APROCLAMATION

For the more effectual Reducing and Suppretting of PIRATES and PRIVATEERS in America.

TAMES R.

Hereas frequent Robberies and Piracies shave been, and are daily committed by great numbers of Pirates and Privateers as well on the Seas as on the Land of and in America, which bath occasioned a great prejudice and obstruction to the Trade and Commerce as well of Our Subjects, as of the Subjects of Our Allies, and hath given a great Scandal and Disturbance to Our Government in those Parts. And whereas We being resolved to take forme effectual course for the putting whend to all fuch Oueragious Infolencies, have therefore thought it requisite to send a Squadron of Shifts into the Pasts aforesaid, under the Command of Our Trusty and Well-beloved Servant Sir Robert Holmes Knight, Our Governor of Our Isle of Wight, and have etherwise given that all necessary Powers for Suppressing of the faid Parates and Privateers, either by Force, or affurance of Pardon, and have Constituted and Appointed the Said Sir Robert Holmes Our Sole Commissioner in that Affair; Now to the end that this Our Royal Purpose may be the better put in Execution, and that none of the Said Offenders may have any cause of excuse or pretence left for want of a due Advertisement of Our Intended Mercy and Clemency towards them, upon their mithdrawing themselves from their Jaid micked and Piracical courses for the future: We are Gratiously pleased hereby to Promise and Declare, That in sase any such Pirate or Privateer; Pirates or Privateers, Shall within the space of Twelve months next in sang the Date of this Our Proclamation, either in Raylon, of by their Agents Surrender, or become obliged to Surren der him or themselves unto the said Sir Robert Holmes, of any other person or persons appointed by him, or such other person on persons as in case of his Death Shall be further Constituted and Appointed by Wi, within any of Our faid Marats, Planeasions, Colonies, or other Places on the Sea or Land, thing between the Tropiques of Cancer and Capricorn in America, and the case any Pirate of Privateer, Rivales of Privateers, final within the space of Fifteen months next ensuing the Date of these Presents, Surrender, or become obliged to Surrender him or shemselves ourrener, or vecome obugen to surrender non or chemselves to the said Sir. Bobert Holmes, or Any others. Appointed as aforesaid, in enjother pares of America, or which Our Kingdom of England, and sold give sufficient Security to be approved of by the said Sir Robert Holmes, or in rafe of his Death, by said other person of herbar a stall be sirther. Appointed by Lie for his or their survey good Behaviour, We will, upon such humble Submission, and after such security when Grant was such Beington. fuch Security given, Grant unco Such Rivate or Pirates

Privateer or Privateers, Our Gracious; Full and Ample Pardon for all Piracies or Robberies committed by him or them upon the Sea or Land before the Date of these Prefents. And We do hereby straightly Charge and Command all and fingular Our Admira's, Vice-Admira's, Chief Go-vernors, Captains, Commanders, Marine's Scamen, and all Our Officers and Ministers of and in all and every Our Said Islands, Plantations, Colonies, and Territories what soever, and of all and everyour Ships of War and other Veffels; and all other Our Officers and Subjects whatover, not only to be Aiding, Favouring and Affifting in their several Places and Stations, unto the said Ser Robert Holmes, and such other person or persons as shall be ap pointed; as aforefaid, in and for the more effectual Reducing and Suppressing of all manner of Pirates and Privateers within the Limits and Parts aforesaid, or any of them, but also (upon the producing a Certificate or instrument under the Hand and Seal of the faid Sir Robert Holmes, or such other person as in case of his Death shall be further Appointed by Us, signifying that any Pis-rate of Privateer, Rivates of Privateers, bath or have Sur-rendred him or themselves unto the said Sir Robert Holmes, or such other person on persons appointed as aforefaid, and given Security for their future good Behaviour; according to the Tenor of elses Prefents,) to permit and suffer the faid person or person lawfully to pass and travel either by Sea or Land, spit baut any Let, Hindrance. or Molefration what seever, no sor from any of our faid Islands, Plantations or Colonies, or into Our Kington of England, as foon as conveniently may be, in Order to his or their receiving Our Full and Gracious Pardon & afore-Said, and that in the mean time no Indictment. Process, or other Proceeding Shall be had in any of Que Courts of Record, or elfewhere, againsts any fuch person or persons producing such Certificate or Instrument; for any Piracy or Robbery by him or them committed as afresaid, before the Date of these Presents. Provided always. That if any of the said Offender or Offenders what seem Shall, after the publishing of this Our Proclamuson; in Contempt thereof, and of Our Princely Mercy and Clemency to thereof, and of Our Princely Mercy and Clemency to them hereby offered, wilfully and obstinately persist in their Pinacies, Robberies, and Outragious Practices, or shall not Surrender themselves in manner aforesist; Then We do bereby expresty Direct and Command. This all and every field person and persons shall be pursued with the ur-prost Schoolin, and much the greatest Rigour chat may be until they and every of them be utterly Suppressed and De-Proved : We declaring to to be Our Royal Purpole and Re-Columnian, That they and every of them halt from thence forth be finally Excluded and Debarr & from receiving any further Favour or Merch and lastly, We to Barely Re-voke, Amus and make south all Proclamations by Di formerly third souching the Bramister herein above mentioned, or any of chem.

