By Her Majesty's Command.

The Ladies, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing Rooms, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to The Princess.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that a letter from the Lady who is to make the presentation, stating it to be her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to the Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's Command, that no presentations shall be made at the Drawing Room, except in accordance with the above regulations.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, intituled "An Act to prevent until the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals," and from time to time continued by divers subsequent Acts, and lastly by an Act passed in the session of the twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and nineteen, it is (amongst other things) enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time, to make such Orders and Regulations as to them may seem necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal to or from such parts or places as they might designate in such Order or Orders, of sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals, or of meat, skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals, or of hay, straw, fodder, or other articles, likely to propagate infection, and to make any other Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations; and that all provisions for any of the purposes aforesaid in any such Order or Orders contained shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in the said Act:

And whereas the said Act has been amended and explained by an Act passed in the twenty-ninth year of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the Act of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and seven, to prevent the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals:"

And whereas a contagious or infectious disorder, generally designated as the "Cattle Plague," has lately appeared, and now prevails, amongst cattle in some parts of England:

And whereas divers Orders have been made by the Lords of the said Council in relation to the Cattle Plague, which were consolidated and amended by an Order, bearing date the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, which Order has been altered and extended by subsequent Orders, and contains certain regulations as to the movement of cattle brought by sea into England, which regulations have been altered and amended by divers Orders dated respectively the twenty-seventh day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, relating to cattle brought by sea from any place out of the United Kingdom to any place on the Rivers Thames or Medway westward of the Nore Light, the twenty-third and the twenty-ninth

days of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, relating to cattle brought by sea from any place out of the United Kingdom to Southampton, and the eleventh day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, relating to cattle brought by sea from any place out of the United Kingdom to Harwich, in regard to cattle brought to a certain market for the sale of cattle in the parish of St. Mary, Islington, in the county of Middlesex, known as the Metropolitan Cattle Market:

And whereas it is expedient that certain other regulations should be made in respect of cattle brought to the Metropolis:

Now, therefore, the Lords of the said Council do hereby order as follows, that from and after the eighteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, notwithstanding anything in the said recited Orders, or in any other Order of the said Council, to the contrary:

1. Cattle brought by sea from any place out of the United Kingdom, except the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man, and landed at any place in England, shall not be moved from the landing place where landed for the period of twelve hours from the time of landing, but shall remain for such period in some lair or other proper place adjacent to such landing place to be provided for their reception, for the purpose of being inspected by a competent inspector, and no cattle shall be landed from any vessel until such lair or other proper place shall have been provided.

2. If upon inspection any cattle so landed shall be found to be in such a state that in the judgment of the inspector it would be unsafe that such cattle should be moved from the port or place where the same shall have been landed, such cattle shall, with all convenient speed, be slaughtered at the place where landed, or at the nearest slaughter-house.

3. When by any Order or Orders of the Privy Council cattle brought by sea from any place out of the United Kingdom, except the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man, are permitted to be moved to the Metropolitan Cattle Market, no such cattle shall be moved to such market except by railway, and all cattle brought by railway to such market shall be discharged from the trucks in which they have been conveyed within one thousand yards of the said Metropolitan Cattle Market, at Islington, and shall be driven immediately upon being so discharged, to such market or to the lairs belonging thereto, or to such other lairs as may be licensed by the Privy Council for the reception of such cattle.

4. Nothing herein contained shall affect the Orders dated, respectively, the first day of February, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, and the seventeenth day of this present month of May, relating to the movement of cattle within the Metropolis, and to cattle brought to the said Metropolitan Cattle Market respectively.

5. The words herein contained shall be construed as in the said Order of the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, and all the provisions therein contained, relative to the offences for the contravention thereof, and the penalty for the same, and in respect of the powers of officers employed under it, and all other provisions of that Order, and the subsequent Orders altering it, now in force, and not inconsistent with any thing herein contained, shall, in respect of every matter and thing to

which they shall be applicable, apply to the Regulations contained in this Order, and the enforcing the same, and the officers employed under it.

6. The Local Authority for the Metropolis shall forthwith cause this Order to be published in some newspaper circulating in the Metropolis, and also cause a copy thereof to be affixed at some conspicuous place in the said Metropolitan Cattle Market at Islington; and the Commissioners of Police for the Metropolis and the City of London shall cause a copy thereof to be affixed at some conspicuous place at each police station in their respective districts.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a Despatch from Her Majesty's Ambassador at Berlin, inclosing copy and translation of a Convention between the several States of the Zollverein, regulating the future duties upon salt.

