**N**OTICE is hereby given, that the Levee which, by command of The Queen, was appointed to be held by His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales, on behalf of Her Majesty, at St. James's Palace; on Wednesday, the 6th of June next, is postponed until Tuesday, the 19th of June next.

It is The Queen's pleasure that Presentations to His Royal Highness at the Levee shall be considered as equivalent to Presentation to Her Majesty.

## REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

### *By Her Majesty's Command.*

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

## PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

The State apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court at one o'clock.

## PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS by an Act passed in the present session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to amend the law relating to contagious or infectious diseases in cattle and other animals," it is, amongst other things, enacted, that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by Order in Council, from time to time to continue, or to renew, if expired, all or any of the provisions, in the first part of that Act contained, for such time as shall be specified in such Order:

And whereas it is provided in the eleventh section of the said Act, which section is in the first part thereof, that Part I of the said Act

shall continue in force until the fifteenth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, and no longer, unless continued or renewed by Order of Her Majesty in Council:

And whereas it is provided in the twelfth, thirteenth, fourteenth, fifteenth, and sixteenth sections of the first part of the said Act as follows:—

*Slaughter of Diseased Animals.*

"12. Every Local Authority shall cause all animals affected with the cattle plague within its district to be slaughtered, and shall, by way of compensation for every animal so slaughtered, pay to the owner thereof such sum not exceeding twenty pounds, and not exceeding one half of the value of the animal immediately before it was affected with the cattle plague, as to such Local Authority may seem fit.

"13. Every Local Authority shall cause every animal that has died of cattle plague, or has been slaughtered in consequence of being affected with cattle plague within its district, to be buried as soon as possible in its skin in some proper place, and to be covered with a sufficient quantity of quicklime or other disinfectant, and with not less than six feet of earth.

"14. Every Local Authority shall, within its district, cause the yard, shed, stable, field, or other premises in which any animal affected with cattle plague has been kept while affected by the disease, or has died or been slaughtered, to be thoroughly cleansed and disinfected, and all hay, straw, litter, dung, or other articles that have been used in or about any such animal to be burnt or otherwise destroyed; and no fresh animal shall be admitted into any yard, shed, stable, field, or other premises in which any animal affected with cattle plague has been kept while affected by the disease, or has died or been slaughtered, until the expiration of thirty days after the cleansing and disinfecting of such premises in pursuance of this Act; and every Local Authority shall direct the disinfecting the clothes of, and the use of due precautions by Inspectors, Cattle Overseers, and others in contact with animals affected by the cattle plague, with a view to prevent the spreading of contagion.

"15. A Local Authority may, if it thinks fit, cause to be slaughtered any animal that has been in the same shed or stable, or in the same herd or flock, or in contact with any animal affected with cattle plague within its district; and the owner of any animal so slaughtered may either dispose of the carcase on his own account, with a licence from some Officer appointed in that behalf by a Local Authority, or may require the Local Authority to dispose of the same, in which case such Local Authority shall pay to the owner thereof, by way of compensation, such sum, not exceeding twenty-five pounds, as may equal three-fourths of the value of the animal slaughtered: Provided always, that the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, or any two or more of them, may reserve animals (ordered to be slaughtered as aforesaid) for the purpose of experimental treatment.

"16. The Local Authority may require the value of any animal slaughtered under this Act to be ascertained by Officers of the Local Authority or by arbitration, and generally may impose conditions as to evidence of the slaughter and value of the animals slaughtered: Provided that no compensation shall in any case be paid in respect of any animal found affected with cattle plague in a market or on a highway, or in respect of any animal which has been moved or otherwise dealt

with in contravention of this Act, or any Order of a Local Authority made in pursuance thereof."

And whereas by Orders of Her Majesty in Council, the last bearing date the ninth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, the provisions of the above recited sections of the first part of the said Act were continued in force beyond the said fifteenth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, until the thirtieth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six; and whereas it is considered expedient that the same be further continued:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the power vested in Her by the said Act, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the said recited provisions contained in the twelfth, thirteenth, fourteenth, fifteenth, and sixteenth sections of the first part of the said Act shall continue in force on and after the said tenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, until the first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six.

