A PROCLAMATION.

VICTORIA, R.

WHEREAS We are happily at peace with all Sovereigns, Powers, and States ;

And whereas, notwithstanding Our utmost exertions to preserve peace between all the Sovereign Powers and States now at war, hostilities have unhappily commenced between His Imperial Majesty the Emperor of Austria, His Majesty the King of Prussia, His Majesty the King of Italy, and the Germanic Confederation ;

And whereas a state of war now exists between His Imperial Majesty the Emperor of Austria, His Majesty the King of Prussia, His Majesty the King of Italy, and the Germanic Confederation, and between their respective subjects and others inhabiting within their countries, territories, or dominions ;

And whereas We are on terms of friendship and amicable intercourse with all and each of these Sovereigns, and with the Germanic Confederation, and with their several subjects, and others inhabiting within their countries, territories, or dominions ;

And whereas great numbers of Our loyal subjects reside and carry on commerce, and possess property and establishments, and enjoy various rights and privileges, within the dominions of each of the aforesaid Sovereigns and States, protected by the faith of Treaties between Us and each of the aforesaid Sovereigns and States ;

And whereas We, being desirous of preserving to Our subjects the blessings of peace, which they now happily enjoy, are firmly purposed and determined to abstain altogether from taking any part, directly or indirectly, in the war now unhappily existing between the said Sovereigns and States, their subjects and territories, and to remain at peace with, and to maintain a peaceful and friendly intercourse with all and with each of them, and their respective subjects, and others inhabiting within any of their countries, territories, and dominions, and to maintain a strict and impartial neutrality in the said hostilities and war, unhappily existing between them ;

We, therefore, have thought fit, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Our Royal Proclamation.

And We do hereby strictly charge and command all Our loving subjects to govern themselves

accordingly, and to observe a strict neutrality in and during the aforesaid hostilities and war, and to abstain from violating or contravening either the laws and statutes of the realm in this behalf, or the law of nations in relation thereto, as they will answer to the contrary at their peril.

And whereas in and by a certain statute made and passed in the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, entitled "An Act to prevent the enlisting or engagement of His Majesty's subjects to serve in a foreign service, and the fitting out or equipping, in His Majesty's dominions, vessels for warlike purposes without His Majesty's licence," it is amongst other things declared and enacted as follows:—"That if any person within any part of the United Kingdom, or in any part of His Majesty's dominions beyond the seas, shall, without the leave and licence of His Majesty, for that purpose first had and obtained as aforesaid, equip, furnish, fit out, or arm, or attempt or endeavour to equip, furnish, fit out, or arm, or procure to be equipped, furnished, fitted out, or armed, or shall knowingly aid, assist, or be concerned in the equipping, furnishing, fitting out, or arming of any ship, or vessel, with intent or in order that such ship or vessel shall be employed in the service of any foreign Prince, State, or Potentate, or of any foreign colony, province, or part of any province or people, or of any person or persons exercising or assuming to exercise any powers of government in or over any foreign State, colony, province, or part of any province or people, as a transport or store-ship, or with intent to cruize or commit hostilities against any Prince, State, or Potentate, or against the subjects or citizens of any Prince, State, or Potentate, or against the persons exercising, or assuming to exercise, the powers of government in any colony, province, or part of any province or country, or against the inhabitants of any foreign colony, province, or part of any province or country, with whom His Majesty shall not then be at war, or shall, within the United Kingdom, or any of His Majesty's dominions, or in any settlement, colony, territory, island, or place, belonging or subject to His Majesty, issue or deliver any commission for any ship or vessel, to the intent that such ship or vessel shall be employed as aforesaid, every such person so offending shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanour, and shall, upon conviction thereof, upon any information or indictment, be punished by fine and imprisonment, or either of them, at the discretion of the Court in which such offender shall be convicted ; and

every such ship or vessel, with the tackle, apparel, and furniture, together with all the materials, arms, ammunition, and stores, which may belong to or be on board of any such ship or vessel, shall be forfeited; and it shall be lawful for any officer of His Majesty's Customs or Excise, or any officer of His Majesty's Navy, who is by law empowered to make seizures for any forfeiture incurred under any of the laws of Customs or Excise, or the laws of trade and navigation, to seize such ships and vessels aforesaid, and in such places and in such manner, in which the officers of His Majesty's Customs or Excise, and the officers of His Majesty's Navy, are empowered respectively to make seizures under the laws of Customs and Excise, or under the laws of trade and navigation; and that every such ship and vessel, with the tackle, apparel, and furniture, together with all the materials, arms, ammunition, and stores, which may belong to, or be on board of such ship or vessel, may be prosecuted, and condemned, in the like manner, and in such Courts as ships or vessels may be prosecuted and condemned for any breach of the laws made for the protection of the revenues of Customs and Excise, or of the laws of trade and navigation."

