The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament, held in the sixth and seventh years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for rendering more easy the taking the poll at County Elections," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time, on petition from the Justices of any county, riding, parts, or division in England or Wales in Quarter Session assembled, representing that the number of polling places for such county, riding, parts, or division, is insufficient, and praying that the place or places mentioned in the said petition may be a polling place, or polling places, for the county, riding, parts, or division of the county within which such place or places is or are situate, to declare that any place or places mentioned in the said Petition shall be a polling place or polling places for that county, riding, parts or division; and that the Justices of the Peace for such county, riding, parts, or division, in Quarter Sessions or some special Sessions assembled, as mentioned in the Act passed in the third year of the reign of His said late Majesty, intituled "An Act to settle and describe the divisions of Counties and the limits of Cities and Boroughs in England and Wales," in so far as respects the election of members to serve in Parliament shall, conformably to the said last-mentioned Act, divide such county, riding, parts, or division into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place:

And whereas by another Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to limit the time for proceeding to Elections in Counties and Boroughs in England and Wales, and for polling at Elections for the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge, and for other purposes," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time hereafter, on Petition from the Justices in Quarter Sessions assembled of any county, riding, parts, or division of any county other than any county of a city or of a town in England and Wales, representing that it would be expedient that any polling

place or places mentioned in the said Petition should cease to be such, and that any other place or places mentioned in the said Petition should be substituted in lieu thereof, and praying that such alteration and substitution might be made, to declare that the said alteration and substitution shall be made in respect of all or any of the places mentioned in the said Petition, and the said declaration shall be certified under the hand of one of the clerks in ordinary of Her Majesty's Privy Council, and, when so certified, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall then be of the same force and effect as if the same had been expressly made by the authority of Parliament:

And whereas the Justices of the Peace acting in and for the county of Surrey in General Quarter Sessions assembled at Guildford, in and for the said county, on Tuesday, the third day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, have presented their Petition to Her Majesty, representing that the number of polling places in the eastern division of the said county is insufficient, and that it would be expedient that Saint Mary Magdalen, Bermondsey, should cease to be a polling place for the said division, and that Southwark should be substituted in lieu thereof:

The Petitioners, therefore, humbly prayed that Her Majesty would be pleased, with the advice of Her Privy Council, to declare that Richmond, in the said division of the said county, shall be a polling place for the said division, and that Saint Mary Magdalen, Bermondsey, shall cease to be a polling place for the said division, and that Southwark shall be substituted in lieu thereof.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the said Petition into consideration, doth, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, declare, order, and direct that Richmond, in the said division of the said county, shall be a polling place for the said division, and further, that Saint Mary Magdalen, Bermondsey, shall cease to be a polling place for the said division, and that Southwark shall be substituted and be a polling place for the said division of the said county in lieu thereof; and further that the Justices of the Peace for the said county in Quarter Sessions assembled, or some special Sessions as mentioned in the said Act passed in the third year of the reign of His said late Majesty, shall, conformably to the said last-mentioned Act, divide the said division into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place.

**W**HEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England, beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-ground or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require), that after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time, as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish;

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., late one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, did make a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein with the modifications hereinafter specified:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the eleventh day of June last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the twenty-third day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that burials in the undermentioned parishes shall be discontinued (except as is herein otherwise directed), as follows; viz.:

**LONG MARSTON, TRING.**—Forthwith in the church, and from and after the thirty-first of December next, in the churchyard.

**FEATHERSTONE.**—Forthwith in the parish church, and also in the churchyard, except in vaults and walled graves, in which each coffin shall be separately enclosed by stone or brickwork properly cemented, and except in earthen graves which can be opened not less than five feet deep without digging up entire bones or exposing coffins.

