WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the thirty-first day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint John the Baptist, situate at Clay Hill, in the parish of Saint Andrew, Enfield, in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Saint Andrew, Enfield, and of the new parish of Jesus Chapel, Enfield, in the county and diocese aforesaid, which lie contiguous one to

another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such parish and new parish respectively.

“And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parish of Enfield, and of the said new parish of Jesus Chapel, Enfield, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry, for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint John the Baptist, situate at Clay Hill aforesaid.

“Now, therefore, with the consents of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Archibald Campbell, Bishop of the said diocese of London, and of the Reverend John Moore Heath, the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Saint Andrew, Enfield, and as such the patron of the perpetual curacy of the said new parish of Jesus Chapel, Enfield (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), and with the consent of the Master, Fellows, and Scholars of the College of the Holy and Undivided Trinity, within the town and university of Cambridge, the patrons of the said vicarage of the parish of Saint Andrew, Enfield aforesaid (in testimony whereof they have set their common or corporate seal to this representation), we humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Saint Andrew, Enfield, and of the said new parish of Jesus Chapel, Enfield, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint John the Baptist, situate at Clay Hill aforesaid, and that the same should be named ‘The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint John the Baptist, Clay Hill’, and that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of such consolidated chapelry should belong to, and be exercised by, the said John Moore Heath, as vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Saint Andrew, Enfield as aforesaid, and by his successors, vicars, or incumbents of the same vicarage for ever.

“We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order, in respect thereto, as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

“The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint John the Baptist, Clay Hill, being:—

“All that portion of the parish of Saint Andrew, Enfield, in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London, which is bounded on the west, by the district of Saint John, Potter’s Bar, in the same county and diocese; on the north, by the parish of Northaw, in the county of Hertford, and in the diocese of Rochester; on the north-east, by the new parish of Jesus Chapel, Enfield, in the county of Middlesex, and diocese of London aforesaid; and on the remaining sides, that is to say; on the south and south-west, by an imaginary line, commencing on the boundary which divides the said new parish of Jesus Chapel, Enfield, from the parish of Saint Andrew, Enfield aforesaid, at a point in the centre of the bridge which carries the road leading from Forty Hill to Clay Hill over the new river; and extending

thence westward along the middle of the said road (passing the northern end of Baker-street) to a point distant one hundred and forty yards to the west of the middle of the northern end of Baker-street aforesaid; and extending thence south-westward, in a course parallel to, and one hundred and forty yards to the west, of the middle of Baker-street as aforesaid, to a point in the middle of New-lane; and extending thence westward along the middle of the said lane to its junction with the road called Lavender Hill; and continuing in the same direction along the middle of the last-named road to its junction with the road leading from Enfield, past Botany Bay and North Lodge to Potter’s Bar; and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-described road as far as the boundary which divides the said parish of Saint Andrew, Enfield, from the district of Saint John, Potter’s Bar aforesaid.

“And also all that portion of the said new parish of Jesus Chapel, Enfield, which is bounded on the south-west by the above-described portion of the parish of Saint Andrew, Enfield aforesaid; on the north, partly by the said parish of Northaw, and partly by the parish of Cheshunt, in the said county of Hertford, and in the diocese of Rochester aforesaid; and on the remaining side, that is to say, upon the east, by an imaginary line, commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Jesus Chapel, Enfield, from the said parish of Cheshunt, at a point in the middle of the road leading from Goff’s Oak, to Clay Hill, and extending thence southward along the middle of the said road as far as the boundary (near the eastern end of the road leading from Cattle Gate) which divides the said new parish of Jesus Chapel, Enfield, from the above-described portion of the parish of Saint Andrew, Enfield, aforesaid.”

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore Her Majesty by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fourteenth day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, in the words following; that is to say:

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act passed in the

session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of another Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the thirteenth and fourteenth years of your Majesty's reign, chapter ninety-four, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for augmenting the income of the archdeaconry of Barnstaple, in the diocese of Exeter.

"Whereas by the first recited Act it is enacted that any archdeaconry may, subject to the consent of the bishop, be endowed, amongst other modes, by augmentation out of the common fund in the same Act mentioned, but not so as to raise the average annual income to an amount exceeding two hundred pounds; provided that no archdeacon shall be entitled to hold any endowment or augmentation, or other emolument, as such archdeacon, under the provisions of the same Act, unless he shall be resident for the space of eight months in every year within the diocese in which his archdeaconry is situate, but subject to the same provisions as to licences for non-residence which are enacted with respect to incumbents of benefices by the Act relating to pluralities and the residence of the clergy in the same Act mentioned; and it is by the said first recited Act further enacted, that upon the endowment of an archdeaconry being made under the provisions thereof, all lands, tithes, and other hereditaments (except any right of patronage) belonging to such archdeaconry at the time of such endowment, may, with the consent of the bishop of the diocese and of any archdeacon in possession at the time of the passing of the same Act, and by the authority therein provided, be vested in us, for the purposes of the same Act.

