By Her Majesty's Command.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name

of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to The Princess.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, intituled "An Act to prevent until the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders amongst sheep, cattle, and other animals," and from time to time continued by divers subsequent Acts, and lastly, by an Act passed in the session of the twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and nineteen, it is (amongst other things) enacted that it shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time to make such Orders and Regulations as to them may seem necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal to or from such parts or places as they may

designate in such Order or Orders, of sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals, or of hay, straw, fodder, or other articles likely to propagate infection; and to make any other Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations; and that all provisions for any of the purposes aforesaid in any such Order or Orders contained shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in the said Act:

And whereas the said Act has been amended and explained by an Act passed in the twenty-ninth year of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the Act of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and seven, to prevent the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals."

And whereas a contagious or infectious disorder, generally designated as the "Cattle Plague," has lately appeared, and now prevails, amongst cattle in England and Wales:

And whereas divers Orders in pursuance of the said recited Act have been made by the Lords of the said Council in relation to the said Cattle Plague, which were consolidated and amended by Orders bearing date the 24th day of March, and the 11th day of April, 1866, and such last Orders have been since altered and extended by other Orders of the Council since duly issued, one of which, bearing date the 14th day of April, 1866, relates to South Wales:

And whereas some of the regulations contained in the said Orders will cease on the first day of June next following, and it is expedient that the same should be continued, and that farther regulations should be made in regard to the landing of foreign cattle, the movement of cattle, and the cleansing of pens and the movement of hay and straw as herein provided.

Now, therefore, the Lords of the said Council do hereby order as follows, that is to say:

Art. 1. All the regulations contained in the said Orders above referred to, which, if this Order had not been made, would have ceased and determined on the first day of June next shall be continued and be in force until the Lords of the said Council shall hereafter otherwise order.

Art. 2. All cattle brought by sea from any place out of the United Kingdom, except the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man, and landed at any place in the United Kingdom, shall be taken forthwith to the market held and duly licensed by the Lords of the Council for the sale of cattle, for immediate slaughter, if any such there be within the said place, which shall be held within four days from the landing of such cattle; and if there be no such market duly licensed within such place, or if the market duly licensed shall not be held within four days from the landing of such cattle, such cattle shall be slaughtered at such place before the expiration of such four days.

Art. 3. All lambs, sheep, goats, and swine brought by sea from any place out of the United Kingdom into any town or place in the United Kingdom, in the same vessel with any foreign cattle, shall be dealt with in all respects as such foreign cattle, and shall be subject to all the regulations applicable to such foreign cattle brought by sea into any such town or place.

Art. 4. The Local Authority shall, with the view of preventing the spread of the said disorder, with all convenient speed after the issuing

of this Order, make regulations with respect to the movement of commonable animals on, to, from, and through the commons and wastes within its jurisdiction, whereon there shall exist any right of common, and the depasturing, or for the prohibition of the depasturing of such commonable animals thereon, and shall publish such regulations by notice in some newspaper circulating in the neighbourhood of the commons or wastes to which they relate, and after the lapse of four days from such publication no animal shall be moved on, to, from, or through, or be depastured on such common or waste in contravention of such regulation.

Art. 5. Notwithstanding anything in the said Orders otherwise provided, it shall be sufficient if the pen which shall be used for any animal shall be thoroughly cleansed and disinfected in the manner directed by the Board of Trade once in every twenty-four hours during the time when it shall be used for any such animal, and at such other times as the said Board of Trade shall require.

Art. 6. The regulations in the said Orders contained relating to the movement of hay and straw out of infected places, shall not apply to hay or straw used in the packing and storing of goods where the owner, seller, or purchaser of such goods who shall pack or store the goods, or shall cause the same to be packed or stored, shall prove upon any inquiry to the satisfaction of the Local Authority of the district out of which and into which such goods shall be brought respectively, or of some person employed by them in this behalf, that such hay or straw is not infected, and has not been in contact with any diseased animal, or with any matter or thing which has been in such contact during the period of twenty-eight days previous to the day when the same is so being used.

Art. 7. The Local Authority in the Counties of Pembroke, Cardigan, and Carmarthen respectively, may grant Licences for the holding of Fairs whereat Cattle may be sold, so that a separate Licence be granted for every Fair, and that the same may be inade revocable at the discretion of the said Local Authority, which Licence shall be in writing and in such form as the Local Authority shall deem to be expedient.

Art. 8. This Order shall be construed in like manner as the said Orders of the 24th day of March and the 11th day of April, and all the provisions of such last-mentioned Orders now in force shall apply to this Order respectively, except so far as they may be inconsistent with anything herein contained.

"Act to prevent until the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals," and from time to time continued by divers subsequent Acts, and lastly by an Act passed in the session of the twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and nineteen, it is (amongst other things) enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time to make such Orders and Regulations as to them may seem necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal to or from such parts or places as they may designate in such Order or Orders of sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals, or of meat, skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals, or of hay, straw, fodder, or other articles likely to propagate infection, and to make any other Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations; and that all provisions for any of the purposes aforesaid in any such Order or Orders contained shall have the like force and effect as, if the same had been inserted in the said Act:

And whereas the said Act has been explained and amended by an Act passed in the twenty-ninth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to amend the Act of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and seven, to prevent the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals:"

And whereas a contagious or infectious disorder, generally designated as the "Cattle Plague," has lately appeared, and now prevails, amongst cattle in England and Wales:

And whereas the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, in exercise of the powers given by the said Act so continued as aforesaid, did, on the 24th day of March now last past, by an Order then made, amongst other things order and direct that, until the first day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, all cattle brought by sea from any place out of the United Kingdom into any town or place in England should be marked by clipping the hair off the end of the tail, and that no such cattle should be removed alive from such town or place except by sea:

