**W**HEREAS by an Act of Parliament made and passed in the sixth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, chapter seventy-eight, it was amongst other things enacted "That it should and might be lawful for His Majesty, His heirs and successors, by His or their Order in Council, or for the Lords or others of His or their Privy Council, or any two or more of them, by their Order from time to time, as often as they might see reason to apprehend that the yellow fever or other highly infectious distemper prevailed on the Continent of America or in the West Indies, to require that every vessel coming from or having touched at any port or place on the Continent of America or in the West Indies, should come to an anchor at certain places to be appointed, from time to time, by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs (who were thereby authorized to make such appointment), for the purpose of having the state of health of the crew of such vessel ascertained before such vessel should be permitted to enter the port whereto she should be bound, or any other port of the United Kingdom; but that such vessel should not be deemed liable to quarantine unless it should be afterwards specially ordered under that restraint:"

And whereas there is reason to apprehend that the yellow fever prevails at St. Thomas's, in the West Indies, and it is expedient to put into operation the above-recited provision of the said Act:

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council do hereby order and direct that every vessel coming from or having touched at the Port of St. Thomas aforesaid shall come to an anchor at such place or places as may from time to time be appointed by the Com-

missioners of Her Majesty's Customs, for the purpose of having the state of the health of the crew of such vessel ascertained before such vessel shall be permitted to enter the port whereto she shall be bound, or any other port of the United Kingdom, and shall remain at such place or places until the state of health of such crew shall have been ascertained, pursuant to the said recited provision, and thereafter to be subject to such lawful direction as may be made in that behalf by or under the direction of the said Lords.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

## REGIMENTAL DEBTS ACT, 1865.

NOTICE is hereby given, that Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the War Department holds in his hands for distribution amongst the next of kin of each of the deceased soldiers named in the list hereunder written, the sum of money set opposite to each name.

No application can be attended to which does not quote the War Office number from the first column of the list, and which does not state the dates and places of the soldier's birth, enlistment, and death, also the name of his regiment, and his regimental number.

Should not these particulars furnished by the applicant agree with the facts recorded on the War Office documents relating to the deceased soldier, no notice will be taken of the application, but should they agree therewith then after the expiration of three calendar months the Secretary of State will furnish the applicant with the usual requirements needed for the proof of his relationship.

The application must be authenticated by the signature of the applicant, and his name should be affixed in the presence of the clergyman, or one of the churchwardens of the parish, or a Justice of the Peace, the applicant's address, with the name of the post town, must also be clearly stated. No personal application can receive attention.

Further lists will from time to time be published, and therefore, it will facilitate the applicant's inquiries to give the number and date of the notice in which the deceased soldier's name appeared.—

PARIS UNIVERSAL EXHIBITION OF  
1867 IMPERIAL COMMISSION.

[Extract from *Moniteur Universel*, Thursday,  
13th December, 1866.]

SPECIAL JURY FOR THE NEW CLASS OF  
REWARDS.

THE regulation of the 7th of June, 1866, approved by the Imperial Decree dated the 9th of the same month, established a distinct class of rewards "in favour of individuals, establishments, or localities which, by an organization or by institutions of a special character, have developed a spirit of mutual goodwill among all persons co-operating in the same work, and have assured the material, moral, and intellectual welfare of the workmen."

In accordance with the terms of Article 35, the International Jury specially appointed to judge of this order of merit, held its first meeting at the Palais de l'Industrie on 1st December, 1866, under the presidency of the Minister of State, Vice-President of the Imperial Commission. More than 200 claims received by the Commissaire Général or by foreign commissioners were submitted to the Jury.

New and important applications having been announced by several members, the Jury decided to postpone the last day for the delivery of claims and statements of particulars to the Commissariat Général until the 31st of January, 1867, instead of the 1st of December, 1866, the date previously appointed.

Foreign claims must be transmitted to the Commissariat Général through the medium of the Commissions appointed by each Government, and of their representative on the Special Jury.

On this occasion it was considered desirable that the programme of the competition should be more fully detailed, the Imperial Commission having merely indicated its object in very general terms.

In the first place the following principles were adopted :—

1st. The Jury may doubtless take into account, among the facts presented for its consideration, the spirit of charity and beneficence; but it is not specially charged to reward acts of that character.

2nd. To constitute them the basis of a claim to reward, the facts adduced must have been the consequence of a free and spontaneous initiative, and not of legislative enactments.

3rd. It will not suffice that the work be praiseworthy in itself; it must at the same time be compatible with sustained and progressive prosperity.

4th. The circumstances of the position in which competitors may be found should be duly considered. To have maintained intact traditional circumstances of harmony and happiness, whilst progressing in agricultural or industrial pursuits, is a good ground of claim; but the introduction of improvements where antagonism and suffering previously existed is not less meritorious.

The Jury considers it desirable, with a view to obtaining complete information, and as an element for consideration in making its awards, that the demands should be accompanied by historical and statistical summaries, and by a statement of every circumstance which may serve to characterize the origin, development, and prosperity of the undertakings.

As regards the double object of the competition, the state of harmony and the state of well-being, candidates are at full liberty to select for themselves the best means of showing that they have attained or approximated to this object.

The following may be instanced as symptoms of the existence of a spirit of harmony, — long continuance of co-operation; permanence of satisfactory relations; absence of irritating discussions on the subject of wages.