**LEVENSHULME, MANCHESTER.**—Forthwith in the Wesleyan Chapel and in the chapelyard thereof.

**RHUDDLAN.**—Forthwith in the church and in the old part of the churchyard, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, every coffin buried in which shall be enclosed in stone or brickwork properly cemented or in concrete, and except in earthen graves which have not been buried in for the preceding fourteen years, every coffin in which shall be enclosed by concrete; also burials in such graves to be limited to the dead of the Ecclesiastical District of Rhuddlan, and the widows or widowers of those already buried in the old part of the churchyard.

**W**HEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit;

And whereas Orders in Council have been made, directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyards hereinafter mentioned, from the time specified in such Orders; and whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the time for discontinuing burials in the said churchyards be postponed;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyards be postponed as follows; viz.:

In the churchyard of *Brize Norton*, to the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six.

In the churchyard of East Grinstead, to the first of February, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven.

**W**HEREAS by an Act, passed in the Session of Parliament, held in the twentieth and twenty-first years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the Burial Acts," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, to order such acts to be done by or under the directions of the churchwardens or such other persons as may have the care of any vaults or places of burial, for preventing them from becoming or continuing dangerous or injurious to the public health; and that every such Order in Council shall be published in the London Gazette, and that such churchwardens or other persons shall do or cause to be done all acts ordered as aforesaid, and the expenses incurred in and about the doing thereof shall be paid out of the poor rates of the parish: Provided always, that no such representation shall be made until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the churchwardens or other persons, or one of the churchwardens or other persons, having the care of the vaults or places of burial to which the representation relates;

And whereas the Right Honourable Spencer Horatio Walpole, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation having been duly given to the churchwardens or other persons having the care of the undermentioned churchyard, has made a representation, stating that he is of opinion that, for the purpose of preventing the said churchyard from becoming or continuing dangerous or injurious to the public health, an Order should be made for the adoption of the measures which are hereinafter set forth;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the churchwardens or such other persons as may have the care of the undermentioned churchyard do adopt, or cause to be adopted, the following measures, viz.:—

That the churchyard of St. John Eastover, Bridgwater, be effectually drained, so that the water may not accumulate in any grave or vault.

**W**HEREAS the Right Honourable Spencer Horatio Walpole, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbent and the Churchwardens of the

parish hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has, under the provisions of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England," beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead "in the Metropolis," made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parish, without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that interments in the same should be discontinued, with the following modifications; viz.:

**BRIDGWATER.**—In the cemetery, and in the churchyard of St. John, Eastover, from and after the thirty-first of December next, except in vaults and walled graves, in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal and separately entombed by stone or brickwork properly cemented, or by concrete; and except in earthen graves which are free from water, no coffin in which shall be covered with less than four feet depth of earth, or any new grave dug within one foot of any other. One coffin only to be buried in the same grave at a time, and no second burial in the same grave allowed within fourteen years, unless that of another member of the same family, in which case a foot of earth shall be left between the coffins.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the sixth day of September next:

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parish affected by such representation, one month before the said sixth day of September.

**W**HEREAS by an Act passed in the session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, intituled "An Act to prevent until the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals," and from time to time continued by divers subsequent Acts, and lastly by an Act passed in the session of the twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth years of the

reign of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and nineteen, it is (amongst other things) enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time, to make such Orders and Regulations as to them may seem necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal to or from such parts or places as they may designate in such Order or Orders, of sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals, or of meat, skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals, or of hay, straw, fodder, or other articles likely to propagate infection, and to make any other Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations, and that all provisions for any of the purposes aforesaid in any such Order or Orders contained shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in the said Act :

And whereas the said Act has been amended and explained by an Act passed in the twenty-ninth year of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the Act of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and seven, to prevent the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals :"

And whereas a contagious or infectious disorder, generally designated as the "Cattle Plague," has lately appeared, and now prevails, amongst cattle in England and Wales :

And whereas divers Orders have been made by the Lords of the said Council in relation to the cattle plague, which were consolidated and amended by an Order bearing date the 24th day of March last :

And whereas provisions are contained in the said Order of the Privy Council to regulate the movement of cattle on any highway, and such movement without a licence as therein described is prohibited, except for a distance not exceeding five hundred yards, from one part of the said farm to the other :

