disinfected, and recover in a summary manner all expenses incurred by it from the occupier of the premises on which such articles were found, and in addition thereto such occupier shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

24. The dung of a diseased animal, and all hay, straw, or litter, or any other article that has been in contact with or used about a diseased animal, shall not be removed from the premises where such animal has been, except for the purpose of being destroyed or disinfected and dealt with in compliance with this Order and with a licence of an Inspector specifying the place at which it is to be destroyed or disinfected and dealt with, and shall not be removed beyond the limits of the district of the Local Authority in which the said premises are situated without the consent in writing of the Local Authority into whose district it is moved. If such dung, hay, straw, litter, or other article is removed in contravention of this regulation, the occupier of the premises from which it is removed, and also the person removing the same, shall be respectively deemed guilty of an offence against this Order; and it shall be lawful for the Local Authority to destroy or disinfect any such article, and to recover the expenses of such destruction or disinfection from the said occupier.

25. Every Local Authority shall direct the disinfecting of clothes of, and the use of due precautions by, Inspectors and other officers brought into contact with diseased animals, with a view to prevent such Inspectors or Officers spreading contagion. Any Inspector or Officer disobeying the directions of any Local Authority as to such disinfection and use of due precautions shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

#### *Infected Places.*

26. The authorities hereinafter mentioned, that is to say, any Local Authority as to any place within its district shall, and the Privy Council as to any place in England may, by Order made at any time after the passing of this Order, and published in manner hereinafter mentioned, declare any place in which disease amongst animals at that time exists, together with such an area, including such place, as to such authority may seem to be required, to be an "infected place," from and after a date to be specified in such Order; and the authority declaring a place to be infected may, at the expiration of one month after the disappearance of disease in that place, by Order published in like manner, declare such place to be free from disease, and after the publication of such last-mentioned Order such place shall cease to be an "infected place" within the meaning of this Order, unless again declared in manner aforesaid to be "an infected place."

Any Local Authority may include in the area of an "infected place" any adjoining part of the district of another Local Authority, with the consent of such last-mentioned authority, testified in writing by a letter signed by the clerk of such authority.

The area of an "infected place" may be described by reference to a map deposited at some

specified place, or by reference to parishes, townships, farms, or otherwise, as the authority may think expedient.

An Order declaring a place to be an "infected place" shall be published by notice being posted-up in or near the "infected place," and, so far as is possible, in all places where notices are usually posted up, within five miles of such "infected place," or in such other manner as the authority declaring the place to be infected may think expedient.

The Local Authority, on declaring any place infected, shall forthwith report by post to the Privy Council the fact of such declaration having been made.

No objection shall be taken in any legal proceeding in respect of an "infected place" on the ground that due notice has not been given of such place having been declared to be an "infected place."

Any Order made by the Privy Council under this regulation shall supersede any Order inconsistent with it that may have been made by a Local Authority.

27. The following rules shall be observed with respect to "infected places," in addition to the other regulations of this Order with respect to diseased animals; that is to say:—

1. No animal shall be moved out of an "infected place."
2. No hides, skins, horns, hoofs, or offal of animals shall be moved out of an "infected place," without the licence of some Officer of the Local Authority appointed to issue such licences certifying that such articles have not formed part of a diseased animal, and, if necessary, have been properly disinfected:
3. No carcase of, or undressed meat that has formed part of, any bull, bullock, cow, ox, heifer, or calf, shall be moved out of an "infected place," without the licence of some Officer of the Local Authority appointed to issue such licences certifying that such carcase is not that of a diseased animal, or that such meat has not formed part of a diseased animal:
4. No dung of animals, and no hay, straw, litter, or other articles forming the food of animals, or used for or about animals, shall be removed out of an infected place without the licence of some officer of the Local Authority appointed to issue such licences certifying that such articles have not been in contact with or used about a diseased animal:
5. A licence for the purpose of this regulation must be in writing, and shall not authorize the removal of any articles beyond the district of the Local Authority in which the infected place is situate without the licence of the Local Authority into whose district it is proposed to move such articles.

If any animal, dung of animals, hide, skin, horn, hoof, offal, meat, hay, straw, litter, or other articles, is or are moved in contravention of this regulation, the owner of such animal or articles, and also the person moving the same, or causing, directing, or permitting the same to be moved, shall respectively be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

All constables and police officers shall enforce the provisions of this regulation, to the utmost of their power, and may apprehend all persons committing any offence against this regulation, and may require all animals and articles being moved out of such place in contravention of this

regulation to be forthwith taken back within the limits of such place.

This regulation shall not apply to any animal or article carried by railway through an infected place.

#### *Markets and Fairs.*

28. No market, fair, auction, exhibition, or sale of cattle shall be held until the 1st day of June, 1866, except as hereinafter mentioned; that is to say,

First. Cattle belonging to the owner or occupier of premises that are not situate within the limits of an infected place, if the cattle are free from disease, and have been in the possession of the owner or occupier not less than twenty-eight days immediately previous to the sale, may be sold on such premises;

Secondly. Markets may be held, with the licence of the Privy Council, for the sale of cattle intended for immediate slaughter; Provided that no cattle shall be removed from such market until they have been marked in the manner in which cattle are ordinarily marked for slaughter according to the custom of such market, or, if there is no such custom, by clipping the hair off the end of the tail; and all cattle required to be marked by this regulation shall be slaughtered within four days from the date of the holding of such market (if sold) by or by the order of the purchaser, or (if not sold) by or by the order of the owner, and shall in no instance be taken, in the case of cattle brought to the Metropolitan Cattle Market, beyond the limits of the Metropolis, including the City of London and the Liberties thereof, and in the case of cattle brought to any other market, beyond such limits as may be described in the licence of the Privy Council allowing such market, and under such conditions with respect to their movement within such limits as may be imposed by such licence.

If any cattle are sold in contravention of this regulation, both the seller and the purchaser of such cattle shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

If any cattle required to be marked by this regulation are not so marked, the persons for the time being in charge of such cattle shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

If any cattle required to be slaughtered by this regulation are not so slaughtered, the purchaser or owner of such cattle or his agent (as the case may be) shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

If any cattle are removed in contravention of this regulation, the person removing such cattle, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the removal of such cattle, shall respectively be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

29. No sheep, lambs, goats, or swine shall be brought into or exposed for sale in any market licensed for the sale of cattle under the last preceding regulation, except for the purpose of immediate slaughter, and all such sheep, lambs, goats, and swine, when brought into or exposed for sale in any such market, shall be subject to the last preceding regulation, in the same manner as if they were cattle, except that they shall be marked in such manner as the market authority may direct, instead of in the manner prescribed by the said regulation.

