

cluded and entered into Articles with several Princes and States, for furnishing Men this next Campaign, upon these Terms, That 17 Rixdollers shall be paid for each Foot Soldier, one half by advance, and the other Moiety when half the number of Men agreed for shall be sent to *Agria* (which is the place of general Redevous appointed for the Recruits) that every Prince defray his Men thither; that there be not sent fewer than 100 Men at one time: And that to every 600 Men there be allow'd one Captain, two Lieutenants, and three Ensigns. That the new Levies be all sent before the end of *March*, who are upon their arrival to be clothed and paid on the same foot with the Imperial Regiments.

Cologne, January 7. Yesterday the Count de Caunitz appeared with the Character of Envoy from the Emperor, (which he had not owned before) in an Audience before the Grand Chapter he laid open the Subject of his Commission, which was to dissuade them from proceeding to the Election of the Cardinal of *Hofenburg*. And the Archbishop of *Damas*, the Apostolick Nuncio, had, by Orders from the Pope, employed his Solicitations with the Elector, to interpose his Authority for putting off the Choice to a further day, representing, That what should be done herein, would not be valid, without Leave first obtain'd from his Holiness: But none of the Realsons offer'd prevail'd either with the one or the other, for this day being assembl'd, according to their former Order, the Chapter unanimously Elected the Cardinal for Coadjutor. There are 22 Canons belonging to the Cathedral, but there were only 19 present, of all which there was not one dissenting Voice: And there was a Messenger immediately dispatched to *Bon* to give the Elector Notice of the Choice. Some few days before, the Bishop of *Bressan* and Count *Contingec*, had presented to the Nuncio their Protestation and Appeal, against the intended Election, which was accordingly received in order to transmit the same to *Rome*.

Paris, January 14. Here are lately arrived Two Extraordinary Couriers from *Rome*, who parted both from thence the same day on the 26th of *December*; the first with Advice, That on *Christmas* Eve, the Marquis of *Lavardin*, in the manner used by all former Ambassadors, had, with his whole Family, been at his Devotions at Midnight-Mass, at the Church of *St. Lewis*. And the other brought an account, That on the same 26th of *December*, was found affixed on that Church this Sentence of Interdict.

BY the Apostolical Authority, and the Special Command of our Holy Lord the Pope, the Parish Church of *St. Lewis* is declared to be under an Ecclesiastical Interdict, for that the Rector, Officials, and Members of the said Church, have rashly presumed, on the Eve of the Nativity of our Lord Jesus Christ, to admit to Divine Service, and the Participation of the Sacraments, Henry de Beaumanoir, Marquis of *Lavardin*, who is Notoriously Excommunicated.

Given at *Rome* this 26th day of *December*, 1687.

Let none dare to take this down, upon pain of the greater Excommunication to be incurred by a Sentence reserved to our Holy Lord.

The Envoys of the Reformed Cantons, when they took Leave of the Marquis de *Croissy*, on the 26th past, are said to have done it in these Terms: Our Superiors having sent us hither to use our utmost Endeavours, to move his Majesty, in their Names, to the maintenance of their Allies the Republick of *Geneva*, in the Possession of their Rights, which they have continued to enjoy for 150 Years; and his Majesty having thought fit to refer the Builnes in question, to the Cognizance of the Parliament of *Orion*, we have represented that our Superiors cannot submit therein, this being a matter of State, which is interwoven with several publick Aids and Articles of mutual Defence and Alliance, which that Parliament can be no proper Judges of, nor will those of *Geneva* think fit to produce to them their Treaties, which are also ours. But your Excellency having thereupon signified to us his Majesties Pleasure, That there should be no further Conferences with us on this Subject; it remains that we return home to give a faithful Account of what has passed, since we may justly apprehend, That our longer stay here will be a little agreeable as our coming at first. We are therefore now to take our Leaves of your Excellency, and to acknowledge the Patience you have had in several Conferences with us, as well to desire you, in pursuance of the repeated Orders and in-

structions sent us, to assure his Majesty, That our Masters, whatever surprize they may be under, at the disappointment of this Negotiation, as being unforeseen by them, that the Considerations in Favour of a single Chapter and about 25 Prebends (how ever their Pretentions are weakly grounded) should outweigh the Services and Friendship of the ancient and constant Allies of this Crown, who have never been sparing of their Blood, or whatever else depended on them to promote the Interest of his Majesty and his Kingdom: They shall yet unalterably continue in the observance of all they have bound themselves to by their Treaties with his Majesty, as they do not doubt his Royal Intentions to preserve all Agreements made with them. And as to our own particular, though we have not had the Honour to see his Majesty, we do no less ardently offer up our Prayers to God for the Welfare and Prosperity of his Sacred Person.

Whitehall, January 11. The Marquis of *Bedmar*, Master of the Ordnance in *Flanders*, and Envoy Extraordinary from *Spain*, had Audience of Her Majesty the 8th Instant; and the next day of the Queen Dowager; as also on the 10th Instant of her Royal Highness the Princess *Ann of Denmark*; and this day of his Royal Highness Prince *George of Denmark*, being conducted by Sir *Charles Correll* Master of the Ceremonies.
