REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S COURTS AT
BUCKINGHAM PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command.

The number of Ladies and Gentlemen attending each Court will be limited to two hundred and sixty, including those who will be presented to Her Majesty.

It is expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at Her Majesty's Court only when in attendance upon the Ladies of their families.

Those Gentlemen who have not been presented to The Queen will, under such circumstances, be eligible for presentation to Her Majesty at these Courts.

The presentation of Ladies and Gentlemen will be limited to one hundred at each Court.

Ladies and Gentlemen wishing to attend Her Majesty's Courts must send in their names and addresses to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, S.W., on or after Thursday, the 21st instant, and these names will be submitted for Her Majesty's approval in the order of their receipt at the Office.

All applications must be made in writing, and no names will be received previous to the 21st instant.

Ladies and Gentlemen who desire to be presented to Her Majesty must, in like manner, send in their names and addresses to the Lord Chamberlain's Office on or after the 21st instant. A letter from the Lady or Gentleman by whom each presentation is to be made must in all cases be forwarded.

The Queen has been graciously pleased, with regard to these Courts, to dispense with the regulation that the Lady or Gentleman must attend

the Court at which they propose to make presentations to Her Majesty.

The Lord Chamberlain will forward to all persons who can be received under the above regulations, cards for their admission to Buckingham Palace at the Court which Her Majesty shall be pleased to appoint for their reception.

In sending in their names Ladies and Gentlemen are requested to mention the Court which they would prefer to attend.

All those Ladies and Gentlemen who receive cards of admission to Buckingham Palace are requested to bring with them two large cards with their names clearly written thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in attendance and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to Her Majesty. In the case of presentation the name of the presenter must be inserted on the card.

REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEES TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

By Her Majesty's command.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levees, at St. James's

Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levees, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

Buckingham Palace, February 5, 1867.

THIS day Her Majesty proceeded in state from Buckingham Palace to the House of Peers, where she arrived soon after two o'clock; and was received on alighting from Her state carriage, by the Lord Chancellor, the Lord President, the Lord Privy Seal, Lord Colville of Culross, officiating for the Lord Great Chamberlain (the Lord Willoughby de Eresby), the Deputy Earl Marshal, Garter King of Arms, and Black Rod, and proceeded into the House in the usual order;—the crown was borne by the Duke of Richmond, K.G., the sword of state by the Earl of Derby, K.G., and the cap of maintenance by the Marquis of Winchester.

Her Majesty being seated on the Throne, and the Great Officers of State and others standing in their respective places on the right and left, Black Rod was sent with a message from Her Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their immediate attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, Her Majesty was pleased to deliver to the Lord Chancellor the following most gracious Speech to both Houses of Parliament, which Her Majesty commanded his Lordship to read, and which he accordingly did:

My Lords and Gentlemen,

IN again recurring to your advice and assistance, I am happy to inform you that my relations with Foreign Powers are on a friendly and satisfactory footing.

I hope that the termination of the war in which Prussia, Austria, and Italy have been engaged,

may lead to the establishment of a durable peace in Europe.

I have suggested to the Government of the United States a mode by which questions pending between the two countries, arising out of the late civil war, may receive an amicable solution, and which, if met, as I trust it will be, in a corresponding spirit, will remove all grounds of possible misunderstanding, and promote relations of cordial friendship.

The war between Spain and the Republics of Chili and Peru still continues, the good offices of my Government, in conjunction with that of the Emperor of the French, having failed to effect a reconciliation. If either by agreement between the parties themselves, or by the mediation of any other friendly Power, peace shall be restored, the object which I have in view will equally be attained.

Discontent prevailing in some provinces of the Turkish Empire has broken out in actual insurrection in Crete. In common with my Allies, the Emperor of the French and the Emperor of Russia, I have abstained from any active interference in these internal disturbances, but our joint efforts have been directed to bringing about improved relations between the Porte and its Christian subjects, not inconsistent with the sovereign rights of the Sultan.

The protracted negotiations which arose out of the acceptance by Prince Charles of Hohenzollern of the Government of the Danubian Principalities have been happily terminated by an arrangement to which the Porte has given its ready adhesion, and which has been sanctioned by the concurrence of all the Powers signatories of the Treaty of 1856.

Resolutions in favour of a more intimate union of the Provinces of Canada, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick, have been passed by their several Legislatures, and delegates duly authorised, and representing all classes of colonial party and opinion have concurred in the conditions upon which such an union may be best effected. In accordance with their wishes a Bill will be submitted to you which, by the consolidation of colonial interest and resources, will give strength to the several provinces as members of the same empire, and animated by feelings of loyalty to the same Sovereign.

I have heard with deep sorrow that the calamity of famine has pressed heavily on my subjects in some parts of India. Instructions were issued to my Government in that country to make the utmost exertions to mitigate the distress which prevailed during the autumn of last year. The blessing of an abundant harvest has since that time materially improved the condition of the suffering districts.