#### *Foreign Cattle.*

30. Until the first of June one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six all cattle brought by sea

from any place out of the United Kingdom into any town or place in England shall be marked by clipping the hair off the end of the tail, and no such cattle shall be removed alive from such town or place except by sea.

"Town or place" in this regulation shall, according to circumstances, mean as follows:

1. The area of the Metropolis including the City of London and the Liberties thereof;
2. The area of any borough or such other limits as may be defined by the Privy Council in respect of such borough;
3. In the case of any other town or place, such area as may be defined by the Privy Council to constitute such town or place.

*Cattle brought by sea from any part of the United Kingdom into England.*

31. No cattle brought by sea from any place in the United Kingdom into any town or place in England shall be removed from such town or place alive, without a certificate from the Local Authority having jurisdiction in such town or place that such cattle have been examined by some Officer appointed for that purpose by such authority, and that such cattle are free from disease; but such certificate shall not exempt such cattle from any other regulation of this Order with respect to the movement of cattle or otherwise; provided, nevertheless, that, in the case of cattle landed in any place in England from Ireland, the certificate of the Local Authority, that such cattle are free from disease, shall be accepted, in the case of a fat-stock licence, by the person authorized to grant the same as sufficient for the purpose of granting such licence, and, in the case of a store-stock licence, such certificate shall be accepted by the Justice as equivalent to the declaration of the owner or his agent and to the certificate of the occupiers required by the form of the said store-stock licence.

"Town or place" shall in this regulation have the same meaning as in the preceding regulation.

*Special Regulations within the Metropolis.*

32. The following additional regulations shall be in force as respects the movement of cattle within the Metropolis, inclusive of the City of London and the Liberties thereof:

1. No cattle shall be removed from the Metropolis, inclusive as aforesaid; provided that where any person occupies a farm situate partly within and partly without the Metropolis, inclusive as aforesaid, or any other contiguous premises so situate, he may, with a licence from the Commissioner of Police of the Metropolis (which licence such Commissioner is hereby empowered from time to time to grant, and, if he think fit, to revoke), and for a time not exceeding seven days from the date of such licence, move from one part of such premises to another any animal not diseased which has been in his own possession for twenty-eight days immediately previous to the date of such licence, and has been marked in such manner as the said Commissioner of Police may direct.

If any cattle are removed from the Metropolis, inclusive as aforesaid, in contravention of this regulation, the owner of such cattle, and also the person in charge of the same, shall respectively be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

2. No cattle shall be moved along any highway, thoroughfare, or public place within

the Metropolis, inclusive as aforesaid, except for a distance not exceeding five hundred yards from part to part of the same farm or to water, without a licence from the said Commissioner of Police; and every such licence shall state the number and description of animals licensed to be removed, and the place of their destination, and shall be valid only for twenty-four hours from the date thereof; provided that this clause of this Order shall not apply to any animals intended for immediate slaughtering which are sent to or from the said Metropolitan Cattle Market.

If any cattle are moved along any highway, thoroughfare, or public place in contravention of this regulation, the owner of such cattle, and also the person in charge of the same, shall respectively be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

**GENERAL REGULATIONS.**

*Movement of Cattle.*

33. No cattle shall be moved on any highway between sunset and sunrise, except within the limits of the Metropolis, inclusive of the City of London and the Liberties thereof, or of any other city or town.

No cattle shall be moved by or upon any railway, canal, navigation, river, or highway, or by any vessel coastwise, without a licence, except for a distance not exceeding five hundred yards from one part of the same farm to the other.

Licences shall be of two descriptions—

1. A licence for cattle intended for immediate slaughter, hereinafter called a fat stock licence;
2. A licence for other cattle, hereinafter called a store stock licence.

A fat stock licence shall be in the form, and contain the particulars, and be signed in the manner appearing in the form marked A. in the second schedule annexed hereto, or as near thereto as circumstances admit.

A store stock licence shall be in the form, and contain the particulars, and be signed in the manner appearing in the form marked B. in the said second schedule, or as near thereto as circumstances admit.

No cattle shall be moved as aforesaid out of the district of the Local Authority in which they are, without a licence in one of the forms aforesaid, such form being applicable to the class of cattle moved; but where cattle are moved only within the district of a Local Authority, that Local Authority may make Regulations for granting licences, in such form as it thinks fit, for the movement of such cattle, so that the conditions of such licences be not more stringent than the conditions of the licences in the said second schedule.

If any cattle are moved in contravention of this regulation, the owner of such cattle, and the person directing or permitting the removal of the same, and the company or person conveying the same shall respectively be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

Cattle brought by land from Scotland into England may be moved in England with the same licences that in Scotland authorize their removal from the district of one Local Authority to another, in pursuance of any Order of the Privy Council in force for the time being.

34. No person shall drive or allow any cattle under his charge to be driven or to stray into any enclosed field, without the consent of the

owner or occupier thereof, and any person acting in contravention of this regulation shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

*Movement of Hides and Skins, &c.*

35. No hide, skin, horn, or hoof of animals shall be moved by highway, railway, canal, river, or other mode of conveyance unless effectually covered.

If any hides, skins, horns, or hoofs are moved in contravention of this regulation, the person sending the same, and the person moving the same, shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

36. No regulation of this Order, shall apply to the following hides, skins, horns, and hoofs (that is to say),

- (1.) Hides, skins, horns, or hoofs imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America:
- (2.) Hides, skins, horns, hoofs, or glue pieces that have been effectually limed for manufacturing purposes.

But the burden of proving that any hides, skins, horns, or hoofs are such as are authorized by this regulation to be removed shall lie upon the person charged with moving the same in contravention of this Order.

*Regulations as to Dogs.*

37. A Local Authority may make such orders as it thinks expedient for preventing the propagation of disease by means of dogs, and may order any stray dogs to be destroyed or otherwise disposed of as it thinks fit.

*Cleansing of Pens and Trucks.*

38. Every railway or other Company or person carrying animals for hire shall, on every occasion after any animal has been taken out of any pen, carriage, truck, or boat used by such Company or person, and before any other animal or article is placed therein, thoroughly cleanse and disinfect every such pen, carriage, truck, or boat in such manner as the Board of Trade may from time to time direct.

The expression "truck" shall include any horsebox or other vehicle used in the carrying of animals.

