By the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

PRESENT,

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the sixth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, entitled "An Act to repeal the several Laws relating to the performance of Quarantine, and to make other provisions in lieu thereof," it is, amongst other things, enacted as follows :

Section 2. That from and after the 1st day of June, 1825, all vessels coming from or having touched at any place from whence His Majesty, His heirs or successors, by and with the advice of His or their Privy Council, should have adjudged and declared it probable that the plague, or other infectious disease or distemper highly dangerous to the health of His Majesty's subjects, might be brought, should be and be considered to be liable to quarantine, within the meaning of the said Act and of any Order or Orders which should be made by His Majesty, His heirs and successors, by and with the advice of His or their Privy Council, concerning quarantine and the prevention of infection as therein mentioned; and all such vessels as aforesaid should, upon their arrival at any such port or place, be obliged to perform quarantine, in such place or places, for such time, and in such manner as should from time to time be directed by His Majesty, His heirs or successors, by His or their Order or Orders in Council, notified by proclamation, or published in the London Gazette; and all commanders, masters, or other persons having the charge or command of any such vessels, whether coming from any infected place, or being otherwise liable to quarantine as aforesaid, should be subject to all provisions, rules, regulations, and restrictions contained in the said Act, or in any Order or Orders which should be made by His Majesty, His heirs and successors, in Council, as aforesaid, concerning quarantine, and the prevention of infection, and to all the pains, penalties, forfeitures, and punishments contained in the said Act, for any breach or disobedience

thereof, or of any Order or Orders of His Majesty in Council, made under the authority thereof.

Section 3. That it should be lawful for His Majesty, His heirs and successors, by His or their Order in Council, or for the Lords or others of His or their Privy Council, or any two or more of them, by their Order from time to time, as often as they should see reason to apprehend that the yellow fever or other highly infectious distemper prevails on the Continent of America, or in the West Indies, to require that every vessel coming from or having touched at any port or place on the Continent of America or in the West Indies, should come to an anchor at certain places to be appointed from time to time by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs (who were thereby authorised to make such appointment), for the purpose of having the state of health of the crew of such vessel ascertained before such vessel should be permitted to enter the port whereto she should be bound, or any other port of the United Kingdom; but that such vessel should not be deemed liable to quarantine unless it should be afterwards specially ordered under that restraint.

Section 6. That it should be lawful for the Lords and others of His Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, to make such Order as they should see necessary and expedient upon any unforeseen emergency, or in any particular case or cases, with respect to any vessel arriving and having any infectious disease or distemper on board, or on board of which any infectious disease or distemper might have appeared in the course of the voyage, or arriving under any other alarming or suspicious circumstances as to infection, although such vessels should not have come from any place from which His Majesty, His heirs or successors, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, might have adjudged and declared it probable that the plague or any such infectious disease or distemper might be brought, and also with respect to the persons, goods, wares, and merchandise, and other articles as therein mentioned on board the same, and likewise to make such Orders as they should see fit, for shortening the time of quarantine to be performed by particular vessels or particular persons, goods, wares, merchandise, or any other articles, or for absolutely or conditionally releasing them, or any of them from quarantine; and all such Orders so made by the Lords or others of the Privy Council, or any two or more of them as aforesaid, should be as good, valid, and effectual, to all intents and purposes, as

well with the respect to the commander, master, or other person having the charge of any vessel, and all other persons on board the same, as with respect to any other persons having any intercourse or communication with them, and to the penalties, forfeitures, and punishments to which they might respectively become liable, as any Order or Orders made by His Majesty, His heirs or successors, by and with the advice of His or their Privy Council, concerning quarantine, notified by proclamation or published in the London Gazette.

And whereas, by "The Sanitary Act, 1866," it is (amongst other things) enacted as follows:—

Section 52. That every vessel having on board any person affected with a dangerous or infectious disorder should be deemed to be within the provisions of the Act of the sixth year of King George the Fourth, chapter seventy-eight, although such vessel had not commenced her voyage, or had come from or was bound for some place in the United Kingdom; and the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, or any three or more of them (the Lord President of the Council or one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State being one), might, by Order or Orders to be by them from time to time made, make such Rules, Orders, and Regulations as to them should seem fit, and every such Order should be certified under the hand of the Clerk in Ordinary of Her Majesty's Privy Council, and should be published in the London Gazette, and such publication should be conclusive evidence of such Order to all intents and purposes.

And whereas one of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company's vessels, called the "La Plata," has lately arrived from the West Indies, in the Southampton Water, in the county of Hants, and has been directed to proceed to, and remain under quarantine at, the Motherbank, off the Isle of Wight, and during and in the course of her voyage from the West Indies, the Yellow Fever, being a dangerous and infectious disease, appeared on board the said vessel, and attacked several persons on board thereof, and the said vessel arrived under alarming and suspicious circumstances; and whereas several persons who were on board the "La Plata," on her arrival, being all the persons on board the said ship who were known to be or suspected of being affected by the said disease, have since been ordered to be removed to the Quarantine Lazaretto or Hulk called the "Menelaus," lying at the Motherbank, off the Isle of Wight:

And whereas it is expedient to make provision for the disposition of the other persons remaining on board the said ship "La Plata:"

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, in exercise of the powers vested in them in that behalf, do hereby order,—

1. That the said vessel called the "La Plata" shall remain and continue at the Motherbank aforesaid, until the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, or any three or more of them shall make further Order.