Given at One Court at Whitehall this Twentieth day of January 1682. In the Third Year of Our Reign.

Son of the Church: That the present King was not behand any of his Ancestors in his Services and Respects to the Holy See: That the Persons of Ambassadors were always held Sacred, even amongst Nations not yet civit liz'd: That the Priviledges and Franchifes pretended to, were Immunities that the Crown had been long posses'd of: That the Rights of the Crown can admit of no Regulation or Bounds, but fuch as shall be fet by the Justice and Moderation of the King: That the former Popes, who endeavoured to reform the Abuses of the Franchises, employed no other means but those of their Temporal Power: That the Censures of the Church, and the Power of the Keys, were abused when employed to serve Temporal ends: That an Ambassador, representing the King, and executing his Commands, was exempt from all Ecclefiaftical Centure: That the Church of St. Lewis, was, by a Bull of Sixtus V. made the National Church of the French, where they were bound to affift at Divine Service, and receive the Communion, in whatever parts they lived at Rome. If this had been a matter of Ecclefiaftical Cognizance, and the Ambassador Subject to it, there was neither a preceding Citation against him, nor Sentence pronounc'd and published, or so much as a Signification of any to the Curate of the interdicted Church: All which of any to the Curate of the interdicted Church: To which must plainly shew the nullity of that Decree. it was further added, That the Pope, fince the last affembly of the Clergy, upon the Business of the Regale, and their Declarations then made, had refused his Bulls to fuch as the King had nominated to the vacant Archbishopricks and Bishopricks, by which there were 35 un-Supplied, to the great Prejudice of those Diocesses, and contrary to the Agreement settled between Pope Leo X. and Francis I. by an Inftrument called the Concordat , which, in Favour of the Pope, revok'd the Pragmatique Sanction, founded on the Decrees of the Councils of Constance and Basil, and grants, to the Pape's several Advantages by Laples, Anticipations, and the Power of admitting Refignations, with other beneficial Articles; the Inconveniences of which Refusal, may, and ought, to be remedied by fuch ways as have been formerly put in practice by the Church: For the providing whereof, it was proposed, That Provincial Councils, or a National one, should be called. The King's Council having been heard, and a Copy of the Bull produced, which was made in May last, and Printed at Rome, concerning the Franchifes of the Ambaffador's Quarters, with the Ordonnance of the 26th of December, and the Aftorny-General's Appeal of the 22d Instanto And after mature debate upon the whole, the Court pronounced this Judgment, That the Attorny General be admitted an Appellant as of abuse against the said Bull and Ordonnance, declaring the fame to be void, forbidding all Persons to disperse them within the Kingdom, and commanding that all Copies be brought to the Register's Office there to be suppress'd. That the Appeal, brought by the Attorny-General to a future Council, be sprolled. That the King be humbly intrested to employ his, Authority for the maintenance of the Franchises and Immunities of his Ambassadors Quarsers at Rome, to the utmost extent, in which the same westerever enjoyed.
