Ladies and Gentlemen wishing to attend Her Majesty's Courts must send in their names and addresses to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, S.W., on or after Thursday, the 21st instant, and these names will be submitted for Her Majesty's approval in the order of their receipt at the Office.

All applications must be made in writing, and no names will be received previous to the 21st instant.

Ladies and Gentlemen who desire to be presented to Her Majesty must, in like manner, send in their names and addresses to the Lord Chamberlain's Office on or after the 21st instant. A letter from the Lady or Gentleman by whom each presentation is to be made must in all cases be forwarded.

The Queen has been graciously pleased, with regard to these Courts, to dispense with the regulation that the Lady or Gentleman must attend

the Court at which they propose to make presentations to Her Majesty.

The Lord Chamberlain will forward to all persons who can be received under the above regulations, cards for their admission to Buckingham Palace at the Court which Her Majesty shall be pleased to appoint for their reception.

In sending in their names Ladies and Gentlemen are requested to mention the Court which they would prefer to attend.

All those Ladies and Gentlemen who receive cards of admission to Buckingham Palace are requested to bring with them two large cards with their names clearly written thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in attendance and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to Her Majesty. In the case of presentation the name of the presenter must be inserted on the card.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for rendering more easy the taking the poll at county elections," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time, on petition from the Justices of any county, riding, parts, or division in England or Wales in Quarter Sessions assembled, representing that the number of polling places for such county, riding, parts, or division is insufficient, and praying that the place or places mentioned in the said petition may be a polling place or polling places for the county, riding, parts, or division of the county within which such place or places is or are situate, to declare that any place or places mentioned in the said

petition shall be a polling place or polling places for that county, riding, parts, or division, and that the Justices of the Peace for the county, riding, parts, or division, in Quarter Sessions or some Special Sessions assembled, as mentioned in the Act passed in the second and third years of His said late Majesty, intituled "An Act to settle and describe the divisions of counties and the limits of cities and boroughs in England and Wales, in so far as respects the election of members to serve in Parliament," shall, conformably to the said last-mentioned Act, divide such county, riding, parts, or division into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place :

And whereas the Justices of the Peace for the county of Derby, in Quarter Sessions assembled, on the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, have presented a petition to Her Majesty, representing that the number of polling places for the southern division of the said county is insufficient, and praying that Ripley, in the said division, may be a polling place for that division :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the petition into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to declare, order, and direct, and it is hereby declared, ordered, and directed, that Ripley, in the said division, shall be a polling place for the said southern division of the said county ; and that the Justices of the Peace for the said county, in Quarter Sessions, or some Special Sessions assembled, as mentioned in the said Act, passed in the second and third years of the reign of His said late Majesty, shall, conformably to the said Act, divide such southern division of the said county into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place.

And whereas by certain other Acts made and passed in the thirteenth and fourteenth, in the sixteenth, in the twentieth, in the twenty-second, and in the twenty-ninth years of the reign of Her Majesty, the provisions of the said recited Act, have been amended and extended :

And whereas it has been represented that it would be of advantage to the public, if the County Court of Flintshire, holden at Saint Asaph, were ordered to be holden at Rhyl, as well as at Saint Asaph.

"WE, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of the Holy Trinity, situate at Lane End, in the parish of Great Marlow, in the county of Buckingham, and in the diocese of Oxford.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Great Marlow, of the parish of West Wycombe, in the county and diocese aforesaid, of the parish of Fingest, in the same county and diocese, and of the parish of Hambleden, in the same county and diocese, which lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the Schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such respective parishes.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parish of Great Marlow, of the said parish of West Wycombe, of the said parish of Fingest, and of the said parish of Hambleden, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all Ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of the Holy Trinity, situate at Lane End aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Samuel Bishop of the said diocese of Oxford, as such Bishop, and as the patron, in right of his see of the vicarage of the said

parish of Great Marlow, and also as the alternate patron in right of his see of the rectory of the said parish of Fingest (to which is united for Ecclesiastical purposes the rectory of the parish of Ibstone, in the county and diocese aforesaid), with the consent of Dame Elizabeth Dashwood, of West Wycombe Park, in the same county, widow, the patron of the vicarage of the said parish of West Wycombe, and with the consent of the Reverend William Henry Ridley, the rector or incumbent of the rectory of the said parish of Hambleton, and the patron of the same rectory (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), and with the consent of the warden and scholars of the House or College of Scholars of Merton in the University of Oxford, the other alternate patrons of the rectory of the parish of Fingest with the parish of Ibstone thereto united as aforesaid (in testimony whereof they have affixed their corporate or collegiate seal to this representation) we humbly represent, that it would in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Great Marlow, of the said parish of West Wycombe, of the said parish of Fingest, and of the said parish of Hambleton, which are described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of the Holy Trinity, situate at Lane End aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of the Holy Trinity, Lane End,' and that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of such Consolidated Chapelry should belong to and be exercised by the said William Henry Ridley, as rector for the time being of the rectory of the parish of Hambleton as aforesaid, and by his successors in the same rectory for ever.

"We therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The consolidated chapelry of the Holy Trinity, Lane End, being:—

"All those contiguous portions of the parish of Great Marlow, in the county of Buckingham, and in the diocese of Oxford, of the parish of West Wycombe, in the same county and diocese, of the parish of Fingest in the same county and diocese, and of the parish of Hambleton in the same county and diocese, which are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line, commencing at a point upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Great Marlow from the parish of Hambleton aforesaid, at a point near to Sears's brick-kilns, in the middle of the road leading from Freeth across Moor Common to Lane End, and extending thence first southward, then north-eastward, and then south-eastward along the last described boundary passing Moor Farm, and passing Bismar Pond, and following from thence the southern side of Moor Wood to the southern end of the fence dividing Moor Wood aforesaid from the closes numbered respectively 1081, 1098, and 1099 upon the tithe commutation map of the said parish of Great Marlow, and upon the map hereunto annexed, and extending thence first northward and then north-eastward along the middle of such fence to its junction with the fence dividing the close numbered 1099 as aforesaid, from the close numbered