Among the symptoms of the existence of happiness may be mentioned savings' bank deposits of

proportionably considerable amount, ownership or permanent possession of house, with or without rural out-premises (*dépendances rurales*), combination of agricultural with manufacturing pursuits, subventions, practices, and institutions generally adapted to render the position of the workman more stable, and to provide for exceptional cases.

The following points will not be less worthy of consideration:—Habits of life which admit of the mothers of families remaining at home, and measures taken to protect young girls, the conditions of whose employment necessitate their leaving home; systems of premiums, payment by the piece, and any other arrangements relative to wages likely to improve the quality of the work and to stimulate the workman's energy and spirit of initiative; relief funds, asylums, participation in life assurances; practices and institutions of all kinds which tend to improve the material condition of the work-people, and to secure for them a provision in case of future need; schools and other institutions for the promotion of morality and intelligence. In fine, it will be well to mention whatever efforts have been made to repress or to prevent the spread of vicious habits.

The Jury has not thought it right to exclude from the competition individuals or societies which, although not engaged in agricultural or manufacturing pursuits, have founded durable and prosperous institutions, contributing to the propagation of good-feeling and happiness, of which it is desirable to seek the best examples.

Having completed the programme of the competition, the Jury proceeded to adopt the following regulations respecting the method of examining claims, the arrangement of the candidatures, and the assignment of the rewards:—

1st. A Jury of the same nationality as the claimant, or one representing that nationality, will make the first examination of the claim. This Jury will see that the statements of particulars are as complete as possible, and will address the papers, together with its own opinion (*avis*) of the claim, to the Commissariat Général, before the 31st of January, 1867.

2nd. A Commission, consisting of all members of the Jury present in Paris, will sit from day to day for the purpose of investigating claims. If necessary, it will appoint for each case to be examined a second Jury, the members of which will be of nationalities other than that of the person whose claim may be in question. Acting on the reports of the examinations, the Jury will prepare a class-list of the candidatures admitted to competition.

3rd. A committee of seven members, nominated by the President, will sit from the 15th to the 31st of March, 1867, for the purpose of summing up the work of examination and inquiry. It will draw up a list of sixty candidatures, arranged in order of merit, none being bracketed equal, and will appoint reporting members charged with the duty of supporting its propositions before the jury.

4th. In its second session, from the 14th of April to the 15th of May, the Jury will deliberate upon the class-list presented by the committee; at the same time reserving to itself until the last moment the right of giving a place to claims which the committee may have eliminated. The result of the discussions held on each successive candidature will be stated in a class-list definitively settled.

5th. Finally, the Jury will determine, in accordance with this last-mentioned list, the distribu-

tion and assignment of the prizes and honourable mentions.

A concluding observation may be added to the preceding instructions, which answer the numerous inquiries of claimants respecting the terms of the competition.

It is necessary to obviate the effect of those feelings of extreme reserve which have hitherto prevented the presentation of many applications. The Jury would therefore remark, that the initiative of claims is not restricted to competitors alone, and it invites competent persons to bring under its observation meritorious cases which appear especially deserving of examination.

The study of the documents already addressed to it has enabled the Jury to appreciate the utility of this new competition, and it considers that by pointing out examples of well-being and social harmony those to whom the present appeal is directed will render a service of public benefit.

EXTRACT from the Regulations respecting the nature of the Rewards and the Composition of the Juries appointed to award them. Approved by Imperial Decree, 9th June, 1866.

(See London Gazette, 26th June, 1866.)

IV.—*Special arrangements respecting a new Order of Reward.*

Art. 30. A distinct order of reward is instituted in favour of the persons, establishments, or localities which, by a special organization, or special institutions, have developed a spirit of harmony among all those co-operating in the same work, and have provided for the material, moral, and intellectual well-being of the workmen.

These rewards consist of ten prizes, of the total value of 100,000 francs (£4,000), and twenty Honourable Mentions;

One grand prize of £10,000 francs may, in addition, be awarded to the person, establishment, or locality, distinguished under this head by a very exceptional superiority.

Art. 31. A special jury will judge of the merit specified for this order of reward, and will determine the amount of the prizes and the form in which they will be awarded.

One of the Vice-Presidents of the Imperial Commission will act as President of this jury.

The total number of members, including the President, is fixed at twenty-five.

The number of members which the different countries will contribute to this jury is shewn in the accompanying Table (column e).

The Secretary of the Imperial Commission will act as its Secretary.

Art. 32. In the event of members not being nominated before the 1st December, 1866, in conformity with Art. 3, the Imperial Commission will select the foreign jurors from amongst the persons accredited to them by the various governments.

Art. 33. The number of members of the jury who must be present to form a quorum, is fixed at 18. The prizes and honourable mentions will be awarded according to the majority of votes. The grand prize can only be awarded by a majority of two-thirds.

Art. 34. Applications and documents describing and pointing out for the new order of reward, a person, an establishment, or a locality, must be transmitted before the 1st December, 1866, to the Councillor of State, General Commissioner.

Art. 35. The first session of the jury will be held on the 1st December, 1866, in order that they may lay down the regulations for the guidance of applicants, and commence their investigations.

Art. 36. In a second and last session, from the 15th April to the 14th May, 1867, the jury will

come to a final decision on the apportionment of the prizes, and on the persons, establishments, or localities to which they are to be awarded. These prizes will be distributed at the same time as the other rewards, namely, on the 1st July, 1867.