**W**HEREAS by the 410th section of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," it is enacted that, upon the completion of any new lighthouse, buoy, or beacon, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, fix such dues in respect thereof, to be paid by the master or owner of any ship which passes the same, or derives benefit therefrom, as Her Majesty may deem reasonable, and may from time to time alter the amount thereof; and that such dues shall be paid and collected in the same manner and by the same means, and subject to the same conditions, in, by, and subject to which the light-dues authorised to be levied by the said Act are paid and collected: And whereas the Port of Dublin Corporation have erected and are about to light certain new lighthouses at the undermentioned places, viz.:—

1st. At Calf Rock, situate about three-quarters of a mile off Dursey Head, the north-western point of Bantry Bay, in County Cork:

2nd. At Blacksod Point Quay, on the western side of Blacksod Bay, in County Mayo:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers vested in Her by the said recited Act, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct that, upon the completion and lighting of the said lights respectively, there shall be paid, in respect of each of the said lights for every vessel, whether British or foreign, which may pass or derive benefit from such light, the toll of three-sixteenths of a penny per ton, of the burthen of every such vessel for each time of passing or deriving benefit therefrom, if on an oversea voyage; and one-sixteenth of a penny per ton for each time of passing or deriving benefit therefrom, if on a coasting voyage; and that the said tolls in respect of each of the said lighthouses shall be levied by the Port of Dublin Corporation, subject to the gross abatement or discount of sixty per cent., and other regulations and abatements, mentioned in the new consolidated tables of light duties sanctioned by an Order in Council dated the first day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four.

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a representation bearing date the twenty-sixth day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church called Capel Curig, situate in the parish of Llandegai, in the county of Carnarvon, and in the diocese of Bangor.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Llandegai, of the parish of Trefriw, with the chapelry of Llanrochwyn thereto annexed, in the county and diocese aforesaid, of the parish of Llanllechid, in the same county and diocese, and of the portion of the parish of Llanrwst-with-Trewydir, in the said county of Carnarvon, and in the diocese of Saint Asaph, which lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such parishes and chapelry respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parish of Llandegai, of the said parish of Trefriw, with the chapelry of Llanrochwyn, of the said parish of Llanllechid, and of the said parish of Llanrwst-with-Trewydir, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church called Capel Curig as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend James Colquhoun, Bishop of the said diocese of Bangor, as such Bishop, and also as the patron in right of his see, both of the perpetual curacy of the said parish of Llandegai, and of the rectory of the said parish of Llanllechid; with the consent of the Right Reverend Thomas Vowler, Bishop of the said diocese of Saint Asaph, as such Bishop, and also as the patron in right of his see of the rectory of the said parish of Llanrwst-with-Trewydir; and with the consent of the Right Reverend Alfred, Bishop of the said diocese of Llandaff, the patron in right of his see of the rectory of the said parish of Trefriw, with the chapelry of Llanrochwyn aforesaid (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Llandegai, of the said parish of Trefriw, with the chapelry of Llanrochwyn thereto annexed, of the said parish of Llanllechid, and of the said parish of Llanrwst-with-Trewydir, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into

one consolidated chapelry for the said church called Capel Curig as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Capel Curig,' and that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of such consolidated chapelry should belong to and be exercised by the said James Colquhoun, Bishop of the said diocese of Bangor, and by his successors, Bishops of the same diocese, for ever.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto, as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The **SCHEDULE** to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Capel Curig, being:—