And whereas it is expedient to vary the provisions of the said Order of the 24th day of March, 1866, so far as relates to cattle brought by sea from the islands of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, and Sark (hereinafter called the "Channel Islands"), and the Isle of Man, in'o any town or place in England:

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council do hereby, in exercise of the powers given by the said Act so continued as aforesaid, order as follows:—

1. From and after the publication of this Order in the London Gazette, so much of the said Order of the 24th day of March, 1866, as requires cattle brought by sea from any place out of the United Kingdom into any town or place in England to be marked by clipping the hair off the end of the tail, and prohibits the removal of such cattle alive from any such town or place, except by sea, shall cease to be applicable to such cows as hereinafter

mentioned, but shall in all other respects remain in full force and effect.

2. This Order shall apply only to cows brought into any town or place in England from the Channel Islands, or any of them, or from the Isle of Man, in vessels plying or sailing between those islands respectively, or one of them, and England, which shall not have touched since last leaving England at any port or place, except some port or place in the said islands, or one of them, or since last leaving the said islands, or one of them, at some port or place in England, and which shall not have any cattle on board, except cows certified in the manner hereinafter provided to be the produce of and to have been born in the said islands respectively, or one of them, and not to have been previously removed therefrom.

3. In order to entitle any cows or cow so brought into any town or place in England as aforesaid to the benefit of this Order, the master of the vessel in or on board of which the same shall be so brought shall, upon his arrival in such town or place, deliver to such person as shall be appointed by the Local Authority of such town or place for such purpose, or (in default of any such appointment) to the Officers of Her Majesty's Customs at such town or place, a clearance cocket under the hands or hand of the Principal Officer and Controller of Her Majesty's Customs at the port or place in one of the said islands from which such cows or cow shall have been exported, describing such cows or cow as being *bonâ fide* the produce of and as having never previously been removed or exported out of the Channel Islands, or one of them, or the Isle of Man (as the case may be); together with a certificate in writing under the hand of the Governor or Lieutenant-Governor of such island, certifying that the shipper of such cows or cow has made proof before a magistrate within such island, in the manner required by the laws relating to the Customs, that such cows or cow are or is actually the produce of, and were or was born within, the Channel Islands or the Isle of Man (as the case may be), and have or has never previously been removed or exported therefrom; and also a certificate under the hand of some veterinary surgeon practising within such island, and countersigned by a magistrate having authority within the same, to the effect that to the best of his knowledge and belief such cows or cow are or is free from the said disorder called the Cattle Plague, and from every symptom commonly supposed to indicate the presence or approach of the said disorder, and from contagious disease of any kind, and that to the best of his knowledge and belief the said cattle plague never has existed, and does not, at the time of granting such certificate, exist in such island.

4. No cows or cow brought by sea from the Channel Islands, or any of them, or from the Isle of Man, into any town or place in England as defined by the 30th section of the said Order of the 24th day of March, 1866, in such manner and so certified as aforesaid, shall be removed from such town or place alive without a certificate from the Local Authority having jurisdiction in such town or place that such cows or cow have or has been examined by some officer appointed for that purpose by such authority, and that such cows or cow are or is free from disease: such certificate shall not exempt such cows or cow from any other Regulation of the said Order of the 24th day of March with respect to the movement of cattle or otherwise: Provided nevertheless, that in the case of any such cows or cow so certified

as aforesaid the certificate of the Local Authority that such cows or cow are or is free from disease may be accepted in the case of a fat-stock licence by the person authorized to grant the same as sufficient for the purpose of granting such licence, and in the case of a store-stock licence such certificate may be accepted by the Justice as equivalent to the declaration of the owner or his agent and to the certificate of the occupiers required by the form of the said store-stock licence under the said Order of the 24th day of March, 1866.

5. Every person guilty of an offence against this Order shall for each such offence incur a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds; and where any such offence is committed with respect to more than four animals a penalty not exceeding five pounds for each animal may be imposed instead of the penalty of twenty pounds.

And whereas divers Orders in pursuance of the said first recited Act have been made by the Lords of the said Council in relation to the cattle plague, which were consolidated and amended by Orders bearing date the 24th day of March and 11th day of April, 1866 :

And whereas the counties of Westmoreland, Northumberland and Montgomery, are at present free from the cattle plague, but the said plague exists to a considerable extent in counties respectively adjoining such first-mentioned counties :

And whereas the Lords of the Council, by an Order bearing date the 27th day of April last, made special provisions in respect of the county of Westmoreland, as therein contained ; and it is expedient that the same should be rescinded, and that similar provisions should be made in respect of the counties of Northumberland, Westmoreland, and Montgomery :

Now, therefore, the Lords of the Council do hereby rescind the Order of the 27th day of April last, except in regard to any matter or thing commenced and not completed under it, or any offence committed, and any prosecution or other proceedings commenced or to be taken in reference thereto :

And the said Lords do hereby order that from and after the date hereof the Local Authority for the counties of Northumberland, Westmoreland, and Montgomery respectively, may from time to time, and with a view to prevent the spreading of the said cattle plague, make regulations for the exclusion from such counties respectively of cattle or other animals coming from any other part of Great Britain, or for the admission of such cattle or other animals into the same respectively, subject to such conditions as to such Local Authority may seem expedient.

And such Local Authority may from time to time revoke or alter any such Regulations. And no cattle or other animals shall be conveyed, brought, or taken into the said counties respectively, contrary to such Regulations, anything in the Orders of the 24th of March and 11th of April, 1866, to the contrary notwithstanding, after four days from the publication of such Regulations, except as hereinafter provided :

Provided that no such regulation shall interfere with the conveyance of any animals by railway through or out of the county to which it refers.