If any pen, carriage, truck, or boat is at any time used in contravention of this regulation, the Company or person by whom it is used shall, every time that such pen, truck or boat is used, be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds.

*Powers of Officers employed under this Order.*

39. Any inspector or other officer empowered to carry this Order into effect, may, if authorized so to do by any General or Special Order in writing of the Local Authority, enter any field, stable, cow shed, or other premises within his district, where he has reasonable grounds for supposing that cattle affected by disease are to be found, or have been, or have been buried, or otherwise disposed of, for the purpose of carrying into effect the provisions of this Order, or enter into the station or premises of any railway or other company or person carrying animals for hire, for the purpose of ascertaining whether the pens, carriages, trucks, boats, or other vehicles used by such company or person have been duly cleansed and disinfected; and if any person refuses admission to, or obstructs or impedes, or aids in obstructing or impeding any such inspector or other officer, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

40. It shall be lawful for any officer authorized by a Local Authority so to do, or for any con-

stable or police officer, to inspect any railway truck, cart, boat, or other vehicle by land or by water, in which animals, hay, manure, litter, straw, and other articles used for or about animals, are carried, and to examine the person in charge of the same, with a view to ascertain whether any animals or articles are being moved in contravention of this Order; and such officer may, if he has reasonable grounds for suspecting that such animals or articles are being moved in contravention of this Order, apprehend without warrant the person in charge of the same, and bring him before a Justice, who shall inquire into the case in a summary manner, and such Justice, if satisfied that there are good grounds for suspecting that such animals or articles were moved in contravention of this Order, may direct, by writing under his hand, such animals or articles to be detained, and the person in charge thereof to be brought before two Justices as soon as practicable, and such animals or articles may be detained and the person brought before the Justices accordingly.

Upon such person being brought before the two Justices they shall adjudicate on the case in a summary manner, and, if satisfied that the animals or articles were moved in contravention of this Order, may direct the same to be destroyed or otherwise disposed of, as they think most expedient for the prevention of the spreading of disease amongst animals.

The constable or other police officer detaining any animals in pursuance of this Regulation shall cause them to be supplied with requisite food and water during their detention; and any expenses incurred by such officer in respect of such animals may be recovered in a summary manner from the person in charge, or from the owner of the animals.

41. It shall be lawful for any constable or police officer, or for any officer authorized by a Local Authority so to do, to stop and detain any animal moved, or which he has reasonable grounds for suspecting is being moved in contravention of this Order, and to apprehend without warrant the person in charge of such animal, and bring him before a Justice, who shall inquire into the case in a summary manner; and such Justice, if satisfied that such animal was being moved in contravention of this Order, may direct, by writing under his hand, the animal so moved to be detained, and the person in charge thereof to be brought before two Justices as soon as practicable, and such animal may be detained and person brought before the Justices accordingly.

Upon such person being brought before the two Justices they shall adjudicate on the case in a summary manner, and, if satisfied that the animal was being moved in contravention of this Order, may direct the same to be slaughtered and buried, or to be otherwise disposed of, as they think most expedient for the prevention of the spreading of disease amongst animals.

42. Any constable, police, or other officer detaining any animal shall cause it to be supplied with requisite food and water during its detention; and any expenses incurred by such officer in respect of any animal may be recovered in a summary manner from the person in charge, or from the owner of the animal.

43. If any person having charge of any animal or thing being moved on a highway, railway, canal, navigation, or river, for the moving whereof a licence is requisite under this Order, being required by any constable, police officer, or officer authorized by a Local Authority, to produce the licence (if any) for the moving of that animal or thing, fails so to do, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

43. Every person guilty of an offence against this Order shall for each such offence incur a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds; and where any such offence is committed with respect to more than four animals, a penalty not exceeding five pounds for each animal may be imposed instead of the penalty of twenty pounds. And where any such offence is committed with reference to any dung, offal, hay, litter, straw, or other thing, a further penalty not exceeding ten pounds may be imposed for every half ton in weight of such dung or other thing after the first half ton.

44. Any Local Authority may appear before any Justices, or in any legal proceedings, by its clerk, or by any agent authorized by it in writing under the hands of two of its members, and any railway company or other body corporate may appear before any Justices or in any legal proceedings by their secretary, or by any member of their board of management, or by any agent authorized in writing under the hands of any two members of such board.

## PART III.

*Repeal of Orders.*

45. On and after the sixteenth of April one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six there shall be revoked, so far as respects England and Wales, the following Orders, or so much thereof as may be in force; that is to say,

of November 23rd, 1865,  
of December 16th, 1865,  
of January 20th, 1866,  
of February 6th, 1866,  
of February 23rd, 1866.

And all notices published by any Local Authority in pursuance of such Orders shall cease to have any effect, without prejudice nevertheless to the prosecution of any offence that may have been committed against the said Orders or Notices, or any of them, or to the recovery of any penalty in respect of such offence.

In the case of cattle landed in any place in England from Ireland the certificate of the local authority to the effect that the cattle are free from disease shall be accepted by the Justice as equivalent to the declaration of the owner or his agent and the certificate of the two occupiers.

(b) If the cattle are being moved on change of tenancy or on change of pasture, or from premises in one place to premises in another in the occupation of the same person, insert instead of the words [which I have sold] the words [which I desire to move from \_\_\_\_\_ to \_\_\_\_\_].

### CATTLE PLAGUE.

*County of Clackmannan, including the Burgh of Alloa.*

THE Local Authority has revoked all former orders and notices and has adopted *inter alia* the following, of which notice is hereby given :—

1. No bull, cow, ox, heifer, calf, sheep, goat, or swine, shall be brought from any place into the county of Clackmannan.

Except under a licence which would permit the removal of such animal, in the portions of the adjoining counties politically connected with Clackmannanshire, from or through which it may have to pass. The licence to be obtained in such adjoining county and to be endorsed by a Justice of the Peace for Clackmannanshire before the removal of the animal; and in the case of sheep, under a licence for their removal obtained in the county from which they are brought.

2. No raw or untanned skins or hides, or horns, or hoofs of any of the animals above mentioned, and no dung, fodder, or litter, or hay or straw used as litter, shall be brought into the county of Clackmannan.

Except in regard to hides, horns, or hoofs, with a certificate from the seller or owner or the superintendent of a slaughter-house, that said hides, horns, or hoofs are not from animals affected with cattle plague, and have not been in contact with the hides, horns, or hoofs of such animals, and in regard to dung, fodder, or litter, or hay or straw used as litter, with a certificate from a Justice of the Peace residing near the place from which the same are brought, that the said dung, fodder, or litter, or hay or straw used as litter, are from premises where cattle plague has not existed for thirty days.