1100 upon the said maps, and extending thence northward along the middle of the last described fence, and along the middle of the fence dividing the close numbered 18 upon the said maps from the cottage and orchard numbered 16 upon the same maps, to the northern extremity of the last described fence on the southern side of the road leading from Lane End to Marlow, near to the milestone indicating three miles to Marlow, and extending thence north-eastward, obliquely across the last described road to a point in the middle of the southern end of a certain footpath leading through Brangwins Shaw and Widdington Park Wood towards West Wycombe, and extending thence in a direction generally northward, to and along the middle of the said footpath (crossing the boundary which divides the said parish of Great Marlow from the parish of West Wycombe aforesaid), as far as a point in the middle of the fence forming the southern boundary of the close in which Park Cottages are situate, and which is numbered 789 upon the tithe commutation map of the said parish of West Wycombe, and upon the said map hereunto annexed, and extending thence eastward along the middle of the said boundary fence to its junction with the fence forming the eastern and northern boundary fence of the same close and cottages, and extending thence first northward and then westward along the middle of the last described boundary fence to a point in the middle of the southern end of the lane which leads from the said cottages towards West Wycombe, and extending thence northward along the middle of the same lane to its junction with Park-lane, and continuing thence still northward across the last-named lane to a point in the middle of the southern end of Great Wood-lane, and continuing thence in the same direction for a distance of twenty chains, or thereabouts, along the middle of the last-named lane to a point opposite to the middle of the western end of the fence forming the southern boundary of the farm-house and homestead called Ellis's Farm, in the occupation of Mr. James Smith Hobbs and numbered 430 upon the last-mentioned maps; and extending thence eastward to and along the middle of the last described boundary fence to its junction with the fence forming the eastern and northern boundary of the said farm-house and homestead, and extending thence first northward and then north-westward along the middle of the last described fence to a point in the middle of Great Wood-lane, aforesaid, opposite to the middle of the western end of the last described fence, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-mentioned lane for a distance of nine chains or thereabouts to the gate at the entrance of Great Wood opposite to the middle of the eastern end of the footpath which leads along the southern side of the said Wood, and across the road called "Gravelly Nap," and across the enclosed lands on the western side of such road, and through Denhams Wood to Wheeler End Common, and extending thence first north-westward to and along the last-described footpath, and then south-westward along the middle of the same footpath as far as a point on Wheeler End Common aforesaid at the south-eastern corner of the allotment grounds called "Botany," and continuing thence south-westward in a direct line for a distance of ten and a half chains, or thereabouts across the said common to the point in the middle of the road leading from Fingest to Ham and West Wycombe where such road is intersected by the boundary which divides the said parish of West Wycombe from the parish of Fingest aforesaid, and extending thence westward along

the said boundary to its junction with the boundary dividing the said parish of Fingest from the Consolidated Chapelry of Cadmore End situate partly in the said county of Buckingham and partly in the county of Oxford, and wholly in the Diocese of Oxford aforesaid; and extending thence in a direction generally southward along the last-described boundary, following in the latter portion the road leading from Fingest to Ham and West Wycombe aforesaid, as far as the point near the foot of Hanover Hill where the said boundary diverges from such road; and extending thence first south-eastward and then south-westward along the middle of the last-described road to a point near the Sign-Post Pond on the boundary dividing the said parish of Fingest from the parish of Hambleton aforesaid; and extending thence eastward along the last-described boundary (following thereby the road leading from Fingest to Marlow) as far as the point where the said boundary diverges to the north-east from the last-mentioned road, and continuing thence south-eastward along the middle of the same road to its intersection by the road which leads from Freeth across Moor Common to Lane End, as aforesaid; and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the road last referred to as far as the first-described point near to Sears's brick-kilns upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Great Marlow from the parish of Hambleton as aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts, and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct, that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Oxford.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now, humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated

chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Simon, situate within the limits of the parish of Sheffield, in the county of York, and in the diocese of York.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Sheffield, and of the chapelry district of Saint Mary, Sheffield, in the same county and diocese, which lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the Schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the churches of such parish and chapelry district respectively.

"And whereas, it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parish of Sheffield, and of the said chapelry district of Saint Mary, Sheffield, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all Ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Simon, situate within the limits of such parish as aforesaid.

"And whereas by a certain indenture bearing date on or about the fifteenth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, and made or expressed to be made between the Right Honourable and Most Reverend William Archbishop of York of the first part, William Pole Thornhill, of Stanton Park, near Bakewell, in the county of Derby, Esquire, and Isabella, his wife, and Andrew Sherlock Lawson, of Aldborough Manor, near Boroughbridge, in the said county of York, Esquire, the patrons of the vicarage of the said parish of Sheffield, of the second part, the Reverend Thomas Sale, Doctor of Divinity, the Vicar or Incumbent of the Vicarage of the same parish of the third part, and the Right Honourable and most Reverend William Thomson, Doctor of Divinity, in his individual capacity (previously named as party to the indenture in his corporate or official capacity of Archbishop of York), the said Thomas Sale in his individual capacity (previously named as party to the said indenture in his corporate or official capacity of Vicar of Sheffield), Thomas Dunn, of Sheffield aforesaid, Esquire (a lay member of the Church of England); and Henry Rodgers, of Sheffield aforesaid, Esquire (also a lay member of the Church of England), of the fourth part; it was agreed that the right of nominating a minister to serve the said church of Saint Simon, situate within the limits of the parish of Sheffield as aforesaid, should, upon and after the consecration of such church, be vested in and should be exercised jointly by the said persons, parties to the before-mentioned indenture, of the fourth part; and in and by their heirs and assigns as trustees, that is to say, in and by the said William Thomson and Thomas Sale, in their individual, and not in their corporate capacities, and in and by the said Thomas Dunn and Henry Rodgers, and their heirs and assigns, and in such other trustees as should be thereafter appointed in the manner in such indenture more particularly set forth and provided.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said William, Archbishop of York, as bishop of the said diocese of York, and with the consents of the said William Pole Thornhill, and of the said Isabella, his wife, and of the said Andrew Sherlock Lawson, the patrons of the vicarage of the parish of Sheffield as aforesaid, and with the consent of the said Thomas Sale, the vicar or incumbent of such vicarage, and as such the patron of the perpetual curacy of the chapelry district of Saint Mary, Sheffield (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation) we humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Sheffield, and of the said chapelry district of Saint Mary, Sheffield, which are described in the Schedule

