

THE following Notices have been received by the Clerk of the Council from the Local Authorities appointed under the Orders of the Lords of the Council relating to the "Cattle Plague," and are published in the London Gazette in conformity with the requirements of their Lordships' Orders :—

CATTLE PLAGUE.

Salop adjourned Sessions, 31st March, 1866.

It was resolved,—

That in lieu and instead of rules numbered 8 and 13, as framed and adopted on the 24th instant, the following amended rules be approved and adopted, namely :—

8. That in case of change of tenancy, an incoming tenant may, with the licence of a Justice, bring animals from any premises then or then late in his occupation, in the counties of Radnor or Montgomery, or in the franchise of Wenlock, or in either of the boroughs of Bridgnorth, Ludlow, Oswestry, or Shrewsbury, into lands in his occupation in an uninfected district, of the county of Salop, during fourteen days from the 25th March instant, such animals having been in the possession of the party removing for thirty days immediately preceding, provided that they do not pass through an infected district.

13. In order to allow for the breeding of stock within infected districts, any animal if sound, may between 6 a.m. and 7 p.m. be moved with a breeding licence on any public highway, for any distance not exceeding four miles, provided there has not been any case of cattle plague within thirty days and within two miles of the farm, house, or homestead, or yard, or building, from or to which such animal is to be removed; and provided that all such places which have been affected with cattle disease, further back than the period of thirty days, shall have been effectually disinfected, prior to any such moving.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

County of Renfrew.

NOTICE is hereby given, by the County Board, being the local authority under "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," for the county of Renfrew, that the existing resolutions and Orders of the Board are continued, and remain in full force within the said county, subject to the modification contained in the following resolution, adopted by the board at its meeting held on 31st March, 1866, viz. :—

That from and after the date of the publication of this notice, it shall not be unlawful to remove any animal (meaning thereby any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine), from any place within the county of Renfrew to any other place therein, provided that the animal is free of disease, and that the cattle plague does not exist, and has not existed at the farm or place from which the animal is to be removed, or within one mile thereof, for at least thirty days preceding the date of removal; and, where the disease has existed, that the place has been disinfected for said period; and further, that the animal when removed shall be accompanied by a declaration signed by the owner, and a certificate signed by two members of the District Committee, to that effect; which declaration and certificate the owner shall be bound

immediately to deliver to the Cattle Constable of the district; and provided also, that the animal shall be removed within forty-eight hours after the date of the certificate; but nothing herein contained shall authorise the bringing of any animal as aforesaid, excepting sheep, into the county of Renfrew from any burgh therein, or from any other county or place.

Notice is hereby further given, that any person contravening the above resolution, shall thereby act unlawfully, and shall for every such offence forfeit a sum not exceeding twenty pounds sterling.