The Articles of this Convention are to come into force on the 1st January, 1868;

And establish a duty of two thalers per centner gross weight on all salt produced within the Zollverein, or imported from abroad.

When destined, however, for the following purposes, salt will be duty free:—

1. Exportation.
2. Agricultural purposes.
3. Salting and pickling articles destined for exportation, and which are exported.
4. All other purposes of trade, excepting salt used in the preparation of such articles as are destined for human consumption and use, more particularly salt used in the manufacture of tobacco, mineral waters; and baths.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a Despatch from the British Commissioner of the European Commission of the Danube, enclosing copy and the following translation of an amended Tariff relative to steam vessels navigating the Danube:—

ENACTMENTS modifying the Dues imposed upon Steam Vessels by the Tariff of 2nd November, 1865, in force at the Sulina Mouth.

Art. 1.

Steam vessels which come within the class designated by Article 2 of the Tariff of the 2nd

November, 1865, shall continue to be subject to the fixed due of sixty centimes per ton on leaving the river, with free entry, provided that they are propelled by paddle-wheels, that their draught of water when fully laden does not exceed ten feet English, and that their voyages are strictly periodical, conformably with a previously published announcement.

Art. 2.

Every steam vessel other than those designated in the preceding Article, leaving the Port of Sulina, to put to sea, and having, according to her manifest, more than the third of her full cargo, shall pay the navigation dues fixed by the following Tables, without any distinction between the packet-boats of public companies and the steam-boats of private persons; viz:—

Art. 3.

Steam vessels other than those designated in the above first Article shall be subject, without any distinction, and independently of the toll on leaving the river, to the payment of the fourth part of this toll, if they enter Sulina arriving from seaward, with more than the third of their cargo; but if, in this case, they leave the river again with less than the third of their cargo, they shall pay for entering the integral amount of the toll for leaving.

Art. 4.

In the case provided for by the third paragraph of Article 10 of the Tariff of 2nd November, 1865, the dues of steam vessels shall be paid in conformity with Article 2 of the present provisions.

All other provisions of the above-mentioned Tariff relative to steam vessels, and which are not formally changed by the present enactment, shall continue to remain in force, except the two last paragraphs of Article 3, which are expressly abrogated.

Art. 5.

The present provisions shall be immediately published; but they shall only be applied from and after the first of August next.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 30.)—FRANCE, WEST COAST.

Fixed Light on Noirmoutiers Island.

THE French Government has given notice, that from the 25th day of May, 1867, a light will be exhibited from a lighthouse recently constructed on pointe des Dames, on the north coast of Noirmoutiers island.

The light is a *fixed white and red* light, elevated 111 feet above the level of the sea, and in clear weather the white portion of the light should be seen from a distance of 10 miles, and the red from a distance of 7 miles.

The white portion of the light is visible from seaward round a great part of the horizon, and the red portion from the bearing W. by N., or in a line from the steeple of Bourgneuf to S. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., or in a line about midway between the shoals of Pierre Moine and Basse des Pères.

The tower is stone, rectangular, and 52 feet high; it is painted red on the two faces south of the line to the steeple of Bourgneuf, and is 1,420 yards north of the entrance of the port of Noirmoutiers, in lat. $47^{\circ} 0\frac{1}{2}'$ N., long. $2^{\circ} 13\frac{1}{4}'$ west of Greenwich.

Fixed Light on Point Grouin du Cou.

Also that a new light has been established 580 yards S.E. by E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E. from the present light on the point Grouin du Cou at the entrance of Pertuis Breton.

The light is a *fixed white* light elevated 92 feet above the level of the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 10 miles.

The tower is stone, 46 feet high, and is in lat. $46^{\circ} 20\frac{1}{4}'$ N., long. $1^{\circ} 28'$ west of Greenwich.

[All bearings are magnetic. Variation $20\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ Westerly in 1867.]

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 31.)—GULF OF ADEN.

Fixed Light on Ras Marshigh, Aden.

THE Marine Department at Bombay has given notice, that a light is now exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected on Ras Marshigh, Aden.

The light is a *fixed white* light, elevated 244 feet above the level of the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 20 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses, of the first order.