This Order shall be construed in like manner as the Orders of the 24th March and 11th April, 1866, and all the provisions therein contained shall apply to this Order, so far as the same can be applicable, and the violation of any part of this Order shall be an offence subject to the penalty incurred under the said Orders by the committing of any offence against them or either of them ; and the regulations made by each Local Authority under this Order shall be published in some newspaper or newspapers circulating within the county for which such Local Authority acts, and also in some newspaper or newspapers circulating within the county or counties bordering on the county for which such Local Authority acts.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament made and passed in the session of Parliament holden in the third and fourth years of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter 96, for the regulation of the duties of postage, power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury from time to time, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British postage or inland postage payable by law on the transmission by the post of foreign or colonial letters or newspapers or of any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant, and from time to time, by Warrant as aforesaid, to alter or repeal any such altered rates, and make and establish any new or other rates in lieu thereof, and from time to time, by Warrant as aforesaid, to appoint at what time the rates which may be payable are to be paid.

And whereas further powers are given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by another Act made and passed in the session of Parliament holden in the tenth and eleventh years of the reign of Her Majesty, cap. 85, for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post Office.

And whereas certain powers are also given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury by another Act of Parliament, made and passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her Majesty, cap. 27, for amending the laws relating to the stamp duties on newspapers and for providing for the transmission by post of printed periodical publications.

And whereas a communication is about to be established by colonial packet boats between Panama and New Zealand and Australia, and it is expedient to fix certain rates of postage upon letters and packets transmitted by the post from the United Kingdom to New Zealand and Australia, via Panama, and from Panama to New Zealand and Australia respectively, and to make certain regulations in relation thereto in the manner hereinafter mentioned and contained.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers reserved to us in and by the said hereinbefore recited Acts of Parliament respectively, and all and every or

some or one of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners (by the authority of the statute in that case made and provided), order, declare, and direct as follows; that is to say:—

1. On every letter not exceeding one half of an ounce in weight, posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to New Zealand or Australia, transmitted by the post from any place in the United Kingdom to New Zealand or Australia, via Panama (the sea conveyance being partly by British and partly by colonial packet boat), there shall be charged and taken a uniform rate of postage (British and colonial combined) of one shilling.

2. On every letter not exceeding one half of an ounce in weight, transmitted by the post from any of Her Majesty's colonies or any foreign country through the United Kingdom, to New Zealand or Australia, via Panama (the sea conveyance from the United Kingdom to New Zealand or Australia being partly by British and partly by colonial packet boat), there shall be charged and taken a uniform rate of postage (British and colonial combined) of one shilling, for the conveyance of every such letter from any port in the United Kingdom to New Zealand or Australia; and for the conveyance of every such letter from the British colony or foreign country from which the same shall be forwarded to the port in the United Kingdom of the arrival of the packet boat or vessel (not being a packet boat) conveying the same, such a further or additional rate of postage as shall from time to time be charged and payable for British postage on letters not exceeding half an ounce in weight, posted in any such British colony or foreign country, and transmitted direct from such colony or foreign country to the port in the United Kingdom of the arrival of the packet boat or vessel (not being a packet boat) conveying the same, provided that in all cases where such additional rate includes both inland and sea services, there shall be deducted therefrom the sum of one penny in respect of the inland conveyance under this clause, of every such letter sent through the United Kingdom.

3. All such respective letters so transmitted, as is mentioned in the first and second clauses of this Warrant, if exceeding one half of an ounce in weight, shall be subject to the several further and additional and progressive rates of postage hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:—

On every letter so transmitted, if exceeding one half of an ounce in weight, and not exceeding one ounce in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid two rates of postage;

And on every letter so transmitted, if exceeding one ounce and not exceeding two ounces in weight, four rates of postage;

And on every letter so transmitted, if exceeding two ounces, and not exceeding three ounces in weight, six rates of postage;

And on every letter so transmitted, if exceeding three ounces, and not exceeding four ounces in weight, eight rates of postage;

And for every additional ounce in weight of any letter so transmitted as aforesaid above the weight of four ounces, there shall be charged, taken, and paid two additional rates of postage; and every fractional part of such additional ounce in weight above the weight of four ounces, shall be charged as an additional ounce in weight. And each progressive and additional rate chargeable under

this clause, shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such letter would be charged with under this Warrant, if not exceeding one half of an ounce in weight.

4. On every letter not exceeding one half of an ounce in weight, transmitted by colonial packet boat from Panama to New Zealand or Australia (without such letters having previously passed through the United Kingdom), there shall be charged and taken (in addition to any other rates of postage chargeable and payable thereupon), a colonial packet rate of postage of sixpence.

5. And on every letter transmitted as is mentioned in the 4th clause of this Warrant exceeding one half of an ounce in weight, and not exceeding one ounce in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid progressive and additional rates of postage as follows, that is to say:—

On every such letter exceeding one half of an ounce in weight, and not exceeding one ounce in weight, two rates of postage;

On every such letter exceeding one ounce, and not exceeding one ounce and the half of another ounce in weight, three rates of postage;

On every such letter exceeding one ounce and the half of another ounce, and not exceeding two ounces in weight, four rates of postage;

And for every half of an ounce in weight of any such letter above the weight of two ounces, there shall be charged and taken one additional rate of postage, and in charging any additional rate of postage every fraction part of such additional half of an ounce shall be charged as an additional half of an ounce in weight, and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this clause shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such letter would be charged with under this Warrant if not exceeding one half of an ounce in weight.