"And whereas by the secondly recited Act it is declared and enacted that, in the case of any archdeaconry which shall no longer be held by the archdeacon who was at the time of the passing of the said first recited Act in possession thereof, the provisions of the same Act which relate to the transfer to us of the estates of any archdeaconry, upon its endowment in either of the modes therein provided, shall be construed and held to authorize such transfer, with the consent of the bishop of the diocese and of the archdeacon in possession of the archdeaconry at the time.

"And whereas the said archdeaconry of Barnstaple is endowed by the annexation thereto of the rectories or parsonages of Lynton and Countisbury, in the county of Devon, with the lands, tenements, and hereditaments to such rectories and parsonages belonging (the same being now demised on a lease for lives), and is further endowed with an annual payment from the dean and chapter of Exeter, variable every ten years, according to the price of corn, such annual payment being the consideration for the transfer to the said dean and chapter of a house situate in the city of Exeter, and formerly belonging to the said archdeaconry, and the amount of the same annual payment for the period of ten years, commencing from the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, is forty pounds four shillings and nine pence.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that the amount of the net annual income of the said archdeaconry, derived from fees and other payments, over and above the sources of income hereinbefore specified, is such that, after allowing for the cessation, in accordance with the recommendation hereinafter contained, of an annual payment amounting to eight shillings and four pence, now made by the said archdeacon to us as holders of the estates of the said dean and chapter

of Exeter, such net annual income will not exceed the sum of forty-two pounds.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Henry, Bishop of Exeter, and of the Venerable Henry Woolcombe, the present archdeacon of the said archdeaconry of Barnstaple, testified by their having respectively signed and sealed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose that there shall be paid by us, out of the said common fund, to the said Henry Woolcombe and his successors in the said archdeaconry, so long as he and they shall respectively hold the same, and shall duly reside in accordance with the provisions of the said first recited Act, or be legally exempt from residence, the annual sum of one hundred and eighteen pounds on the first day of January in every year, and every such whole yearly payment shall be made only on production to us of a certificate under the hand of the bishop of the diocese for the time being, that the said Henry Woolcombe, or his successor for the time being, in the said archdeaconry, has duly resided as aforesaid during the preceding year, or on the production to us of a licence of non-residence, and that immediately upon the gazetting of any Order of your Majesty in Council, ratifying this scheme, there shall be paid by us to the said Henry Woolcombe, the sum of one hundred and eighteen pounds in respect of the period which elapsed between the first day of January in the year last past, and the first day of January now last past, and that all lands, tenements, and hereditaments whatsoever now belonging to, or forming part of the endowment of the said archdeaconry of Barnstaple, except the annual payment made thereto by the dean and chapter of Exeter, as hereinbefore mentioned, and except also any right of ecclesiastical patronage, shall forthwith be disannexed from the said archdeaconry and become and be absolutely transferred to and vested in us, subject to any existing lease or leases, grant or grants thereof, for the purposes of the said Acts, and that we shall be entitled to the rents, profits, and proceeds of the said lands, tenements, and hereditaments, as from the said first day of January in the year last past.

"And we further recommend and propose that the annual payment of eight shillings and fourpence, now made by the said archdeacon to us as holders of the estates of the said dean and chapter of Exeter, for chapter Pentecostals shall, as from the said first day of January, in the year last past, absolutely cease and determine.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Exeter.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Henry, Bishop of the said diocese of Exeter (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said chapelry of Saint Mary, Penzance, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Paul, situate within the limits of such chapelry as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Paul, Penzance.'

"And, with the like consent of the said Henry, Bishop of the said diocese of Exeter (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, and churchings should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns, and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Paul, Penzance, being:—

"The District Chapelry of Saint James the Greater, Eastbury, being :—

"All that part of the parish of Lambourn, in the county of Berks, and in the diocese of Oxford, wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls, which is situate to the east of an imaginary line commencing on the boundary which divides the said parish from the particular district of Saint Mary, Lambourn Woodlands, sometime part of the said parish of Lambourn, at a point in the centre of the four cross roads at Great Cleeve-hill ; and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the road leading past Thornhill Copse to Bockhampton to the junction of such road with the road leading from Eastbury to Lambourn ; and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-described road for a distance of fourteen chains, or thereabouts, to a point opposite to the middle of the south-western end of the road called Long Hedge, which leads past Sheepdrove ; and extending thence, first north-eastward, and then north-westward, along the middle of the last-described road to its junction at Hyde Barn with the road leading over Hyde Down and Stancombe Down to Letcomb ; and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-described road as far as the boundary which divides the said parish of Lambourn from the parish of Letcomb Basset, in the same county and diocese."