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said district chapelry of Christ Church, Portswood, which is hereinafter mentioned and described (such part not at present containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine

worship), should be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes in the manner hereinafter set forth.

numbered respectively 1481 and 1489 upon the said maps from the closes numbered respectively 1480 as aforesaid, 1440, and 1376, upon the same maps, to the south-western end of the fence which divides the close numbered 1439 from the close numbered 1376 as aforesaid; and continuing thence, still south-westward, to a point in the middle of the road which leads from Hedgerley past the northern end of Park-lane to Wigmore Heath and Dropmore; and extending thence, westward, along the middle of such road, for a distance of seven chains, or thereabouts, to the boundary at the junction of the same road with Park-lane aforesaid which divides the said parish of Burnham from the parish of Dorney aforesaid; and extending thence, first south-eastward and then south-westward, along the last-described boundary (following thereby the middle of the said lane), as far as a point opposite to a boundary post inscribed 'St. A. D., 1866, No. 7,' and placed on the boundary which divides the said parish of Hitcham from the parish of Hedsor, in the same county and diocese; and extending thence first north-eastward and then north-westward along the last-described boundary, to its junction with the boundary dividing the said parish of Hitcham from the parish of Wooburn, in the same county and diocese; and extending thence in a direction mainly north-

eastward along the last-described boundary to its junction with the boundary dividing the parish of Taplow aforesaid from the said parish of Wooburn; and extending thence first northward and then north-eastward along the last-described boundary, to its junction with the boundary dividing the said parish of Beaconsfield from the parish of Taplow, as first described; and extending thence south-eastward along such boundary to the point in Green Common Lane, where the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Oxford.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the eighth day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Anne, situate at Chasetown, in the new parish of Burntwood, in the county of Stafford, and in the diocese of Lichfield.

"Whereas, at certain extremities of the said new parish of Burntwood, of the new parish of Saint John the Baptist, Hammerwich, in the county and diocese aforesaid, and of the consolidated chapelry of Ogle Hay, in the same county and diocese, which lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such new parishes and consolidated chapelry respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said new parish of Burntwood, of the said new parish of Saint John the Baptist, Hammerwich, and

of the said consolidated chapelry of Ogle Hay, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Anne, situate at Chasetown aforesaid.

"And whereas by an agreement bearing date the ninth day of September, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, and expressed to be made between the Right Reverend John, Bishop of the said diocese of Lichfield, of the first part, the Reverend Henry Moore, the then Vicar or Incumbent of the Vicarage of the parish of Saint Mary, in the city of Lichfield, and in the said diocese of Lichfield, and as such Vicar or Incumbent, the patron of the perpetual curacy of the said new parish of Burntwood, of the second part, the Reverend George Poole, the Incumbent of the same perpetual curacy, of the third part, John Robinson McClean, of No. 23, Great George-street, Westminster, then President of the Institution of Civil Engineers, of the fourth part, and the Most Honourable Henry, Marquess of Anglesey, of the fifth part, it was agreed that the right of nominating a Minister to serve the said church of Saint Anne, situate at Chasetown aforesaid, when consecrated should be vested in and should be exercised by the person or persons therein and hereinafter mentioned, that is to say, by the said John Robinson McClean and his heirs for and during the continuance of a certain lease then existing of a colliery called 'The Cannock Chase Colliery,' and also during the continuance of any extension of such lease of the same colliery that might thereafter be granted, and that from and after the determination of such existing lease or extended lease as aforesaid, the right of nominating a Minister to serve the said church of Saint Anne, situate at Chasetown aforesaid, should be exercised by and be vested in perpetuity in the said Henry, Marquess of Anglesey, and the person or persons for the time being entitled to the possession or the receipt of the rents and profits of so much of the settled estates of the Anglesey family as are comprised in the said lease.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said John, Bishop of the said diocese of Lichfield, as such bishop and also as the patron in right of his see of the perpetual curacy of the said consolidated chapelry of Ogle Hay, and with the consent of the Reverend John Gylby Lonsdale, the present vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Saint Mary, Lichfield, and as such vicar or incumbent the patron of the perpetual curacy of the said new parish of Burntwood, and with the consents of John Jackson, of Hammerwich aforesaid, Gentleman, Thomas Pavier, of No. 9, Bedford-row, Red Lion-square, in the county of Middlesex, Gentleman, Richard Bird, of Beacon-street, Lichfield, in the county of Stafford, Gentleman, Charles Forster the younger, of Haunch Hall, Lichfield aforesaid, Gentleman, William Adey Russell, of Wallington House, Bloxwich, in the said county of Stafford, Gentleman, Elias Ashmole Ashmall, of Hammerwich aforesaid, Farmer, Thomas William Flavell, of No. 21, Bedford-row aforesaid, Esquire, and Thomas Stubbs, of Teddesly, near Cannock, in the said county of Stafford, Farmer, the joint patrons (with John Bird, of Beacon-street aforesaid, a Minor), of the perpetual curacy of the said new parish of Saint John the Baptist, Hammerwich (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said new parish of Burntwood, of the said new parish of Saint John the Baptist, Hammerwich and of the said con-

solidated chapelry of Ogle Hay, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Anne, situate at Chasetown aforesaid; and that the same should be named 'The consolidated chapelry of Chasetown,' and that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of such consolidated chapelry should belong to and be exercised by the person or persons particularly mentioned and described in and contemplated by the hereinbefore-recited agreement of the ninth day of September, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, which said agreement is deposited in the diocesan registry at Lichfield.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Chasetown, being:—