6. On every letter transmitted by the post under the provisions of the 1st and 4th clauses of this Warrant the postage thereof shall be paid at the time of the same being posted, either in money or by being duly stamped with the proper postage stamp or stamps affixed thereto, which stamp or stamps shall in every case be affixed or appear on the outside of every such letter near the address or direction, and shall be of the value or amount of the postage duty payable thereon under or by virtue of this Warrant.

7. If any letter shall be posted in the United Kingdom addressed to New Zealand or Australia (except Tasmania), without any postage having been paid thereon in the mode hereinbefore required or with a postage paid thereon, in the mode hereinbefore required, which shall be less in amount than the single rate of postage to which such letter, if not exceeding half an ounce in weight, would be liable under this Warrant, every such letter shall be detained and opened, and shall be either returned or given up to the sender thereof.

8. If any letter shall be posted in the United Kingdom addressed to New Zealand or Australia (except Tasmania) with a postage paid thereon in the mode hereinbefore required, which shall be less in amount than the rate of postage to which the same would be liable under or by virtue of this Warrant, but equal in amount to the single rate of postage chargeable on any such letter if not exceeding half an ounce in weight, every such letter shall be forwarded charged with the amount of the difference between the postage so paid thereon and the postage to which it would have been liable if the postage had been paid, when

posted, together with the further and additional rate of postage of one shilling.

9. If any letter shall be posted in the United Kingdom addressed to Tasmania without any postage having been paid thereon, in the mode hereinbefore required, or with a postage paid thereon, in the mode hereinbefore required, which shall be less in amount than the rate of postage to which the same would be liable under or by virtue of this Warrant, or if any letter shall be sent or tendered or delivered in order to be sent by the post, under the provisions of the 4th clause of this Warrant, without the postage payable thereon, under or by virtue of this Warrant, being fully prepaid in the mode hereinbefore required, every such respective letter shall be detained and opened, and shall be either returned or given up to the sender thereof.

10. Nothing herein contained shall in anywise annul, prejudice, or affect any of the exemptions or privileges granted by or under the said hereinbefore recited Acts, or either of them, or by or under any other Acts of Parliament relating to the Post Office, or any of the privileges which officers, seamen, and soldiers employed in Her Majesty's service are by law entitled to, of sending and receiving by the post letters subject to the regulations and restrictions in respect of the same.

11. On every packet consisting of a printed British newspaper not exceeding four ounces in weight posted in the United Kingdom addressed to New Zealand or Australia, and transmitted by the post from any place in the United Kingdom to New Zealand or Australia via Panama (the sea conveyance being partly by British and partly by colonial boat), there shall be charged and taken an uniform rate of postage (British and colonial combined) of four pence. And on every packet consisting of a printed colonial or foreign newspaper not exceeding four ounces in weight transmitted by the post from any of Her Majesty's colonies or any foreign country through the United Kingdom to New Zealand or Australia via Panama (the sea conveyance from the United Kingdom to New Zealand or Australia being partly by British and partly by colonial packet boat), there shall be charged and taken an uniform rate of postage (British and colonial combined) of four pence, for the conveyance of every such packet from any port in the United Kingdom to New Zealand or Australia; and for the conveyance of every such last-mentioned packet from the British colony or foreign country from which the same shall be forwarded to the port in the United Kingdom of the arrival of the packet boat or vessel (not being a packet boat) conveying the same, such a further or additional rate of postage as shall from time to time be charged and payable for British postage on such packets not exceeding four ounces in weight posted in any such British colony or foreign country and transmitted direct from such colony or foreign country to the port in the United Kingdom of the arrival of the packet boat or vessel (not being a packet boat) conveying the same.

12. On every packet consisting of a printed newspaper not exceeding four ounces in weight transmitted by colonial packet boat from Panama to New Zealand or Australia (without having previously passed through the United Kingdom) there shall be charged and taken (in addition to all other rates of postage chargeable and payable thereupon) a colonial rate of postage of two pence.

13. On every packet consisting of printed papers other than newspapers, or consisting of patterns or samples of merchandize of no intrinsic

value, not exceeding four ounces in weight, transmitted by colonial packet boat from Panama to New Zealand or Australia (without having previously passed through the United Kingdom), there shall be charged and taken (in addition to all other rates of postage chargeable and payable thereupon) a colonial rate of postage of three-pence.

14. On every packet consisting of books, publications, or works of literature or art, whether British, colonial, or foreign, or consisting of printed votes or proceedings of the Imperial Parliament or the colonial legislatures, not exceeding four ounces in weight, posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to New Zealand or Australia, and transmitted by the post from any place in the United Kingdom to New Zealand or Australia, via Panama (the sea conveyance being partly by British and partly by colonial packet boat), there shall be charged and taken an uniform rate of postage (British and colonial combined) of six-pence.

15. All packets transmitted respectively under the authority of the 11th and 14th clauses of this Warrant, hereinbefore respectively contained, shall, if, exceeding the weight of four ounces respectively, be subject to the several further and additional and progressive rates of postage hereinafter mentioned (that is to say):—

On every such packet so transmitted, if exceeding four ounces, and not exceeding eight ounces in weight, there shall be charged and taken two rates of postage;

And on every such packet, if exceeding eight ounces, and not exceeding twelve ounces in weight, there shall be charged and taken three rates of postage;

And on every such packet, if exceeding twelve ounces, and not exceeding sixteen ounces in weight, there shall be charged and taken four rates of postage;

And for every additional four ounces in weight of any such packet above the weight of sixteen ounces, there shall be charged and taken one additional rate of postage, and in charging any additional rate of postage every fractional part of such additional four ounces in weight shall be charged as an additional four ounces in weight; and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this clause, shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such packet would be charged with under this warrant, if not exceeding four ounces in weight.

