REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S COURTS AT BUCKINGHAM PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command.

The number of Ladies and Gentlemen attending each Court will be limited to two hundred and sixty, including those who will be presented to Her Majesty.

It is expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at Her Majesty's Court only when in attendance upon the Ladies of their families.

Those Gentlemen who have not been presented to The Queen will, under such circumstances, be eligible for presentation to Her Majesty at these Courts.

The presentation of Ladies and Gentlemen will be limited to one hundred at each Court.

Ladies and Gentlemen wishing to attend Her Majesty's Courts must send in their names and addresses to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, S.W., on or after Thursday, the 21st instant, and these names will be submitted for Her Majesty's approval in the order of their receipt at the Office.

All applications must be made in writing, and no names will be received previous to the 21st instant.

Ladies and Gentlemen who desire to be presented to Her Majesty must, in like manner, send in their names and addresses to the Lord Chamberlain's Office on or after the 21st instant. A letter from the Lady or Gentleman by whom each presentation is to be made must in all cases be forwarded.

The Queen has been graciously pleased, with regard to these Courts, to dispense with the regulation that the Lady or Gentleman must attend

the Court at which they propose to make presentations to Her Majesty.

The Lord Chamberlain will forward to all persons who can be received under the above regulations, cards for their admission to Buckingham Palace at the Court which Her Majesty shall be pleased to appoint for their reception.

In sending in their names Ladies and Gentlemen are requested to mention the Court which they would prefer to attend.

All those Ladies and Gentlemen who receive cards of admission to Buckingham Palace are requested to bring with them two large cards with their names clearly written thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in attendance and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to Her Majesty. In the case of presentation the name of the presenter must be inserted on the card.

REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEES TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

By Her Majesty's command.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levees, at St. James's

Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levees, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented: In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

WHEREAS by an Order of the Privy Council, bearing date the fourth day of this present February, reciting certain provisions of the Act of the eleventh and twelfth years of the reign of

Her Majesty, intituled "An Act to prevent, until the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals," and its amendment by an Act of the last session of Parliament, and that a contagious or infectious disorder, designated as the "Cattle Plague," had lately appeared and then prevailed among cattle in some parts of England, and divers other matters, and among the rest, that a market held at a place known as Smithfield, in the borough of Birmingham, in the county of Warwick, for the sale of cattle, had been licensed by the Lords of the Council for the sale of cattle intended for immediate slaughter, their Lordships made certain regulations as to the movement of cattle sold in the said market, as therein fully set forth.

And whereas it is expedient that the said Order should be rescinded:

Now, therefore, the Lords of the said Council do hereby order, that from and after this fourteenth day of this present month of February, the said Order shall be revoked and rescinded, and become null and of no effect, except in respect of any matter commenced under or otherwise protected by it, until such matter shall be fully completed or ended.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, intituled "An Act to prevent until the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals," and from time to time continued by divers subsequent Acts, and lastly by an Act passed in the session of the twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and nineteen, it is (amongst other things) enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time to make such Orders and Regulations as to them may seem necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal to or from such parts or places as they may designate in such Order or Orders, of sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals; or of meat, skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals, or of hay, straw, fodder, or other articles likely to propagate infection, and to make any other Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations; and that all provisions for any of the purposes aforesaid in any such Order or Orders contained shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in the said Act:

And whereas the said Act has been amended and explained by an Act passed in the twenty-ninth year of Her present Majesty's reign, intitled "An Act to amend the Act of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and seven, to prevent the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals:"

And whereas a contagious or infectious disorder, generally designated as the "Cattle Plague," has lately appeared and now prevails amongst cattle in some parts of England:

And whereas divers Orders have been made by the Lords of the said Council in relation to the Cattle Plague, which were consolidated and amended by an Order bearing date the 24th day of March last:

And whereas provisions are contained in the said Order of the Privy Council to regulate the movement of cattle on any highway, and such movement without a licence as therein described is prohibited, except for a distance not exceeding five hundred yards, from one part of the same farm to the other:

And whereas the holding of markets for the sale of cattle is prohibited by the said Order until the 1st day of June, 1866, except in the case of a market held with the licence of the Privy Council for the sale of cattle intended for immediate slaughter, which term hath, by an Order of the said Council, been extended from the said 1st day of June until the said Lords of the Council shall otherwise direct:

And whereas there is a market held in a place known as Smithfield, in the borough of Birmingham, in the county of Warwick, for the sale of cattle, and the holding thereof has been licensed by the Lords of the said Council, by instrument, bearing date the 31st day of May last, for the sale of cattle intended for immediate slaughter, so long as the said above-mentioned Orders shall remain in force, or until the revocation of the said licence as therein provided, subject to all the conditions, provisions, and regulations in the said first-mentioned Order contained applicable to such market:

And whereas it is provided by the said Order of the 24th of March last, that in the case of cattle brought to any market other than the Metropolitan Cattle Market, they shall in no case be taken beyond such limits as may be described in the licence of the Privy Council allowing such market, and under such conditions with respect to their movement within such limits as may be imposed by such licence:

And whereas in the said licence for the holding of the above-mentioned market, it is provided that no cattle brought into the said market shall be taken alive beyond the limits of the municipal boundaries of the said borough, and further, that no market shall be held for the sale of sheep, lambs, goats, or swine, within the said borough, except for the purpose of slaughter, and all sheep, lambs, goats, or swine, brought into any market within the borough for sale, shall be slaughtered within the municipal boundaries of the said borough within four days after their exposure in the market:

And whereas it is expedient that certain other regulations should be made in this behalf:

Now, therefore, the Lords of the Council do hereby order, that notwithstanding such provisions in the said licence, and all similar provisions in the said Order, cattle sold in the said market

until the fourth day of May next, if the said licence shall so long continue in force, may be moved to any slaughter-house in the towns or places of Wolverhampton, Walsall, Handsworth, Smethwick, Willenhall, Darlaston, Wednesbury, West Bromwich, Tipton, Rowley Regis, Great Bridge, Bilston, and Harborne, in the county of Stafford, and to the towns and places of Aston, Warwick, Coventry, and Saltley, all in the county of Warwick, and at all intermediate places in the respective counties of Stafford and Warwick between any such town or place and the said borough of Birmingham, to be there slaughtered under such regulations as the Local Authorities for the counties of Stafford and Warwick respectively shall from time to time make and issue in regard to the movement as well as the places, times, and manner of slaughtering of such cattle.

Provided that nothing herein contained shall allow the cattle to be kept alive for more than four days after exposure in the said market.

Every such regulation shall be published by the Local Authority making it in some newspaper circulating in the borough of Birmingham, and by a notice affixed in some conspicuous place in the said market.

Notwithstanding the provision in the said licence above recited, and the similar provision in the said Order, swine may be sold at any market or other place within the said borough, whether for immediate slaughter or otherwise, and need not be slaughtered within the municipal boundaries of the said borough within four days after their exposure for sale.

This Order shall be construed in like manner as the said Order, and every person who shall contravene this Order, or any regulation of the Local Authority made under it, shall be guilty of an offence, and be subject to the like penalty as in the case of a contravention of any regulation in such Order.

And the Lords of the said Council hereby further direct that the Local Authority of the borough of Birmingham shall cause this Order to be published in some newspaper circulating in the said borough.

QUALIFICATION OF PUBLIC VACCINATORS.

WHEREAS it is required under the Regulations set forth in the Order of the Lords of the Privy Council, dated 1st December, 1859, that persons to be thereafter contracted with by the Guardians and Overseers of Unions and Parishes in England for the performance of public vaccination shall (except in certain cases) produce a certificate of proficiency in vaccination, given, after due examination, or instruction and examination, by some Public Vaccinator whom the Privy Council authorize to act for that purpose :—

Notice is hereby given, that, subject to the same conditions as their Lordships have heretofore appointed in the like matter, and subject also to their Lordships' further orders, Mr. George Cuthbert Gilchrist, of 11, Pilgrim-street, Newcastle-upon-Tyne, officiating as Public Vaccinator in the Newcastle-upon-Tyne Union, is authorised to give certificates for the purposes of the aforesaid Order to persons whom he, at his appointed station, shall have examined or instructed in vaccination.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Ambassador at Constantinople, containing a copy of a note from Aali Pasha respecting the importation of salt from Sicily to Antivari and Scutari :—

Sublime Porte, January 3, 1867.

THE Imperial Government having authorised the disembarkation of salt in the ports of Antivari and Scutari, in Albania, in transit for Montenegro, with a view to facilitate the victualling of that Principality, instructions have been given to the Turkish Consular Agents in Sicily to grant their

signature to vessels laden with salt and destined from one or other of these two ports.

This transport of salt having assumed large proportions and giving opportunity for certain abuses, measures have been taken to prevent smuggling, and to issue authority to control the transit operations at Antivari and at Scutari destined for Montenegro. These measures ought to consist in the fulfilment of the following formalities:—

1. Captains must hand over to the Consular Agents of the ports of Sicily, from which salt is embarked destined for Antivari and Scutari in Albania, a written engagement to present, on their return, to these same Consular Agents a certificate of direction from the Custom-house officers at Antivari or at Scutari, stating that the quantity of salt freighted upon their vessels and stated in their manifest had been really and truly disembarked in one of those two ports and examined by the Custom-house.

2. Captains on their return to the Sicilian Ports are obliged to present this certificate to the Consular Agents, who, on the receipt of this probatory document, will restore them their former engagement.

By means of these measures the Custom-house Officers of Antivari and Scutari will be able to state the amount of salt disembarked in transit, and to ascertain whether this transit right serves as a pretext for the clandestine introduction of salt into the other provinces of the Empire.

Captains, however, who shall not be able to clear themselves, by means of this Custom-house certificate, of the disembarkation of their cargoes of salt in the ports of Antivari and Scutari, will be liable to the penalties inflicted upon offences of smuggling.