And it is, in and by the said Act, further enacted, "That if any person in any part of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or in any part of His Majesty's dominions beyond the seas, without the leave and licence of His Majesty for that purpose first had and obtained as aforesaid, shall, by adding to the number of the guns of such vessel, or changing those on board for other guns, or by the addition of any equipment for war, increase or augment, or procure to be increased or augmented, or shall be knowingly concerned in increasing or augmenting, the warlike force of any ship or vessel of war, or cruiser, or other armed vessel, which, at the time of her arrival in any part of the United Kingdom, or any of His Majesty's dominions, was a ship of war, cruiser, or armed vessel, in the service of any foreign Prince, State, or Potentate, or of any person or persons exercising, or assuming to exercise, any powers of government in or over any colony, province, or part of any province or people belonging to the subjects of any such Prince, State, or Potentate, or to the inhabitants of any colony, province, or part of any province or country, under the control of any person or persons so exercising, or assuming to exercise, the powers of government, every such person so offending shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanour, and shall, upon being convicted thereof, upon any information or indictment, be punished by fine and imprisonment, or either of them, at the discretion of the Court before which such offender shall be convicted."

Now, in order that none of Our subjects may unwarily render themselves liable to the penalties imposed by the said statute, We do hereby strictly command that no person or persons whatsoever, do commit any act, matter, or thing whatsoever contrary to the provisions of the said Statute, upon pain of the several penalties by the said Statute imposed, and of Our high displeasure.

And We do hereby further warn and admonish all Our loving subjects, and all persons whatsoever entitled to our protection, to observe towards each and all of the aforesaid Sovereigns and States, their subjects and territories, and towards all belligerents whatsoever, with whom we are at peace, the duties of neutrality; and to respect, in all and each of them, the exercise of those belligerent rights which We and Our Royal Predecessors have always claimed to exercise.

And We do hereby further warn all Our loving subjects, and all persons whatsoever entitled to Our protection, that if any of them shall presume, in contempt of this Our Royal Proclamation, and of Our high displeasure, to do any acts in derogation of their duty as subjects of a neutral Sovereign, in a war between other Sovereigns and States, or in violation or contravention of the law of nations in that behalf, as more especially by breaking or endeavouring to break, any blockade lawfully and actually established by or on behalf of any or either of the said Sovereigns and States, by carrying officers, soldiers, despatches, arms, ammunition, military stores or materials, or any article or articles considered and deemed to be contraband of war, according to the law or modern usages of nations, for the use or service of any or either of the said Sovereigns and States, that all persons so offending, together with their ships and goods, will rightfully incur, and be justly liable to, hostile capture, and to the penalties denounced by the law of nations in that behalf.

And We do hereby give notice, that all Our subjects and persons entitled to our protection who may misconduct themselves in the premises, will do so at their peril and of their own wrong; and that they will in no wise obtain any protection from Us against such capture or such penalties as aforesaid, but will, on the contrary, incur Our high displeasure by such misconduct.

Given at Our Court at *Windsor*, this twenty-seventh day of *June*, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, and in the thirtieth year of Our reign.

COPY of a Letter addressed by the Earl of Clarendon to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty.*

Foreign Office,
June 26, 1866.

MY LORDS,

HER Majesty being fully determined to observe the duties of neutrality during the existing hostilities between the Emperor of Austria, the King of Prussia, the King of Italy, and the German Confederation, and being moreover resolved to prevent, as far as possible, the use of Her Majesty's harbours, ports, and coasts, and the waters within Her Majesty's territorial jurisdiction, in aid of the warlike purposes of either belligerent, has commanded me to communicate to your Lordships, for your guidance, the following rules, which are to be treated and enforced as Her Majesty's orders and directions.

Her Majesty is pleased further to command that these rules shall be put in force in the United Kingdom and in the Channel Islands on and after the fourth day of July, and in Her Majesty's territories and possessions beyond the seas six days after the day when the Governor or other chief authority of each of such territories or possessions respectively shall have notified and published the same; stating in such notification that the said rules are to be obeyed by all persons within the same territories and possessions.

During the continuance of the present hostilities, all ships of war of either belligerent are prohibited

from making use of any port or roadstead in the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or in the Channel Islands, or in any of Her Majesty's colonies or foreign possessions or dependencies, or of any waters subject to the territorial jurisdiction of the British Crown, as a station or place of resort for any warlike purpose, or for the purpose of obtaining any facilities of warlike equipment; and no ship of war of either belligerent shall hereafter be permitted to sail out of or leave any port, roadstead, or waters subject to British jurisdiction, from which any vessel of the other belligerent (whether the same shall be a ship of war or a merchant ship) shall have previously departed, until after the expiration of at least twenty-four hours from the departure of such last-mentioned vessel beyond the territorial jurisdiction of Her Majesty.

2. If any ship of war of either belligerent shall, after the time when this Order shall be first notified and put in force in the United Kingdom and in the Channel Islands, and in the several Colonies and foreign possessions and dependencies of Her Majesty respectively, enter any port, roadstead, or waters belonging to Her Majesty, either in the United Kingdom or in the Channel Islands, or in any of Her Majesty's Colonies or foreign possessions or dependencies, such vessel shall be required to depart and to put to sea within twenty-four hours after her entrance into such port, roadstead, or waters, except in case of stress of weather, or of her requiring provisions or things necessary for the subsistence of her crew, or repairs; in either of which cases the authorities of the port or of the nearest port (as the case may be) shall require her to put to sea as soon as possible after the expiration of such period of twenty-four hours, without permitting her to take in supplies, beyond what may be necessary for her immediate use; and no such vessel which may have been allowed to remain within British waters for the purpose of repair shall continue in any such port, roadstead, or waters, for a longer period than twenty-four hours after her necessary repairs shall have been completed. Provided, nevertheless, that in all cases in which there shall be any vessels (whether ships of war or merchant ships) of the said belligerent parties in the same port, roadstead, or waters, within the territorial jurisdiction of Her Majesty, there shall be an interval of not less than twenty-four hours between the departure therefrom of any such vessel (whether a ship of war or a merchant ship) of the one belligerent, and the subsequent departure therefrom of any ship of war of the other belligerent; and the time hereby limited for the departure of such ships of war respectively shall always, in case of necessity, be extended so far as may be requisite for giving effect to this proviso, but not further or otherwise.