"All those contiguous portions of the new parish of Burntwood, in the county of Stafford, and in the diocese of Lichfield, of the new parish of Saint John the Baptist, Hammerwich, in the same county and diocese, and of the consolidated chapelry of Ogle Hay, in the same county and diocese which are bounded on the north and in part on the west, by the new parish of Gentleshawe, in the said county and diocese, and in other part of the west by the parishes of Cannock and Norton Canes, in the same county and diocese, and on all other sides thereof, that is on the south-west, south-east, and east, by an imaginary line, commencing at the point in the centre of Norton Reservoir, where the boundary which divides the said new parish of Burntwood, from the said parish of Norton Canes, meets the northern boundary of the consolidated chapelry of Ogle Hay aforesaid; and extending thence south-eastward along the original boundary which before the assignment of the said consolidated chapelry divided the township or parish of Hammerwich, from the parish of Norton Canes aforesaid, to a boundary stone, inscribed 'C. St. A. C. C., 1866, No. 1,' and placed on the northern side of the road leading from Brownhills to Burntwood; and extending thence first south-eastward to a point in the middle of such road, and then north-eastward, along the middle of the same road for a distance of eighteen chains, or thereabouts (crossing the Birmingham Canal Navigation, and the railway of the Cannock Chase Colliery Company, and crossing the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint John the Baptist, Hammerwich, from the consolidated chapelry of Ogle Hay aforesaid), to a point opposite to a boundary stone inscribed 'C. St. A. C. C. 1866, No. 2,' and placed on the northern side of the said road; and extending thence, northward, to the last-described boundary stone; and continuing thence, still northward, and in a direct line, for a distance of thirty chains, or thereabouts, to a boundary stone inscribed 'C. St. A. C. C. 1866, No. 3,' and placed on the northern side of the road leading from Chasetown to Muckley Corner, at the southern end of the fence forming the eastern boundary of the close numbered 1 upon the map attached to the award of the Commissioners for enclosing the townships of Burnt-

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; and of the Act of the

twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-fourth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme, for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the parish of Llangerniew, in the county of Denbigh, and in the diocese of Saint Asaph.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said parish of Llangerniew, which is hereinafter mentioned and described (such part not at present containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship), should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas certain hereditaments and premises situate within the said parish of Llangerniew have become vested in us under the provisions of and for the purposes of the herein mentioned Acts.

"And whereas Henry Robertson Sandbach, of Hafodunos, in the said parish of Llangerniew, Esquire, has contributed and applied in and towards the erection of a church for the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted certain sums of money, upon the understanding that we should provide for and pay to the minister of the said district a grant of one hundred and fifty pounds per annum, when and so soon as such district shall have been constituted, and when and so soon as such minister shall have been duly licensed according to the provisions of the herein secondly-mentioned Act, and upon the further understanding that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) the whole right of patronage of the said district, and of the nomination of the minister thereof, should be assigned in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas such grant of one hundred and fifty pounds per annum will be made by an instrument to be executed by us under our common seal, in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and eleven.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Thomas Vowler, Bishop of the said diocese of Saint Asaph (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose, that all that part of the said parish of Llangerniew, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Llanddewi.'

"And we further recommend and propose, that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted, and of the nomination of the minister thereof, shall, without any assurance in the law, other than this scheme,

and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be assigned to, and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Thomas Vowler, Bishop of the said diocese of Saint Asaph, and by his successors, bishops of the same diocese, for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measure relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Llanddewi, being:—

"All that part of the parish of Llangerniew, in the county of Denbigh, and in the diocese of Saint Asaph, which is situate to the south of an imaginary line, commencing upon the boundary which divides such parish from the parish of Eglwfsfach, in the same county and diocese, at a point in the middle of the road leading from Eglwfsfach to Llangerniew, opposite to a boundary stone inscribed 'L. D., 1867, No. 1,' and placed on the southern side of such road, and extending thence eastward along the middle of the said road, for a distance of sixty-eight chains, or thereabouts, to a point opposite to a boundary stone inscribed 'L. D., 1867, No. 2,' and placed on the southern side of the same road, at the northern end of the fence which divides the close numbered 759 upon the tithe commutation map of the said parish of Llangerniew, and upon the map hereunto annexed, from the close numbered 749 upon the same maps, and extending thence first southward to the last-described boundary stone and along the middle of the said fence, and then eastward along the middle of the same fence to its junction with the fence which divides the said close numbered 759 from the close numbered 750 upon the same maps, and continuing thence in a direction, still generally eastward, along the middle of the last-described fence and along the middle of the fences which divide the buildings and premises of the farm called 'Caerllo,' numbered 756 upon the said maps, and the closes numbered respectively 776, 775, 774, 737, 735, 725, 700, 701, 702, 692, 691, and 690 upon the same maps, from the closes and plantations numbered respectively 750 as aforesaid, 751, 753, 754, 649, 650, 682, 681, 680, and 683 upon the said maps, to a boundary stone inscribed 'L. D., 1867, No. 3,' and placed at the south-eastern end of the fence which divides the close numbered 690 from the close numbered 683 as aforesaid, on the northern side of the road which leads from Llanrwst past Rhos, Tyddyn-Ucha, and Clogddu to Llangerniew, and continuing thence first eastward to the middle of the last-described road, and then north-eastward along the middle of the same road to its junction with the road which leads from Llangerniew up the valley by the side of the River Gallen, towards Tynddol and Tynyffordd, and extending thence southward along the middle of the last-described road, for a distance of three chains, or thereabouts, to a point opposite to the middle of the western end of a certain cross road which leads across the said river and past Hendreddu, Cefn Isa, and Gors, to the bridge over the River Elwy, called 'Pont-y-syllte,' and extending thence first

eastward to and along the middle of such cross road, and then south-eastward, and finally north-eastward along the middle of the same road as far as a point in the middle of the said bridge, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said River Elwy, for a distance of six chains, or thereabouts, to the boundary which divides the said parish of Llangerniew from the parish of Llanfair Talhaiarn, in the county and diocese aforesaid."

