WHEREAS by an Act passed in the sixth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, entitled "An Act to repeal the several Laws relating to the performance of Quarantine, and to make other provisions in lieu thereof," it is, amongst other things, enacted as follows:

Section 2. That from and after the 1st day of June, 1825, all vessels coming from or having touched at any place from whence His Majesty, His heirs or successors, by and with the advice of

His or their Privy Council, should have adjudged and declared it probable that the plague, or other infectious disease or distemper highly dangerous to the health of His Majesty's subjects, might be brought, should be and be considered to be liable to quarantine, within the meaning of the said Act and of any Order or Orders which should be made by His Majesty, His heirs and successors, by and with the advice of His or their Privy Council, concerning quarantine and the prevention of infection as therein mentioned; and all such vessels as aforesaid should, upon their arrival at any such port or place, be obliged to perform quarantine, in such place or places, for such time, and in such manner as should from time to time be directed by His Majesty, His heirs or successors, by His or their Order or Orders in Council, notified by proclamation, or published in the London Gazette; and all commanders, masters, or other persons having the charge or command of any such vessels, whether coming from any infected place, or being otherwise liable to quarantine as aforesaid, should be subject to all provisions, rules, regulations, and restrictions contained in the said Act, or in any Order or Orders which should be made by His Majesty, His heirs and successors, in Council, as aforesaid, concerning quarantine, and the prevention of infection, and to all the pains, penalties, forfeitures, and punishments contained in the said Act, for any breach or disobedience thereof, or of any Order or Orders of His Majesty in Council, made under the authority thereof.

Section 3. That it should be lawful for His Majesty, His heirs and successors, by His or their Order in Council, or for the Lords or others of His or their Privy Council, or any two or more of them, by their Order from time to time, as often as they should see reason to apprehend that the yellow fever or other highly infectious distemper prevails on the Continent of America, or in the West Indies, to require that every vessel coming from or having touched at any port or place on the Continent of America or in the West Indies, should come to an anchor at certain places to be appointed from time to time by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs (who were thereby authorised to make such appointment), for the purpose of having the state of health of the crew of such vessel ascertained before such vessel should be permitted to enter the port whereto she should be bound, or any other port of the United Kingdom; but that such vessel should not be deemed liable to quarantine unless it should be afterwards specially ordered under that restraint.

Section 6: That it should be lawful for the Lords and others of His Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, to make such Order as they should see necessary and expedient upon any unforeseen emergency, or in any particular case or cases, with respect to any vessel arriving and having any infectious disease or distemper on board, or on board of which any infectious disease or distemper might have appeared in the course of the voyage, or arriving under any other alarming or suspicious circumstances as to infection, although such vessels should not have come from any place from which His Majesty, His heirs or successors, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, might have adjudged and declared it probable that the plague or any such infectious disease or distemper might be brought, and also with respect to the persons, goods, wares, and merchandise, and other articles as therein mentioned on board the same, and likewise to make such Orders as they should see fit, for shortening the time of quarantine to be performed by particular vessels or particular

persons, goods, wares, merchandise, or any other articles, or for absolutely or conditionally releasing them, or any of them from quarantine; and all such Orders so made by the Lords or others of the Privy Council, or any two or more of them as aforesaid, should be as good, valid, and effectual, to all intents and purposes, as well with the respect to the commander, master, or other person having the charge of any vessel, and all other persons on board the same, as with respect to any other persons having any intercourse or communication with them, and to the penalties, forfeitures, and punishments to which they might respectively become liable, as any Order or Orders made by His Majesty, His heirs or successors, by and with the advice of His or their Privy Council, concerning quarantine, notified by proclamation or published in the London Gazette.

And whereas, by "The Sanitary Act, 1866," it is (amongst other things) enacted as follows:—

Section 52. That every vessel having on board any person affected with a dangerous or infectious disorder should be deemed to be within the provisions of the Act of the sixth year of King George the Fourth, chapter seventy-eight, although such vessel had not commenced her voyage, or had come from or was bound for some place in the United Kingdom; and the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, or any three or more of them (the Lord President of the Council or one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State being one), might, by Order or Orders to be by them from time to time made, make such Rules, Orders, and Regulations as to them should seem fit, and every such Order should be certified under the hand of the Clerk in Ordinary of Her Majesty's Privy Council, and should be published in the London Gazette, and such publication should be conclusive evidence of such Order to all intents and purposes.