"All those several portions of the parish of Llandegai, in the county of Carnarvon, and in the diocese of Bangor, of the parish of Trefriw with the chapelry of Llanrochwyn, in the same county and diocese, of the parish of Llanllechid, in the same county and diocese, and of the parish of Llanrwst-with-Trewydir, in the said county of Carnarvon, and in the diocese of Saint Asaph, which are comprised within, and are bounded by, an imaginary line commencing in the centre of the bridge, at the western end of Llyn Ogwen, which carries the Holyhead turnpike-road over the River Ogwen, near where the boundary, dividing the south-eastern portion of the said parish of Llanllechid from the new parish of Glanogwen, in the county of Carnarvon, and diocese of Bangor aforesaid, meets the boundary dividing the south-eastern portion of the said parish of Llandegai from the chapelry district of Saint Anne, sometime part of such last-mentioned parish; and extending thence, first south-eastward and then south-westward, along the last-described boundary, to its junction at the southern end of Llyn-y-cwn with the boundary dividing the said parish of Llandegai from the parish of Llanberis, in the said county of Carnarvon, and diocese of Bangor; and extending thence, in a direction mainly south-eastward, along the last-described boundary to its junction at a point a little to the north of Llyn-cwm-fynnon with the boundary dividing the said parish of Llandegai from the parish of Beddgelert, in the said county of Carnarvon, and diocese of Bangor aforesaid; and extending thence south-eastward, along the last-described boundary, to its junction with the boundary which divides a detached portion of the said parish of Trefriw with the chapelry of Llanrochwyn from the parish of Beddgelert aforesaid; and extending thence, first southward and then south-eastward, along the last-described boundary to its junction at or near to the mountain gap called 'Bwlch-Rhiw-yr-y-chain' with the boundary dividing the said detached portion of the parish of Trefriw with the chapelry of Llanrochwyn from the parish of Dolwyddelen, in the said county of Carnarvon, and diocese of Bangor; and extending thence, first eastward and then north-eastward along the last-described boundary to its junction on the summit of Moel Siabod with the boundary dividing the said parish of Llanrwst with Trewydir from the parish of Dolwyddelen aforesaid; and extending thence, first south-eastward and then north-eastward, along the last-described boundary to the northernmost extremity of the said parish of Dolwyddelen at or near to the summit of the mountain called Mynydd-y-Gribin; and extending thence northward and in a straight line for a

distance of one mile, or thereabouts, to a point near the farm buildings called Craig Foris, in the middle of the stream which flows past the eastern side of the said farm buildings into the River Llugwy; and extending thence north-westward along the middle of such stream to the point where it crosses under the middle of the Holyhead turnpike-road aforesaid near to the milestone which marks the forty-second mile from Holyhead; and extending thence, first westward and then northward, along the middle of the said turnpike-road crossing the bridge over the River Llugwy called 'Pont-y-Glyn' to a point near the northern end of such bridge opposite to the middle of the south-western end of a certain cross road which leads across the mountains towards Llanrwst; and extending thence north-eastward to and along the middle of the last-described road to its junction with the road which leads past the farm called 'Glyn' into the mountains lying to the north of such farm; and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-described road, as far as its intersection by the boundary dividing the said parish of Llanrwst with Trewydir from the parish of Trefriw with the chapelry of Llanrochwyn aforesaid; and extending thence in a straight line north-westward for a distance of about two miles and a-half, passing to the south of the mountain ridge called Ffrith-newydd, and across the northern end of the mountain ridge called Clogwyn Mawr, to a point on the boundary which divides the said parish of Llanllechid from the united parishes of Llanbedr-with-Caerhun, in the said county of Carnarvon and diocese of Bangor, such point being marked by a boundary stone called 'Maenytrichwmwd,' situate on the eastern side of the road called 'Henffordd,' and distant about ten chains to the west of the southern end of Llyn Cwlyd; and extending thence, first northward, and then north-westward, along the last-described boundary, passing over the summits of Penllithrig-y-wrach and Penhelig, to the junction about ten chains south of the summit of Carnedd Llewellyn of such boundary with the boundary dividing the said parish of Llanllechid from the new parish of Glanogwen as aforesaid; and extending thence south-westward along the last-described boundary to the point in the centre of the bridge over the River Ogwen where the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the respective Registrars of the said diocese of Bangor, and of the said diocese of Saint Asaph.

George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the first and second years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and seven; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the third day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the first and second years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and seven; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church situate at Mickley, in the parish of Ovingham, in the county of Northumberland, and in the diocese of Durham.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church situate at Mickley aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles, Bishop of the said diocese of Durham (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those portions of the said parish of Ovingham, and also all that extra-parochial territory called "Master's Close," which are respectively described in the schedule hereunder written, and which, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and are thereon coloured pink and green respectively, should be assigned to the said church situate at Mickley aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Mickley.'