A whereas a draft of the said scheme has been, in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore secondly-mentioned Act, transmitted to the patron and to the incumbent of the parish out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such patron and incumbents have respectively signified their assent thereto.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Saint Asaph.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the Session of Parliament, held in the twentieth and twenty-first years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the Burial Acts," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, to order such acts to be done by, or under the directions of the churchwardens or such other persons as may have the care of any vaults or places of burial, for preventing them from becoming or continuing dangerous or injurious to the public health; and that every such Order in Council shall be published in the London Gazette, and that such churchwardens or other persons shall do or cause to be done all acts ordered as aforesaid, and the expenses incurred in and about the doing thereof shall be paid out of the poor rates of the parish: Provided always, that no such representation shall be made until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the churchwardens or other persons, or one of the churchwardens or other persons, having the care of the vaults or places of burial to which the representation relates;

And whereas the Right Honourable Spencer Horatio Walpole, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation having been duly given to the churchwardens or other persons having the care of the under-mentioned church, has made a representation, stating that he is of opinion that, for the protec-

tion of the public health, an Order should be made for the adoption of the measures which are hereinafter set forth;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the churchwardens or such other persons as may have the care of the undermentioned church do adopt, or cause to be adopted, the following measures, viz. :—

That the coffins now unenclosed beneath the parish church of Spitalfields, Middlesex, be embedded in soil mingled with charcoal, and enclosed either by concrete or by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit;

And whereas Orders in Council have been made, directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyards and burial-ground hereinafter mentioned, from the time specified in such Orders; and whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the time for discontinuing burials in the said churchyards and burial-ground be postponed;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyards and burial-ground be postponed as follows; viz. :

In the parish churchyard, Cannington, Bridgewater, to the thirty-first of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven.

In the churchyard of East Grinstead, Sussex, to the thirty-first of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven.

In the burial-ground of Grosvenor-street Chapel, Staleybridge, to the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, on condition that the Regulations of the Order in Council of the twenty-ninth of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, be observed.

And whereas by an Order in Council, bearing date the first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, burials were directed to be discontinued in the churchyard of Petersham from and after the first day of January, one

thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, which time has since been postponed by various Orders in Council :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that interments be discontinued in Petersham churchyard after the thirtieth of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, except in now existing vaults and walled graves in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal and separately enclosed in stone or brickwork properly cemented.

And whereas by an Order in Council, bearing date the twenty-fourth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, burials were, with certain exceptions, directed to be discontinued on and after the time specified in such Order in the churchyard of St. John, Dukinfield, which time has been postponed by various Orders in Council :

And whereas it seems fit that the said Orders be varied :

COYTY, GLAMORGANSHIRE.—Forthwith wholly in the Noltz Episcopalian Chapel, in the parish of Coyty ; and that interments be discontinued in the burial-ground of that chapel after the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, except in vaults and walled graves, in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal, and separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented, and except in earthen graves which can be opened to the depth of five feet without the exposure of coffins or disturbance of remains.

And that interments be discontinued forthwith wholly in the Independent Chapel in the parish of Coyty, and forthwith in the chapel-yard, except for the burial of the members of the families of those already buried therein.

NEWCASTLE, GLAMORGANSHIRE.—Forthwith wholly in the church ; and that interment be discontinued in the churchyard after the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, except in vaults and walled graves existing on the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal, and separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented, and except in earthen graves which can be opened to the depth of five feet without the exposure of coffins or the disturbance of remains.

And that interments be discontinued forthwith wholly in the Baptist and Unitarian Chapels in the parish of Newcastle, Glamorganshire ; and forthwith in the burial-grounds of the said chapels, except for the burial of the members of the families of those already buried therein.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the nineteenth day of March next :

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette ; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before the said nineteenth day of March.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the sixth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, entitled "An Act to repeal the several Laws relating to the performance of Quarantine, and to make other provisions in lieu thereof," it is, amongst other things, enacted as follows :

Section 2. That from and after the 1st day of June, 1825, all vessels coming from or having touched at any place from whence His Majesty, His heirs or successors, by and with the advice of His or their Privy Council, should have adjudged and declared it probable that the plague, or other infectious disease or distemper highly dangerous to the health of His Majesty's subjects, might be brought, should be and be considered to be liable to quarantine, within the meaning of the said Act and of any Order or Orders which should be made by His Majesty, His heirs and successors,

by and with the advice of His or their Privy Council, concerning quarantine and the prevention of infection as therein mentioned; and all such vessels as aforesaid should, upon their arrival at any such port or place, be obliged to perform quarantine, in such place or places, for such time, and in such manner as should from time to time be directed by His Majesty, His heirs or successors, by His or their Order or Orders in Council, notified by proclamation, or published in the London Gazette; and all commanders, masters, or other persons having the charge or command of any such vessels, whether coming from any infected place, or being otherwise liable to quarantine as aforesaid, should be subject to all provisions, rules, regulations, and restrictions contained in the said Act, or in any Order or Orders which should be made by His Majesty, His heirs and successors, in Council, as aforesaid, concerning quarantine, and the prevention of infection, and to all the pains, penalties, forfeitures, and punishments contained in the said Act, for any breach or disobedience thereof, or of any Order or Orders of His Majesty in Council, made under the authority thereof.

Section 3. That it should be lawful for His Majesty, His heirs and successors, by His or their Order in Council, or for the Lords or others of His or their Privy Council, or any two or more of them, by their Order from time to time, as often as they should see reason to apprehend that the yellow fever or other highly infectious distemper prevails on the Continent of America, or in the West Indies, to require that every vessel coming from or having touched at any port or place on the Continent of America or in the West Indies, should come to an anchor at certain places to be appointed from time to time by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs (who were thereby authorised to make such appointment), for the purpose of having the state of health of the crew of such vessel ascertained before such vessel should be permitted to enter the port whereto she should be bound, or any other port of the United Kingdom; but that such vessel should not be deemed liable to quarantine unless it should be afterwards specially ordered under that restraint.

Section 6. That it should be lawful for the Lords and others of His Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, to make such Order as they should see necessary and expedient upon any unforeseen emergency, or in any particular case or cases, with respect to any vessel arriving and having any infectious disease or distemper on board, or on board of which any infectious disease or distemper might have appeared in the course of the voyage, or arriving under any other alarming or suspicious circumstances as to infection, although such vessels should not have come from any place from which His Majesty, His heirs or successors, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, might have adjudged and declared it probable that the plague or any such infectious disease or distemper might be brought, and also with respect to the persons, goods, wares, and merchandise, and other articles as therein mentioned on board the same, and likewise to make such Orders as they should see fit, for shortening the time of quarantine to be performed by particular vessels or particular persons, goods, wares, merchandise, or any other articles, or for absolutely or conditionally releasing them, or any of them from quarantine; and all such Orders so made by the Lords or others of the Privy Council, or any two or more of them as aforesaid, should be as good, valid, and effectual, to all intents and purposes, as

well with the respect to the commander, master, or other person having the charge of any vessel, and all other persons on board the same, as with respect to any other persons having any intercourse or communication with them, and to the penalties, forfeitures, and punishments to which they might respectively become liable, as any Order or Orders made by His Majesty, His heirs or successors, by and with the advice of His or their Privy Council, concerning quarantine, notified by proclamation or published in the London Gazette.