3. No ship of war of either belligerent shall hereafter be permitted, while in any port, roadstead, or waters subject to the territorial jurisdiction of Her Majesty, to take in any supplies, except provisions and such other things as may be requisite for the subsistence of her crew, and except so much coal only as may be sufficient to carry such vessel to the nearest port of her own country, or to some nearer destination, and no coal shall again be supplied to any such ship of war in the same or any other port, roadstead, or waters subject to the territorial jurisdiction of Her Majesty, without special permission, until after the expiration of three months from the time when such coal may have been last supplied to her within British waters as aforesaid.

4. Armed ships of either party are interdicted from carrying prizes made by them into the ports, harbours, roadsteads, or waters of the United Kingdom or any of Her Majesty's colonies or possessions abroad.

WHEREAS Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, by an Order reciting that, whereas it had been represented to Her Majesty, that certain contagious or infectious disorders were then prevalent among cattle, in the dominions and territories situated in Europe, belonging to His Majesty the King of the Netherlands, and that there was danger of the said disorders being introduced into this country by means of cattle from such countries or places, did order, that on and after the twenty-eighth day of March then instant, no cattle should be imported or introduced into the United Kingdom, which should come from or should have been at any place within the aforesaid territories and dominions, situate in Europe, belonging to His Majesty the King of the Netherlands; and also that on and after the said twenty-eighth day of March then instant, no cattle should be imported or introduced into the United Kingdom which should be, or should have been, on board any vessels at the same time with any cattle which should have come from, or should have been within, the aforesaid territories and dominions.

And Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, did thereby further order that, in the event of any cattle being landed in any portion of the United Kingdom, contrary to the provisions of that Order, all such cattle, the importation or introduction whereof was thereby prohibited as aforesaid, should, upon their arrival in this country, be destroyed or otherwise disposed of, as the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Customs might direct; and that that Order should continue in force until revoked by any further Order; and that the word "cattle" should include sheep as well as bulls, cows, oxen, heifers, and calves.

And whereas it is advisable that this Order should be revoked to the extent hereinafter set forth.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth hereby revoke so much of the said Order as would apply to cattle

the produce of the provinces of Friesland and Groningen, parts of the said dominions belonging to His said Majesty the King of the Netherlands, and doth hereby authorise any such cattle to be imported into any port or place in Great Britain, from the ports of Harlingen, in the province of Friesland, and Delfzyl, in the province of Groningen, only, subject nevertheless to all the regulations heretofore or hereafter to be made by the Lords of the said Council, or by any Local Authority under the Order of such lords, applicable to the importation of foreign cattle or sheep into any port or place in Great Britain.

This Order shall be construed as the said recited Order of the twenty-fourth day of March last, and shall continue in force until revoked.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS Her Majesty, at the Court held at Buckingham Palace, the 24th day of March last, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, by an Order reciting that whereas it had been represented to Her Majesty that certain contagious or infectious disorders were then prevalent among cattle in the dominions and territories situated in Europe belonging to His Majesty the King of the Netherlands, and that there was danger of the said disorders being introduced into this country by means of cattle from such countries or places, did order that, on and after the twenty-eighth day of March then instant, no cattle should be imported or introduced into the United Kingdom which should come from or should have been at any place within the aforesaid territories and dominions situate in Europe, belonging to His Majesty the King of the Netherlands; and also that, on and after the said twenty-eighth day of March then instant, no cattle should be imported or introduced into the United Kingdom which should be or should have been on board any vessels at the same time with any cattle which should have come from or should have been within the aforesaid territories and dominions;

And whereas by an Order, bearing even date herewith, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, hath revoked so much of the said Order as would apply to cattle the produce of the provinces of Friesland and Groningen, parts of the said dominions belonging to His said Majesty the King of the Netherlands, and authorised any such cattle to be imported into any port or place in Great Britain from the ports of Harlingen, in the province of Friesland, and Delfzyl, in the province of Groningen, only, subject nevertheless to all the regulations heretofore or hereafter to be made by the Lords of the said Council, or by any Local Authority under the Order of such Lords, applicable to the importation of foreign cattle or sheep into any port or place in Great Britain;

And whereas it has been represented to Her Majesty that it is advisable that certain provisions should be made with reference to the horns, hoofs,

and raw or wet hides and skins of cattle to be imported from the dominions and territories aforesaid into the United Kingdom;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that on and after the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, no horn, hoof, raw or wet hide or skin of any such cattle as aforesaid shall be imported or introduced into the United Kingdom which shall come from, or shall have been at, any place within the aforesaid territories and dominions, situate in Europe, belonging to His Majesty the King of the Netherlands, other than the said provinces of Friesland and Groningen; and also that on and after the said first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, no horn, hoof, raw or wet hide or skin of any such cattle shall be imported or introduced into the United Kingdom which shall be, or shall have been, on board any vessels at the same time with any cattle which shall have come from, or shall have been within, the aforesaid territories and dominions, other than the said provinces of Friesland and Groningen.

And Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth hereby further order that, in the event of the horn, hoof, raw or wet hide or skin of any cattle being landed in any portion of the United Kingdom, contrary to the provisions of this Order, such horn, hoof, raw or wet hide or skin, the importation or introduction whereof is so hereby prohibited as aforesaid, shall, upon arrival in this country, be destroyed or otherwise disposed of, as the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Customs may direct.

This Order shall continue in force until revoked by any further Order.

The word "cattle" shall include sheep as well as bulls, cows, oxen, heifers, and calves.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by the 31st section of "The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862," it is enacted that "any rules concerning the lights or signals to be carried by vessels navigating the waters of any harbour, river, or other inland navigation, or concerning the steps for avoiding collision to be taken by such vessels, which have been or are hereafter made by or under the authority of any Local Act, shall continue and be of full force and effect, notwithstanding anything in this Act or in the schedule thereto contained."

And whereas by the 32nd section of the said recited Act, it is further enacted that "in the case of any harbour, river, or other inland navigation, for which such rules are not and cannot be made by or under the authority of any Local Act, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council, upon application from the harbour trust, or body corporate, if any, owning or exercising jurisdiction upon the waters of such harbour, river, or inland navigation, or if there is no such harbour trust, or body corporate, upon application from persons

interested in the navigation of such waters, to make rules concerning the lights or signals to be carried, and concerning the steps for avoiding collision to be taken by vessels navigating such waters; and such rules, when so made, shall, so far as regards vessels navigating such waters, have the same effect as if they were regulations contained in Table (C) in the schedule to this Act, notwithstanding anything in this Act or in the schedule thereto contained."

And whereas the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board, being the Harbour Trust owning and exercising jurisdiction upon the waters of the River Mersey and in the sea channels and approaches thereto, have, under the circumstances provided for by the last-recited section of the said Act, applied to Her Majesty in Council to make certain rules, which they have submitted for approval concerning the lights and signals, and concerning the steps for avoiding collision, to be taken by vessels navigating such waters:

And whereas the rules so submitted as aforesaid appear to be reasonable and proper:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers in her vested by the 32nd section of the said recited Act, and by and with the approval of Her Privy Council, doth hereby make the said rules which are set forth in the schedule hereto.

SCHEDULE.

Rules concerning the Lights or Signals to be carried, and concerning the steps for avoiding collision to be taken by vessels navigating the River Mersey.

1. All vessels, as well sailing vessels as steamers, including river craft exceeding 10 tons measurement, while navigating or anchoring in any part of the River Mersey below Warrington Bridge, shall, save as mentioned in the third rule, observe and obey the "Regulations for Preventing Collisions at Sea" set out in Table C in the schedule to the Act 25 and 26 Vic., cap. 63, the short title of which is "The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862," together with the additional regulations following:—

2. Canal flats, or vessels without masts, being towed, shall carry the lights prescribed for sailing vessels by Articles 5 and 6 of the said Table C.

3. The single bright light, prescribed by Article 7 of the same table, is to be carried by all vessels when at anchor in the Mersey or the sea channels or approaches thereto, at a height not exceeding twenty feet above the hull, suspended from the forestay, or otherwise near the bow of the vessel where it can be best seen; and in addition to the said light, all ships or vessels having two or more masts shall exhibit another bright light, at double the height of the bow lights, at the main, or mizen peak, or the boom topping lift, or other position near the stern where it can be best seen.

MEMORANDUM.—The above are all the new rules which the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board think needful to suggest, with a view to extending to the River Mersey the useful regulations prescribed by the said Act, but they propose to add the following by way of notice only:—

NOTICE.—By the 29th Section of the Act aforesaid, it is provided that, in case of a collision, if it be shewn that either vessel has infringed any of the regulations for preventing collisions for the time being in force, such vessel shall be deemed in fault.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-one; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the seventeenth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of your Majesty, chapter forty-one; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for setting out and constituting a district for spiritual purposes, and annexing such district to the consecrated church of Saint Andrew, situate at Blackley, in the new parish of Saint Peter, Blackley, within the original limits of the parish of Manchester, in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Manchester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district for spiritual purposes should be set out and constituted for and be annexed to the said church of Saint Andrew, situate at Blackley as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend James Prince, Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester (testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said new parish of Saint Peter, Blackley, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, and which is also delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, be severed and disannexed from the said new parish of Saint Peter, Blackley, and shall be set out and constituted for, and be annexed to the said church of Saint Andrew, situate at Blackley aforesaid, and shall become and be a district for spiritual purposes, and shall be named 'The District of Saint Andrew, Blackley.'