2. That the persons now on board the said vessel called the "La Plata," not ordered to be removed to the "Menelaus," shall be removed to the ship called the "Parana," at the Motherbank, unless ordered to remain on board the "La Plata," by the Medical Superintendent of Quarantine at Southampton.

3. That all persons on board the "Menelaus" Quarantine Hulk, or who shall hereafter be removed on board the said hulk, or on board the "Parana," shall be kept and detained on board the said hulk, or the "Parana," until the said Lords of the Council, or any three or more of them, shall make further order.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, intituled "An Act to prevent "until the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the "spreading of contagious or infectious disorders "among sheep, cattle, and other animals," and from time to time continued until the first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, and the end of the then next session of Parliament, by divers subsequent Acts, and lastly by an Act passed in the session of the twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and nineteen, it is (amongst other things) enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time, to make such Orders and Regulations as to them may seem necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal to or from such parts or places as they might designate in such Order or Orders, of sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals, or of meat, skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals, or of hay, straw, fodder, or other articles likely to propagate infection, and to make any other Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations; and that all provisions for any of the purposes aforesaid in any such Order or Orders contained shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in the said Act:

And whereas a contagious or infectious disorder generally designated as the "Cattle Plague," has lately appeared, and now prevails, amongst cattle in England, and has also prevailed among sheep in many parts of England:

And whereas divers Orders have been made by the Lords of the said Council in relation to the cattle plague, which were consolidated and amended by an Order bearing date the 24th day

of March last, which Order has been altered and extended by subsequent Orders :

And whereas by the said Order of the Privy Council, it was ordered that no market, fair, auction, exhibition, or sale of cattle, should be held until the 1st day of June last, which time has been since further extended by an Order of the said Council until the said Lords shall otherwise order, subject to exception as in the said Order of the 24th day of March last is mentioned; and whereas such exception was made in respect of markets licensed according to the provisions therein contained :

And whereas by another Order, bearing date the 8th day of August last, the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council did prescribe certain forms of licence to be used for the removal of various animals :

And whereas it is expedient that provisions should be made to enable sales of animals, to which these Orders apply, to take place from time to time under such restrictions as the said Lords shall deem requisite.

Now, therefore, the Lords of the Council do hereby order, that from and after the twenty-first day of this January instant, the Lords of the said Council may, upon application from the Local Authority of any county, license the holding of any sale or sales of animals, either at stated periods or from time to time, at any place on

places within the district of the said Authority, during such time and under such restrictions or conditions as to the said Council shall seem expedient or necessary; and thenceforth, animals may be sold for immediate slaughter or otherwise, at such place or places, anything in the Orders of the said Council to the contrary notwithstanding.

Every licence so granted shall be revocable by the said Lords of the Council when they deem it necessary to revoke the same.

When the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council shall, under this Order, license any sale of animals, such animals may be moved to the place of such sale from such places and none other than shall be defined in the licence granted for such sale, with a licence in the form set forth in the above-mentioned Order of the 8th day of August last, for the store stock licence, with the declaration and certificate thereto annexed, but not without it; and the person bringing such animals to the place of sale, shall deliver the said licence to some officer appointed by the Local Authority for the purpose of receiving the same thereat, and the said licence shall be numbered, detained, and carefully kept and recorded by such officer.

No animal exposed to sale or sold in such place shall be moved therefrom to any place, except with a pass or licence to be given by the officer who shall have received the licence as aforesaid, to the owner or purchaser desirous of moving the same, in the following form :—

Appointed to receive licences and grant passes in the above-named place of sale.

NOTE.—Any person who forges or alters any licence, or offers or utters the same knowing it to be forged or altered, will be liable to a penalty of £20, or to be imprisoned, with hard labour, for the term of three months. See 29 and 30 Victoria, cap. 110, sec. 10.

Provided that nothing herein contained shall affect any licence already granted by the Privy Council for any market for the sale of animals for immediate slaughter or otherwise; or for any market for the sale of sheep or lambs; or for the holding of exhibitions, nor affect the provisions of any Order of the Privy Council under which the Local Authority of any county is empowered to license the holding of fairs, or to make regulations as to the admission of animals into such county.

The words herein contained shall be construed as in the said Order of the 24th day of March last, and all the provisions therein contained

relative to the offences for the contravention thereof, and the penalty for the same, and the provisions of the said Order in regard to the powers of officers employed under that Order and all other provisions of that Order, and the subsequent Orders altering the same now in force and not inconsistent with anything herein contained, shall, in respect of every matter to which they may be applicable, apply to the regulations contained in this Order and the enforcing of the same, and to the officers employed under it.