16. All packets transmitted respectively under the authority of the 12th and 13th clauses of this Warrant hereinbefore respectively contained, shall, if exceeding the weight of four ounces respectively, be subject to the several further and additional and progressive rates of postage hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:—

On every such packet so transmitted, if exceeding four ounces, and not exceeding one-half of a pound in weight, there shall be charged and taken two rates of postage;

And on every such packet, if exceeding one-half of a pound, and not exceeding one pound in weight, there shall be charged and taken four rates of postage;

And for every additional half of a pound in weight of any such packet above the weight of one pound, there shall be charged and taken two additional rates of postage; and every fractional part of such additional half of a pound in weight shall be charged as an additional half of a pound in weight, and

each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this clause shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such packet would be charged with under this Warrant if not exceeding four ounces in weight.

17. For the purposes of this Warrant every newspaper transmitted by the Post under the 11th and 12th clauses of this Warrant shall be deemed and considered a packet, and shall be charged and chargeable with a separate and distinct single rate or separate and distinct progressive and additional rates of postage, according to the weight thereof, as hereinbefore respectively mentioned, notwithstanding two or more newspapers shall be enclosed and transmitted in one and the same cover, wrapper, envelope, or bundle, and form only one parcel or bundle of newspapers, and every printed supplement or additional sheet to any such newspaper shall, for the purpose of charging the postage under this Warrant, be deemed a distinct newspaper, unless sent in the same cover or together with the newspaper to which it is a supplement or addition.

18. Every packet transmitted by the post under the provisions of the 11th, 12th, and 14th clauses of this Warrant, shall be so transmitted in conformity with, and under, and subject to, the several orders, directions, regulations, and conditions following; that is to say:

Every British newspaper shall be printed and published at intervals not exceeding thirty-one days between any two consecutive numbers or parts of such publication; and the same shall be registered at the General Post Office, in London, and shall be posted within fifteen days from the date of its publication, and the title and date of the newspaper shall be printed at the top of every page thereof.

Every packet shall be sent open at the ends or sides, and either without a cover or in a cover or envelope open at the ends or sides, and there shall be no written letter, either closed or open, nor any written communication in the nature of a letter, either closed or open (whether such letter or communication be addressed to or intended for the person to whom the packet shall be directed, or any other person), nor any enclosure sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, nor any other inclosure not authorized by this Warrant, sent in or with any such packet; nor shall there be any word or communication printed on the contents of any such packet after the publication thereof, nor any writing, figures, or marks upon any such contents, or the cover thereof, not authorized by this Warrant, except the name and address of the person to whom the same is sent; but the name or title of any newspaper, and the name and address of the publisher, news-vender, or agent, by whom the same is sent, may be printed on the cover thereof.

19. If any packet be sent or be tendered or delivered in order to be sent by the post, under the 11th, 12th, and 14th clauses of this Warrant, otherwise than in conformity with the conditions and regulations established by or under the 18th clause of this Warrant, the same shall and may be detained and opened, and, at the option of the Postmaster-General, shall (except in the case provided for in the clause next hereinafter contained) be either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or be given up to the person to whom the same shall be addressed, or be forwarded to the place of its destination; and any such packet on being so returned, given up, or

forwarded, shall be chargeable with any rates of postage the Postmaster-General may think fit, not exceeding the rates that would be chargeable on such packet as a letter.

20. If any packet sent or tendered or delivered in order to be sent by the post, under the provisions of the 11th, 12th, and 14th clauses of this Warrant, shall contain any written letter or any written communication in the nature of a letter, whether closed or open, or any enclosure sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, or any other enclosure not authorised by this Warrant, every such letter, or communication, or enclosure may be taken out by any officer of the Post-office, and either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or forwarded to the address on the packet, charged in either case not only with the full rates of postage as a letter, but also with a further and additional rate of postage equal in amount to the single rate of postage chargeable under this Warrant on a packet not exceeding four ounces in weight, and the remainder of the packet, if the postage be duly paid when posted, may be forwarded to the place of its address without any extra charge.

21. Every packet consisting of printed papers which shall be transmitted by the post under the authority of the 13th clause of this Warrant, shall be sent without a cover, or in a cover open at the ends or sides, and it may contain any number of separate books or other publications, prints or maps, and any quantity of paper, parchment, or vellum, and the books or other publications, prints or maps, may be either printed, written, or plain, or any mixture of the three, and all legitimate binding, mounting, or covering of a book, publication, print, or map, or of a portion thereof, shall be allowed to pass by the post whether such binding, mounting, or covering be loose or attached, as also rollers in the case of prints or maps, markers (whether of paper or otherwise) in the case of books, and whatsoever is necessary for the safe transmission of literary or artistic matter, or usually appertains thereto; but no packet shall contain any written letter, nor any communication in the nature of a letter, closed or open, nor any enclosure, sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, nor any communication of the nature of a letter, written in or upon any such packet, or the cover thereof, nor shall any packet consist of or contain any photographs, drawings, prints, or other contents which may be obviously of an obscene character.

22. Every packet consisting of patterns or samples of merchandize, which shall be transmitted by the post under the authority of the 13th clause of this Warrant, shall be so transmitted in conformity with, and under and subject to, the several orders, directions, regulations, and conditions hereinafter contained, that is to say:—

No pattern or sample, being of any intrinsic value, or being an article or thing of a saleable nature, or having a value of its own apart from its mere use as a pattern or sample, shall be transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant.

There shall be no enclosure, sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, nor any other enclosure not authorized by this Warrant, sent in or with any such packet.

