THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, the following translations of a Circular and Decree of the Italian Government in regard to the exercise of Italian rights at sea during the present war:—

Florence,

June 20, 1866.

SIR,

WAR having been declared between Italy and Austria, the King's Government has considered it its duty to turn its attention to the method of regulating the exercise of its rights at sea.

For this purpose, it has adopted the provisions shown in the documents which I have the honour to enclose to you, in order that you may be able to give to the Government where you are residing all the information that may be required of you. You will draw special attention to the fact that

the Italian Legislature was the first to consecrate, on condition of reciprocity, the principle that the merchant vessels of the enemy are exempt from capture and confiscation on the part of the vessels of the State; and that, as this maxim has been officially adopted by the Austrian Government, the benefit to be derived from it is fully assured to the citizens of the two States during the present war.

VICTOR EMANUEL II, by the Grace of God and the will of the Nation, King of Italy.

Whereas a state of declared war exists between the Kingdom of Italy and the Empire of Austria.

Whereas having referred to Article 225 of the Mercantile Marine Code, having heard the Council of State, having listened to the Council of Ministers, on the proposition of Our Ministers for Foreign Affairs and for Marine Affairs, We have decreed and do decree as follows :

ARTICLE I.

The Commission of Prizes, contemplated by Article 225 of the Mercantile Marine Code, is established, and is to have its sittings in Florence.

ARTICLE II.

The Commission of Prizes consists of the Vice-President of the Admiralty Board, as President; of a member of the Admiralty Board; of three Councillors of Appeal; of a member of the Diplomatic Legal Board (*Consiglio del contenzioso Diplomatico*); of a superior functionary of the Mercantile Marine Administration; of a Government Commissioner and a Secretary, both without deliberative votes.

The Commissioner is charged to promote the proceedings in the name of the Government and to give his opinions; he cannot take part in the voting.

ARTICLE III.

The members of the Commission of Prizes, except the Secretary, are nominated by Us, on the proposition of Our Ministers for Foreign Affairs and for Marine Affairs.

On the occurrence of vacancies they are filled up in the same manner. The Secretary is to be chosen by the Commission from among the functionaries of the Ministry for Foreign Affairs or of that for Marine Affairs.

ARTICLE IV.

The Commission has the power of selecting one from among its voting members to take the place of the President when he is absent.

ARTICLE V.

The Commission of Prizes has to decide upon the validity and upon the confiscation of the maritime prizes taken during the present war, according to the rules sanctioned by the mercantile marine code, and the instructions issued to the Commanders of the acting naval forces.

ARTICLE VI.

The deliberations of the Commission are valid when five members are present. In the event of an equality of votes, that of the President, or of the member who occupies his place, determines the majority.

ARTICLE VII.

The decisions of the Commission of Prizes shall be communicated to Our Minister for Foreign Affairs and for Marine Affairs, within eight days from their being arrived at.

ARTICLE VIII.

Appeals may be made from the decisions of the Commission of Prizes to the Council of State, which will pronounce definitively thereon, according to the form settled by its regulations. The appeal must be made within three months from the date of the decision, if it be promoted by the Government Commissioner, and within three months from the day of the notification of the decision, if moved by the parties interested.

ARTICLE IX.

The parties may submit memorials, in writing, addressed to the President of the Commission.

Foreign consular agents may address to the Government Commissioner such remarks as they may consider advisable in the interests of their countrymen.

ARTICLE X.

The expenses of the Secretariat and the other accessories for the service of the Commission of Prizes, shall form a special division in the accounts of the Ministry for Marine Affairs.

Our Ministers for Foreign Affairs, and for Marine Affairs, are charged with the execution of the present decree, which, when sealed with the State Seal shall be inserted in the official collection of the laws and decrees of the Kingdom of Italy; all concerned being commanded to observe it and to cause it to be observed.

INSTRUCTIONS from the Minister for Marine Affairs to all Officers, General, Superior, and Subaltern, Commanding the Navy, the Squadrons, and the Vessels on Service.

War having been declared between the Kingdom of Italy and Austria, I have to give you such instructions as shall serve to regulate your conduct in the operations which our squadrons or detached ships will be called upon to perform.

And first of all I must recall to your attention, that Italy and Austria having signed the Declaration of 16th April, 1856, that emanated from the Congress of Paris, the principles announced therein are binding on both of them, and must be observed and upheld by the two Powers.

These principles are :—

1. Privateering is abolished and remains so.
2. The neutral flag covers the enemy's goods, with the exception of contraband of war.
3. Neutral merchandise, with the exception of contraband of war, cannot be sequestered under the hostile flag.
4. Blockades to be binding must be effectual, that is, they must be maintained with a sufficient force to prevent access to the hostile shore.

I therefore invite you to keep these maxims well in mind, as well as the others which I am about to lay down :

1.

From this instant you are called upon to pursue and to take possession of, by force of arms, every Austrian ship of war.

2.

Austria having by an Imperial Ordinance of 13th May last, declared her adhesion to the principle of reciprocity contemplated by Art. 211 of our Mercantile Marine Code, you will not seize merchant vessels of the enemy, nor their cargoes, except in the case of their carrying contraband of war, or attempting to violate a blockade.