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the herein-named Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

The **SCHEDULE** to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint Andrew, Blackley, being:—

"All that part of the new parish of Saint Peter, Blackley, sometime part of the parish of Manchester, in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Manchester, which is situate to the north-west of an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish from the new parish of Tonge-cum-Alkrington, in the same county and diocese, at a point near Amselford Gate, in the middle of a certain lane

leading from Alkrington Hall towards Crab-lane Head, and opposite to a boundary stone inscribed 'B. St. A. D., 1866, No. 1,' and placed on the northern side of such lane; and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said lane for a distance of forty-eight chains or thereabouts (passing Cooper Fold, and Yew Tree House) to a point opposite to a boundary stone inscribed 'B. St. A. St. A. intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such incumbents and such patrons have respectively signified their assents to the same scheme.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Manchester.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for constituting a separate district, for spiritual purposes, out of the parish of Old Radnor, situate partly in the county of Radnor and partly in the county of Hereford, and wholly in the diocese of Hereford.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said parish of Old Radnor which is hereinafter mentioned and described (such part not at present containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship), should be constituted a separate district, for spiritual purposes, in the manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas a sum of three thousand pounds sterling has been contributed and paid to our account at the Bank of England by Robert Baskerville Mynors, of Evancoyd, in the said county of Radnor, Esquire, in aid of the endowment of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, and of the maintenance of the minister thereof for the time being, and we have in respect thereof agreed with the said Robert Baskerville Mynors, and have undertaken to provide and pay, by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year, to such minister as aforesaid, when he shall have been duly licensed in accordance with the provisions of the herein secondly-mentioned Act, and to his successors, the yearly sum of one hundred pounds.

"And whereas the said sum of three thousand pounds sterling has been so contributed and paid

as aforesaid, upon the understanding that we should pay out of the common fund, created by the firstly herein named Act, to the minister for the time being of the said district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, when such minister shall have been duly licensed as before mentioned, the annual sum of fifty pounds, and upon the further understanding that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) the whole right of patronage of the said district, and of the nomination of the minister thereof, should be assigned in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Renn Dickson, Bishop of the said diocese of Hereford (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said parish of Old Radnor which is described in the schedule hereunder written, and which is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Evancoyd.'

"And we further recommend and propose, that we may be authorized and empowered to pay, out of the common fund before referred to, to the minister for the time being of the district so recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed according to the provisions of the herein secondly-mentioned Act, the sum of fifty pounds in each and every year, by equal half yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November, and that the first of such payments, or a proportionate part thereof, shall be made on the first day of May or the first day of November next after the day of the date of the licence of such minister as aforesaid, and that, in case a vacancy in the ministry of such district shall happen on any other day than the first day of May or the first day of November, the amount next thereafter payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister making the vacancy, or his personal representative or representatives, and the minister succeeding to such district.

"And we further recommend and propose, that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted, and of the nomination of the minister thereof, shall, without any assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be assigned to and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised jointly by the said Robert Baskerville Mynors, by Ellen Hope, of No. 27, Gloucester-place, Portmansquare, in the county of Middlesex, Widow, by the Reverend Edward Higgins, of Bosbury House, Ledbury, in the county of Hereford, Clerk, by Arthur Armitage, of Dandor, near Ross, in the same county of Hereford, Esquire, and by George Warrington Carew, of Crowcombe Court, near Taunton, in the county of Somerset, Esquire, and their successors, to be appointed as hereinafter is mentioned; upon trust, nevertheless, that they, the said Robert Baskerville Mynors, Ellen Hope, Edward Higgins, Arthur Armitage, and George Warrington Carew, and their successors, shall, upon every legal vacancy in or avoidance of the ministry of the said district so recommended to be constituted, exercise such right of patronage and nomination, by nominating to such ministry some one fit and proper person, being in Holy Orders

of the United Church of England and Ireland, to be approved of for the purpose by them the trustees for the time being of the said right of patronage and nomination, or by a majority of them; provided always, and we hereby further recommend and propose, that when and so often as any of them, the said Robert Baskerville Mynors, Ellen Hope, Edward Higgins, Arthur Armitage, and George Warrington Carew, or any future trustees or trustee, shall die, resign, or become incapable of acting in the execution of the trust or right of nomination hereby recommended and proposed to be created, or shall desire to retire from the said trust, then and in every such case a new trustee or new trustees of the said right of patronage and nomination shall be appointed in the manner and subject to the several provisions set forth in and provided by the tenth section of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, with respect to new trustees to be appointed under the provisions of such last-mentioned statute.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Evancoyd, being:—

"All that part of the parish of Old Radnor, partly in the county of Radnor, and partly in the county of Hereford, and wholly in the diocese of Hereford, which is comprised within and is co-extensive with the limits of the three contiguous townships of Evenjobb, Newcastle, and Barlandwith-Burfa, in the said county of Radnor."

And whereas a draft of the said scheme has been, in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore secondly-mentioned Act, transmitted to the incumbent and to the patrons of the parish of Old Radnor, out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such incumbent and such patrons have respectively signified their assents to the same scheme.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Hereford.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the thirty-first day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act passed in the session of Parliament, held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act" to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the "fourth Report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues," have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for applying a part of certain property, formerly belonging to the prebend of Sawley, in the cathedral church of Lichfield, in aid of the Fabric Fund of the said cathedral church.