Notice is hereby given, that every person contravening any of the above regulations is liable to be prosecuted for a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds sterling.

At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace, holden by adjournment at the Castle of Chester, in and for the county of Chester, on Saturday, the 24th day of March, 1866.

In pursuance of the Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated the 16th December, 1865, and the 23rd February, 1866. This Court doth hereby vary the notice as to the removal of cows and heifers for breeding purposes, given at the adjourned Sessions held on the 10th day of March instant, and doth by this notice declare :—That in order to allow for the breeding of stock, cows or heifers (if sound) may be moved with a licence on any turnpike-road, highway, or occupation road, or the sides thereof respectively, to and from any place where a bull is kept, such licence to be granted by a member of the Committee appointed pur-

suant to "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," for the district from which such cows or heifers are to be sent.

And this Court doth by this notice further declare that the owner of any cows or heifers who may purchase a bull may remove such bull along any turnpike-road, highway, or occupation road, or the sides thereof, to his farm or land on which such cows or heifers are kept, on obtaining previous to such removal a licence from a member of the Committee, under "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," for the district from which the bull is to be removed.

Peter Phelps, and others their associates Justices, it was ordered that so much of the Orders of the 16th December, 1865, and the 3rd day of January, 1866, as refers to the county of Haverfordwest, be revoked, so far as regards cattle originally brought into, or now in, Haverfordwest from the county of Pembroke, and the hides, skins, horns, hoofs, &c., of cattle, sheep, &c., originally brought in from the county of Pembroke, and slaughtered in Haverfordwest, but the revocation of the Orders is not to apply to cattle or hides brought by sea into the county of Haverfordwest.

### CATTLE PLAGUE.

*Salop Adjourned Sessions, 24th March, 1866.*

In pursuance of the Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and of the statutes in that case made and provided, the Justices of the Peace assembled at this General Quarter Sessions of the Peace, with a view to prevent the spreading of the disease designated as the "Cattle Plague," do hereby make the following order, namely :—

1. That the orders, declarations and notices, heretofore made by Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for this county, in the several Petty Sessional Divisions of the said county, and also in General Quarter Sessions of the same county, or any adjournment thereof, on the subject of the cattle plague, except with reference to the appointment of Inspectors, are hereby respectively revoked and annulled.

2. That in the construction of this Order, the word cattle shall mean and include any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf.—And the word animal shall mean and include any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine.

3. That no animal shall be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place within the said county of Salop, nor removed from place to place within the said county, except as allowed by the provisions of this Order.

4. That no animal shall be brought, removed, or taken to any market or fair, or to any place

whatever within the county of Salop, for the purposes of exhibition or public sale.

5. That no animal shall be moved or taken from any place to any other place in the said county, under any circumstances, between the hours of 7 o'clock in the evening and 6 o'clock in the morning.

6. That any cattle may be moved from any place in any Petty Sessional Division (other than and except an infected district,) to any other place in the same Division: and with an order of two Justices of the district into which such cattle are proposed to be removed, from lands in one Petty Sessional Division to lands in another Petty Sessional Division, provided such lands are in the occupation, and such cattle are in the possession of the same person; provided also, that there shall not have been any case of cattle plague during thirty days immediately preceding, within two miles of the premises from or to which such cattle are proposed to be removed; and provided they do not pass through an infected district.

7. That in case of a change of tenancy of lands in an uninfected district, the off-going tenant thereof may move his cattle in any part of the said county, other than and except an infected district. And that upon any sale taking place in any uninfected district, upon any such change of tenancy, or under any distress or execution, the purchaser of any cattle may move the same in any part of the said county, except into, in, or through an infected district; a licence of two Justices of the Peace having been granted authorising the removal of cattle from such sale, such licence being granted only upon proof that there has not been any case of cattle plague within two miles of the place of sale, during a period of thirty days next preceding.

8. That in case of change of tenancy, an incoming tenant may, with the licence of a Justice, bring cattle from any premises, then or then late in his occupation, in the counties of Radnor or Montgomery, or the franchise of Wenlock, into lands in his occupation in an uninfected district, of the county of Salop, during fourteen days from the 25th of March instant, such cattle having been in the possession of the party removing for thirty days immediately preceding, provided that they do not pass through an infected district.

9. That any sheep, lamb, goat, or swine may be brought into the said county of Salop, from any place in the counties of Montgomery or Radnor, or franchise of Wenlock, during such time as such county of Montgomery or Radnor, or franchise of Wenlock, as the case may be, shall be free from any cattle plague or sheep small pox, and provided that they do not pass through an infected district.

10. That any sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, may be moved within the said county of Salop, in the uninfected districts.

11. That the several Petty Sessional Divisions of Drayton, Wem, and Whitchurch, and the parishes of Ellesmere, Hordley, Loppington, Middle, Petton, and Welshampton, in the Division of Pimhill, in the said county, are hereby declared to be at the present time infected districts, and the same and each of them shall continue to be so considered until such time as the Inspector of such district shall report and declare in writing that there has not been any case of cattle plague in such district during a period of thirty days, then immediately preceding; and that upon such report and declaration being filed with the Clerk of the Peace, such district shall be considered as uninfected.

12. That no cattle shall be moved from any place within the Newport or Condover Petty Sessional Divisions, to any other place in the said Divisions, except from and to lands and premises in the same occupation, save and except with a licence, to be granted by a Justice, acting for such Division, and that no cattle shall be moved nor shall any licence be granted for any removal, if there has been within a period of thirty days immediately preceding any case of cattle plague, within two miles of the place from whence such cattle are proposed to be removed.

13. In order to allow for the breeding of stock within infected districts, any bull, cow, or heifer, if sound, may, between 6 a.m. and 7 p.m. be moved with a breeding licence on any public highway, for any distance not exceeding four miles, provided there has not been any case of cattle plague within thirty days, and within two miles from the farm, house or homestead, or yard, or building, from or to which such cattle are to be removed, and provided that all places that have been affected with cattle disease, further back than the period of thirty days, have been effectually disinfected, prior to any such moving of cattle.

14. That in case of any cattle plague appearing in any uninfected district, all lands and premises within a distance of two miles shall be thereupon deemed and considered as an infected district, and all the rules and regulations applicable to an infected district shall apply to the said lands and premises.

