WHEREAS the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart, one of Her Ma-jesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parish hereinafter mentioned, ten days previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has, under the provisions of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign. intituled "An Act to amend the laws con-"cerning the burial of the dead in England "beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to " amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead "in the Metropolis," made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parish, without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that interments in the same should be discontinued, with the following modifications; viz.:

EPSOM.—Forthwith wholly in the parish church and in the churchyard of the same, except in vaults in which each coffin shall be separately entombed, and except in earthen graves which can be opened to the depth of four feet without the exposure of coffins or disturbance of entire bones.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to orders that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the twentieth day of August next:

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parish affected by such representation, one month before the said twentieth day of August.