And whereas, by "The Sanitary Act, 1866," it is (amongst other things) enacted as follows:—

Section 52. That every vessel having on board any person affected with a dangerous or infectious disorder should be deemed to be within the provisions of the Act of the sixth year of King George the Fourth, chapter seventy-eight, although such vessel had not commenced her voyage, or had come from or was bound for some place in the United Kingdom; and the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, or any three or more of them (the Lord President of the Council or one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State being one), might, by Order or Orders to be by them from time to time made, make such Rules, Orders, and Regulations as to them should seem fit, and every such Order should be certified under the hand of the Clerk in Ordinary of Her Majesty's Privy Council, and should be published in the London Gazette, and such publication should be conclusive evidence of such Order to all intents and purposes.

And whereas one of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company's vessels, called the "Seine," has lately arrived, from the West Indies, in the Southampton Water, in the county of Hants, and is now under quarantine at the Motherbank, off the Isle of Wight, and during and in the course of her voyage from the West Indies, the Yellow Fever, being a dangerous and infectious disease, appeared on board the said vessel, and the said vessel arrived under suspicious circumstances; and whereas several persons who were on board the "Seine," on her arrival, have since been removed to the vessels called the "Parana," and the "Æolus," lying at the Motherbank, off the Isle of Wight:

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, in exercise of the powers vested in them in that behalf, do hereby order,—

1. That the said vessel called the "Seine," shall remain and continue at the Motherbank aforesaid, until the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, or any three or more of them shall make further Order.

2. Provided that all persons on board the "Parana" and the "Æolus" continue in good health, and that no new matter shall have come to the knowledge of the Commissioners of Customs in objection thereto, the persons so removed on board the "Parana" and "Æolus" having been detained on board those vessels under a quarantine of observation for a period exceeding twenty-four hours, after such removal, shall, together with the said vessels "Parana" and "Æolus," be discharged from any further restraint on account of quarantine, together with such of their clothing, bedding, and personal baggage, as the Medical Superintendent of Quarantine, at Southampton,

shall certify to have been properly aired, washed, or fumigated.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, intituled "An Act to prevent until the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals," and from time to time continued until the first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, and the end of the next session of Parliament, by divers subsequent Acts, and lastly by an Act passed in the last session of Parliament, it is (amongst other things) enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time to make such Orders and Regulations as to them may seem necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal to or from such parts or places as they may designate in such Order or Orders of sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals, or of meat, skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals, or of hay, straw, fodder, or other articles likely to propagate infection, and to make any other Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations; and that all provisions for any of the purposes aforesaid, in any such Order or Orders contained, shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in the said Act:

And whereas a contagious or infectious disorder, generally designated as the "Cattle Plague," has lately appeared, and now prevails, amongst cattle in some parts of England:

And whereas divers Orders have been made by the Lords of the said Council in relation to the cattle plague, which were consolidated and amended by an Order bearing date the twenty-fourth day of March last, which has been since altered and extended by subsequent Orders:

And whereas it is, among other things, therein ordered by the said Privy Council, that any Local Authority as to any place within its district shall, by an Order made after the passing of that Order, declare any place in which disease amongst animals at that time exists, to be an infected place from and after a date to be specified in such Order:

And whereas provisions are contained in the said Order of the Privy Council to regulate the

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movement of cattle on any highway, and such movement, without a licence as therein described, is prohibited, except for a distance not exceeding five hundred yards from one part of the same farm to the other, and forms of licence for the removal of cattle were set forth in the schedule to the said Order:

And whereas by an Order of the Lords of the Council, bearing date the 8th day of August last, the forms of licences so set forth were altered and others were substituted, and in all such forms it is provided that animals thereby authorised to be removed shall not be driven or passed through any infected place or within one mile of the outward boundary thereof:

And whereas it is expedient that an alteration shall be made in the above limits of one mile in regard to animals moved within the Metropolis:

Now, therefore, the Lords of the Council do hereby order that, from and after the date hereof, animals, whether intended for immediate slaughter or not, may be moved within the Metropolis, at a distance not less than one hundred yards from the outward boundary of any place in the said Metropolis declared to be infected, in accordance with the provisions of the said Order of the 24th March last, anything in the said Order, or in any other Order, or in any licence duly issued under the Orders aforesaid, to the contrary notwithstanding.

This Order shall be construed in all respects as the said Order of the 24th March last, and the said Lords do further order, that the Local Authority for the Metropolis shall forthwith cause this Order to be published by advertisement in some newspaper circulating in the Metropolis, and by causing a copy thereof to be affixed at some conspicuous place in the Metropolitan Cattle Market, at Islington, in the county of Middlesex.

hoofs, or other parts of any animals, or of hay, straw, fodder, or other articles likely to propagate infection, and to make any other Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations; and that all provisions for any of the purposes aforesaid in any such Order or Orders contained shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in the said Act:

And whereas the said Act has been amended and explained by an Act passed in the twenty-ninth year of Her present Majesty's reign, intitled "An Act to amend the Act of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and seven, to prevent the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals:"

And whereas a contagious or infectious disorder, generally designated as the "Cattle Plague," has lately appeared and now prevails amongst cattle in some parts of England:

And whereas divers Orders have been made by the Lords of the said Council in relation to the Cattle Plague, which were consolidated and amended by an Order bearing date the 24th day of March last:

And whereas provisions are contained in the said Order of the Privy Council to regulate the movement of cattle on any highway, and such movement without a licence as therein described is prohibited, except for a distance not exceeding five hundred yards, from one part of the said farm to the other:

And whereas the holding of markets for the sale of cattle is prohibited by the said Order until the 1st day of June, 1866, except in the case of a market held with the licence of the Privy Council for the sale of cattle intended for immediate slaughter, which term hath, by an Order of the said Council, been extended from the said 1st day of June until the said Lords of the Council shall otherwise direct:

And whereas there is a market held in a place known as Smithfield, in the borough of Birmingham, in the county of Warwick, for the sale of cattle, and the holding thereof has been licensed by the Lords of the said Council, by instrument, bearing date the 31st day of May last, for the sale of cattle intended for immediate slaughter, so long as the said above-mentioned Orders shall remain in force, or until the revocation of the said licence as therein provided, subject to all the conditions, provisions, and regulations in the said first-mentioned Order contained applicable to such market:

And whereas it is provided by the said Order of the 24th of March last, that in the case of cattle brought to any market other than the Metropolitan Cattle Market, they shall in no case be taken beyond such limits as may be described in the licence of the Privy Council allowing such market, and under such conditions with respect to their movement within such limits as may be imposed by such licence:

And whereas in the said licence for the holding of the above-mentioned market, it is provided that no cattle brought into the said market shall be taken alive beyond the limits of the municipal boundaries of the said borough, and further, that no market shall be held for the sale of sheep, lambs, goats, or swine, within the said borough, except for the purpose of slaughter, and all sheep, lambs, goats, or swine, brought into any market within

the borough for sale, shall be slaughtered within the municipal boundaries of the said borough within four days after their exposure in the market:

And whereas it is expedient that certain other regulations should be made in this behalf:

Now, therefore, the Lords of the Council do hereby order, that notwithstanding such provisions in the said licence, and all similar provisions in the said Order, cattle sold in the said market until the fourth day of May next, if the said licence shall so long continue in force, may be moved to any slaughter-house in the towns or places of Wolverhampton, Walsall, Honslow, Smethwick, Willenhall, Darlaston, Wednesbury, West Bromwich, Tipton, Rowley Regis, Great Bridge, Bilston, and Harborne, in the county of Stafford, and to the towns and places of Aston, Warwick, Coventry, and Saltley, all in the county of Warwick, and at all intermediate places in the respective counties of Stafford and Warwick between any such town or place and the said borough of Birmingham, to be there slaughtered under such regulations as the Local Authorities for the counties of Stafford and Warwick respectively shall from time to time make and issue in regard to the movement as well as the places, times, and manner of slaughtering of such cattle.

Provided that nothing herein contained shall allow the cattle to be kept alive for more than five days after exposure in the said market.

Every such regulation shall be published by the Local Authority making it in some newspaper circulating in the borough of Birmingham, and by a notice affixed in some conspicuous place in the said market.

Notwithstanding the provision in the said licence above recited, and the similar provision in the said Order, swine may be sold at any market or other place within the said borough, whether for immediate slaughter or otherwise, and need not be slaughtered within the municipal boundaries of the said borough within four days after their exposure for sale.

This Order shall be construed in like manner as the said Order, and every person who shall contravene this Order, or any regulation of the Local Authority made under it, shall be guilty of an offence, and be subject to the like penalty as in the case of a contravention of any regulation in such Order.

And the Lords of the said Council hereby further direct that the Local Authority of the borough of Birmingham shall cause this Order to be published in some newspaper circulating in the said borough.

And whereas it is expedient that the like authority should be given for the removal of cattle and other animals from the county of Westmoreland into Scotland :

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council do hereby order that from and after the sixth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, notwithstanding anything in the said first mentioned Order of the 31st day of August last provided, it shall be lawful for any person to move cattle and other animals from the county of Westmoreland into Scotland, provided that a licence for moving such animals be obtained in the form and otherwise in accordance with the provisions contained in the Order made by the said Lords, bearing date the 8th day of August last, which apply to the licence therein termed the Store Stock Licence, and provided also that the Local Authority of the county in Scotland, into which such animals are proposed to be removed, shall give authority, or issue some regulation for the movement of animals from the county of Westmoreland into it, and the same shall be duly observed.

This Order shall be construed in like manner as the Order issued by the Lords of the said Council under the Acts aforesaid, bearing date the 24th day of March last, and shall be published by the Local Authority of the county of Westmoreland in some public newspaper circulating in the same county.

Every regulation to be made by every such Local Authority in Scotland shall be published in like manner as other regulations issued by Local Authorities in Scotland have been required to be published by the Lords of the said Council.

PROVISIONAL ORDER under the Highway Act, 1862, and the Highway Act, 1864.

WHEREAS at a Court of Quarter Sessions of the Peace, held in and for the county of Middlesex, by adjournment, on the 17th day of January instant, a Provisional Order was made in the words following; that is to say:—

Middlesex.

WHEREAS at the General Quarter Session of the Peace for this county of Middlesex, on the 5th day of January, 1863, the Justices then assembled did, by a certain Provisional Order made by virtue of the statute in that case made and provided, constitute certain parishes, with so much of the parish of Harrow-on-the-Hill as is not within the district of the Harrow Local Board of Health constituted under the Public Health Act, 1848, a highway district, for the more convenient management of highways, to be called the Edgware Highways District, and did order and direct that two Waywardens should be elected for such part of the parish of Harrow-on-the-Hill as is not within such Local Board of Health district.

And whereas at the General Session of the Peace holden in and for the said county, on the 9th day of February, 1863, and thence continued by adjournment to the 19th day of February, in the year aforesaid, the Justices then assembled did then and there make a Final Order confirming the Provisional Order so made as aforesaid.

And whereas by the Highway Act, 1864, it is enacted that the Justices may, by their Provisional and Final Order, declare that any Poor Law parish within their jurisdiction, or residue of a Poor Law parish, after excluding such part, if any, as is prohibited by the Highway Act, 1862, either wholly or without the consent of the governing body, from being included in the highway district, shall henceforward become a highway parish; and upon such declaration being made, such Poor Law parish or residue of a Poor Law parish shall thereafter be a highway parish entitled to return a Waywarden or Waywardens to the Highway Board of the district in which it is included.

And whereas by the said Highway Act, 1864, it is enacted that where, previously to the passing of the Provisional Order forming a highway district, Surveyors or Waywardens have been elected within any highway parish in that district, and where the mode of electing a Waywarden or Waywardens in such parish is not provided by this Act or the Highway Act, 1862, the Justices shall, by their Provisional and Final Orders constituting the district, or by any subsequent Provisional and Final Orders, make Provisional and Final Orders for the annual election of a Waywarden or Waywardens for such parish.

