Provided, that such revocation shall not apply to or otherwise affect any proceeding or any act commenced under the authority of the said Orders respectively, and not yet completed; but the same may be continued to completion as fully as if this Order were not issued.

This Order shall be published by the Local Authority of the county of Chester as defined in the Order of the Privy Council, bearing date the 24th day of March last, in some newspaper circulating in the said county.

**W**HEREAS by an Act passed in the session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, intituled "An Act to prevent until the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals," and from time to time continued by divers subsequent Acts, and lastly by an Act passed in the session of the twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and nineteen, it is (amongst other things) enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time, to make such Orders and Regulations as to them may seem necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal, to or from such parts or places as they might designate in such Order or Orders, of sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals, or of meat, skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals, or of hay, straw, fodder, or other articles likely to propagate infection, and to make any other Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations; and that all provisions for any of the purposes aforesaid in any such Order or Orders contained shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in the said Act:

And whereas a contagious or infectious disorder generally designated as the "Cattle Plague," has lately appeared, and now prevails, amongst cattle in England and Wales:

And whereas divers Orders have been made by the Lords of the said Council in relation to the

cattle plague, which were consolidated and amended by an Order bearing date the 24th day of March last, which Order has been altered and extended by subsequent Orders:

And whereas it was ordered thereby that no cattle shall be moved on any highway between sunset and sunrise except within certain limits therein specified, and it is expedient to alter the said Order in this respect:

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy-Council do hereby, in exercise of the powers given under the said Act so continued as aforesaid, alter the said Order in the manner following; that is to say:

No cattle shall, during this present month of December, and the ensuing months of January, February, and March, be moved on any highway between the hours of six o'clock in the evening and six o'clock in the morning, except within the limits specified in the said Order.

The forms of licences and passes issued under any Order of the said Council, which contain any reference to the said prohibition in the Order of the 24th day of March last, shall be altered in accordance with this Order.

This Order shall be construed in like manner as the Order of the 24th of March last; and the provisions of the said Order relative to the offences in contravention thereof, and the penalties for the same, and otherwise now in force, except so far as they may be inconsistent with anything herein contained, shall be applied to this Order.
