Falmouth, Jan. 27.

N Thur day last came in here the New Martia, and the Canaries Merchant from the Canaries, and the Hope of Yarmouth from Cad1? ; the 25th they put out again to fea, in company with feveral other thips, fome of them bound for our own Ports, others for France. Yesterday came in here the Conftant Warwick from Plymouth bound for the Irifh Coafts Several thips which came lately from Scilly, intending for France, are put in here, with one veffel from Virginialaden with Tobacco.

Plymouth Jan. 28. Here is lately arrived one thip of 300 Tuns from the *Ganarics*, bound for *London*, and one from *Malaza*. This day put in here a French man of War of 40 Guns, commanded by Captain de la Roche, who with a Squadron of 14 fail, belides two Fite-ships, put to sea for the Guard of the French Coafts, and to fecure their Trade in the Channel, against the Spaniards, but was separated from the reft of his company by ftorm, of whom he expects an account.

Venice, #an. 20. Our late reports from Candia have been very uncertain, nor has the arrival of Seignior Labia in the Europa brought us any Letters, those being daily expefted by a Tartan, to whom they were committed, but is as yet kept out at fea ; the perfons here arrived in the Europa, inform us only that at their departure from Candia, which was on Christmas-Eve, there was little or no probability that the Turks which were left before the Town had any intentions of quitting their Polts, but that they were daily relieved from the reft of the Army, and encouraged, though with little success to continue their Mines, which they frequently sprang, and as often attempted to assault, but were always bearen off with lo's, and had not made any advance lince the retirement of the grois of their Aimy; that in revenge of their attaques upon the Town, the Belieged made their returns by feveral brisk fallies, whereby the Turks had loft fome number of men. They fay further, that upon their way homewards, they had received advice, that on St. Stephens day there happened a great skirmish between them, the belieged fallying out in white Arms, and killing a very confiderable number of the Enemy; and that the Plague rages ftill with much violence in the Turks Army, infomuch, that a first command is given out to all the Garri-Ion in Candia, that no perfon the 1 prefume upon any fally or other occasion to take any booty of Cloaths, or other Goods from the Enemy, or to meddle with the bodies of the flain Furks.

We are also informed that the Grand Visier is daily expetting recruits, and that at Metelino, Tenedo, and Scio, about 600. Janilaries were ready at each place to embark themselves fr his Service ; but that our thips plying upon those Seas, discourage them from adventuring out; that fe-veral of the Bnemies Saichs were lately taken, well laden with Ammunitions and Provisions, intending for Ganea: that our Fleet was divided into feveral Squadrons, attending in all places the motion of the Enemies thips, and particu-larly shole from Barbary, which as yet keep close in the Habour, whither they were retired.

these proportions, for greater or lester quantities, either in Gross or by Retail; these Rates and Prizes to be only observed in all His Majesties Ports and other places within this Realm where Wines are landed, and within ten miles of those ports and places; and in those places where Wines by Land-carriage shall be conveyed more then 10 miles from the next Port, the feveral forts of Wines aforefield, shall and may be fold according to the Rates aforefield, with an allowance not exceeding Four pounds the Tunn, and One penny the Quart for the Carriage thereof upon Land every 30miles, and according to that proportion, and not at greater Rates, under such pains and penalties, as by the Proclamation it felf will more fully appear.
