WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, intituled "An Act to prevent until the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals," and from time to time continued by divers subsequent Acts, and lastly by an Act passed in the session of the twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and nineteen, it is (amongst other things) enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time to make such Orders and Regulations as to them may seem necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal to or from such parts or places as they may designate in such Order or Orders of sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals, or of meat, skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals, or of hay, straw, fodder, or other articles likely to propagate infection, and to make any other Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations; and that all provisions for any of the purposes aforesaid, in any such Order or Orders contained, shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in the said Act:

And whereas the said Act has been amended and explained by an Act passed in the twenty-ninth year of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the Act of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and seven, to prevent the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals:"

And whereas a contagious or infectious disorder, generally designated as the "Cattle Plague," has lately appeared and still prevails amongst cattle in some parts of England:

And whereas divers Orders have been made by the Lords of the said Council in relation to the cattle plague, which were consolidated and amended by an Order bearing date the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six:

And whereas provisions are contained in the said Order of the Privy Council to regulate the movement of cattle on any highway, and such movement without a licence as therein described is prohibited, except for a distance not exceeding five hundred yards, from one part of the same farm to the other:

And whereas the holding of markets for the sale of cattle is prohibited by the said Order until the first day of June, one thousand eight hundred

and sixty-six, except in the case of a market held with the licence of the Privy Council for the sale of cattle intended for immediate slaughter, which term hath, by an Order of the said Council, been extended from the said first day of June until the said Lords of the Council shall otherwise direct :

And whereas there is a market held for the borough of Liverpool, at Stanley, in the township of West Derby, in the county palatine of Lancaster, called the Liverpool New Cattle Market, for the sale of cattle, and the holding thereof has been licensed by the Lords of the said Council, by instrument bearing even date herewith, for the sale of cattle intended for immediate slaughter, so long as the said above-mentioned Orders shall remain in force, or until the revocation of the said licence, as therein provided, subject to all the conditions, provisions, and regulations in the said first-mentioned Order contained applicable to such market :

And whereas it is provided by the said Order of the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, that in the case of cattle brought to any market other than the Metropolitan Cattle Market, they shall in no case be taken beyond such limits as may be described in the licence of the Privy Council allowing such market, and under such conditions with respect to their movement within such limits as may be imposed by such licence :

And whereas in the said licence for the holding of the above-mentioned market, it is provided that no cattle brought into the said market shall be taken alive beyond the limits of the outward boundaries of the municipal borough of Liverpool, except as therein mentioned :

And whereas it is expedient that certain other regulations should be made in this behalf :

Now, therefore, the Lords of the Council do hereby order, that, notwithstanding anything in the said licence contained, on and after the seventh day of this present month of June, cattle sold in the said market until the thirty-first day of July next, if the said licence shall so long continue in force, may be moved from the said market to any slaughter-house in the towns of Blackburn, Bolton, Bury, Rochdale, Warrington, and Wigan, in the county of Lancaster, and in the township of Birkenhead, in the county of Chester, to be there immediately slaughtered under such regulations as the Local Authorities for the counties of Lancaster and Chester respectively, shall, from time to time, make and issue in regard to the movement as well as the places, times, and manner of slaughtering of such cattle :

Provided, that if any cattle shall be moved for a distance exceeding five miles in a direct line from such market, the cattle shall be moved by railway only from the market to their ultimate destination, or to the nearest slaughter-house within one mile of the station, except in respect of cattle to be moved to the township of Birkenhead, which may be moved from the said market into the part of the said township of Birkenhead hereinafter described, so that they are driven, taken, or conveyed along the shortest route from the said market across the River Mersey, to one of the landing-places at the Woodside or the Birkenhead Ferry, and from such landing-place by the shortest route to the public slaughter-house belonging to the Birkenhead Improvement Commissioners, anything in the said Order of the twenty-fourth of March, one thousand eight

hundred and sixty-six, to the contrary notwithstanding.

The part of the township above referred to is that part which is bounded on the east by the River Mersey, on the north and west by the north-westerly side of Argyle-street and Wilbraham-street, and on the south by the boundary line between the townships of Birkenhead and Tranmere.

This Order shall be construed in like manner as the said Order of the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, and every person who shall contravene this Order, or any regulation of the Local Authorities made under it, shall be guilty of an offence, and be subject to the like penalty as in the case of a contravention of any regulation in such Order.

This Order shall be published by the Local Authority of the borough of Liverpool; and every regulation made by the Local Authorities respectively under it shall also be published in some newspaper circulating in the borough of Liverpool, and by a notice affixed in some conspicuous place in the said market.

