WHEREAS by an Order bearing date the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, duly issued under the authority of an Act passed in the session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, intituled "An Act to prevent until the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and the end of the then session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals," and from time to time continued by divers subsequent Acts, and lastly by an Act of the last session, which Order recited that a contagious or infectious disorder, generally designated as the "Cattle Plague," prevailed amongst cattle in England and Wales, the Lords of the Council made various regulations for preventing the spread of the said cattle plague, and, among others, for dealing with infected places ;

And whereas it is provided in the said Order that the Privy Council as to any place in England may, by Order made at any time after the passing of that Order, and published in manner therein-after mentioned, declare any place in which disease amongst animals at that time exists, together with such an area including such place as to the Lords of the said Council may deem to be required, to be an infected place from and after a date to be specified in such Order.

And whereas the said disease now exists on the premises in the occupation of Edward Thomas Davis, called "The Butchers' Arms Inn," situate in the York-road, in the parish of St. Mary, Islington, in the county of Middlesex, and the Lords of the Council deem it advisable to declare the said place to be an infected place.

Now, therefore, the Lords of the Council do hereby declare that from and after the twenty-second day of this present May, the said premises in the occupation of Edward Thomas Davis, called "The Butchers' Arms Inn," together with the stables and lairs adjoining thereto, situate in the York-road, in the parish of St. Mary, Islington, in the county of Middlesex, to be an infected place within the operation of the said Order.

And the said Lords do hereby order the Local Authority of the Metropolis to cause this Order to be published in some newspaper circulating in the Metropolis, and also cause a copy thereof to be affixed at some conspicuous place in the Metropolitan Cattle Market, at Islington, in the county of Middlesex.

And the said Lords do hereby order the Local Authority of the Metropolis to cause this Order to be published in some newspaper circulating in the Metropolis, and also cause a copy thereof to be affixed at some conspicuous place in the Metropolitan Cattle Market, at Islington, in the county of Middlesex.