And whereas by the above-recited Provisional and Final Orders constituting the Edgware Highways District, no declaration was made that so much of the parish of Harrow-on-the-Hill as is not within the district of the Harrow Local Board of Health should be a highway parish entitled to return two Waywardens to the Highway Board, nor make provision for the annual election of such Waywardens.

And whereas application has been made unto the Justices of the Peace for the said county at the General Quarter Session of the Peace holden at the Sessions House, Clerkenwell-green, by adjournment, this 17th day of January, 1867, to

make a Provisional Order, and to confirm the same subsequently by a Final Order, declaring so much of the said parish of Harrow-on-the-Hill as is not within the district of the Harrow Local Board of Health shall be a highway parish, entitled to return two Waywardens, and making provision for the annual election of such Waywardens.

Now, at the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Lady the Queen, holden in and for this county of Middlesex, at the Session House, on Clerkenwell-green, by adjournment, on Thursday, the 17th day of January, 1867, the Justices of the Peace for the said county here assembled, upon a due consideration of the premises, do, by virtue of the first-mentioned Act by this Provisional Order, declare and direct that so much of the parish of Harrow-on-the-Hill as is not within the district of the Harrow Local Board of Health shall be a highway parish, and shall be designated "The Highway Parish of Harrow-on-the-Hill." And that in future all elections for Waywardens of the said highway parish of Harrow-on-the-Hill shall be conducted in manner and form following; that is to say:—

The Clerk shall at every election of Waywardens perform the duties hereby imposed on him, and in case there is a vacancy in the office of Clerk, or from illness, or other sufficient cause he shall be unable to discharge such duties, the Waywardens shall appoint some person to perform such of the duties as shall then remain to be performed.

The Clerk shall prepare and sign a notice, which shall, on or before the 1st day of March, be published in like manner as notices for holding vestries for the transaction of parochial business for the whole parish, and shall contain the following particulars:—

The number and qualification of the persons to be elected.

The persons by whom, and the places where, the nomination papers hereinafter mentioned are to be received, and the last day on which they are to be sent.

The mode of voting in case of a contest, and the day on which the voting papers will be delivered and collected, and the time and place for casting up the votes.

Provided always, that when the day appointed for any Act in relation to such election shall be on a Sunday, Christmas Day, or Good Friday, such Act shall be performed on the day next following, and each subsequent proceeding shall be postponed one day.

Any person entitled to vote in such highway parish may nominate for the office of Waywardens thereof, himself, or any other person or persons legally qualified, not exceeding the number of persons to be elected.

Every such nomination shall be in writing, in the form marked A hereunto annexed, and be signed by one person only, and shall be sent, after the 1st and on or before the 10th day of March, to the Clerk, or to such person as may be appointed to receive the same. No nomination sent before the 1st of March or after the 10th shall be valid.

If the number of persons nominated shall be the same or less than the number of persons to be elected, such person or persons, if duly qualified, shall be deemed to be elected, and shall be certified by the Clerk under his hand, but if the number so nominated exceed the number to be elected, the Clerk shall cause voting papers, in the form Schedule B thereto annexed, to be prepared and filled up, and shall insert therein the

names of all the persons nominated, with the number of votes each would be entitled to under the Act 58 Geo. 3, cap. 69, it shall not be necessary to insert more than once the name of any person nominated; and the Clerk shall, on the 20th day of March, cause one of such voting papers to be delivered by the person appointed for that purpose to the address in such highway parish of each ratepayer or owner qualified to vote therein.

If the Clerk considers that any person nominated is not duly qualified to be a Waywarden, he shall state in the voting paper that he considers such person not to be duly qualified.

If any person nominated shall tender to the Clerk his refusal in writing to serve as Waywarden, and if, in consequence thereof, the number of such persons shall be the same as or less than the number of persons to be elected, all or so many of the remaining candidates, being duly qualified, shall be deemed to be elected, and shall be certified as such by Clerk under his hand.

Each voter shall write his initials in the voting paper delivered to him against the name or names of the person or persons (not exceeding the number of persons to be elected) for whom he intends to vote, and shall sign such voting paper, provided that if any voter cannot write, he shall affix his mark at the foot of the voting paper in the presence of a witness, who shall attest and write the name of the voter against the same, as well as the initials of such voter, against the name of every candidate for whom the voter intends to vote.

The Clerk shall cause the voting papers to be collected on the next day but one by the persons appointed or employed for the purpose, in such manner as he shall direct, but no voting paper shall be received or admitted unless the same have been delivered at the address or residence as aforesaid, of the voter within the highway parish, nor unless the same be collected by the persons appointed or employed for that purpose: Provided always, that if any person qualified to vote shall not have received a voting paper as aforesaid, he shall, on application before that day to the Clerk, be entitled to receive a voting paper from him, and to fill up the same in his presence, and then and there to deliver the same to him. Voting papers not collected as aforesaid may be delivered in person to the Clerk before ten o'clock in or on the day appointed for the examination and casting up of the votes.

The Clerk shall, on the 25th day of March, attend at the Board Room of the Waywardens, and ascertain the validity of the votes by an examination of the rate books, and such other documents as he may think necessary, and by examining such persons as he may think fit; and he shall make a list of the voters, and cast up such of the votes as he shall find to be valid, and to have been duly given, collected, or received, and ascertain the number of such votes for each candidate; and the candidates to the number of Waywardens to be elected for such highway parish, who, being duly qualified, shall have obtained the greatest number of votes, shall be deemed to be elected, and shall be certified as such by the Clerk under his hand.

And to each person so elected he shall send notice for such election.

And affix copies of such notice at the usual places for affixing notices of parochial meetings.

He shall deliver to the Waywardens, at their next Meeting after such election, such list, with all the nomination and voting papers, to be pre-

served for not less than two years, and the same shall be open to public inspection for six months after such election without fee or reward.

In the event of the full number of Waywardens not being elected at the time aforesaid, or if during the year a vacancy shall occur by death, resigna-

tion, removal of other disqualification, the Board of Waywardens shall direct the Clerk to proceed to the election of one or more, as the case may be, to supply such defect, and the Clerk shall adopt the foregoing rules in conducting such election at such times as the Board shall direct.