"Whereas by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the thirty-seventh year of the reign of His late Majesty, King George the Third, intituled "An Act to explain and amend an Act" passed in the fourth and fifth years of the reign of Her late Majesty, Queen Anne, intituled "An Act for augmenting the number of Canons residentiary in the cathedral church of Lichfield, and for improving the Deanery and Prebends of the said cathedral, and to make further provision for the Canons residentiary in the said cathedral church, and an addition to the Fabric Fund thereof," it was, amongst other things, enacted that one-fifth part of all fines and profits which should be from time to time received for renewing the lease or leases of the said prebend of Sawley, or a fifth part of the rent or rents, receipt or receipts, benefit or advantage, arising from the said prebend (except of the ancient reserved rent) should be paid unto the Dean and Chapter, for the time being, of the said cathedral church of Lichfield, to be by them applied in aid of the fabric fund appropriated to keeping the said cathedral church in repair.

"And whereas in pursuance and under the authority of the provisions contained in the herein first recited Act all the lands, tenements, hereditaments, and endowments (except any right of patronage), formerly belonging to the said prebend of Sawley, became, on the death of the Reverend Lawrence Gardner, Doctor in Divinity, late holder of the said prebend, vested in us, subject to the then subsisting lease or leases thereof, and, by the same Act, we are required to set apart so much of the rent and profits of the said prebend of Sawley as had been theretofore applied as an addition to the fabric fund of the said cathedral church.

"And whereas our reversionary interest in a portion of the estates formerly belonging to the said prebend has been sold, under the authority of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the twenty-seventh day of June, one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight, and one-fifth part of the proceeds of such sale have been duly appropriated for the benefit of the fabric fund of the said cathedral church, under the authority of a further Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the eleventh day of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three.

"And whereas the portion of the said estates and endowments which remained vested in us after the sale hereinbefore mentioned is now in our possession in fee-simple, the beneficial lease whereby the same was demised having expired on the twenty-ninth day of September, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and consists of a sum of two thousand seven hundred and sixteen pounds seven shillings and sixpence, three pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities, and of certain tithe rent-charges amounting to the sum of seven hundred and fifty-one pounds and seventeen shillings arising in the parishes of Sawley and Wilne, in the county of Derby.

"And whereas the hereinbefore mentioned ancient reserved rent, amounting to the sum of sixty-six pounds thirteen shillings and four pence, remained payable to us up to the date of the expiration of the said lease, and no allowance or deduction was made on account thereof in calculating the amount which was appropriated out of the proceeds of the said sale for the benefit of the said fabric fund as hereinbefore mentioned.

"And whereas we have ascertained that the tithe rent-charges set out in the schedule annexed to this scheme, being part of the tithe rent-charges now in our possession as aforesaid, represent in value, as nearly as may be, one-fifth part of the said total amount of seven hundred and fifty-one pounds and seventeen shillings, after making a reasonable reduction in respect of the exception of the said ancient reserved rent from the operation of the Act secondly hereinbefore mentioned.

"And whereas, with the view of effectually carrying out the purposes and provisions of the said secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act, the following arrangement has been agreed upon between us and the said dean and chapter.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, with the consent of the Dean and Chapter of the said cathedral church of Lichfield, testified by their having hereunto affixed their corporate

seal, that upon the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly published Order, the tithe rent-charges, particularly described in the schedule to this scheme, amounting to the sum of one hundred and thirty-three pounds thirteen shillings and two pence, and all our estate and interest in the same shall become and be absolutely vested in the said dean and chapter, upon trust, to apply the same and the rents and profits arising therefrom in aid of the fabric fund of the said cathedral church, in accordance with the provisions of the herein firstly and secondly recited Acts, and that the said dean and chapter shall be entitled to the rents, profits, and proceeds of the same tithe rent-charges, upon trust as aforesaid, as from the said twenty-ninth day of September, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four.

"And we further recommend and propose that we shall stand possessed of one equal fifth-part of the said sum of two thousand seven hundred and sixteen pounds seven shillings and sixpence, three pounds per centum Consolidated Annuities, upon trust for the said dean and chapter, and shall pay or cause to be paid to the treasurer for the time being of the said cathedral church, the interest, dividends, and annual proceeds of the same equal fifth part (such dividend, interest, and annual proceeds being reckoned as accruing to the said dean and chapter as from the said twenty-ninth day of September, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four) to be applied by the said dean and chapter in aid of the said fabric fund, in accordance with the provisions of the herein firstly and secondly recited Acts.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Lyneham, and of the parish of Christian Malford, in the said county of Wilts, and in the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such respective parishes.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parish of Lyneham and of the said parish of Christian Malford, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Mary, situate at Clack aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Walter Kerr, Bishop of the said diocese of Salisbury, as such bishop, with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles John, Bishop of the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, as such bishop, and also as the patron in right of his see of the rectory of the said parish of Christian Malford, and with the consent of George Heneage Walker Heneage, of Compton Bassett House, in the said county of Wilts, Esquire, the patron of the perpetual curacy of the said parish of Lyneham (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Lyneham, and of the said parish of Christian Malford, which are described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Mary, situate at Clack aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Bradenstoke-cum-Clack,'

and that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of such consolidated chapelry should belong to, and be exercised by, Gabriel Goldney, of Beechfield, near Chippenham, in the said county of Wilts, Esquire, his heirs and assigns for ever.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said district parish of the Holy Trinity, Bolton-le-Moors, which is hereinafter mentioned and described (such part not at present containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship) should be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, in the manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas, in pursuance of the power and authority given by an Order and Decree of your Majesty's High Court of Chancery, bearing date the fourth day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, approving a scheme for the regulation and management of the 'Bolton Lectureship Charity Estate,' a clear annual sum of one hundred and sixteen pounds thirteen shillings and four pence has been provided out of the revenues of the said estate for and towards the endowment of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, and for and towards the maintenance of the minister thereof, so soon as such minister shall have been appointed and licensed thereto, and of his successors, ministers of the same district.

