EXTRACT of a Despatch which has been addressed to the Earl of Clarendon by Sir John Crampton, Her Majesty's Minister at Madrid, dated the 16th of June :—

I did not omit to urge upon the Spanish Government the expediency of making public, with the least possible delay, the decisions which may be come to by the Spanish Central and Local Boards of Health, as to the ports of Great Britain which they consider to be "foul" or "suspected," in consequence of its being supposed that cases of cholera morbus have occurred at them, or in their neighbourhood.

According to the present practice, these decisions, if taken by the Central Board at Madrid, are communicated to the Local Boards by instructions, and if taken by the Local Boards, are reported to the Central Board, at Madrid, for approval.

They appear to be sometimes made public in the local newspapers or official bulletins, or else to become known only by their application to the cases of vessels arriving in Spain from the ports to which they refer.

It was for this reason that it appeared to me that it would be some mitigation of the inconveniences and losses to which British shipping is exposed in Spain in regard to quarantine, if as little time as possible should be lost in making known to British subjects the nature of the quarantine to which they would have to submit on arriving in this country from ports considered by the Spanish Authorities to be infected with contagious diseases, and that the best way of effecting this would be the publication in the Gazette of Madrid of all such decisions.

In this the Spanish Minister for Foreign Affairs agreed with me, and promised that he would move the Minister of the Interior to adopt the suggestion.

It appears to me, however, that the most effectual way of informing British shipowners, so far as it can be done beforehand, of the quarantines likely to be imposed upon their vessels in Spain, would be, that Her Majesty's Consuls at the Spanish ports should keep themselves in communication with the Local Authorities upon the subject, and immediately communicate to Her Majesty's Government the decisions of the Spanish Authorities, whether emanating from the Central

Board of Health at Madrid, or from the Local Board at the port at which they reside.

Although this would not, under the provisions of the present law of health, in all cases ensure to a British ship-master a knowledge of the nature and amount of quarantine which he would have to undergo on his arrival in Spain, it would often apprise him of it.

The suggestion which recommends a notification by the Spanish Government of its resolution to regard all arrivals from British ports, even if bearers of clean bills of health as subject to quarantine, has already been complied with by the issue of the Circular No. 151, published in the Official Bulletin of the Province of Pontevedra, because by the decision therein notified, that "all the ports near Liverpool are to be considered foul, and all the ports of Great Britain notoriously compromised," vessels from Great Britain are, according to the 30th Article of the sanitary law, subjected to quarantine whether they bear clean bills of health or not; and the species and degree of quarantine to be applied to them is regulated by the other provisions of the same law.

The suggestion which recommends that "Ports should be specified on the Spanish sea-board at which vessels arriving from non-infected ports with clean bills of health may perform quarantine," could have no application under the operation of the present law, because by it such vessels would either be at once admitted to pratique, or else, in case of an official decision in Spain having declared the ports they came from infected, and thereby rendered their clean bills of health of no avail, they would be subject to quarantine either at a foul lazaretto or at a lazaretto of observation, as the case might be, under the provisions of the law.

The misapprehension under which most of those who have complained of the manner in which quarantine has been imposed in Spain, is that the enforcement of it by the authorities upon a vessel bearing a clean bill of health is in every case "illegal." This is, however, not so.

The Spanish Boards of Health, it is true, establish quarantines often extremely vexatious and detrimental to commerce, as well as of unnecessary severity, but generally speaking the letter of the law is observed.

