LORD STANLEY has received a Telegram from Sir Alexander Malet, Bart., K.C.B., Her Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at Frankfort, dated the 11th instant, announcing that Her Royal Highness the Princess Louis of Hesse (Princess Alice of Great Britain) safely gave birth to a Princess at Darmstadt, at two o'clock on that morning.

WHEREAS the Local Board of Health for the District of Diss, in the county of Norfolk, have, under the provisions of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the 20th and 21st years of Her Majesty's reign, intitled "An Act to amend the Burial Acts," presented a petition to Her Majesty in Council, stating that the district of the said Local Board is co-extensive with the district for which it is proposed to provide a burial-ground; that no Burial Board has been appointed for the said district; and that an Order in Council has been made for closing certain burial-grounds within the said district, subject to the qualifications therein set forth, and praying that Her Majesty would be pleased to order that the said Local Board of Health for the district of Diss, shall be the Burial Board for the district of such Local Board.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such petition, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the twentieth day of August next.

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be published in the London Gazette, and in one of the newspapers usually circulating in the district of the Local Board aforesaid, one month at least before the said twentieth day of August next.
