Son of the Church: That the prefent King was not bewind any of his Anceftors in his Services and Refiects to the Holy See: That the Perfons of Ambafladors were aways held Sacred; eveh antronght Nations not yet civit liz'd: That the Priviledges and Franchifes pretended to, were Immunities that the Crown had been long poffers'd bf: That the Rights of the Crown can adinit of no Regulation or Bounds, but fuch as ihall be fet by the Juftice and Moderation of the King: That the former Popes, whio endeavoured to reformi the Abufes of the Franchifes, empleyed no other means but thofe of their Temporal Power: 'That the Cenfures of the Churchi and the Power of the Keys, were abuifed when employed to ferve Temporal ends: That an Ambaffador, reprefenting the King, and executing his Commands, was exempt from all EccleFiaftical Cenfore : That the Church of St. Lettis,was, by a Bull of Sixtus V. made the National Church of the French, where they were bound to affift at Divine Service, and receive the Communion, in whatever parts they Jived at Rome. If this had been a matter of Ecclefiaftical Cognizance, and the Ambaffador Subject to it, there was neither a preceding Citation againft him, nor Sentence pronotuc'd and publifhed, or to much as a Signification of zay to the Curate of the interdicted Cburch: All which muft plainly fhew the nullity of that Deeree. To which it was further added, That the Pope, fince the laft affembly of the Clergy, upon the Bufinefs of the Regalb, and their Declarations then made, had refufed his Bulls to fuch as the King had nominated to the yacant Archbifhopricks and Bifhopieks, by which there were 35 unfupplied, to the great Preiudice of thofe Diocefes, and contrary to the Agreement feted between Pope Leo X. and Francis I by an Inftrument called the Concordat, which, in Favour of the Pope, revok'd the Pragmatique Sanction, founded on the Decrees of the Coungils of Conftance and Bafill, and grants, to the Pgise's Teveral Adraptages by Laples, Anticipations,; and the Power of ad mitting Refignations, with other beneficial Artices ${ }^{\prime}$ the Inconveniences of whith Refufal, may, and cught, to be remedied by fuch ways as have been formerly put in practice by the Church: For the providing whereof, it was propoled, That Prquincial Councils, or a National one, thould be called. The King's Coungil having been heard, and a Copy of the Bull produced, which was made in $M a y$ laft, and Printed at Rome, copcerning the Franchifes of the Ambaffador's, Quarters, with , whe Ordonnance of the 26th of Decanderer, and the Attorny-General's Ap-. peal of the 22d Intants And aiter mature debate upon the whole, the Coirt-pronounced this Judghient, That the Attorny-General be admitted an Appellant as of abufe againt the faid Bull and Ordonanice, dedaring the fane to be void, forbinding all Perrons fo differfe them: within the Kingdom, and commanding that all Copies be brought to the Regifter's Office theretobe fupprefid. That the Appeal, brought by the Atporgy-General to a foture Council, be gingoligd. That the King be huntbly . intreated to employ his, Authority for the maintenance of the Franchifes and Fumuxities of his Appbaffodors Quarwers at Rome, to the putpoof extent, in, which the fame Wh teger enioyedr As, alfo to call, Rrorincial Councils, onanational Oner, OFOAn Affembly pfe the Great Men, to conkide of the nioftgoryenient mpans, toremedy the diforders, which, the tongay wancy of Acchbifhopricks and Binhopricks hath whoduged, and to pheyent the Progrefs midinareafe of the (ange; And thatin the mean time, his Maisfley woutd be plegied to prohibit, in fuch manner as the Inall think fits siayy, Conmerce, with , the Court of Dompi in fending iMopshy thither. anted laftly, that this
