## PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

**W**HEREAS by an Act passed in the session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, intituled "An Act to prevent until the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals," and from time to time continued by divers subsequent Acts, and lastly by an Act passed in the session of the twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and nineteen, it is (amongst other things) enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time, to make such Orders and Regulations as to them may seem necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal to or from such parts or places as they may designate in such Order or Orders, of sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals, or of meat, skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals, or of hay, straw, fodder, or other articles likely to propagate infection, and to make any other Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations; and that all provisions for any of the purposes aforesaid in any such Order or Orders contained shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in the said Act:

And whereas the said Act has been amended and explained by an Act passed in the twenty-ninth year of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the Act of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and seven, to prevent the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals:"

And whereas a contagious or infectious disorder, generally designated as the "Cattle Plague," has lately appeared, and now prevails, amongst cattle in England and Wales:

And whereas divers Orders have been made by the Lords of the said Council in relation to the cattle plague, which were consolidated and amended by an Order bearing date the 24th day of March last:

And whereas provisions are contained in the said Order of the Privy Council to regulate the movement of cattle on any highway, and such movement without a licence as therein described is prohibited, except for a distance not exceeding five hundred yards, from one part of the same farm to the other:

And whereas the holding of markets for the sale of cattle is prohibited by the said Order until the 1st day of June, 1866, except in the case of a market held with the licence of the Privy Council for the sale of cattle intended for immediate slaughter, which term hath, by an Order of the said Council, been extended from the said 1st day of June until the said Lords of the Council shall otherwise direct:

And whereas there is a market held in the Borough of Wolverhampton, in the county of Stafford, for the sale of cattle, and the holding thereof has been licensed by the Lords of the said Council, by instrument bearing date the 31st day of May last, for the sale of cattle intended for immediate slaughter, so long as the said above-mentioned Orders shall remain in force, or until the revocation thereof as therein provided, subject to all the conditions, provisions, and regulations in the said first-mentioned Order contained applicable to such market:

And whereas it is provided by the said Order of the 24th of March last, that in the case of cattle brought to any market other than the Metropolitan Cattle Market, they shall in no case be taken beyond such limits as may be described in the licence of the Privy Council allowing such market, and under such conditions with respect to their movement within such limits as may be imposed by such licence:

And whereas in the said licence for the holding of the above-mentioned market, it is provided that no cattle brought into the said market shall be taken alive beyond the limits of the municipal boundaries of the borough of Wolverhampton, and it is expedient that certain other regulations should be made in this behalf:

Now, therefore, the Lords of the Council do hereby order, that notwithstanding such provision in the said licence, cattle sold in the said market may, until the thirtieth of September next, if the said licence shall so long continue in force, be moved to any slaughter-house within a distance bounded by the main high road leading from Wolverhampton to Dudley, by the railway from Dudley to Walsall, which crosses the Stour Valley Railway to the south-east of Tipton, and by the main high road leading from Walsall to Wolverhampton, to be there immediately slaughtered, under such regulations as the Local Authority of the several counties in which these places shall be situated respectively shall from

time to time make and issue in regard to the movement, and the places, times and manner of the slaughtering of such cattle.

And if the said Local Authority make regulations in such behalf, cattle may be moved under such regulations from the said market by railway only to the Spon-lane station of the London and North-Western Railway, or to the West Bromwich station of the Great Western Railway, and thence respectively to slaughter-houses within the parish of West Bromwich, and there be forthwith slaughtered, or to the Brierley Hill Station of the Great Western Railway, to be forthwith slaughtered within one mile of such station. And subject to regulations to be made by the said Local Authority, cattle may be slaughtered within the parts of the parishes of Willenhall, Wedresbury, and Sedgley, which are not included in the district above described :

Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall allow the cattle to be kept alive for more than four days after exposure in the said market.

Every such regulation shall be published by the said Local Authority in some newspaper circulating in the borough of Wolverhampton, and by a notice affixed in some conspicuous place in the said market.

Every person who shall contravene this Order, or any regulation of the Local Authority made under it, shall be guilty of an offence, and be subject to the like penalty as in the case of a contravention of any regulation in the said Order of the 24th of March last.