15. That in infected districts where separate buildings, yards, or lands are in the occupation of the same person, any animal may for the purpose of being taken from any of those buildings, yards, or lands, be at any time moved in such infected district on any public highway for any distance not exceeding 500 yards, and with a licence of a Justice for a distance not exceeding two miles. Provided also that in no case shall any such removal take place if there has been any case of cattle plague within thirty days immediately preceding, and within two miles from the farm, house, or homestead, yard, or building, from or to which such cattle are to be removed, Provided also that all places where any case of cattle plague shall have arisen at a period before such removal of upwards of thirty days must have been effectually disinfected prior to any such removal of cattle.

16. That with the licence of a Justice, any calf may be moved in an infected district in a cart, Provided that the lands or premises from or to which it is moved have not been infected with the cattle plague for a period of thirty days, then last past.

17. That any sheep, lamb, goat, or swine may be moved from any part of the said county, being an uninfected district, to lands or premises in the occupation of the owner of such animal in an infected district, but no such animal shall be removed from any one place in an infected district to any other place in an infected district, nor from or out of any infected district into any other part of the said county.

18. That no raw or untanned hides, skins, horns, or hoofs of any cattle (except such as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America,) shall be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place within the said county of Salop, nor removed from place to place within the said county, except as allowed by the provisions of this order.

19. That any raw or untanned hides, skins, horns, or hoofs of any cattle may be moved

from any place in any Petty Sessional Division, not being an infected district, to any other place in the same Division, and with a licence of a Justice, to any other place in the said county, Provided there shall not have been within a period of thirty days immediately preceding any case of cattle plague within two miles of the premises from which such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs, are proposed to be removed.

20. That no dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter likely to propagate infection, shall be brought into any place within the said county of Salop, or removed in the said county from any one place to any other place, except for the purpose of being immediately buried or destroyed.

Any person guilty of any offence against any of the foregoing regulations will be liable to a penalty not exceeding £20.

Forms of licences for moving cattle may be obtained on application to the Clerk of the Peace, Shirehall, Shrewsbury, or the Clerk to the Justices of the Division.

### CATTLE PLAGUE.

*Gloucestershire, to Wit.*

At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Sovereign Lady the Queen, holden at the Shire hall, in Gloucester, for the county aforesaid, on Tuesday, the 20th day of March, in the twenty-ninth year of the reign of our Sovereign Lady Victoria, by the grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, A.D. 1866—in pursuance of an Act of Parliament made and passed in the fifth year of the reign of his late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled “An Act for preventing the interference of the Spring Assizes with the April Quarter Sessions,”—before John Curtis Hayward, Esq., James Francillon, Esq. (Chairman), and others their fellows, Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace of the said county, then and there assembled.

By virtue of the power in that respect on them conferred by Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated respectively the 23rd day of November, 1865, the 16th day of December, 1865, the 20th day of January, 1866, and the 23rd day of February, 1866, made in pursuance of several Acts of Parliament therein recited, with a view to prevent the spreading of a contagious or infectious disorder called “The Cattle Plague,” the said Justices, as the Local Authority for the said county, do hereby revoke all orders and notices heretofore made and published by them, as the said Local Authority for the said county, or by the Justices in Petty Sessions assembled, provided that such revocation shall not affect any appointment made, or any notice given, or any act done, or any penalty recoverable, under the said orders or notices, or any of them, and considering it expedient for the prevention of the cattle plague, do hereby order, resolve, and declare, in lieu thereof, as follows:—

*As to Markets and Fairs.*

That no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine be brought or sent to any fair or market to be holden within the said county, or to any place whatsoever within the said county, for the purpose of exhibition or

sale, from the 24th day of March instant, the date of the publication of this Order, so long as the same shall remain in force.

*As to the Importation of Animals, Hides, Hay, Straw, &c., into the said County.*

That no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, nor any raw or untanned hide or skin, nor any horns or hoofs of any such animals (except such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs, as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America), nor the offal of such animals, nor any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter likely to propagate infection, be brought from any other part of Great Britain into the said county, or within the jurisdiction of the said Justices, as the Local Authority aforesaid.

Provided always that it shall be lawful for any person to remove any animals bona fide his own property, and out at keep beyond the borders of the said county, in any locality free from the cattle plague, to his own farm or premises, within the jurisdiction of the said Local Authority, such person having first obtained a certificate granted at a meeting of the Local Committee appointed by the said Local Authority, under the provisions of the “Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866,” for the district in which such farm or premises are or is situate, having first obtained a proper certificate, according to the regulations of the Local Authority of the district from which they come, and having also the consent in writing of the Local Committee of each district of this county through which the animals are to pass.

Provided that such animals shall not pass through the city of Bristol, or within five miles of the boundaries thereof.

*As to the Removal of Animals, Hides, Horns, Hoofs, &c., within the said County.*

That no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, nor any raw or untanned hide or skin, nor any horns or hoofs of such cattle be removed from one place to another along any of the highways of the said county, except under the following conditions:—

#### 1. *As to Fat Animals.*

That fat animals, sold for slaughtering, be branded with a X on the hind quarters, and be killed within three days of the time of removal, such removal to take place only upon the certificate of a Justice of the Peace acting for the Petty Sessional Division from which such animals come, stating the name and residence of the seller, and the fact that the Justice has been satisfied by the evidence of one or more witnesses of the healthiness of such animals, that they have been in the possession of the seller for thirty days at least, and that no case of cattle plague has occurred within one month within three miles of the place from which such animals come. Such certificate to remain in force for three days only.

#### 2. *As to Store Animals.*

That store animals may be removed upon the certificate of a Justice of the Peace acting for the Petty Sessional Division from which such animals are removed, stating the name and residence of the owner, and the fact that the Justice has been satisfied, upon the evidence of one or more witnesses, that such animals are healthy, that they have been in the owner's possession for at least thirty days previously, and the destination of such animals, with the reasons for their removal, and that no case of cattle plague has

occurred within one month within five miles of the place from which such animals are to be removed—such certificate to be in force for five days only.

All such orders or certificates for the removal of fat or store animals to be made in duplicate, one part thereof to be forthwith transmitted by the Justice granting the same to the Clerk of the Peace, the other to be delivered to the party removing the animals as his authority, and to be transmitted by him to the officer in charge of the nearest police station within three days of the expiration thereof. Any certificate to be revocable if improperly obtained, or upon other reasonable ground.