There shall be no writing in or upon any such packet, or on the cover thereof, except the address of the person for whom it is intended, the address of the sender thereof, a trade mark, and numbers and prices;

All such packets shall be sent in covers open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination, nevertheless samples of seeds, drugs, and such other articles and things as cannot be sent in open covers may be enclosed in bags of linen, paper, or other material, tied at the neck, but bags so closed that they cannot be readily opened, even although they be transparent, shall not be used for that purpose.

23. All packets, consisting of patterns or samples of merchandize, posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to New Zealand or Australia, and transmitted by the post from any place in the United Kingdom to New Zealand or Australia via Panama (the sea conveyance being partly by British and partly by colonial packet boat), may be so transmitted under the authority of this Warrant, and at the several rates of postage respectively, as are payable in respect of packets consisting of books, publications, or works of literature or art, transmitted by the post from the United Kingdom to New Zealand or Australia, under or by virtue of this Warrant, nevertheless, such packets, consisting of patterns or samples of merchandize, shall be so transmitted in conformity with, and under and subject to the several orders, directions, regulations, conditions, and restrictions hereinafter respectively mentioned and contained, concerning or relating to the same, that is to say:—

There shall be no enclosure, sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, nor any other enclosure not authorized by this Warrant, sent in or with any such packet;

There shall be no writing or printing upon any such packet, or on the cover thereof, or contained therein, except the address of the person for whom it is intended, the address of the sender thereof, and a manufacturer's or trade mark, and number and price of the pattern or sample, and every such manufacturer's or trade mark, number and price, shall be written or printed on labels attached to such patterns or samples, or to the bags or boxes containing the same, and not on loose pieces of paper or other material.

All such packets shall be sent in covers, open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination, nevertheless samples of seeds, drugs, and such other articles and things as cannot be sent in open covers may be inclosed in boxes, or in bags of linen or other material, which shall be fastened in such a manner that they may be readily opened, but closed bags if transparent may be used for this purpose.

No article which might injure the contents of the mails bags, or the persons of the officers of the Post Office, shall be transmitted by the post under the authority of this Warrant; nevertheless, any packet containing any razor, scissors, knife, fork, or other sharp or pointed instrument, keys, watch machinery, metal, metal tubing, or ore, or such like, shall and may (notwithstanding anything in a certain Warrant of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, bearing date the 28th day of November, 1844, contained to the contrary), be transmitted by the post under the authority of the 23rd clause of this Warrant, subject to the several orders, directions, regulations, and restrictions herein mentioned and contained relating thereto, provided that every such article or instrument so contained in any such packet shall be securely packed and guarded, and every such packet shall not only conform in every respect to the several orders, directions,

regulations, and restrictions herein contained, but the same shall also furnish sufficient protection against injury to the officers of the Post Office and to the contents of the mail bags, while at the same time the patterns or samples may be easily examined: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall extend to authorise the transmission by the post of any packet containing any explosive or other dangerous material or substance.

24. If any packet sent or tendered or delivered, in order to be sent by the post under the provisions of the 13th and 23rd clauses of this Warrant, shall be sent otherwise than in conformity with the several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions hereinbefore contained relating thereto, every such packet shall (except in the case next hereinafter otherwise provided for), be chargeable and shall be treated in all respects as a letter.

25. If any packet sent or tendered, or delivered in order to be sent by the post under the provisions of the 23rd clause of this Warrant, shall contain any inclosure sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, or any other inclosure not authorized by this Warrant, every such inclosure may be taken out by any officer of the Post Office, and either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or be forwarded to the address on the packet charged not only with the full rates of postage as a letter but also with a further and additional rate of postage of sixpence, and the remainder of the packet if duly prepaid may be forwarded to the place of its address without any extra charge.

26. As to all packets hereinbefore in the 11th, 12th, 13th, 14th, and 23rd clauses of this Warrant, authorized to be sent by the post (except packets passing through the United Kingdom under the 11th clause of this Warrant), the postage thereof shall in every case be paid at the time of the same being posted; and in the case of packets posted in the United Kingdom under the 11th, 14th, and 23rd clauses of this Warrant, the postage thereof shall be paid not in money, but by being duly stamped with the proper postage stamp or stamps affixed thereto, which stamp or stamps shall in every case be affixed or appear on the outside of every such packet, near the address or direction, and shall be of the value or amount of the postage duty payable thereon under or by virtue of this Warrant (unless any such packet be sent from any department or office in or connected with the public service of Her Majesty which shall have a postage account with the General Post Office in London, in which case the same shall be forwarded post paid, and the postage thereof shall be charged in such postage account); and if any such packet shall be posted without any postage having been paid thereon, as hereinbefore required, or shall be posted with a postage paid thereon, as hereinbefore required, which shall be less in amount than the rate or rates of postage payable thereupon under and by virtue of this Warrant, every such respective packet shall and may be detained and opened, and at the option of the Postmaster-General, shall be either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or to the person to whom it shall be addressed, or be forwarded to the place of its destination, and every such packet on being so returned, given up, or forwarded, shall be chargeable with any rate or amount of postage which the Postmaster-General shall think proper, not exceeding the rate or amount of postage to which such packet would have been liable as a letter, nor less than the rate of postage which such packet would have been chargeable with if the postage thereof had been properly paid when posted.

27. No packet addressed to New South Wales or Queensland shall be transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant which shall exceed the weight of three pounds; nor shall any packet be transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant which shall exceed two feet in length or one foot in breadth or depth, unless under the special authority of the Postmaster-General.