And whereas there is a market held on premises belonging to the Corporation of Salford, situate in Cross-lane, in Salford, in the county of Lancaster, for the sale of cattle, and the holding thereof has been licensed by the Lords of the said Council, by instrument bearing date the 31st day of May last, for the sale of cattle intended for immediate slaughter, so long as the said above-mentioned Orders shall remain in force, or until the revocation thereof as therein provided, subject to all the conditions, provisions, and regulations in the said first-mentioned Order contained applicable to such market :

And whereas it is provided by the said Order of the 24th of March last, that in the case of cattle brought to any market other than the Metropolitan Cattle Market, they shall in no case be taken beyond such limits as may be described in the licence of the Privy Council allowing such market, and under such conditions with respect to their movement within such limits as may be imposed by such licence :

And whereas in the said licence for the holding of the above-mentioned market, it is provided that no cattle brought into the said market shall be taken alive beyond the limits of the municipal boundaries of the boroughs of Salford and Manchester, and it is expedient that certain other regulations should be made in this behalf :

Now, therefore, the Lords of the Council do hereby order, that notwithstanding such provision

in the said licence, cattle sold in the said market may, until the 30th day of September next, if the said licence shall so long continue in force, be moved for a distance extending twelve miles from the said market, but not further, to any slaughter-house, to be there immediately slaughtered under such regulations as the Local Authority for the county of Lancaster shall, from time to time, make and issue in regard to the movement as well as the places, times, and manner of slaughtering of such cattle :

Provided, that if any cattle shall be moved for a distance exceeding five miles in a direct line from such market, the cattle shall be moved by railway only from the market to their ultimate destination, or to within one mile thereof; and provided also, that nothing herein contained shall allow the cattle to be kept alive for more than four days after exposure in the said market.

Every such regulation shall be published by the said Local Authority in some newspaper circulating in the borough of Salford, and by a notice affixed in some conspicuous place in the said market.

Every person who shall contravene this Order, or any regulation of the Local Authority made under it, shall be guilty of an offence, and be subject to the like penalty as in the case of a contravention of any regulation in the said Order of the 24th of March last.

And whereas a contagious or infectious disorder generally designated as the "Cattle Plague" has lately appeared and now prevails among cattle in Scotland :

And whereas an Order dated 3rd November, 1865, was made by the Lords of the said Council in regard to the said Cattle Plague, whereby it was declared that the expression "North-Western District of Scotland" shall be interpreted to mean and embrace the whole of the county of Argyll, in Scotland, and the whole of Scotland lying to the north and west of the Caledonian Canal :

And whereas other Orders have been made by the said Lords relating in whole or in part to the said North-Western District of Scotland; and whereas it is expedient to extend and enlarge the said North-Western District of Scotland :

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council do hereby, in exercise of the powers given under the said Act so continued as aforesaid, order as follows :—

1. The expression "North-Western District of Scotland" shall mean and embrace not only "the whole of the county of Argyll in Scotland, and the whole of Scotland lying to the north and west of the Caledonian Canal," but also the whole of the counties of Inverness, Elgin, and Nairn, except so much thereof as lie to the east and south-east of the River Spey from its mouth to the point where it is joined by the River Avon : Provided that the county of Argyll shall not be affected in any way by the foresaid extension of the North-Western District, as regards the movement of animals into the said county.

2. Section forty-seven of the Order of 11th April, 1866, is hereby revoked, and in lieu thereof it is ordered that every licence for moving sheep into the North-Western District of Scotland, as above extended and defined, shall contain a statement of the place from and the route by which such sheep are to be moved, and no Local Authority shall sign or authorize to be signed any such licence until a certificate signed by an Inspector or other officer appointed for the purpose by the Local Authority of the county from which such sheep are to be moved has been produced, certifying that such sheep are free from disease, and that the place from which such sheep are to be moved has been free from cattle plague for twenty-eight days, and is not within ten miles of an infected place, as defined by the said Order of 11th April, 1866, and no Local Authority shall sign or authorize to be signed any such licence, if the route by which such sheep are to be moved passes through an "infected place," or within ten miles thereof : Provided that no sheep shall be removed into any county by virtue of any such licence, unless the consent of the Local Authority of such county has been first had and obtained.