Provided always that it shall not be necessary in the case of a licence granted by a Justice for the removal of any cow, heifer, or sow to a short distance for breeding purposes, that the same be made out in duplicate, or that a copy be returned to the Clerk of the Peace.

And provided also, that an occupier be allowed to remove animals from one part of land in his occupation to any other part thereof along any highway for a distance not exceeding one mile, without any such certificate, order, or licence, as is hereby before required in the case of removal of animals. No animals under any circumstances to be moved along any highway except between the hours of sunrise and sunset. No hide or skin, horn, or hoof of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, shall be removed except within forty-eight hours of the time of slaughter, and then only to be taken to a tan-yard.

And it is further ordered that no cattle, sheep, lambs, goats, or swine, or any raw or untanned hides or skins, or any horns, or hoofs, or offal of any animal, or any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, shall be removed from any farm, nor along any highway in any parish or place within the jurisdiction of the said Justices as the said Local Authority after an Inspector shall have certified that the cattle plague exists, or has existed, in such parish or place within the space of thirty days.

That fat animals be permitted to be removed from the parishes of Twyning and Fotherampton, in this county, through the borough of Tewkesbury, and into this county again, under a proper certificate, and also with the licence of the Mayor of the said borough.

And lastly it is ordered that, in consequence of the intermixture of the counties of Gloucester and Worcester, cattle, sheep, and swine be permitted to pass from the said parish of Twyning into the parish of Bredon, in the county of Worcester, and thence to the parish of Kemerton, in the county of Gloucester, and also across the parish of Overbury, in the county of Worcester, to the parish of Beckford, in the county of Gloucester, and vice versa, any order hereinbefore contained to the contrary notwithstanding, a proper certificate for such removal and the sanction of one or more of the Justices of Worcestershire as is or shall be required for the removal of animals by the local authority of the said county of Worcester being first had and obtained.

And notice is hereby given, that from and after the publication of this order in a newspaper circulating within the county of Gloucester (the jurisdiction of the said Local Authority), any person offending herein will for every offence forfeit a penalty not exceeding £20.

## CATTLE PLAGUE.

*Borough of Dover, in the County of Kent.*

At a Special Meeting of the Town Council of the borough of Dover, the local authority for the district of the said borough to execute the provisions of "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," held at the Court Hall, on Tuesday, the 27th day of March, 1866, by virtue of the Orders in Council of the 16th day of December, 1865, and the 23rd day of February, 1866, it was ordered that the order and the notice following thereon issued by William Rigden Mummery, Esquire, Mayor of the said borough, and dated the 22nd day of January, 1866, be revoked from and after the 28th day of March instant.

And in lieu thereof it was declared to be expedient that, from the said 28th day of March instant, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, shall be brought or removed from any place without the said borough to any place within the said borough, nor be on, pass over, along, or across any highway or public road within the borough, except upon the following conditions, videlicet:—

1. That the Inspector appointed for the district of the said borough shall have previously examined such cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox or calf, and the same shall have been marked by him, or shall have previously endorsed the licence which shall have been given by any authorized person or persons in the county of Kent for such removal.

2. That such cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf shall be slaughtered within 48 hours after the same shall have been brought or removed to within the said borough, or have been on, passed over, along, or across such highway or public road as aforesaid.

Provided, nevertheless, that the second condition shall not apply to milch cows, *bona fide* purchased for supplying milk within the borough.

## NOTES.

By "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," section 17, and the Order in Council of the 24th instant, it is ordered that no cattle shall be moved on any railway before the 16th day of April, 1866.

By another Order in Council of the 24th instant, the importation of cattle (including bulls, cows, oxen, heifers, calves, and sheep) coming from, or having been in contact with cattle coming from the territories belonging to the King of the Netherlands is prohibited.

## CATTLE PLAGUE.

*Edinburgh.*

NOTICE is hereby given, that the Committee appointed by the Magistrates and Town Council of Edinburgh, being the local authority, by virtue of "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," at a meeting held on the date hereof, in terms of the powers conferred upon them by the Order of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated the 23rd day of November, 1865, declared that it is expedient, with a view to prevent the spreading of the cattle plague, that, from this date until this notice shall be altered or revoked, no sheep shall be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place within the city of Edinburgh, except under

the condition that they be forthwith exhibited and sold, and thereafter slaughtered within the said city.

Every person offending against this notice is, for every such offence, liable in a penalty not exceeding £20.

And notice is hereby further given, that any person offending against the said Orders in Council, or either of them, by acting contrary to this notice, after the publication hereof, will be subject, for every offence, to forfeit such a sum, not exceeding twenty pounds, as the Justices before whom he or she shall be convicted shall think fit to impose.

#### *Lincolnshire, Holland, to wit.*

At an adjourned General Quarter Sessions of the Peace, held at Boston, in and for the parts of Holland, in the county of Lincoln, on Friday, the

23rd day of March, 1866, before the Reverend John Wilson, Clerk. Chairman, the Reverend John Tunnard, Clerk, Major Charles Thomas John Moore, Thomas Garfit, Esquire.

The Court having under its consideration the Act of Parliament 11th and 12th Victoria, chapter 107, and the several Orders of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council concerning the prevailing disorder known as the "Cattle Plague," do order and declare

That all orders previously made by any Local Authority within the Division of Holland, shall be and they are hereby revoked, except as to any penalties that have been incurred, or any appointment, orders, and regulations made under the "Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866."

And do hereby order and declare

#### *Beast in Markets and Fairs.*

That no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, goat, or swine, shall be sent, brought to, or exhibited or sold in, any market or fair within the Division of Holland.

#### *Private Sales.*

But all such aforesaid animals which have been in the owner's possession for at least fourteen days, may be exhibited and sold on the owner's land or premises, and may be removed therefrom within twenty-four hours after their sale under Certificate B and Licence C.

#### *Places beyond Holland.*

That no animal as aforesaid (excepting fat cattle moved under Certificate D for immediate slaughter by butchers) shall be brought into the Division of Holland from any other place whatever, unless they are brought from land or premises bonâ fide in the occupation of the same person on whose land or premises in the Division of Holland they are to be located, and also accompanied with the Certificate B and Licence C.

#### *Movement of Cattle.*

That no animal as aforesaid shall be moved from place to place within the Division of Holland, without the Certificate B and Licence C.

#### *Butchers.*

A butcher purchasing any such aforesaid animal for immediate slaughter on his own premises, must obtain the Certificate D previous to the removal of the animal.