The 30th Article of the sanitary laws of 1855, which is generally appealed to as enabling vessels

with clean bills of health to pratique, stands as follows :—

“Art. 30. Todo buque procedente del extranjero con patente limpia visada por el Agente Consular Español, con buenas condiciones higiénicas, y sin accidentes sospechosos en el viaje se admitirá desde luego á libre plática sin mas que la visita y reconocimiento, *a no ser que conste oficialmente que en el punto o puerto de donde proceda el buque se habia desarrollado alguna enfermedad contagiosa.*”

By the last clause your Lordship will perceive that the presentation of a clean bill of health does not ensure a vessel against quarantine in case the Spanish Boards of Health may, in the meantime, have received information which they consider to be official, that a contagious malady has appeared at the port of departure, even when the Spanish Consul there, from ignorance of the existence of such a malady, or from its having declared itself after the departure of the vessel, has countersigned her clean bill of health. A circumstance which renders the occurrence of such decisions on the part of the Spanish Boards of Health very frequent, and often unexpected is the entire distrust felt in this country, and by its government of the efficiency of the sanitary measures in force in Great Britain.

The consequence of this is, that little or no attention is paid by the Spanish authorities to a public announcement by the authorities in Great Britain that a contagious malady has ceased to exist, or to the absence of any announcement that such malady exists; any report which may come to the knowledge of the Spanish Boards of Health, which they deem credible, that contagious malady has shown itself in an English port or place, is considered by them to be sufficient to authorize them to adopt measures of precaution, which are rigidly enforced until they themselves, from their own sources of information, become convinced that all danger has disappeared.

In the present instance it may be announced as a certainty that all vessels coming to Spain from Great Britain will be subjected to quarantine, either at a foul lazaretto or at a lazaretto of observation, as their ports of departure may be judged to be foul “sucios,” or compromised “comprometidos,” and that it would be impossible to assure to a shipmaster beforehand to which of these annoyances he will be exposed.

Under these circumstances, and their being in the present state of public feeling in Spain upon this subject no chance of any relaxation of the law of health, I can see no complete remedy for the inconvenience to which our commerce with this country will be subjected, if unfortunately the cholera should prevail in any degree in Great Britain this summer.

NOTE. — Translation of the Article quoted in this Despatch.

“Every ship arriving from abroad with a clean bill of health viséd by the Spanish Consular Agent, in good sanitary condition, without suspicious accidents during the voyage, will be at once admitted to free pratique after the visit and examination, *except it be known officially that some contagious malady has broken out in the place or port from whence the ship sailed.*”

WHEREAS by the 410th section of “The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854,” it is enacted that, upon the completion of any new lighthouse, buoy, or beacon, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, fix such dues in respect thereof, to be paid by the master or owner of any ship which passes the same, or derives benefit therefrom, as Her Majesty may deem reasonable, and may from time to time alter the amount thereof; and that such dues shall be paid and collected in the same manner and by the same means, and subject to the same conditions, in, by, and subject to which the light-dues authorised to be levied by the said Act are paid and collected: And whereas the Port of Dublin Corporation have erected and are about to light certain new lighthouses at the undermentioned places, viz. :—

1st. At Calf Rock, situate about three-quarters of a mile off Dursey Head, the north-western point of Bantry Bay, in County Cork :

2nd. At Blacksod Point Quay, on the western side of Blacksod Bay, in County Mayo :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers vested in Her by the said recited Act, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct that, upon the completion and lighting of the said lights respectively, there shall be paid, in respect of each of the said lights, for every vessel, whether British or foreign, which may pass or derive benefit from such light, the toll of three-sixteenths of a penny per ton, of the burthen of every such vessel for each time of passing or deriving benefit therefrom, if on an oversea voyage; and one-sixteenth of a penny per ton for each time of passing or deriving benefit therefrom, if on a coasting voyage; and that the said tolls in respect of each of the said lighthouses shall be levied by the Port of Dublin Corporation, subject to the gross abatement or discount of sixty per cent., and other regulations and abatements, mentioned in the new consolidated tables of light duties sanctioned by an Order in Council dated the first day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, intituled "An Act to prevent until the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and to the end of the then Session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle,

"and other animals," and from time to time continued by divers subsequent Acts, and lastly by an Act passed in the session of the twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and nineteen, it is (amongst other things) enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time, to make such Orders and Regulations as to them may seem necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal to or from such parts or places as they may designate in such Order or Orders, of sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals, or of meat, skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals, or of hay, straw, fodder, or other articles likely to propagate infection, and to make any other Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations; and that all provisions for any of the purposes aforesaid in any such Order or Orders contained shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in the said Act:

And whereas the said Act has been amended and explained by an Act passed in the twenty-ninth year of Her present Majesty's reign, intitled "An Act to amend the Act of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and seven, to prevent the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals:"

And whereas a contagious or infectious disorder, generally designated as the "Cattle Plague," has lately appeared, and now prevails, amongst cattle in England and Wales:

And whereas divers Orders have been made by the Lords of the said Council in relation to the cattle plague, which were consolidated and amended by an Order bearing date the 24th day of March last:

And whereas provisions are contained in the said Order of the Privy Council to regulate the movement of cattle on any highway, and such movement without a licence as therein described is prohibited, except for a distance not exceeding five hundred yards, from one part of the same farm to the other:

And whereas the holding of markets for the sale of cattle is prohibited by the said Order until the 1st day of June, 1866, except in the case of a market held with the licence of the Privy Council for the sale of cattle intended for immediate slaughter, which term hath, by an Order of the said Council, been extended from the said 1st day of June until the said Lords of the Council shall otherwise direct:

And whereas there is a market held in the borough of Newcastle-upon-Tyne, in the county of Northumberland, which is contiguous to the borough of Gateshead, in the county of Durham, for the sale of cattle, and the holding thereof has been licensed by the Lords of the said Council, by instrument bearing date the 31st day of May last, for the sale of cattle intended for immediate slaughter, so long as the said above-mentioned Orders shall remain in force, or until the revocation thereof, as therein provided, subject to all the conditions, provisions, and regulations in the said first-mentioned Order contained applicable to such market:

And whereas it is provided by the said Order of the 24th of March last, that in the case of cattle brought to any market other than the Metropolitan

Cattle Market, they shall in no case be taken beyond such limits as may be described in the licence of the Privy Council allowing such market, and under such conditions with respect to their movement within such limits as may be imposed by such licence:

And whereas in the said licence for the holding of the above-mentioned market, it is provided that no cattle brought into the said market shall be taken alive beyond the district comprised within the outer municipal boundaries of the said two boroughs, and it is expedient that certain other regulations should be made in this behalf:

Now, therefore, the Lords of the Council do hereby order, that notwithstanding such provision in the said licence, cattle other than such as may be brought by sea from any place out of the United Kingdom into the port of Newcastle-upon-Tyne, sold in the said market, may, until the thirtieth day of September next, if the said licence shall continue so long in force, be moved to any slaughter-house in the borough of Sunderland, in the said county of Durham, but not further, to be there immediately slaughtered under such regulations as the Local Authority for the county of Durham shall, from time to time, make and issue in regard to the movement as well as the times, places, and manner of the slaughtering of such cattle:

Provided, that the cattle shall be moved by railway only from Newcastle-upon-Tyne to the borough of Sunderland: Provided also, that nothing herein contained shall allow the cattle to be kept alive for more than four days after exposure in the said market.

Every such regulation shall be published by the said Local Authority in some newspaper circulating in the boroughs of Newcastle-upon-Tyne and Sunderland, and by a notice affixed in some conspicuous place in the said market.

Every person who shall contravene this Order, or any regulation of the Local Authority made under it, shall be guilty of an offence, and be subject to the like penalty as in the case of a contravention of any regulation in the said Order of the 24th of March last.