3. The whole Orders in Council at present in force in regard to the North-Western District of Scotland shall be held to extend and apply to the North-Western District of Scotland as hereby extended and defined.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her Majesty, cap. 96, for the regulation of the duties of postage, certain scales of weight and rates of postage were fixed and made chargeable and payable upon, for, or in respect of letters, newspapers, parliamentary proceedings and printed papers transmitted and forwarded by the post, and various regulations were made for facilitating the transmission of such letters and papers by the post, and by the same Act powers were given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury from time to time, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of postage therein mentioned.

And whereas further powers were given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by another Act of Parliament, passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter 85, for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post Office.

And whereas it is expedient to make regulations for the transmission by the post between the Isthmus of Panama and ports on the West Coast of South America of certain packets in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers reserved to us in and by the said hereinbefore recited Acts of Parliament, and each of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do by this Warrant, under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners, by the authority of the statute in that case made and provided, order and direct as follows, that is to say:—

1. All packets consisting of printed papers (other than British newspapers) or consisting of patterns or samples of merchandize of no intrinsic value posted in Panama addressed to any other port in the United States of Columbia or to any port in Ecuador, Bolivia, Chili, or Peru, may be transmitted by the post from Panama to any other Port in the United States of Columbia or to any port in Ecuador, Bolivia, Chili, or Peru, by British packet boat, subject to the several rates of postage hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

On every such packet, if not exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid an uniform single rate of postage of three pence;

And on every such packet, if exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid progressive and additional rates of postage as follows; that is to say:

On every such packet, if exceeding four ounces and not exceeding one half of a pound in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid two rates of postage;

And on every such packet, if exceeding one half of a pound and not exceeding one pound in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid four rates of postage;

And for every additional half of a pound in weight of any such packet above the weight of one pound, there shall be charged, taken, and paid two additional rates of postage; and every fractional part of such additional half of a pound in weight shall be charged as an additional half of a pound in weight; and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this clause shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such packet would be charged with under this Warrant, if not exceeding four ounces in weight.

2. Every packet consisting of printed papers (other than British newspapers) which shall be transmitted by the post under the authority of this Warrant, shall be sent without a cover, or in a cover open at the ends or sides, and it may contain any number of separate books or other publications, prints, or maps, and any quantity of paper, parchment, or vellum, and the books or other publications, prints, or maps may be either printed, written, or plain, or any mixture of the three, and all legitimate binding, mounting, or covering of a book, publication, print, or map, or of a portion thereof, shall be allowed to pass by the post, whether such binding, mounting, or covering be loose or attached, as also rollers in the case of prints or maps, markers (whether of paper or otherwise) in the case of books, and whatsoever is necessary for the safe transmission of literary or artistic matter, or usually appertains thereto; but no packet shall contain any written letter, nor any communication in the nature of a letter, closed or open, nor any enclosure sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, nor any communication in the nature of a letter written in or upon any such packet or the cover thereof, nor shall any packet consist of or contain any photographs, drawings, prints, or other contents which may be obviously of an obscene character.

3. Every packet consisting of patterns or samples of merchandize which shall be transmitted by the post under the authority of this Warrant, shall be so transmitted in conformity with, and under, and subject to the several regulations and conditions hereinafter contained; that is to say:

9. In all cases in which any question shall hereafter arise, whether any packet or anything contained therein, transmitted under or by virtue of this Warrant, is entitled to the privileges of this Warrant, and to be so transmitted within the intent and meaning thereof, such question shall be referred to the determination of the Postmaster-General, whose decision thereupon shall be final and conclusive upon all parties.

10. The term "weight," used in this Warrant, shall mean British weight, and the several other terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning, in all respects, as they would have had if inserted in the said Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her Majesty, cap. 96.

11. The Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury may, by Warrant under their hands, duly made at any time hereafter, alter, repeal, revoke, or modify any of the rates of postage hereby fixed, or any of the regulations hereby made, and may make and establish any new or other rates or regulations in lieu thereof, and from time to time may appoint at what time the rates that may be payable are to be paid.

12. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six.