28. Every packet transmitted by the post under this Warrant shall be put into the Post Office at such hours in the day and under all such regulations as the Postmaster-General may appoint.

29. In order to prevent any obstacle to the due and regular transmission of letters by the post, any officer of the Post Office may delay the transmission of any packet posted or forwarded by the post under the provisions of this Warrant either for the space of twenty-four hours after the time at which the same ought to be dispatched in due course of the post, or (at his option) until the dispatch of the mail next after that by which the same ought in due course of the post to be forwarded by him.

30. In all cases in which any question shall hereafter arise whether any packet or anything contained therein, transmitted under or by virtue of this Warrant, is entitled to the privileges of this Warrant, and to be so transmitted within the intent and meaning thereof, such question shall be referred to the determination of the Postmaster-General whose decision thereupon shall be final and conclusive on all parties.

31. The term "Australia," used in this Warrant, shall be construed to mean and include the following colonies; that is to say:—New South Wales, Tasmania, Western Australia, Victoria, South Australia, and Queensland; the term "British newspaper," used in this Warrant, shall be construed to mean a newspaper printed in the United Kingdom, whether it bear a newspaper stamp or not; the terms "books, publications, or works of literature or art," used in this Warrant, shall, for the purposes of this Warrant, mean and comprise all such articles as, in their general character, are either literary or consist of printed, written, engraved, or lithographed matter (although not strictly literary), including books (whether printed, written, or plain), publications or compilations (whether in print or in manuscript), almanacks, printed or lithographed letters, and such artistic productions as prints, maps (whether on paper or canvas or cloth, and whether printed or written), and photographs, when not on glass or in frames containing glass, and any description of paper, parchment, or vellum (whether printed, lithographed, written upon, or plain, or any mixture of the four), together with any binding, mounting, or covering, of, or upon, or belonging to any such article or production, or any portion thereof, or of or belonging to any paper, parchment, or vellum, and including also any cases or rollers of prints or maps, book-markers (whether of paper or otherwise), pencils, pens, or other thing usually appertaining to any such article or production, paper, parchment, or vellum, or necessary for its safe transmission, which shall be sent in the same packet with any such article or production to which they or it shall belong; and all letters, notices, and other communications (whether upon paper, parchment, or vellum), partly printed or partly lithographed and partly written, which, if wholly written, would not be considered letters or communications in the nature of letters: Provided nevertheless, that nothing herein contained shall extend to authorize the sending by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant, of any letter,

notice, or other communication (whether upon paper, parchment, or vellum), partly printed or partly lithographed and partly written, which, if wholly written, would be considered a letter or communication in the nature of a letter, nor of any packet consisting of or containing any photographs, drawings, prints, or other contents which may be obviously of an obscene character, nor of any packet comprising prints or printed matter, unless such prints or printed matter shall consist only of prints or printed matter on paper, parchment, or vellum; and the several other terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as they would have had if inserted in the said recited Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her Majesty, cap. 96.

32. The Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury may, by Warrant under their hands duly made at any time hereafter, alter, repeal, or revoke any of the rates of postage hereby fixed, or any of the orders, directions, regulations, and conditions hereby made, and may make and establish any new or other rates, orders, directions, regulations, or conditions in lieu thereof, and may from time to time appoint at what time the rates which may be payable are to be paid.

33. This Warrant shall come into operation on the twenty-sixth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six.

Fixed and Flashing Light at Napoléon Basin, Marseille.

THE Minister of Public Works in France has given Notice, that on and after the 1st day of May, 1866, a light would be exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected at the entrance of the basin of Port Napoléon, at Marseillé, south coast of France.

The light is a *fixed white light*, varied every *minute by a red flash*. It is elevated 41 feet above the mean level of the sea, and in clear weather should be seen at a distance of 10 miles.

The tower is 18 feet high, and stands on the north extremity of the wall which shelters the basin.

At the same time, the fixed red provisional light, at the salient angle of the outer jetty of the Napoléon basin, would be discontinued.

Fixed Light at Banjoewangie.

THE Dutch Government at Batavia has given Notice, that on and after the 4th day of December, 1865, a light would be exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected at the port of Banjoewangie,—at the east end of the Island of Java—Baly strait.

The light is a *fixed white light*, at an elevation of 41 feet above the level of high water, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 8 miles.

In entering the roadstead of Banjoewangie, steer in with the light bearing west, and it will lead clear of all dangers.

H.M.S. *Perseus*, in December, 1865, observed that a light—a wood fire in a shed—had been placed on Isaki point, the north-east extreme of Kiusiu Island, and was seen from that vessel at a distance of 12 miles.

CATTLE PLAGUE.—ISLE OF MAN.

WHEREAS by an Act passed by the Legislature of the Isle of Man, intituled "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1865," it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of any two members of the Council, to make such orders and regulations, and to take such measures as may appear to be necessary for the purpose of preventing the introduction and spreading into or from the said Isle of the contagious or infectious disease generally designated the "Cattle Plague" or "Rinderpest," or to prohibit the exportation of animals from the said Isle.

And whereas the Lieutenant-Governor, by virtue and in exercise of the powers given by the said Act, issued certain proclamations bearing date respectively the 18th day of October, 1865, the 12th and 16th days of February, the 19th day of March, and the 24th day of April, 1866;

And whereas it is deemed expedient to consolidate, extend, and vary some of the above-mentioned proclamations:

Now, therefore, the Lieutenant-Governor, by and with the advice and consent of two members of the Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers given by the said Act, orders as follows:—

I. That from the date of this Order, the said proclamations, bearing date respectively the 18th of October, 1865, and the 12th and 16th days of February, 1866, shall be and the same are hereby revoked.