"And whereas the said annual sum of one hundred and sixteen pounds thirteen shillings and four pence, and the said capital sum of one thousand pounds, have been so provided and contributed, upon the understanding that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient), the right of patronage of the said district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, and of the nomination of the minister thereof, should be assigned in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend James Prince, Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose, that all that part of the said district parish of the Holy Trinity, Bolton-le-Moors, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, and which is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Mark, Bolton-le-Moors.'

"And we further recommend and propose, that the patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted, and the right of nomination of the minister thereof, for the first and every succeeding alternate turn of presentation or nomination, shall, without any assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be assigned to, and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised jointly by the said Orlando George Charles, Earl of Bradford, by the Reverend Joseph Lowe, the incumbent of the perpetual curacy of the said district parish of the Holy Trinity, Bolton-le-Moors, by George Piggott, of Great Lever, in the said county of Lancaster, Esquire, and by John Hick, of Great Bolton, in the same county, Engineer, and by their respective heirs and assigns, and that such patronage and right of nomination aforesaid shall, for the second and every other alternate turn of presentation or nomination, be in like manner, assigned to, and be absolutely vested in, and be from time to time exercised by the trustees of the Bolton Lectureship Charity Estate aforesaid for the time being.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act or Acts of Parliament.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

The District of Saint Mark, Bolton-le-Moors, being:—

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, duly prepared, and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-first day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme respecting the mode of appointing honorary canons in the cathedral church of Christ, Oxford.

"Whereas it was by the firstly above mentioned Act enacted, that honorary canonries should be thereby founded in every cathedral church in England, in which there were not already founded any non-residentiary prebends, dignities, or offices, and that the holders of such canonries should be styled honorary canons, and should be entitled to stalls, and to take rank in the cathedral church next after the canons, and should be subject to such regulations respecting the mode of their appointment and otherwise, as should be determined on by the authority thereafter provided, with the consent of the chapters of the said cathedral churches respectively, and that the number of such honorary canonries thereby founded in each cathedral church should be twenty-four, and that it should be lawful for the Archbishops and Bishops respectively, if they should think fit, from time to time, to appoint spiritual persons to such honorary canonries, provided that not more than eight of such honorary canonries should be appointed in any diocese within the year next after the passing of the said Act, nor more than two in any subsequent year, except in the case of the vacancy of any honorary canonry by death, resignation, or otherwise; and it was provided that no emolument whatever, nor any place in the chapter of any cathedral church should be taken or held by any honorary canon in virtue of his appointment as such canon; and it was by the secondly recited Act, amongst other things declared and enacted, that such honorary canonries were and should be founded forthwith in the said cathedral church of Oxford, and that all the provisions of the first hereinbefore recited Act, which purported to relate to honorary canonries should apply to the honorary canonries so founded.

"And whereas the Dean and Chapter of the said Cathedral Church of Christ, Oxford, have, by

affixing hereto their common or capitular seal, signified to us their consent to the following regulations being made with reference to the mode of appointment to honorary canonries in the said Cathedral Church and otherwise, in accordance with the provisions of the said first recited Act.

"We, therefore, recommend and propose:—

"I. That it shall be lawful for the Bishop of Oxford for the time being in exercising the power given to him by the said recited Acts of appointing spiritual persons to honorary canonries in the said Cathedral Church of Christ, Oxford, to make any such appointment by instrument under his hand and episcopal seal.

"II. That every honorary canon so appointed shall be admitted into the Cathedral with the same formalities, so far as may be found practicable, as have been heretofore by the practice of the said church observed in the admission of a canon thereof, and shall in all processions of the Dean and Chapter walk in the order of his seniority, determined by the date of his appointment, the senior honorary canon taking rank next to the junior canon. Provided always that, as the space within the said Cathedral Church is at certain periods in full term of the academical year of the University of Oxford required for the use of the then resident graduate and undergraduate members of Christ Church, the said honorary canons shall not at such times be entitled to claim stalls.

"III. That no fee whatever shall be paid by any such honorary canon, except a fee of ten shillings to the Bishop's secretary upon collation, and a like fee to the chapter clerk upon his first admission to the Cathedral.

"IV. That every such honorary canon shall, when present in the Cathedral Church, wear the same habit as a canon, and that when neither the Dean, Sub-Dean, nor any canon shall be present during the performance of Divine service, the senior honorary canon who shall be present shall perform the same duty as would be performed by the canon in residence.

"V. That if any plan for the preaching of the honorary canons in the said Cathedral Church shall be agreed upon by the Dean and Chapter, with the consent of their visitor, every honorary canon appointed in the same church shall conform to such plan, provided that he shall not be required so to preach more than once in every year.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Oxford.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of the Holy Trinity, situate in the parish of Knaresborough, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of the Holy Trinity, situate in the parish of Knaresborough aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Robert, Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Knaresborough, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of the Holy Trinity, situate in such parish as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of the Holy Trinity, Knaresborough.'

"And, with the like consent of the said Robert, Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon, (testified as aforesaid), we further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being.