#### *Breeding Purposes.*

Provided also that nothing contained in the foregoing orders, or any, or either of them, shall render it unlawful to take any cow or sow in a healthy state to or from any bull or boar, within a distance of five miles; but the owner of the cow or sow shall be bound to produce (within forty-eight hours), if demanded by the Police, a certificate, signed by the owner of the bull or boar, that the cow or sow was so bonâ fide taken, and that his permission to bring the cow or sow to the bull or boar had been previously obtained.

#### *Sheep in Holland.*

Sheep and lambs that have been located within the Division of Holland for at least thirty days, may be moved by their owner from place to place in his own occupation without either certificate or licence.

#### *In the County of Lincoln.*

Sheep and lambs that have not been in contact with any infected animal, and have been located

within the county of Lincoln for at least thirty days, may be brought with Certificate A and exhibited and sold in any market or other place within the Division of Holland, and removed therefrom to the purchaser's or vendor's premises with the same certificate, or if sold in separate lots, each lot to be accompanied with a copy of the original certificate, countersigned by a Magistrate.

*From other Places.*

Sheep and lambs may be brought with Certificate A from any place beyond the county of Lincoln direct to the land of any person residing in the Division of Holland, but they shall not be exhibited or sold in any market or fair, or public place, or placed in contact with any other animal or animals, till they have been located at least thirty days within the said Division.

*Agistment.*

The land on which animals are bonâ fide agisted shall be considered as in the occupation of the person whose animals are thereon.

*Hides, Skins, Horns, Hoofs, Offal, Dung, Hay, Straw, Fodder, or Litter.*

No raw or untanned hides or skins, nor the horns or hoofs of any aforesaid animal, not previously disinfected, nor any offal of such animal, nor any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, or from any infected locality, shall be brought from any other part of Great Britain into the Division of Holland.

*If the Property of Occupiers.*

But the owner of such articles or things last aforesaid may move them, if in an uninfected state, with Certificate B and Licence C from land or premises in his own actual occupation, situated either within or without the Division of Holland, to other land or premises actually occupied by him within the said Division.

*Fellmongers.*

The hides of any healthy animal, when certified by an Inspector to be in an uninfected state, may be moved direct to the premises of the fellmonger within forty-eight hours of the slaughter of such healthy animal.

*Hay and Straw.*

Persons purchasing hay, straw, and other articles and things aforesaid from uninfected premises, for their own bonâ fide use, may remove the same to their own premises direct, within a distance of ten miles, with Certificate B and Licence C.

*Change of Tenancy.*

On a bonâ fide change of tenancy, or upon a bonâ fide sale in consequence of a change in tenancy, any animal or thing aforesaid may be moved with a licence of a Justice of the Peace in the form E (hereto annexed) from land or premises which have been free from the cattle plague or other infectious disorder for fourteen days previous to such removal.

*Time of Removal.*

No removal of animals or things as aforesaid shall be lawful between the hours of eight in the evening and five in the morning.

*Penalty.*

All certificates and licences must be shown to the Police or other persons requiring to see them,

and any person found removing any animal or thing as aforesaid, or otherwise contravening any of these orders, shall be liable to a penalty of £20—half the penalty to go to the informer.

Whereas the Justices of the Peace for the said county of Lancaster, assembled at the General Quarter Session of the Peace, held by adjournment at Kirkdale aforesaid, in and for the said county, on the 29th day of January last, being the Local Authority in that behalf, did amongst other things give notice, order, and declare that from and after the 1st day of February then next, and until the 1st day of March then next, no person should (except as therein was excepted and provided) bring or send the offal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, or lamb, or any dung or litter, likely to propagate infection, from any part of Great Britain, beyond the jurisdiction of the said Justices in the Hundred of West Derby, in the said county, into any place within the said jurisdiction.

And whereas, under and by virtue of an Order of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, bearing date the 23rd day of February last, the said order, declaration, and notice of the 29th January last was continued, and the same now remains in full force.

And whereas it appears to the Justices now here assembled to be expedient that the said order, declaration, and notice of the 29th of January last should be altered and varied so far as to permit the removal of offal and dung, or litter, from the borough of Liverpool, into the jurisdiction of the said Justices in the said Hundred of West Derby upon certain conditions. Now therefore the said Justices do hereby give notice, order, and declare:—

1. That notwithstanding any provision to the contrary contained in the said order, declaration, and notice of the 29th of January last, it shall be lawful from and after the date of this order, for any person or persons to bring or send any offal of any such animal as aforesaid, or any dung or litter from the said borough of Liverpool, into the jurisdiction of the said Justices in the said Hundred of West Derby, upon condition that each quantity of offal, or cartload or other quantity of dung or litter removed at any one time,



be accompanied by a certificate from some Inspector or other officer duly appointed for the purpose by the Health Committee of the said borough, that such offal or dung, or litter has come from or been in contact with healthy and unsuspected animals, or has been properly disinfected. Provided however that no such certificate as aforesaid shall be required for the removal of horse manure.

And whereas divers parts of the said Hundred of West Derby are now affected with the cattle plague, and the removal of dung or litter from place to place therein is likely to propagate infection. Now, therefore, the said Justices do hereby further give notice, declare, and order—

2. That from and after the date of this order, and until the same is altered or revoked by any other order of this Court, or of the Privy Council, or Act of Parliament, it shall not be lawful for any person or persons to remove, or cause to be removed, any dung or litter from any place within the same jurisdiction to any other place within the said jurisdiction, unless each cartload or other quantity of dung or litter so removed be accompanied by a certificate of some Cattle Inspector or "competent person" (but the certificate of any such competent person as aforesaid, shall be in all cases countersigned by a Justice of the Peace) that such dung or litter is not likely to propagate infection; provided always, that this prohibition shall not apply to the removal of any dung or litter from one part of any farm to another part of the same farm.

3. That during the period aforesaid, it shall not be lawful for any person or persons to remove or cause to be removed, any dung or litter from any farm or premises which has or have been affected with the cattle plague, unless and until such dung or litter has been certified by some Cattle Inspector to have been turned over and properly disinfected in his presence, and to his satisfaction.

4. And the said Justices do hereby confirm the said order, declaration, and notice of the 29th of January last, in every respect in which it is not altered or varied by this order, or by the order of Quarter Sessions of the 8th of February last.

5. Every person offending against these orders, declarations, and notices, or any of them, will be liable for each offence to a penalty not exceeding £20.