**W**HEREAS by an Order of Her Majesty's Privy Council, bearing date the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, duly issued under the authority of the Act passed in the session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to prevent until the first day of September one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals," which Act has been continued until the first day of August one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, and the end of the then next session of Parliament, by various statutes, and lastly by an Act of the last session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to amend the Act of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and seven, to prevent the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals," it was ordered that no market, fair, auction, exhibition, or sale of cattle should be held until the first day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, with this exception, that markets might be held, with the licence of the Privy Council, for the sale of cattle intended for immediate slaughter: Provided that no cattle should be removed from such market until they had been marked in the manner in which cattle were ordinarily marked for slaughter ac-

ording to the custom of such market, or, if there should be no such custom, by clipping the hair off the end of the tail; and provided also, that all cattle required to be marked by that regulation should be slaughtered within four days from the date of the holding of such market (if sold) by or by the order of the purchaser, or (if not sold) by or by the order of the owner, and by a subsequent Order of the said Council, bearing date the twenty-sixth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, the time limited in the said first-mentioned Order was extended until the Lords of the Council should otherwise order:

And whereas divers markets have been so licensed by the Lords of the said Council for the sale of cattle intended for immediate slaughter, and it is expedient that the time so limited by the said Order for the slaughter of cattle exposed for sale in any market so licensed should be extended:

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council do hereby order that, notwithstanding the said regulation in the said Order, or any regulation in any other Order or Orders, or in any licence of the said Privy Council to the contrary, from and after the tenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven:—

1. Cattle exposed for sale in any market, for the time being so licensed for the sale of cattle for immediate slaughter may be kept alive for the period of six days after exposure in any such market, and no longer, and no such cattle shall be exposed for sale in any such market a second time.

2. This Order shall be construed in like manner as the said Order of the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, and all the provisions therein contained relative to the offences for the contravention thereof, and the penalty for the same and otherwise now in force, except so far as they may be inconsistent with anything herein contained, shall be applied to this Order.

3. The provisions in this Order contained shall also apply to sheep and lambs.

**W**HEREAS by an Order bearing date the eighth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, did, amongst other things, make certain provisions relating to sheep and lambs, applicable only to the counties enumerated in a schedule thereunto annexed, including among others, the county of Chester, and to the counties of cities, or towns, cities, and boroughs therein contained:

And whereas the Lords of the said Council did, by an Order bearing date the eighteenth day of September last, reciting the said Order of the eighth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, make certain other regulations relating to sheep and lambs in the said several counties above referred to:

And whereas by an Order bearing date the sixteenth day of February last, the Lords of the said Council did rescind the said Order of the eighth of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, in regard to the said county of Chester, and it is expedient that the said Order of the eighteenth of September last also should be rescinded in reference to the said county.

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council do hereby order, that from and after this seventh day of June, the said Order of the eighteenth of September last shall be rescinded, and be no longer of force or validity in respect of sheep and lambs in the county of Chester, and in the county of the city of Chester, and the other towns and boroughs therein contained, except in respect of any matter or thing commenced under it and not completed, or of any offence committed in contravention thereof and not yet punished.

## EXPLANATIONS.

## I.—NAVIGATION DUES LEVIED AT SULINA IN 1866.

These dues are levied by the European Commission, by virtue of Article 16 of the Treaty of Paris of the 30th March, 1856, to cover the expenditure devoted to the improvement of the Mouths of the Danube.

The collection is effected on the basis of the Tariff joined to the Public Act signed at Galatz on the 2nd November, 1865. It includes as well the dues imposed on the navigation for the local pilotage, and for the keeping up of the light-houses which mark the Danube Mouths.

In 1866, the gross produce of the dues levied at Sulina amounted to the sum of 882,697 francs 30½ centimes. It is composed of the following items:—

## II.—DEBT OF THE EUROPEAN COMMISSION.

The last term of the loan concluded at Hamburg in 1862, having been paid off, as well as the capital of 10,000 pounds sterling borrowed in London in 1865, the debt of the European Commission does not, beyond the credit of the Ottoman Government not yet due, comprise more than the sum of 45,000 ducats, the amount of the bonds at 10 per cent. issued in 1866, 20,000 ducats of which will be paid off on the 30th June next.

The loan of three millions of francs destined to complete the works of improvement of the Sulina branch and mouth having been perforce again adjourned, the Commission has decided to issue a

further partial loan of 140,000 ducats at 10 per cent. interest, repayable after a period of four years reckoned from the delivery of the bonds.

The balance of the loan of 45,000 ducats will be repaid the 15th December, 1868, and the bond holders of the new loan will, from that date, be the sole creditors enjoying a preference on the produce of the tolls levied at Sulina.
