WHEREAS the Lords of Her Majesty's Council have duly issued divers Orders, under the authority of the Act passed in the session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, intituled "An Act to prevent until the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious and infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals," which Act hath been since continued by divers subsequent Acts, and which several Orders bear the dates set forth in the first schedule hereunto written; and whereas, in such Orders, after reciting the prevalence of the contagious or infectious disorder designated the Cattle Plague among cattle in England and Wales, the Lords of the Council have made provisions for preventing the admission of cattle into particular counties as therein named, or for enabling the local authorities of such counties to make particular regulations in regard to the admission of cattle into such counties:

And whereas it is expedient that such provisions should now be revoked:

And whereas the Lords of the said Council have, under the like authority, made sundry other Orders, the dates whereof are set forth in the second schedule hereunto annexed, enabling the local authorities therein mentioned to grant licences for the holding of fairs in their respective districts, and it is expedient that such Orders should be revoked, so far as they contain such powers as last aforesaid:

Now, therefore, the Lords of the Council do hereby, from and after the fourteenth day of March instant, revoke so much of the several Orders, the dates whereof are set forth in the first schedule as contains provisions prohibiting the admission of cattle into the districts therein mentioned, or enables the local authority therein to make regulations respecting the admission of cattle into their respective districts, and so much of the several Orders, the dates whereof are set forth in the second schedule, as contain such powers as aforesaid, for licensing the holding of fairs:

Provided that nothing herein contained shall apply to an act commenced under any of the said Orders and not yet completed, nor to any offence committed in contravention thereof, and not yet punished.

WHEREAS by an Order bearing date the 16th day of January last, duly issued under the authority of the Act of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, since continued by divers statutes, and lastly by an Act of the last session of Parliament until the 1st day of August next, and the end of the then next session of Parliament, reciting certain provisions of the said Act, and that the contagious or infectious disorder termed the Cattle Plague then prevailed amongst cattle in England, and had prevailed amongst sheep in many parts of England, and the Order of the Lords of the Council of the 24th day of March last, and the provision therein relating to the holding of markets, fairs, auctions, exhibitions, or sales of cattle, and another Order of the Lords of the Council, bearing date the 8th day of August last, relating, among other things, to the forms of licence to be used for the removal of animals and sundry other matters, the Lords of the Council did order that, from and after the 21st day of January then instant, the Lords of the Council might, upon application from the Local Authority of any county, license the holding of any sale or sales of animals at the times and places, and subject to such restrictions or conditions, as to the said Lords should seem expedient or necessary :

And whereas it is advisable that this Order should be extended as hereinafter set forth :

Now therefore, the Lords of the said Council do hereby order that the application for any licence for the sale of any animals under the said Order may be made by any Local Authority as defined by the said Order of the 24th of March last besides the Local Authority of a county, and the said Lords may grant a licence for the holding of such sale within the district of the Local Authority so making the application :

And any licence granted upon the application of such other authority shall be subject to all the same provisions as are contained in the said Order of the 16th day of January last.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament made and passed in the sixth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth,

chapter seventy-eight, it was amongst other things enacted "That it should and might be lawful for His Majesty, His heirs and successors, by His or their Order in Council, or for the Lords or others of His or their Privy Council, or any two or more of them, by their Order, from time to time, as often as they might see reason to apprehend that the yellow fever or other highly infectious distemper prevailed on the Continent of America or in the West Indies, to require that every vessel coming from or having touched at any port or place on the Continent of America or in the West Indies, should come to an anchor at certain places to be appointed, from time to time, by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs (who were thereby authorized to make such appointment), for the purpose of having the state of health of the crew of such vessel ascertained before such vessel should be permitted to enter the port whereto she should be bound, or any other port of the United Kingdom; but that such vessel should not be deemed liable to quarantine unless it should be afterwards specially ordered under that restraint:"

And whereas there is reason to apprehend that the yellow fever prevails in the West Indies, and in parts of the Continent of America, and it is expedient to put into operation the above-recited provision of the said Act:

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council do hereby order and direct that from and after the fourteenth of March instant, every vessel coming from or having touched at any Port or Place lying between longitude 52 and 82 degrees west of Greenwich, and between 4 and 24 degrees north latitude, shall come to an anchor at such place or places as may from time to time be appointed by the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Customs, for the purpose of having the state of the health of the crew of such vessel ascertained before such vessel shall be permitted to enter the port whereto she shall be bound, or any other port of the United Kingdom, and shall remain at such place or places until the state of health of such crew shall have been ascertained, pursuant to the said recited provision, and thereafter to be subject to such lawful direction as may be made in that behalf by or under the direction of the said Lords.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, from Her Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires at Mexico, a copy of a Decree modifying the Mexican Tariff of Tonnage Dues.

(Translation.)

Art. 1. The Titles VIII and XI of the Law of the 1st November of 1865 are reformed in the following terms:—

Art. 2. The right of touching at the Mexican Coast, or of anchoring off it, involves the payment of a contribution to the Mexican Government; but vessels engaged in the coasting trade, not exceeding twenty tons inclusive, will be exempted from this contribution.

Art. 3. The tonnage duty shall be paid within ten days after arrival. Any fraction of incomplete tonnage shall be proportionally paid for.

Art. 4. The duty is established in the following manner:—

Art. 5. Steamers, to whatever nations they may belong, shall pay half-tonnage duties, according to the conditions set down in the present tariffs. Nevertheless, steamers that specially and periodically carry passengers, possessing a grant for so doing from the Mexican Government, and which besides carry commercial effects, shall pay solely for the number of tons occupied by the goods they may discharge, independently of the duty imposed by the 58th Article, Title XIII, of the Law of 1st November, 1865.

Art. 6. Sailing-vessels, national or foreign, which may arrive with cargoes of coal for the depôts which may be established in the ports of the Empire, by permission of the Government, are exempt from tonnage dues.

Art. 7. Foreign vessels arriving for the purpose of taking in cargoes of logwood, or other productions of the country from one or more ports of the Empire, as prescribed in the Tariff of the Maritime Custom-houses, shall be exempted from the payment of tonnage dues.

Art. 8. All foreign vessels that arrive for the purpose of bringing or taking away passengers, correspondence, metals, specie, or logwood, are also exempted from the payment of tonnage dues.

Art. 9. Lighthouse dues shall not be collected except at those ports where lighthouses exist.

Art. 10. The duty shall be collected according to the following tariff:—

Sailing-vessels, national or foreign, of long voyages, and coming from countries which have concluded treaties with Mexico, bringing passengers, merchandize, and correspondence to any of the ports of the Empire, shall pay five cents per ton, whatever be the burthen of the vessel.

Foreign sailing-vessels belonging to nations that have not concluded treaties with Mexico, and carrying merchandize and correspondence to any of the ports of the Empire, shall pay ten cents per ton, whatever be the burthen of the vessel.

Art. 11. Steamers, to whatever nation they may belong, shall pay a higher lighthouse duty than sailing vessels. This duty shall be established in the following manner:—

National or foreign steamers arriving from countries that have concluded treaties with Mexico shall pay ten cents per ton, whatever be the burthen of the vessel.

Foreign steamers belonging to countries that have not concluded treaties with Mexico shall pay twenty cents per ton, whatever be the burthen of the vessel.

Art. 12. These tariffs comprise the entrance and departure, either at coasting-trade ports or ports open to foreign trade

Art. 13. No vessel, of whatever class soever, except those of war, national or foreign, shall be exempted from lighthouse dues without special permission from the Sovereign.

The Departments for Foreign Affairs and Marine, and that of Finance, are charged, in as far as they are respectively concerned, with the execution of this Decree.