The persevering efforts and unscrupulous assertions of treasonable conspirators abroad have, during the last autumn, excited the hopes of some disaffected persons in Ireland, and the apprehensions of the loyal population; but the firm, yet temperate exercise of the powers entrusted to the Executive, and the hostility manifested against the conspiracy by men of all classes and creeds, have greatly tended to restore public confidence, and have rendered hopeless any attempt to disturb the general tranquillity. I trust that you may consequently be enabled to dispense with the continuance of any exceptional legislation for that part of my dominions.

I acknowledge, with deep thankfulness to Almighty God, the great decrease which has taken place in the cholera, and in the pestilence which has attacked our cattle; but the continued

prevalence of the latter in some foreign countries, and its occasional re-appearance in this, will still render necessary some special measures of precaution; and I trust that the visitation of the former will lead to increased attention to those sanitary measures which experience has shown to be the best preventive.

Estimating as of the highest importance an adequate supply of pure and wholesome water, I have directed the issue of a commission to inquire into the best means of permanently securing such a supply for the Metropolis, and for the principal towns in densely-peopled districts of the kingdom.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I have directed the estimates for the ensuing year to be laid before you. They have been prepared with a due regard to economy, and to the requirements of the public service.

You will, I am assured, give your ready assent to a moderate expenditure calculated to improve the condition of my soldiers, and to lay the foundation of an efficient army of reserve.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

Your attention will again be called to the state of the representation of the people in Parliament, and I trust that your deliberations, conducted in a spirit of moderation and mutual forbearance, may lead to the adoption of measures which, without unduly disturbing the balance of political power, shall freely extend the elective franchise.

The frequent occurrence of disagreements between employers of labour and their workmen, causing much private suffering and public loss, and occasionally leading, as is alleged, to acts of outrage and violence, has induced me to issue a commission to inquire into, and report upon, the organisation of trades' unions, and other associations, whether of workmen or employers, with power to suggest any improvement of the law for their mutual benefit. Application will be made to you for Parliamentary powers, which will be necessary to make this inquiry effective.

I have directed Bills to be laid before you for the extension of the beneficial provisions of the Factory Acts to other trades specially reported on by the Royal Commission on the employment of children; and for the better regulation, according to the principle of those Acts, of workshops where women and children are largely employed.

The condition of the mercantile marine has attracted my serious attention. Complaints are made that the supply of seamen is deficient; and the provisions for their health and discipline on board ship are imperfect. Measures will be submitted to you with a view to increase the efficiency of this important service.

I have observed with satisfaction the relaxations recently introduced into the Navigation Laws of France. I have expressed to the Emperor of the French my readiness to submit to Parliament a proposal for the extinction, on equitable terms, of the exemptions from local charges on shipping, which are still enjoyed by a limited number of individuals in British ports; and His Imperial Majesty has, in anticipation of this step, already admitted British ships to the advantage of the new law. A Bill upon this subject will forthwith be laid before you.

A Bill will also be submitted to you for making better provision for the arrangement of the affairs of Railway Companies which are unable to meet their engagements.

Measures will be submitted to you for improving the management of Sick and other Poor in the

metropolis, and for a redistribution of some of the charges for relief therein.

Your attention will also be called to the amendment of the Law of Bankruptcy; to the consolidation of the Courts of Probate and Divorce and Admiralty; and to the means of disposing, with greater dispatch and frequency, of the increasing business in the Superior Courts of Common Law, and at the Assizes.

The relations between landlord and tenant in Ireland have engaged my anxious attention, and a Bill will be laid before you which, without interfering with the rights of property, will offer direct encouragement to occupiers of land to improve their holdings, and provide a simple mode of obtaining compensation for permanent improvements.

I commend to your careful consideration these and other measures which will be brought before you; and I pray that your labours may, under the blessing of Providence, conduce to the prosperity of the country and the happiness of my people.

AT the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 1st day of February, 1867.

PRESENT,

WHEREAS by an Order bearing date the 25th day of October last, reciting certain provisions of the statute of the session, held in the eleventh and twelfth years of Her Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, and that a contagious or infectious disorder, known or described as the Sheep-pox or Variola Ovina, then prevailed among the sheep in a certain part of the kingdom, thereinafter described, and that it was expedient to take measures for preventing such disorder from spreading, the Lords of the Council did make certain Orders and regulations to prohibit the removal of sheep or lambs to or from the farm and premises in the occupation of William Matson, senior, situate to the south of the River Colne, and in the parish of St. Osyth, in the county of Essex, and the driving and conducting any sheep or lambs through, or by way of such parish. And they did further order that the said Order should continue in force until revoked by the Lords of the Privy Council; and whereas it is no longer necessary that the whole of this Order should continue in force:

Now, therefore, the Lords of the Council do hereby from and after this first day of February, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven;

revoke so much of the said Order of the 25th day of October last, as prohibits the driving or conducting of sheep or lambs through or by way of such parish, and all other provisions of the said Order in respect of all sheep or lambs not now or hereafter on the said farm and premises in the occupation of the said William Matson, senior, and at the expiration of one calendar month from the date hereof, they do revoke so much of the said Order as shall then remain in force, provided that no case of Sheep-pox or Variola Ovina shall occur on the said farm or premises of the said William Matson, senior, during that time.