"And with the like consent of the said Charles, Bishop of the said diocese of Durham (testified as aforesaid), we further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns, and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being.

"We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Mickley, being:—

"All those several portions of the parish of Ovingham, in the county of Northumberland, and in the diocese of Durham, which are situate to the south of an imaginary line extending along the middle of the River Tyne; and also all that extra-parochial territory containing by admeasurement forty-two acres and a half, or thereabouts,

which is locally situate within the said portions of the parish of Ovingham aforesaid, and which is called 'Master's Close.'"

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Durham.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint James, situate in the parish of Saint Michael, Ashton-under-Lyne, in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Manchester.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Saint Michael, Ashton-under-Lyne, and of the new parish of Christ Church, Ashton-under-Lyne, in the county and diocese aforesaid, and of the new parish of Hurst, in the same county and diocese, which lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such parish and new parishes respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parish of Saint Michael, Ashton-under-Lyne, of the said new parish of Christ Church, Ashton-under-Lyne, and of the said new parish of Hurst, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint James, situate in the parish of Saint Michael, Ashton-under-Lyne as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend James Prince, Bishop of the said diocese

of Manchester, as such Bishop, and also as the alternate patron in right of his see both of the perpetual curacy of the said new parish of Christ Church, Ashton-under-Lyne, and of the perpetual curacy of the said new parish of Hurst, and with the consent of the Right Honorable John, Earl Russell, the First Lord of your Majesty's Treasury, acting on behalf of your Majesty as the other alternate patron in right of the Crown of the same perpetual curacies, and with the consent of the Right Honorable George Harry, Earl of Stamford and Warrington, the patron of the rectory of the parish of Saint Michael, Ashton-under-Lyne aforesaid (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Saint Michael, Ashton-under-Lyne, of the said new parish of Christ Church, Ashton-under-Lyne, and of the said new parish of Hurst, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated, and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint James, situate in the parish of Saint Michael, Ashton-under-Lyne as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint James, Ashton-under-Lyne,' and that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of such consolidated chapelry should belong to and be exercised jointly by the said James Prince, Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester, and his successors, Bishops of the same diocese, by the said George Harry, Earl of Stamford and Warrington, and his heirs, by Reginald Whittaker, of Hurst House, in the said county of Lancaster, Manufacturer, and his heirs, by Arthur Frederick Payne, of Oughtrington Hall, in the county of Chester, Esquire, and by Alexander Butler Rowley, of Hurst, in the said county of Lancaster, Manufacturer, in whom, as trustees, the same right of presentation and appointment is vested under and according to the provisions of a certain deed or articles of agreement, bearing date the twenty-first day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, made pursuant to the hereinbefore-mentioned Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy, and to the Act of the eleventh and twelfth years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and deposited in the registry of the said diocese of Manchester, and in which deed or articles of agreement are contained provisions for appointing from time to time trustees in the room of the said Arthur Frederick Payne, and of the said Alexander Butler Rowley.

In the Churchyard, and in the Wesleyan and Independent Burial-grounds, Middlewich, to the thirtieth of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven.

**LEVENSHULME, MANCHESTER.** — Forthwith in the Wesleyan Chapel and in the chapelyard thereof.

**RHUDDLAN.** — Forthwith in the church and in the old part of the churchyard, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, every coffin buried in which shall be enclosed in stone or brickwork properly cemented or in concrete, and except in earthen graves which have not been buried in for the preceding fourteen years, every coffin in which shall be enclosed by concrete ; also burials in such graves to be limited to the dead of the Ecclesiastical District of Rhuddlan, and the widows or widowers of those already buried in the old part of the churchyard.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the twenty-third day of July next :