"We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of The Holy Trinity, Knaresborough, being:—

"All that part of the parish of Knaresborough, in the county of York, and in the diocese of

Ripon, which is comprised within and is bounded by an imaginary line commencing on the boundary which divides the said parish from the parish of Spofforth, in the same county and diocese, at a point in the centre of Grimbald Bridge, which carries the Kirk Deighton branch of the Wetherby and Knaresborough trust road over the River Nidd; and extending thence in a direction mainly south-westward along the said boundary as far as the point where it crosses the Spofforth branch of the Wetherby and Knaresborough trust road, at or near to the northern end of Brick Kiln Plantation; and extending thence northward, along the middle of the last-described road, for the distance of one mile or thereabouts to a point near White Way Head, opposite to a boundary-stone inscribed 'K. H. T. D. C.' and placed on the western side of the said road at or near to a certain trough, or watering place, situate on the western side of the said road at a distance of one hundred and eighty yards or thereabouts to the south of Low Bridge; and extending thence north-westward and in a direct line for a distance of three hundred and forty-five yards or thereabouts, passing to the west of the Mother Shipton Inn to a point in the middle of the River Nidd aforesaid, opposite to the Dropping Well; and extending thence northward along the middle of the said River Nidd as far as its intersection by the Castle Mill Dam; and extending thence south-eastward along the said dam, and to and along the western and southern sides of the Castle Mill, to a point in the middle of Castle Ings-road, opposite to the middle of the western end of Castle Mill-lane; and extending thence eastward to and along the middle of the last-named lane to its junction with Brewerton-street; and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-named street to its junction with the street called Cheapside; and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-named street to its junction with Gracechurch-street; and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-named street to its junction with High-street; and continuing thence still north-eastward across the last-named street to and along the middle of Park-row as far as a point opposite to the middle of the south-western end of a certain footpath leading past Ivy Cottage to Stockwell-lane; and continuing thence north-eastward to and along the middle of the said footpath to its junction with Stockwell-lane; and continuing thence still in the same direction along the middle of the said lane to its junction with Chain-lane; and extending thence southward along the middle of the last-named lane to its junction with the Kirk Deighton branch of the Wetherby and Knaresborough trust road aforesaid; and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the road last referred to as far as the point in the centre of Grimbald Bridge, where the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Ripon.

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein with the modifications hereinafter specified:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the ninth day of May last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the twenty-third day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order,

and it is hereby ordered, that burials in the under-mentioned parishes shall be discontinued (except as is herein otherwise directed), as follows; viz.:

WITTON-CUM-TWAMBROOKS.—Forthwith wholly within the church and within three yards of the school-house; also in the old part of the churchyard, except for the burial of widowers, widows, parents, and children of those already buried therein in now existing vaults or walled graves, in which each coffin shall be separately entombed, that is, enclosed by stone or brickwork properly cemented; except also in such earthen graves as can be opened, not less than five feet deep, without exposure of coffins or disturbance of entire bones; and interment to be discontinued, except for the burial of the widowers, widows, parents, and children of those previously buried, in the whole of the churchyard after the thirty-first December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven.

HARLESDOWN, KENT.—Forthwith wholly in the church, and also in the churchyard, except in vaults and walled graves in which each coffin shall be separately entombed, that is, enclosed by brickwork or stonework properly cemented, or with concrete, and except in earthen graves which can be opened without the exposure of coffins or disturbance of entire bones, no such grave to be less than five feet deep.

CLIFTON-ON-TEME.—Forthwith wholly in the church.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received from the Foreign Office a copy of a note, an extract translated from which is appended below, addressed to the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs by the Prussian Ambassador at this Court, communicating the views of the Prussian Government as to the effect produced by the existing war between Prussia and some of the States of the German Customs and Commercial Union, on the relations existing by virtue of the Treaties of Commerce concluded in the name of the Union.

(Extract.)

By the occurrence of the state of war, the Treaties which existed between Prussia and the Governments now at war with her, therefore also the Zollverein Treaty, are thrown out of operation.

His Majesty's Government is, therefore, no longer in a position to afford any security for the further observance of the Treaties of the Zollverein with other Powers, by those Powers which are now at war with the Government. Prussia herself and her allies will, however, fulfil these Treaties within the limits of their power to the fullest extent. In particular, they will put no difficulty and no obstacle in the way of the transit of the productions of the Powers which have Treaty relations with them, to the territories of the Government now at war with them, in so far as those productions do not consist of articles contraband of war.

On the other hand, they will allow the productions of the States now at war with them, which are intended for the Powers having Treaty relations with them, to pass through their territory without obstruction.

With the Zollverein Treaty also ceases the operation of the free trade which is established between the Prussian territory and the territories of those Governments now at war with it. The Royal Government can, therefore, no longer treat goods coming from those territories like native goods, as hitherto, but only as foreign goods. Whence it follows that the goods of the Powers having Treaty relations with Prussia, though duty has been paid upon them in those territories, can no longer be considered as nationalised for Prussia, but, when they enter Prussia, must be considered as goods upon which duty has not been paid.

Foreign merchants will, therefore, do well, when sending goods to Prussia and the countries allied with her, through the territories of the Governments at war with Prussia, to despatch them with permits for the Prussian territory or those allied with it respectively.