Provided also, that this revocation shall not apply to, or otherwise affect, any proceeding or any act commenced under the authority of the said Order and not completed, but the same may be continued to completion as fully as if this Order were not issued.

The local authority of the county of Essex, as defined by chapter two of the Acts of the last session of Parliament, shall cause this Order to be published in some newspaper circulating in that part of that county which comprises the parish aforesaid.

THE Queen having been graciously pleased, by an instrument under Her Royal Sign Manual, bearing date the 1st of January, 1867, to direct that the decoration of the Victoria Cross may be conferred on persons serving in the Local Forces of New Zealand, who have performed deeds of gallantry during the progress of the operations undertaken against the insurgent native tribes in that Colony,—Her Majesty has accordingly been pleased to signify Her intention to confer this high distinction on the under-mentioned Officer of the Local Forces of that Colony, whose claim to the same has been submitted for Her Majesty's approval; viz. :—

Auckland Militia ...	Major Charles Heaphy	For his gallant conduct at the skirmish on the banks of the Mangapiko River, in New Zealand, on the 11th of February, 1864, in assisting a wounded soldier of the 40th Regiment, who had fallen into a hollow among the thickest of the concealed Maories. Whilst doing so, he became the target for a volley at a few feet distant. Five balls pierced his clothes and cap, and he was wounded in three places. Although hurt, he continued to aid the wounded until the end of the day. Major Heaphy was at the time in charge of a party of soldiers of the 40th and 50th Regiments, under the orders of Lieutenant-Colonel Sir Henry Marshman Havelock, Bart., C.B., V.C., the Senior Officer on the spot, who had moved rapidly down to the place where the troops were hotly engaged and pressed.

WE, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and eleven, section five, do hereby, subject as hereinafter mentioned, grant to the incumbent for the time being of the vicarage of Wisborough Green, with the chapelry of Loxwood annexed, in the county of Sussex, and in the diocese of Chichester, one yearly sum or stipend of one hundred and twenty pounds, such yearly sum or stipend to be payable out of the common fund under our control, and to be calculated as from the twelfth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, and to be receivable half-yearly on the first day of May and on the first day of November in each and every year: Provided always, that the annual sum or stipend so granted by us to the Incumbent of the said vicarage of Wisborough Green, with the chapelry of Loxwood annexed, shall be paid only upon the production to us on or after the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year of a certificate under the hand of the Bishop of the said diocese of Chichester, that an assistant curate, duly licensed by such bishop, has been employed within the parish of Wisborough Green aforesaid during the half year then ended, and is in receipt of a salary after a rate of not less than one hundred and twenty pounds per annum: Provided also, that such yearly sum or stipend shall continue payable as aforesaid so long only as may to us appear to be expedient under the circumstances from time to time affect the said benefice of Wisborough Green with Loxwood.

In witness whereof, we have hereunto set our common seal, this thirty-first day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven.

“That inasmuch as the population of this parish, which according to the last census amounted to 3585, qualifies the parish, under the authority of the Commissioners for administering the laws for relief of the Poor in England, to come under the operation of the Act 13th and 14th Vict., cap. 57, intituled ‘An Act to prevent the holding of Vestry or other Meetings in Churches, and for regulating the appointment of Vestry Clerks,’ it is hereby the resolution of this Vestry, which has been summoned for the purpose, that the Churchwardens make the requisite application on behalf of the parish to the said Commissioners for their Order that the said Act be henceforth applied to and put in force within the parish.”

And whereas the Churchwardens of the said parish have made their application in writing to the Poor Law Board, pursuant to the above resolution.

Now, therefore, we, the Poor Law Board, under the authority of the several Statutes in that behalf made and provided, hereby order and direct as follows: that is to say:—

ARTICLE I.—That the whole of the said Act passed in the fourteenth year of the reign of Her Majesty shall forthwith be applied to and put in force within the said parish of Berkhamstead Saint Peter.

ARTICLE II.—That the Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the said parish shall, unless the Poor Law Board otherwise direct, pay to the officer for the time being appointed to the said office of vestry clerk for the said parish, under the authority of the Statutes in such behalf and this Order, for the performance of the duties of such office, a salary of twenty-five pounds per annum.

ARTICLE III.—That the salary of such vestry clerk shall be payable up to the day on which he ceases to hold such office, and no longer, and shall be paid by quarterly payments at the several quarters ending at the usual Feast Days in the year, namely, Lady Day, Midsummer Day, Michaelmas Day, and Christmas Day, with a proportionate sum to be paid to his executors or administrators, in case he shall die while holding such office.

And at the request of the Churchwardens of the said parish, We hereby prescribe and direct—

ARTICLE IV.—That the said Vestry Clerk shall perform all the duties specified in the said Act, except such as relate to the keeping of the Vestry Books and the Parish Deeds and Documents and the Rate Books and Accounts which are closed.

ARTICLE V.—That a copy of this Order shall be published in the London Gazette.