**WHEREAS** by an Act passed in the session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, intituled "An Act to prevent until the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals," and from time to time continued by divers subsequent Acts, and lastly by an Act passed in the session of the twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and nineteen, it is (amongst other things) enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time to make such orders and regulations as to them may seem necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal to or from such parts or places as they may designate in such Order or Orders, of sheep, cattle, horses, swine or other animals, or of meat, skin, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals, or of hay, straw, fodder, or other articles likely to propagate infection, and to make any other Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations ; and that all provisions for any of the purposes aforesaid in any such Order or Orders contained shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in the said Act :

And whereas the said Act has been amended and explained by an Act passed in the 29th year of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the Act of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and seven, to prevent the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals :



And whereas a contagious or infectious disorder, generally designated as the "Cattle Plague," has lately appeared, and now prevails, amongst cattle in England and Wales :

And whereas divers Orders in pursuance of the said first-recited Act have been made by the Lords of the said Council in relation to the Cattle Plague, which were consolidated and amended by Orders bearing date the 24th day of March and 11th day of April, 1866 :

And whereas certain exceptions are made in such Orders respectively, in regard to cattle brought from Ireland into England or Scotland, and it is now advisable that such exceptions should be rescinded and annulled, in respect of the district hereinafter mentioned.

Now, therefore, the Lords of the Council do hereby rescind and annul, from the fifteenth day of June instant, so much of the said Orders, whether contained in the articles or in the schedules, as authorizes the acceptance of a certificate from a Local Authority in respect of cattle landed from Ireland in place of the declaration and certificates, or other evidence or testimony required in respect of cattle brought into or removed from any other place in England or Scotland, in every case where such cattle shall have been moved out of any part of the province of Ulster during a period of twenty-one days next preceding their being landed in England or Scotland respectively.

And the said Lords do order that any such cattle which may be moved out of the province of Ulster may be landed from Ireland at any place in England and Scotland respectively, and be removed from that place subject to such provisions and conditions as apply to other cattle removed from that place, if the person bringing such cattle from Ireland or seeking to move them produce to the Local Authority or its appointed officer at

such place, a licence purporting to be signed by a Justice of the Peace in Ireland, and dated six days before the landing of such cattle, in the form and accompanied with the certificate and declaration also in the forms following ; and if any person shall move any cattle landed from Ireland in England or Scotland, in contravention of this Order, he shall be guilty of an offence, and be liable to the penalty imposed by such Orders respectively.

This Order shall be construed in like manner as the said Orders of the 24th day of March and the 11th day of April, and all the provisions of such last-mentioned Orders now in force shall apply to this Order, except so far as they may be inconsistent with anything herein contained.

Vessels arriving from ports infected with cholera can perform quarantine only at the stations at the Dardanelles, Smyrna, Salonica, Beyrout, Cyprus in Crete, and Tripoli, in the Barbary States.

The buoy should be left to the southward and eastward, but small vessels may cross the shoal southward of the buoy, in 12 feet water, by bringing the Semaphore jetty light to bear E. by S.  $\frac{1}{4}$  S., and anchor according to draft of water off the end of the jetty. Large vessels should avoid crossing the shoal southward of the buoy, by bringing the jetty light to bear S.E. by E.  $\frac{1}{4}$  E., and not stand further in than to have the light vessel bearing N.  $\frac{1}{4}$  W.

The best anchorage for large vessels is anywhere northward of the bell buoy, with the light ship bearing from North to N.E. in 4 or 5 fathoms at low water. Vessels waiting for orders will find it convenient to anchor tolerably close to the buoy; whilst those only waiting for tide to pass the bar, should anchor with the jetty light bearing S.E., and the light vessel from N.N.E. to N.E. Small vessels may anchor inside the bell buoy with the light vessel bearing from North to N. by W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  W., and the jetty light from E. by S. to E.S.E.

It is high water at full and change, at the outer bar of Port Adelaide, at 4h. 30m.; and the rise is about 8 feet. The tidal signals are shown from

the Semaphore flagstaff on the hill, but as strangers are required to take a pilot, it is unnecessary to describe them here. The signal for a steam tug is the ensign at the fore. A signalman is stationed on the hill above the inner end of the jetty, to attend to vessels' signals.
