### REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S COURTS AT BUCKINGHAM PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command.

The number of Ladies and Gentlemen attending each Court is limited to two hundred and sixty, including those who will be presented to Her Majesty.

It is expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at Her Majesty's Court only when in attendance upon the Ladies of their families.

Those Gentlemen who have not been presented to The Queen are, under such circumstances, eligible for presentation to Her Majesty at these Courts.

The Queen has been graciously pleased, with regard to these Courts, to dispense with the regulation that the Lady or Gentleman must attend the Court at which they propose to make presentations to Her Majesty.

All those Ladies and Gentlemen who have received cards of admission to Buckingham Palace are requested to bring with them two large cards with their names clearly written thereon, one to be

left with the Queen's Page in attendance and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to Her Majesty. In the case of presentation the name of the presenter must be inserted on the card.

The State apartments will be open for the reception of Company an hour before each Court.

### PRESENT,

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

W HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninetyseven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the thirtyfirst day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint John the Baptist, situate at Clay Hill, in the parish of Saint Andrew, Enfield, in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Saint Andrew, Enfield, and of the new parish of Jesus Chapel, Enfield, in the county and diocese aforesaid, which lie contiguous one to