Her Majesty has been pleased to approve of Captain J. B. Hammond bearing the designation of Captain-Commandant of the 2nd West Riding of Yorkshire Artillery Volunteer Corps.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter 96, for the regulation of the duties of postage certain scales of weight and rates of postage were fixed and made chargeable and payable upon, or in respect of letters, newspapers, parliamentary proceedings, and printed papers, transmitted and forwarded by the post, and various regulations were made for facilitating the transmission of such letters and papers by the post; and by the same Act powers were given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, from time to time, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of postage therein mentioned;

And whereas further powers were given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury by another Act of Parliament passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter 85, for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post Office;

And whereas certain powers are also given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury by another Act of Parliament made and passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter 27, for amending the laws relating to the stamp duties on newspapers, and for providing for the transmission by post of printed periodical publications;

And whereas the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers vested in them in and by the said before-mentioned Acts, or of some or one of them, and of all other powers enabling them in that behalf, have, from time to time by divers Warrants under their hands, authorized and directed that packets, consisting of printed newspapers, or of printed papers other than newspapers, or of books, publications, or works of literature or art, or of printed votes and proceedings of the Imperial Parliament, or of patterns or samples of merchandize, might be transmitted by the post from the United Kingdom to certain foreign countries at certain rates of postage, and under and subject to certain conditions, regulations, and restrictions in and by the said several Warrants respectively specified and mentioned;

And whereas it is expedient to reduce the postage now chargeable on certain of the said packets in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers reserved to us in and by the hereinbefore-recited Acts of Parliament, and each of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners, by the authority of the statute in that case made and provided, order, direct, and declare as follows; that is to say:

1. That all packets consisting of printed newspapers, exceeding eight ounces in weight, posted in the United Kingdom addressed to France, or to foreign countries through France, or to Italy, or to foreign countries through Italy, or to Spain, and transmitted by the post from the United Kingdom to France, or to foreign countries through France (the conveyance through France, in such last-mentioned cases, being otherwise than in closed mails); or to Italy, or to foreign countries through Italy, or to Spain, under the authority of any Warrant or Warrants of the Commissioners

of Her Majesty's Treasury now in force relating thereto, and all packets consisting of printed papers other than newspapers, or of books, publications, or works of literature or art, or of printed votes and proceedings of the Imperial Parliament, or of patterns or samples of merchandize, exceeding eight ounces in weight, posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to any foreign country, and respectively transmitted by the post from the United Kingdom to any foreign country, under the authority of any Warrant or Warrants of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury now in force relating thereto, shall, in lieu of being charged with the postage payable thereon respectively for such transmission thereof as hereinbefore mentioned, according to the scale of weight and number of rates contained in or referred to by the said referred-to Warrants respectively, or any or either of them, be charged with such postage according to the scale of weight and number of rates following; that is to say:

For every additional four ounces in weight of any such packet above the weight of eight ounces, there shall be charged, taken, and paid one additional rate of postage; and every fractional part of such additional four ounces in weight shall be charged as an additional four ounces in weight; and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this Warrant shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such packet of the weight of, but not exceeding, four ounces, would be charged with under any such Warrants or Warrant respectively as hereinbefore mentioned.

2. The several Warrants hereinbefore referred to, shall, save so far as the same are respectively altered or affected by this present Warrant, or by any other Warrant or Warrants now in force altering or affecting the same, continue in full force and effect as fully and effectually as if the scale of weight and number of rates mentioned and contained in the first clause of this Warrant had been inserted in the said referred-to Warrants in lieu of those therein contained applicable to packets exceeding eight ounces in weight.

3. Nothing herein contained shall be construed to extend to or to affect any packets of whatever description transmitted by the post under the authority of a certain Warrant under the hands of two of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, bearing date the 14th day of June, 1859, relating to letters and packets transmitted by the post between the United Kingdom and Portugal, which said Warrant, and everything therein contained, shall have the same force and effect in all respects as if this Warrant had not been signed.

4. The Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury may, by Warrant under their hands, duly made at any time hereafter, alter, repeal, revoke, or modify any of the rates of postage hereby fixed or altered, or any of the regulations hereby made, and may make and establish any new or other rates or regulations in lieu thereof, and from time to time may appoint at what time the rates that may be payable are to be paid.

5. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six.