3.

You will take care that the practice of fishing on the enemy's coasts shall not occasion any obstacle or detriment to the naval operations which you are called upon to perform.

4.

You will bear in mind that you must abstain from any act of hostility whatever in the ports and in the territorial waters of Neutral Powers; remembering that the limits of the territorial waters extend to the distance of a cannon shot from the shore.

5.

You will capture merchant vessels, whether national, neutral, or hostile, which—

- A. Attempt to violate a blockade;
- B. Carry contraband of war on account of, or intended for the enemy.

6.

As a matter of course, the violation of blockade consists either of an attempt to get into the place blockaded, or to come out of it, after the declaration of blockade, unless, in the latter case, the vessel concerned be in ballast or have a cargo taken in before the blockade, or within the period fixed by the commander of the blockading squadron, which period ought always to be sufficient for the protection of bona fide commerce and navigation.

7.

A blockade is not legally known to a vessel bound to a blockaded port until a special notification thereof has been entered on its papers by one of the blockading ships of war. This is a formality which you must never neglect to fulfil whenever you are engaged in a service of this kind.

8.

The following are contraband of war:—cannon, mortars, firelocks, carbines, revolvers, pistols, sabres, and other portable and fire-arms of all kinds; projectiles, gunpowder, gun-cotton, munitions of war of all kinds whatsoever; soldiers and marines, whether regulars or volunteers; implements and articles of military clothing and armament; despatches and official correspondence; and generally, everything which can, without further manipulation, serve for immediate military or naval armament; sulphur and saltpetre are also considered contraband of war.

9.

If a neutral vessel desires to enter a blockaded port on account of distress at sea, occasioned by bad weather, want of provisions, &c., you shall allow it to do so, on proof of the existing necessity

which compels it; but if the ship carry contraband of war, you shall cause it to be deposited on board your own ship, or one of the others which are maintaining the blockade.

10.

In fulfilment of the duties resulting from the preceding instructions, you will have to exercise the right of search, and, therefore, I have to point out to you how you are to proceed, in order that no disagreeable difficulty may arise therefrom. Although in time of war, this right may be unlimited (except in regard to what is said in the paragraph letter E), nevertheless, I recommend you not to exercise it except in places and under circumstances which give good reasons for believing that its exercise may result in the confiscation of the vessel searched.

You will, therefore, proceed in the following manner:—

A. When you have to reconnoitre and search a merchant vessel, you will hoist the national flag, and, at the same time, discharge an unshotgun; the vessel ought to reply to this signal by hoisting its own flag. If it does not obey, you will act according to the service regulations until it does so.

B. If the merchant vessel stops at once and hoists its own flag, you will remain at what you think a fitting distance, according to the state of the wind and the sea, or other circumstances which cannot be foreseen here, but always watching over the safety of the boat which you send to reconnoitre. In this contingency, however, I recommend to you the greatest care that, in the case in question, moderation be conjoined with the aid which the boat sent to reconnoitre may stand in need of; and you will be able to manœuvre in conformity with what is said at the beginning of this paragraph.

C. As soon as the merchant vessel has lain-to, you will send to her a boat under the command of an officer. This officer, accompanied by two or three men only, will go on board and ascertain the nationality and the description of the vessel, and whether it is engaged in unlawful commerce or not, that is, whether it carries articles or other matters contraband of war. For this purpose the officer shall require the captain to show him the patent of nationality, the muster-roll of the crew, the bill of health of the place where he comes from, and the documents which show the nature of the cargo; and if, from the examination of these, it shall appear that the vessel has no contraband of war on account of and intended for the enemy, the visitation will be thus at an end, and the vessel will be left at liberty, after having the entry made in its papers accordingly. But if these documents prove the existence of contraband of war on board, you will capture the vessel, take possession of its papers, and proceed according to the directions of the service regulations, bearing in mind that even in this last case you must not have the hatches, cupboards, and other receptacles opened for the purpose of ascertaining whether there are other suspicious papers or goods.

D. It is to be understood, however, that all that is pointed out in the paragraphs of this Article in no way alters the discipline prescribed in the case of an infringement of blockade.

E. You must remember that if accidental circumstances remove you from the line of blockade, or carry you into the territorial waters of a neutral country, the right of search must cease in those waters, according to what is said in Article 4, preceding.

11.

You will not visit vessels in a convoy escorted by a neutral ship of war; you will limit yourself to asking the Commander of the convoy for a list the ships placed under his protection, with a declaration that there is no contraband of war on board of them, on account of or intended for the enemy. If, nevertheless, you have reason to suppose that the good faith of the Commander of the convoy has been imposed upon, you will communicate your suspicions to him, and he will proceed alone to search the suspected vessel.

12.

In the event of capturing a vessel of war you will confine yourself to a statement of the fact in your journal, and you will provide for conducting the prize in the manner best adapted for the safety of the crews to which you entrust it, bearing in mind Article 94 of the regulations for service on board.