II. That from this date no animal, nor the carcase, or any portion of the carcase of any animal (save and except as authorized by the said proclamation bearing date the 24th of April, 1866), nor the skins, hides, horns, or hoofs of any animal, shall be imported into this Isle, or into any of the ports thereof; provided that this Order shall not extend to skins and hides brought into Great Britain from India, South America, or Australia.

III. That from this date no animal, or the skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or parts of any animal, shall be exported from this Isle to that part of the United Kingdom called Ireland.

IV. That for twenty-one days from the 21st day of May instant, no cattle, nor the carcase, or any portion of the carcase of any cattle shall be exported from this Isle.

V. That in this Order the expression "animal" shall be interpreted to mean any bull, cow, ox, heifer, steer, calf, tup, sheep, wether, or lamb, and the expression "cattle" shall be interpreted to mean any bull, cow, ox, heifer, steer, or calf.

VI. That from the date of this Order, no turnips, hay, straw, fodder, offal, dung, or litter, and no bones, except so far as authorized by the said proclamation bearing date the 19th of March, 1866, shall be imported into this Isle or into any of the ports thereof, and in the event of any hay, straw, or other prohibited article being used for the packing or preservation of merchandise, the importers, before the removal of their goods, shall be required to give an undertaking, in writing, to the Collector of Customs at the port of entry, that they will destroy or cause to be destroyed by fire, in the presence of a constable, within twenty-four hours from the delivery of the goods, all such prohibited articles.

AT a Meeting of the Council of the Borough of Liverpool, holden on Wednesday, the 9th day of May, 1866, in the Council Chamber, within the Townhall, Present—John Farnworth, Esq., Mayor, and a full Council.

Resolved—"That the following By-laws are approved and made by this Council, the same By-laws having been prepared and made by a Committee of this Council, duly authorised in that behalf, under and by virtue of their appointment by this Council as such Committee, pursuant to the power for that purpose contained in the local and personal Act, 28 and 29 Vic., chapter 278, intitled 'The Liverpool Gunpowder Regulation, &c., Act, 1865.'"

Borough of Liverpool to wit.

Whereas, by the Liverpool Gunpowder Regulation, &c., Act, 1865, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Liverpool, in the county of Lancaster, hereinafter called the Corporation, are empowered to make By-laws for the purpose of guarding against accidents from the explosion of Gunpowder within the limits of the jurisdiction in that behalf, conferred upon the Corporation by the said Act, that is to say, within the whole of the said borough, except such parts thereof as constitute a portion of the River Mersey; as are or may be included in the Mersey

Dock Estate for the time being, on the Lancashire side of the said river.

Now, therefore, the said Corporation, in pursuance of the powers aforesaid, do hereby make and ordain the following By-laws, for the purpose of guarding against the explosion of Gunpowder, that is to say:—

1. Every person storing or keeping Gunpowder exceeding 50 lbs. in weight within the limits mentioned in the title of these By-laws, shall give notice in writing thereof to the Fire Prevention Committee of the said borough, and all such Gunpowder shall be kept in proper receptacles made of zinc or copper, to the satisfaction of the Corporation, to be signified through the said Committee, except small quantities not exceeding 1 lb. in weight in tin canisters; and no quantity of Gunpowder shall be stored or kept within the limits aforesaid, exceeding 200 lbs. in weight.

2. No Gunpowder shall be laden, kept, or stored in any canal boat, barge, or other craft, within the limits mentioned in the title of these By-laws, or shall be conveyed and carried therein in such vessel, unless there be some place fitted up on board, to the satisfaction of the Corporation, to be signified through the said Fire Prevention Committee, wherein the Gunpowder may and shall be safely placed. During the loading or unloading of Gunpowder into or from any such vessel, and until the Powder is properly stowed away, no fire, or light, or smoking shall be allowed on board. And whenever practicable, the person in charge of any such vessel intending to receive more than 300 lbs. of Gunpowder on board, shall have a police constable of the borough on board during all the time of the receiving of the Gunpowder, in order to see that these By-laws are observed and performed, the burthen of proof that it was not practicable to have such constable on board, if there be none, resting upon the person in charge of the vessel: Provided nevertheless, that if reasonable notice in writing shall have been given to the head constable for such constable to be on board, the non-attendance of a constable shall not subject any person to be fined under these By-laws.

3. No person engaged in or about the loading or unloading of Gunpowder, at any railway station or elsewhere within the limits mentioned in the title of these By-laws, or in the conveyance of the same within such limits, shall smoke or use any light, lucifer match, or other combustible near the same. And every person employed in loading or unloading Gunpowder within the limits aforesaid, shall wear slippers of list or gutta percha only.

4. In the conveyance of Gunpowder by land within the limits mentioned in the title of these By-laws, the vehicle containing the Gunpowder shall be well covered at the bottom, sides, and top, with good and sufficient tarpaulins, or with some woollen substance. Provided that neither this or either of the two preceding By-laws, Nos. 2 and 3, shall extend to small quantities of Gunpowder, not exceeding in the whole 2 lbs. in weight.

5. The head constable, and the superintendents of the police of the borough, and any police constable, having a written authority for that purpose from the head constable, shall be at liberty, whenever he or they may think necessary, to enter any canal boat, barge, or other craft, or place within the limits aforesaid, in which Gunpowder may for the time being be, or be reasonably supposed to be stored, kept, or deposited, for the purpose of ascertaining whether these By-laws are duly

observed and obeyed, and no person shall obstruct the head or other constable from making any entry authorised by this By-law.

6. Every person offending against these By-laws shall be liable for the first offence to a penalty of ten pounds, and for a second or any subsequent offence, to a penalty of twenty pounds.