That it shall be lawful to bring bulls, cows, sheep, lambs, goats, or swine, one or more, into the county of Berwick, from any other part of Great Britain, provided that, previous to bringing any of the said animals into the said county, the owner thereof, or some person on his behalf, duly authorised by him, and competent to do so, shall make, before the local authority of the county of Berwick, at a meeting assembled, such a declaration, or produce such evidence, as shall satisfy the said local authority that the said animals have not been on any farm or in any place where cattle plague exists or has existed within the preceding three months, and that the said animals may be brought into the county of Berwick without risk of bringing contagion with them, and such owner or other person shall apply for, and obtain from, the said local authority, if it see fit to grant the same, a licence in duplicate, authorising him to bring the said animals, one or more, into the said county.

3rd. That nothing herein contained shall authorise or permit the removal of any heifer, bullock, ox, or calf, from any other part of Great Britain into the county of Berwick.

Every person offending against the above orders, shall for every such offence forfeit a sum not exceeding £20.

Nevertheless, it is hereby declared that notwithstanding this notice, any person occupying lands within the jurisdiction of the said Local Authority, may remove to such lands any sheep or lambs of which he is the owner from any place beyond the said jurisdiction, provided he obtains, within three days prior to such removal, a licence signed by a member of the Local Authority, or of the District Committee (not having any interest in the animals to be removed, and not being the owner or occupant either of the lands from which removal is to be made, or of the lands to which removal is to be made), to be granted upon production of a statement (in the form prescribed as relative hereto) of the place from which such sheep or lambs are to be removed, of the period for which such sheep or lambs have been at the place aforesaid, and of the route by which they are to be moved, together with a certificate (also in the form prescribed as relative hereto) by an Inspector certifying that such sheep or lambs are free from disease; that the county from which such sheep or lambs are to be moved has been, for 30 days immediately preceding, free from cattle plague; and that the route by which such sheep or lambs are to be moved does not pass through any county or place which the Inspector has reason to believe is infected with cattle plague: these documents to be made in duplicate, of which one copy shall be transmitted to the Chief Constable, County Rooms, Edinburgh, at least 24 hours before the sheep or lambs are moved into the county of Edinburgh, and the other copy shall be retained by the person in charge of the removal: provided further, that no sheep or lambs shall be so moved which are not at the time of removal free from disease, or which have not been for 30 days immediately preceding removal in a county free from cattle plague, or which in the course of removal to the county of Edinburgh, pass through any county or place infected with cattle plague.

*As regards removal from within the County.*

2. That until this notice is altered or revoked no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, and no raw or untanned hides or skins, and no horns or hoofs of any such animals (except such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America), and no

offal or dung of any such animals, and no litter, or straw or hay which has been used for litter, of such animals shall be moved from place to place within the jurisdiction of the said Local Authority, except under the following conditions, viz. :—

Notwithstanding this notice, any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, and any raw or untanned hides or skins, and any horns or hoofs, offal, or dung of any such animals, and any litter or straw or hay that has been used for litter, of such animals may be moved from place to place within the jurisdiction of the said Local Authority or to the confines of the said jurisdiction: provided that the owner or occupant of the farm or premises from which the removal is to take place shall, within three days prior to removal, make a declaration (in the form prescribed as relative hereto) in presence of and to be countersigned by a member of the Local Authority or of the District Committee (the person so countersigning not having any interest in the animal or article to be removed, and not being the owner or occupant either of the farm or premises from which the removal is to be made, or of the farm or premises to which the removal is to be made), to the effect that no cattle plague has existed during the two months immediately preceding the date of said declaration on the farm or premises from which the removal is to take place: provided further that the said declaration shall be made in duplicate, of which one copy shall be delivered at the nearest county police station at least twenty-four hours previous to any such removal, and the other copy shall be retained by the person in charge of the removal: and provided further that no animal (alive or dead), and no article above enumerated, shall be so removed by railway, nor unless it shall have been at the place from which it is to be removed for at least 30 days previous to removal: and provided further that no animal or article so removed (except in the case of a cow taken to the bull) shall be removed again until the expiry of 30 days after the date of the first removal.

*As regards removal for Exhibition or Sale.*

3. That until this notice is altered or revoked no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, and no sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, shall be removed from any place within the jurisdiction of the said Local Authority to any other place within the said jurisdiction for the purpose of being exhibited or sold within the said jurisdiction.

All previous notices issued by the said Justices of the Peace, and by the said Local Authority, are hereby cancelled, except so far as they are in conformity with the alterations above resolved on.

CATTLE PLAGUE.—ISLE OF MAN.

WHEREAS by an Act passed by the Legislature of the Isle of Man, intituled "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1865," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of any two Members of the Council, to make such orders and regulations, and to take such measures as may appear to be necessary for the purpose of preventing the introduction of any infectious or contagious disease amongst animals into the said Isle:

Now, therefore, the Lieutenant-Governor, by and with the advice and consent of two Members of the Council, hath, by virtue and in exercise of the powers given by the said Act, ordered as follows:—

I. That the Proclamation bearing date the 12th February, 1866, so far as the same prohibits the importation of manure, shall be, and the same is hereby varied.

II. That from the date of this order, no manure, and from the 26th day of March, 1866, no guano,

shall be imported into this Isle, or into any of the ports thereof, until affidavits and certificates to the following effect have been handed to the Collector of Customs at the port of entry:—

1. That no carcase, blood, or any animal matter (except bones entirely free from all flesh) has been used in the preparation or manufacture of the manure.

2. That all such bones have been imported into Great Britain from India, South America, or Australia.

3. That all the bones used in the manufacture of the manure have been subjected to some process sufficient to destroy any infection which might otherwise be conveyed by such bones.

4. That the manure has not been in any railway truck, nor in any manner conveyed by railway.

5. That the manure has been shipped in new or disinfected bags, directly from the works or premises where such manure has been prepared or manufactured, and that neither such bags nor manure have been in contact with anything whatever likely to propagate cattle plague or any infectious disease.

6. A certificate from some eminent chemist that the manure does not contain any infectious matter, and may be safely conveyed from place to place, and freely used without conveying or spreading cattle plague or any infectious disease.

And with respect to guano, the following affidavits will be required:—

1. That the guano does not contain any animal matter foreign to guano, or anything whatever likely to propagate cattle plague or any infectious disease.

2. That the guano has not been in any railway truck, nor in any manner conveyed by railway.

3. That it has been shipped in new or disinfected bags, directly from the place where it has been stored, and that neither such bags nor guano have been in contact with anything whatever likely to propagate cattle plague or any infectious disease.