And whereas the holding of markets for the sale of cattle is prohibited by the said Order until the 1st day of June, 1866, except in the case of a market held with the licence of the Privy Council for the sale of cattle intended for immediate slaughter, which term hath, by an Order of the said Council, been extended from the said 1st day of June until the said Lords of the Council shall otherwise direct :

And whereas there is a market held in a place known as Smithfield, in the borough of Birmingham, in the county of Warwick, for the sale of cattle, and the holding thereof has been licensed by the Lords of the said Council, by instrument bearing date the 31st day of May last, for the sale of cattle intended for immediate slaughter, so long as the said above-mentioned Orders shall remain in force, or until the revocation thereof as therein provided, subject to all the conditions, provisions, and regulations in the said first-mentioned Order contained applicable to such market :

And whereas it is provided by the said Order of the 24th of March last, that in the case of cattle brought to any market other than the Metropolitan Cattle Market, they shall in no case be taken beyond such limits as may be described in the licence of the Privy Council allowing such market, and under such conditions with respect to their movement within such limits as may be imposed by such licence :

And whereas in the said licence for the holding of the above-mentioned market, it is provided that no cattle brought into the said market shall be taken alive beyond the limits of the municipal boundaries of the said borough, and it is expedient that certain other regulations should be made in this behalf :

Now, therefore, the Lords of the Council do hereby order, that notwithstanding such provision in the said licence, cattle sold in the said market may, until the 30th day of September next, if the said licence shall so long continue in force, be moved to any slaughter-house within the distance of two miles in a direct line from the boundary of the said borough, and situated within one of the counties of Warwick and Worcester, to be there immediately slaughtered under such regulations as the Local Authority for the said counties respectively shall from time to time make and issue in regard to the movement as well as the places, times and manner of slaughtering of such cattle :

Provided, that nothing herein contained shall allow the cattle to be kept alive for more than four days after exposure in the said market.

Every such regulation shall be published by the said Local Authority in some newspaper circulating in the borough of Birmingham, and by a notice affixed in some conspicuous place in the said market.

Every person who shall contravene this Order, or any regulation of the Local Authority made under it, shall be guilty of an offence, and be subject to the like penalty as in the case of a contravention of any regulation in the said Order of the 24th of March last.

This day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them that *The Lords authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by Her Majesty, for declaring Her Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read;* and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act to amend certain provisions of the Sheriff Court Houses (Scotland) Act, 1860.

An Act to amend the Law relating to the qualifications of Revising Barristers.

An Act to enable the Postmaster-General to sit in the House of Commons.

An Act for confirming certain Provisional Orders made by the Board of Trade under the General Pier and Harbour Act, 1861, relating to Clynder, Hastings, and Newlyn.

An Act to make further provision for the enrolment of certain deeds, assurances, and other instruments relating to charitable trusts.

An Act to authorise the Metropolis Sewage and Essex Reclamation Company to make a new conduit in lieu of certain portions of their authorised conduits; and for other purposes.

An Act to authorise the construction of branch railways from the Devon Valley Railway into the mineral districts of Fife and Clackmannan; and for other purposes.

An Act to authorise the Berwickshire Railway Company to raise additional capital; and for other purposes.

An Act to incorporate a Company for making a railway from the South Wales Railway of the Great Western Railway Company, near to Saint Clears Station, to Laugharne, in the county of Carmarthen, to be called "The Laugharne Railway;" and for other purposes.

An Act to authorise the London, Chatham, and Dover Railway Company to make a branch railway to Chatham Dockyard, and to make arrangements with the Admiralty; and for other purposes.

An Act to authorise the London, Chatham, and Dover Railway Company to execute works in Kent and Surrey, to authorise the acquisition of additional lands in London, Middlesex, Surrey, and Kent, and of the undertakings of the Sittingbourne and Sheerness Railway Company, to extend the time for completing and purchasing lands for undertakings in London, Surrey, and Kent, to amend the Acts relating to the Company; and for other purposes.