And whereas one of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company's vessels, called the "Seine," has lately arrived, from the West Indies, in the Southampton Water, in the county of Hants, and is now under quarantine at the Motherbank, off the Isle of Wight, and during and in the course of her voyage from the West Indies, the Yellow Fever, being a dangerous and infectious disease, appeared on board the said vessel, and the said vessel arrived under suspicious circumstances; and whereas several persons who were on board the "Seine," on her arrival, have since been removed to the vessels called the "Parana," and the "Æolus," lying at the Motherbank, off the Isle of Wight:

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, in exercise of the powers vested in them in that behalf, do hereby order,—

1. That the said vessel called the "Seine," shall remain and continue at the Motherbank aforesaid, until the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, or any three or more of them shall make further Order.

2. Provided that all persons on board the "Parana" and the "Æolus" continue in good health, and that no new matter shall have come to the knowledge of the Commissioners of Customs in objection thereto, the persons so removed on board the "Parana" and "Æolus" having been detained on board those vessels under a quarantine

of observation for a period exceeding twenty-four hours, after such removal, shall, together with the said vessels "Parana" and "Æolus," be discharged from any further restraint on account of quarantine, together with such of their clothing, bedding, and personal baggage, as the Medical Superintendent of Quarantine, at Southampton, shall certify to have been properly aired, washed, or fumigated.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, intituled "An Act to prevent until the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals," and from time to time continued until the first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, and the end of the next session of Parliament, by divers subsequent Acts, and lastly by an Act passed in the last session of Parliament, it is (amongst other things) enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time to make such Orders and Regulations as to them may seem necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal to or from such parts or places as they may designate in such Order or Orders of sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals, or of meat, skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals, or of hay, straw, fodder, or other articles likely to propagate infection, and to make any other Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations; and that all provisions for any of the purposes aforesaid, in any such Order or Orders contained, shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in the said Act:

And whereas a contagious or infectious disorder, generally designated as the "Cattle Plague," has lately appeared, and now prevails, amongst cattle in some parts of England:

And whereas divers Orders have been made by the Lords of the said Council in relation to the

cattle plague, which were consolidated and amended by an Order bearing date the twenty-fourth day of March last, which has been since altered and extended by subsequent Orders :

And whereas it is, among other things, therein ordered by the said Privy Council, that any Local Authority as to any place within its district shall, by an Order made after the passing of that Order, declare any place in which disease amongst animals at that time exists, to be an infected place from and after a date to be specified in such Order :

And whereas provisions are contained in the said Order of the Privy Council to regulate the movement of cattle on any highway, and such movement, without a licence as therein described, is prohibited, except for a distance not exceeding five hundred yards from one part of the same farm to the other, and forms of licence for the removal of cattle were set forth in the schedule to the said Order :

And whereas by an Order of the Lords of the Council, bearing date the 8th day of August last, the forms of licences so set forth were altered and others were substituted, and in all such forms it is provided that animals thereby authorised to be removed shall not be driven or passed through

any infected place or within one mile of the outward boundary thereof :

And whereas it is expedient that an alteration shall be made in the above limits of one mile in regard to animals moved within the Metropolis :

Now, therefore, the Lords of the Council do hereby order that, from and after the date hereof, animals, whether intended for immediate slaughter or not, may be moved within the Metropolis, at a distance not less than one hundred yards from the outward boundary of any place in the said Metropolis declared to be infected, in accordance with the provisions of the said Order of the 24th March last, anything in the said Order, or in any other Order, or in any licence duly issued under the Orders aforesaid, to the contrary notwithstanding.

This Order shall be construed in all respects as the said Order of the 24th March last, and the said Lords do further order, that the Local Authority for the Metropolis shall forthwith cause this Order to be published by advertisement in some newspaper circulating in the Metropolis, and by causing a copy thereof to be affixed at some conspicuous place in the Metropolitan Cattle Market, at Islington, in the county of Middlesex.
