The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty, and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, duly prepared, and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing dute the seventh day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesinstical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixteenth and seventeenth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty, and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for effecting an exchange of the patronage of certain benefices between the Archbishop of York and the Right Honorable William Henry Forester Denison, Baron Londesborough, and the trustees of his family settled estates.

"Whereas the Right Honorable and Most Reverend William, Archbishop of York, is seized in fee in right of his see of the advowson of the Vicarage of Kirkby Wharfe, in the county of York, and in the diocese of York.

"And whereas the advowson of each of the benefices next hereinafter mentioned, that is to say, of the perpetual curacy of Selby, of the vicarage of Seamer, with the chapelries of Cayton and East Ayton, and of the vicarage of Brayton, all in the said county of York, and in the diocese of York, is now legally vested in the said William Henry Forester Denison, Baron Londesborough, for his life, with remainder over to his first and other sons in tail male, with remainders over, under, and by virtue of the last will and testament of William Joseph Denison, late of Denbies, in the county of Surrey, Esquire, now deceased, in which will is contained, amongst other things, a power for the trustees or trustee, for the time being, of the same will, at any time or times after the decease of him the said William Joseph Denison, at the request and by the direction, in

writing, of the person or persons who under the limitations of the said will should be tenant for life, in possession of the manors and other here-ditaments thereby devised and directed to be purchased, to make sale of or to convey in exchange for other hereditaments, to be situate somewhere in Great Britain, all or any part of the said manors and other hereditaments thereby devised and directed to be purchased, and the inheritance thereof, in fee-simple or otherwise, for such price or prices in money, or for such equivalent in manors, messuages, lands, or other hereditaments, as to them, the said trustees or trustee, should seem reasonable.

"And whereas the Right Honorable William Meredyth, Baron Athlumney, the Most Honorable Francis Nathaniel, Marquis Conyngham, and John Pemberton Heywood, of Connaught-place, in the county of Middlesex, Esquire, are the present trustees of the said will of the said William Joseph Denison, deceased.

"And whereas the said William, Archbishop of York, the said William Henry Forester Denison, Baron Londesborough, and the said William Meredyth, Baron Athlumney, Francis Nathaniel, Marquis Conyngham, and John Pemberton Heywood, have signified to us their desire that the patronage of the said several benefices may be exchanged as hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas we have made due enquiry and calculation as to the circumstances of the proposed exchange and the relative values of the said benefices and patronage, and we do hereby certify to your Majesty that the values of the said benefices respectively are as set forth in the two parts of the schedule hereto annexed.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said William, Archbishop of York, as patron in right of his see of the vicarage of Kirkby Wharfe aforesaid, and with the consent of the said William Henry Forester Denison, Baron Londesborough, as such patron as aforesaid of the benefices secondly hereinbefore mentioned, that is to say, of the perpetual curacy of Selby, of the vicarage of Seamer with the chapelries of Cayton and East Ayton, and of the vicarage of Brayton, and with the consents of the said William Meredyth, Baron Athlumney, Francis Nathaniel, Marquis Conyngham, and John Pemberton Heywood (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette
