And whereas it hath been represented that it would be of advantage to the public, that the County Court now holden at Upton-on-Severn, should be holden at Great Malvern instead of at Upton-on-Severn.

is hereby ordered, that from and after the thirtieth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, the County Court now holden by the name of "The County Court of Worcestershire, holden at Upton-on-Severn," shall be holden by the name of "The County Court of Worcestershire, holden at Great Malvern," and the said Court now holden at Upton-on-Severn shall be holden at Great Malvern instead of at Upton-on-Severn.

whereas, by the said several Acts respectively it is provided that when Her Majesty shall by Order in Council direct that the said first-mentioned Act shall come into operation in any of the colonies mentioned therein, such Order shall be construed to apply as well to the said several Acts as to the said first-mentioned Act:

And whereas the Legislature of Dominica has, by an address dated the eleventh day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, prayed Her Majesty to issue such Order as aforesaid, and has, by an Act dated the same day, and intituled "An Act for carrying into execution in Dominica the West Indian Incumbered Estates Acts, 1854, 1858, 1862, and 1864," has made provision for the payment of such salaries and other expenses as aforesaid, to the satisfaction of Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies.

It is, therefore, hereby ordered by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the said "West Indian Incumbered Estates Act, 1854," shall from the date of this Order in Council come into operation in the Colony of Dominica.

WHEREAS by the forty-sixth section of "The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862" it is enacted that if any lighthouse, buoy, or beacon is erected or placed, or reconstructed, repaired, or replaced by any Local Authority having jurisdiction in the matter of lighthouses, buoys, or beacons, Her Majesty may, on the application of the said Local Authority, by Order in Council, fix such dues, to be paid to the said Local Authority, in respect of every ship which enters the port or harbour under the jurisdiction of such Local Authority, or the estuary wherein such lighthouse, buoy, or beacon is situate, and which passes the said lighthouse, buoy, or beacon, and derives benefit therefrom as Her Majesty may deem reasonable. And whereas the Commissioners for improving the port and harbour of Waterford, being the Local Authority having jurisdiction in the matters hereinafter mentioned, have erected, and are about to light a screw pile lighthouse on the Spit of Passage, about seven nautical miles within the entrance of Waterford harbour;

And whereas the said Commissioners have placed sundry other buoys and sea marks between Cheek Point and Duncannon Bar in the said harbour of Waterford;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, upon the application of the said Commissioners, and in exercise of the powers vested in Her by the said recited Act, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct that upon the lighting of the said

light, there shall be paid to the said Commissioners for improving the port and harbour of Waterford in respect of every vessel (whether British or foreign) of eighty-one tons burden and upwards, which, having entered the said port and harbour and come up the same as far as Duncannon, may pass or derive benefit from the said lighthouse, buoys, and sea marks, or any of them, except vessels of Her Majesty's Royal Navy, Government revenue vessels, vessels of war belonging to foreign governments, vessels belonging to or used by the general lighthouse authorities or the Board of Trade, and vessels when supplied with the ordinary fishing gear and employed in catching fish, or in carrying to port fresh fish from the fishing grounds, for each time of entering the harbour of Waterford the toll of one farthing per ton of the burthen of every such vessel.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the Fourth Report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues;" and of another Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to explain and amend two several Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England;" and of another Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for regulating the cathedral churches of Wales;" duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the ninth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the Fourth Report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues;" and of another Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to explain and amend two several Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England;" and of another Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for regulating the cathedral churches of Wales;" have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for substituting a money payment for certain property belonging to the dean and chapter of the cathedral church of Llandaff.

"Whereas it was by the said recited Acts enacted and declared that by the authority of a

scheme prepared by us, and ratified by an Order of your Majesty in Council, and for the purpose of fully carrying into effect any of the provisions of the said first-recited Act, any sum of money which should have been invested in the public funds, or in any other security or securities, in trust for any ecclesiastical body corporate, aggregate, or sole, might, upon application in writing to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, under the hand and seal of such body corporate, and in the case of any chapter, with the consent of the visitor thereof, be directed to be sold, and the same should be sold accordingly; and that the produce of such sale should be applied to such purpose and in such manner as should appear most conducive to the permanent benefit of such body corporate; and also that, for any like purpose, any arrangement might be made, with the consent in writing under the corporate seal of any chapter for the sale, transfer, or exchange of any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments belonging to such chapter, or for the purchase of other lands, tithes, or other hereditaments in lieu thereof, or for substituting in any case any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments for any money payment, or any money payment for any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments; and that the aforesaid provisions relating to the sale and application of any sum of money invested in trust for any ecclesiastical body corporate did and should include and apply to all moneys and securities for money, and to all stock in the Government funds or elsewhere, standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery, or in the name or names of any other public officer, or of any individual or individuals, for or to the credit of or in trust for any bishop, dean and chapter, dean or canon, whether for the purpose of being laid out in land or otherwise.

"And whereas the said chapter now consists, and will for the future consist, under the provisions of the said lastly-recited Act, of a dean and four canons.

"And whereas the said dean and chapter are seized in fee of certain lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments, forming the endowment of the said chapter, the greater part of which have been heretofore demised or granted and are now held on lease or grants for years or lives, at small annual reserved rents, and upon payment of fines.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that by reason of the great antiquity of the said cathedral church, and of the want of due reparation in times past, it has become necessary for the sustentation thereof to expend thereon forthwith such a sum of money as cannot be wholly charged on the parties now entitled to the receipt and enjoyment of the divisible corporate revenues of the said dean and chapter.

"And whereas we have ascertained that the sum required to be provided for the purpose of executing such repairs, and for effecting improvements conducive to the permanent security of the fabric of the said cathedral church amounts to not less than five thousand pounds.

"And whereas we are seized in fee simple in possession of certain lands, houses, and hereditaments particularly described in the schedule marked B annexed to this scheme.

"And whereas by an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the twenty-seventh day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, and duly published in the London

Gazette of the eighth day of September then following, and made under the authority of the Acts hereinbefore mentioned, provision is made by means of payments, to be made by us from time to time out of our common fund for making up the incomes of every dean and canon of the said cathedral church, appointed after the date of such Order, to the respective annual amounts of seven hundred pounds for such dean, and three hundred and fifty pounds for every such canon, and payments are now accordingly made by us from time to time to the present dean and canons of the said cathedral church (all of whom were appointed after the date of the said Order).

“And whereas the said dean and chapter have agreed to accept on behalf of themselves and their successors the lands and hereditaments comprised in the said schedule marked B. and the annual payment hereinafter intended to be secured to them in lieu of the payments now made by us as aforesaid, and as a discharge of all and any liability resting upon us under the provisions of the said Order, and also as a full consideration for the lands and hereditaments intended to be hereby transferred to us, and we are of opinion that the arrangement hereinafter set forth will be the most convenient mode of effecting for the future the purposes contemplated in the said Order, and will ultimately conduce to the improvement of our common fund.

“Now, therefore, with the consent of the dean and chapter of the cathedral church of Llandaff, and of the Right Reverend Alfred, Bishop of Llandaff, as visitor of the said dean and chapter, testified by their having hereunto affixed their respective corporate seals, we humbly recommend and propose that all the lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments which now belong either in possession or reversion to the said dean and chapter (excepting any right of ecclesiastical patronage the said cathedral church and the precincts thereof and the lands and hereditaments particularly described in the schedule hereunto annexed marked A), together with the benefit of any perpetual land tax charged thereupon which may have been redeemed, subject, nevertheless, to the liabilities and claims upon or in respect of the same lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments of or to which the said dean and chapter are now liable and all the estate and interest therein of the said dean and chapter shall upon and from the day on which any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be duly published in the London Gazette, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than any such duly published Order become and be transferred to and vested in us and our successors, and that we and they shall thereupon become absolutely seized of the same in fee and shall be entitled to the rents, profits and proceeds thereof, as from the first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, and that in consideration of and for such transfer and conveyance the lands, houses, and hereditaments particularly described in the schedule marked B annexed to this scheme, and all our estate and interest therein, shall, upon and from the day on which any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be duly published in the London Gazette, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly published Order, become and be transferred to and vested in the said dean and chapter for ever, in as full and ample a manner as if such lands, houses, and hereditaments had formed part of the ancient possessions of the said dean and chapter, subject to any liabilities to which the said

lands, houses, and hereditaments are now subject or legally liable; and that they, the said dean and chapter, shall be entitled to the rents, profits, and proceeds thereof, as from the said first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, and that in further consideration of, and for such transfer and conveyance, and also in discharge of the obligation with respect to the provision of the incomes of the dean and canons of the said cathedral church imposed upon us by the hereinbefore-recited Order of your Majesty in Council, we shall pay to the said dean and chapter, by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November, in every year, the annual sum of three thousand and five hundred pounds (four tenth parts of which said annual payments, or of the net income arising from the estates to be hereafter substituted for the same, as hereinafter mentioned, shall, together with the income which shall accrue to the said dean and chapter from burial and marriage fees, and from the properties comprised in the said schedules marked A and B respectively, be appropriated to the maintenance of the services of the said cathedral church, and the sustentation of the fabric thereof, and to meeting all the expenses and liabilities of the said dean and chapter, including the remuneration of their chapter clerk, the remaining six tenth parts being appropriated to the income of the said dean and four canons, viz., two of such parts to the dean, and one of such parts to each canon); and that the first of such half-yearly payments shall be made on the first day of November next, and that the payment of such last-mentioned annual sum shall continue until the said dean and chapter shall have been put in possession in fee simple of real estates sufficient to secure to the said dean and chapter a clear annual income therefrom (after deducting rates, taxes, and costs of management) of three thousand and five hundred pounds.

“And we further recommend and propose, that the receipt or receipts of the receiver for the time being of the said dean and chapter shall be a good and valid discharge to us for all or any such sum or sums of money as shall therein be expressed to have been paid to him by us under the authority of this scheme, when ratified as aforesaid.

“And we further recommend and propose, that no payments shall be hereafter made by us under the authority of the hereinbefore recited Order of your Majesty in Council, in respect of any period subsequent to the said first day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven.

“And we further recommend and propose that, as a further consideration for the said transfer and conveyance, there shall be paid and expended by us towards defraying the cost of effecting such repairs of the said cathedral church and improvements as aforesaid, under the superintendence of, and according to, plans and specifications to be prepared by the architect of the said dean and chapter, and to be approved by us, the said sum of five thousand pounds, together with interest thereon, at the rate of three pounds per centum, from the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme.

“And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, in conformity with the said Acts, or either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

writing under the corporate seal of any chapter, for the sale, transfer or exchange of any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments belonging to such chapter, or for the purchase of other lands, tithes, or other hereditaments in lieu thereof, or for substituting, in any case any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments for any money payment, or any money payment for any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments, and that the aforesaid provisions relating to the sale and application of any sum of money invested in trust for any ecclesiastical body corporate, did and should include and apply to all monies and securities for money, and to all stock in the Government funds, or elsewhere, standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery, or in the name or names of any other public officer, or of any individual or individuals for or to the credit of or in trust for any bishop, dean and chapter, dean or canon, whether for the purpose of being laid out in land or otherwise.

"And whereas by the firstly hereinbefore-mentioned Act, the chapter of your Majesty's said chapel is included among the bodies corporate, which are as chapters of collegiate churches made subject to the provisions of that Act, and of the Acts secondly and thirdly hereinbefore mentioned, and the chapter of the said chapel now consists of a dean and four canons, eight canonries having been suspended under the provisions of the said first recited Act.

"And whereas by the said Act of the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty, it was enacted, subject to the provisions of the said first hereinbefore recited Act, with respect to the interests of existing incumbents that in the said chapel, so soon as a vacancy should occur in the deanery, the share of the divisible corporate revenues from time to time payable to each canon appointed after the passing of such last-mentioned Act, and to us in respect of each suspended canonry should be one-fourteenth part of the whole of such revenues, and the remainder of such divisible corporate revenues should be paid to the dean.

"And whereas the present dean was appointed on a vacancy which occurred subsequently to the passing of the lastly hereinbefore recited enactment, and two of the present canons were appointed subsequently to the passing of the first hereinbefore recited Act, and the other two canons are willing that the arrangement embodied in the recommendation hereinafter contained should take effect forthwith.

"And whereas, by an Act passed in the twenty-fourth and twenty-fifth years of your Majesty, intituled 'An Act for the Appropriation in favour of the Military Knights and the Churches of Windsor of two of the Canonries suspended in the chapel of Windsor, and for making certain provisions respecting the Naval Knights of Windsor,' after reciting among other things that eight canonries had been suspended as aforesaid, and that one-fourteenth part of the whole monies of the said chapel were then paid to us in respect of each suspended canonry, it was enacted that thenceforth the said dean and canons should retain all such two shares of divisible revenues as if the Act now in recital had not been passed would have been payable to us in respect of two of the said eight suspended canonries, and should apply one of such two shares for the benefit of the Military Knights on the upper or Royal foundation of the Castle at Windsor, in such manner as your Majesty might by warrant under your Majesty's Sign Manual direct, and should apply the other of the said two shares as follows, that is to say, should pay three-fifths thereof to

the vicar for the time being of the Royal borough of Windsor, and the remaining two-fifths to the perpetual curate of the district church of the Holy Trinity in Windsor in augmentation of their respective benefices.

"And whereas the said dean and canons are seized in fee of certain manors, lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments, the greater part of which have been heretofore demised or granted and are now held on lease or grants for years or lives at small annual reserved rents, and upon payment of fines, and they are also beneficially interested or otherwise entitled to certain sums of stock and cash invested or held in trust as aforesaid, and particularly specified and set forth in the schedule to this scheme.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that by reason of the great antiquity of the said chapel and of the collegiate and other buildings connected therewith belonging to the said dean and canons, and of the want of due reparation in times past, it has become necessary for the sustentation thereof to expend thereon forthwith in repairs such a sum of money as cannot be wholly charged on the parties now entitled to the receipt and enjoyment of the divisible corporate revenues of the said dean and canons.

"And whereas we have ascertained that the sum so required to be expended in such repairs amounts to not less than twenty-six thousand pounds.

"And whereas, one of the purposes of the said Act is to provide a fund for making better provision for the cure of souls, and the said dean and canons have proposed to us, with the consent of their visitor, that the said manors, lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments, stock, and cash (except as hereinafter excepted) should be dealt with in manner hereinafter mentioned, and we are of opinion that it would ultimately conduce as well to the improvement of the said fund as to the permanent benefit of the said dean and canons that the same should be dealt with accordingly.

"And whereas the said church of the Holy Trinity, Windsor, has now become a rectory by virtue of an instrument made and executed under our common seal in accordance with the provisions of the 'District Church Tithes Act, 1865,' and published in the London Gazette on the third day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said dean and canons, and of the Right Honourable Frederic, Baron Chelmsford, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, as their visitor, such consents being severally testified by the said dean and canons having sealed and by the said Frederic, Baron Chelmsford having signed and sealed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose that all the manors, lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments which now belong either in possession or reversion to the said dean and canons (excepting any right of Ecclesiastical patronage, the premises within your Majesty's said castle, and certain other premises adjacent thereto, being the garden and stables of the said dean and canons, with the site of a house formerly in the occupation of Frederick Marriott, and all other the land and premises of the said dean and canons thereto adjoining, and excepting also any property held by them on trust for special charitable purposes), subject, nevertheless, to the liabilities and claims upon or in respect of the same manors, lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments of, or to which the said dean and canons are now liable, and all the estate and interest therein of the said dean and

canons and the benefit of the perpetual land tax charged thereon which has been redeemed, shall upon and from the day on which any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, shall be duly published in the London Gazette, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than any such duly published Order become and be transferred to and vested in us and our successors, and that we and they shall thereupon become absolutely seized of the same in fee and shall be entitled to the rents, profits, and proceeds thereof, as from the twenty-ninth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, and that in consideration of and for such transfer and conveyance, we shall surrender all right and be excluded from all participation in respect of the six suspended canonries, the shares of corporate revenue, attaching to which are now payable to us, and in the estates and property to be retained by the said dean and canons or to be hereafter transferred to them as their permanent endowment, and in the rents and profits thereof, or in the money payments hereinafter mentioned; and that there shall be paid by us to the said dean and canons by equal half-yearly payments on the twenty-fifth day of March, and the twenty-ninth day of September in every year, until they shall have been put into possession of real estates as hereinafter mentioned the sum of fourteen thousand and four hundred pounds, and that one such half-yearly payment shall be made in respect of the period which elapsed between the said twenty-ninth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, and the twenty-fifth day of March now last past, immediately upon the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme.

"And we further recommend and propose that as a further consideration for the said transfer and conveyance there shall be paid by us to the said dean and canons, immediately upon such gazetting as aforesaid, the sum of twenty-six thousand pounds, together with interest thereon at the rate of three pounds per centum per annum, from the said twenty-ninth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, for which proposed payment due allowance has been made in fixing the amount of the annuity to be paid to the said dean and canons as aforesaid, and which capital sum shall be invested by the said dean and canons in Government securities, and shall be held by them in trust to be from time to time, as occasion may require, sold out and transferred and the proceeds of the sales expended in such repairs as aforesaid.

"And we further recommend and propose that until such re-endowment as aforesaid there shall also be paid by us to the said dean and canons by equal half-yearly payments on the twenty-fifth day of March and the twenty-ninth day of September in every year, the annual sum of two hundred pounds in order to enable them to remunerate their chapter clerk for the time being, and that one such last-mentioned half-yearly payment shall be made in respect of the period which elapsed between the said twenty-ninth of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, and the twenty-fifth day of March now last past, immediately upon the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme.

"And we further recommend and propose that immediately upon such gazetting, as aforesaid, there shall also be paid by us to the said dean and canons a sum of seven thousand pounds in consideration of the said dean and canons having

abstained and abstaining from renewing certain leases of the said lands, tenements, and hereditaments hereby proposed to be transferred to us, which became renewable prior to or on the twenty-ninth day of September, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, which sum of seven thousand pounds shall be dealt with as income which would have accrued from the said lands and hereditaments for the period ending the said twenty-ninth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, if renewals of such leases had been made, and that the receipts of the receiver for the time being of the said dean and canons shall be a good and valid discharge to us for all or any and every such sum or sums of money as shall therein be expressed to have been paid to him by us under the authority of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme.

"And we further recommend and propose that the net annual income to be derived by the said dean and canons either from the half-yearly payments, amounting together to fourteen thousand and four hundred pounds per annum, proposed to be made by us until such re-endowment as aforesaid, or after such re-endowment from the estates then in the possession of the said dean and canons shall be dealt with and appropriated as follows, that is to say: That four-ninth parts of such net annual income, together with the income arising from the capital sum of twenty-six thousand pounds proposed to be paid by us as aforesaid, and from the unexpended balances thereof, and from the property within and adjacent to the said Castle to be retained by the said dean and canons as hereinbefore proposed, and the income which the said dean and canons shall derive from fees for interments, the erection of monuments, and the performance of ecclesiastical offices shall be appropriated to meeting the cost of maintaining the services of the said chapel and of keeping in repair the fabric thereof, and of the collegiate buildings connected therewith, and to providing for the payment to the said military knights of the ancient stipends and allowances to which they were entitled previously to the passing of the hereinbefore recited Act of the twenty-fourth and twenty-fifth years of your Majesty, and to the payment of all the other expenses and liabilities chargeable upon the corporate revenues of the said dean and canons, including therein certain salaries, subscriptions, and other annual payments which have hitherto been paid by the said dean and canons out of their corporate funds, and that if the whole of such last-mentioned share and proportion of the total capitular revenues being the share and proportion to be appropriated in perpetuity for the said purposes prior to the division of the net capitular revenues shall not in any year be so expended, the surplus thereof shall be accumulated and be employed in making good deficiencies (if any) in subsequent years, but that no portion thereof shall ever be appropriated to the personal use or enjoyment of the said dean and canons or either of them, and that the remaining five-ninth parts shall be divided into eight parts, which eight parts shall be appropriated for the income of the dean and four canons and of the parties entitled under the provisions of the said Act of the twenty-fourth and twenty-fifth years of your Majesty to the proceeds of the said hereinbefore mentioned two suspended canonries in the manner following, that is to say: Two of such eight parts for the income of the dean, one of such eight parts for the income of each of the four canons, one of such eight parts for the

benefit of the said military knights (which last-mentioned parts shall be paid and applied in such manner as your Majesty may by Warrant under your Sign Manual direct, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act of the twenty-fourth and twenty-fifth years of your Majesty), and one of such eight parts for the benefit of the incumbents for the time being, of the two churches hereinbefore mentioned in the proportions specified in the last-mentioned Act, that is to say, three-fifths thereof to the vicar for the time being of the Royal borough of Windsor, and two-fifths thereof to the rector for the time being of the said church of the Holy Trinity, Windsor.

"And we further recommend and propose that no augmentation or endowment of any benefice by means of the appropriation or annexation of any part of the estates to be acquired by us under the provisions of this scheme, or by means of any payment granted out or in respect of the rents and profits thereof, shall be made by us until or unless by and under the like authority, the said dean and canons shall have been put into possession in fee simple of real estates (of which not more than one-half part shall consist of tithe rent charges) sufficient to secure to the said dean and canons a clear annual income therefrom (after deducting rates, taxes, and other out-goings, including costs of management) of fourteen thousand and four hundred pounds.

"And we further recommend and propose, with the like consent of the said dean and canons and of their visitor, that the said sums of stock and cash so described as aforesaid in the schedule to this scheme, and also any other sums of cash or stock which may be now invested or held in trust for the said dean and canons (save and except a sum of five hundred and forty-nine pounds and nine shillings, three pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities, produced by the investment of a sum of five hundred pounds cash received in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four by the said dean and canons, as the consideration for the sale of certain buildings, consisting of a coach-house, stables, and chaise-house, and loose box, with yard thereto, then and for many years past used by the deans of Windsor, and known as the Dean's Stables) shall as soon as conveniently may be, be sold out or transferred, and the same, or the proceeds thereof, be paid or carried to our account at the Bank of England, to be applied towards the objects of this scheme, and particularly to investment in the purchase of any interest in the estates herein proposed to be transferred to us, or any or either of them, or of any other real estates.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, in conformity with the said Acts, or either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

" SCHEDULE.

"All those sums of stock standing to the credit of the dean and canons of Windsor in the books of the Church Estates Commissioners, being the proceeds of enfranchisements effected under the Episcopal and Capitular Estates Management Acts.

"And also the sums of stock standing to the credit of the dean and canons of Windsor in the books of us the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, being the proceeds of sales and enfran-

chisements effected under the Ecclesiastical Leasing Acts, and the Copyhold Acts.

"And also the sum of two hundred and fifty-seven pounds nine shillings and seven pence, Three pounds per centum New Bank Annuities, standing to the credit of the dean and canons of Windsor, in the books of the Governor and Company of the Bank of England.

"And also the sum of six hundred and eighty-four pounds and three pence Three pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities, standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery to the credit of an account exparte the Company of Proprietors of the Oxford Canal Navigation, in the matter of an Act to consolidate and extend the powers and provisions of the several Acts relating to the Oxford Canal Navigation, the account of the dean and canons of Windsor.

"And also the sum of five hundred and ninety-nine pounds and seven shillings Three pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery to the credit of an account exparte the mayor, bailiff, and burgesses of New Windsor, in the matter of the Windsor Bridge Act, the account of the dean and canons of Windsor.

"And also the sum of five hundred and seventy-one pounds nineteen shillings and three pence Three pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities standing to the credit of the Reverend Joseph Goodall, Doctor in Divinity, the Honourable and Reverend Henry Cockayne Cust, or the Treasurer and Steward of the dean and canons of Windsor for the time being, Alexander Milne and William Green, Esquires, in the books of the Governor and Company of the Bank of England.

"And also the sum of two thousand two hundred and thirty-one pounds fifteen shillings and two pence Three pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery to the credit of an account exparte the Commissioners of Her Majesty's woods, forests, land revenues, works, and buildings, the account of the dean and canons of Windsor.

"And also the sum of two thousand two hundred and twenty-four pounds nine shillings and five pence Three pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery to the credit of an account exparte the mayor and commonalty and citizens of the city of London, trustees under the Act of Parliament relating to the Royal Exchange, the account of the dean and canons of Windsor.

"And also the sum of ten thousand nine hundred and sixty-three pounds twelve shillings and four pence Three pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery to the credit of an account exparte the mayor and commonalty and citizens of the city of London, trustees of London Bridge, the account of the dean and canons of Windsor.

"And also the sum of one thousand three hundred and thirty-three pounds and seven pence, Three Pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery to the credit of an account exparte the London and North Western Railway Company, in the matter of the Trent Valley Railway Act, 1845, the account of the dean and canons of Windsor.

"And also the sum of two hundred and nineteen pounds eighteen shillings and a penny,

Three pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities standing to the credit of the Dean and Canons of the King's Free Chapel of Saint George, Windsor, in the books of the Governor and Company of the Bank of England.

"And also the sum of three hundred and ninety-seven pounds ten shillings and three pence, Three pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery to the credit of an account exparte the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Works and Public Buildings, the account of the dean and canons of Windsor.

"And also the sum of two thousand and fifty-seven pounds twelve shillings and ten pence, Three pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery to the credit of an account exparte the London and South Western Railway Company, in the matter of the Windsor, Staines, and South Western Railway Act (No. 1), 1847, the account of the dean and canons of Windsor.

"And also the sum of one hundred and fifty-five pounds and two pence, Three pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery to the credit of an account exparte the London and South Western Railway Company, in the matter of the Windsor, Staines, and South Western Railway Act (No. 1), 1847, the account of the dean and canons of Windsor.

"And also the sum of four hundred and forty-seven pounds five shillings and two pence, Three pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery to the credit of an account exparte the Great Western Railway Company, in the matter of the Great Western Railway (Slough and Windsor) Act, 1848, the account of the dean and canons of Windsor.

"And also the sum of three hundred and thirty-eight pounds, Three pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery to the credit of an account exparte the Wycombe Railway Company, in the matter of the Wycombe Railway Act, 1846, and the Wycombe Railway Amendment Act, 1852, the account of the dean and canons of Windsor.

"And also the sum of two hundred and sixty-four pounds three shillings and three pence, Three pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery to the credit of an account exparte the North Staffordshire Railway Company, in the matter of the North Staffordshire Railway Act, 1847, the account of the dean and canons of Windsor.

"And also the sum of three hundred and twenty-four pounds ten shillings and five pence, Three pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery to the credit of an account exparte the Eastern Counties and London and Blackwall Railway Companies, in the matter of the London, Tilbury, and Southend Extension Railway Act, 1852, the account of the dean and canons of Windsor.

"And also the sum of three hundred and eighteen pounds and six shillings, Three pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities standing to the credit of the dean and canons of Windsor in the books of the Governor and Company of the Bank of England, being the produce of

money received under a Policy of Insurance of a Barn at Urchfont, which was destroyed by fire.

"And also the sum of seven hundred and seventy-three pounds and fifteen shillings, Three pounds per centum Reduced Bank Annuities standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery to the credit of an account exparte the Company of Proprietors of the Wilts and Berks Canal Navigation, the account of the dean and canons of Windsor.

"And also the sum of one hundred and four pounds nineteen shillings and a penny, Three pounds per centum Reduced Bank Annuities standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery to the credit of an account exparte the Berks and Hants Extension Railway Company, in the matter of the Berks and Hants Extension Railway Act, the account of the dean and canons of Windsor.

"And also the sum of one hundred and forty-two pounds three shillings and sixpence, Three pounds per centum Reduced Bank Annuities standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery to the credit of an account exparte the Berks and Hants Railway Company, in the matter of the Berks and Hants Railway Act, 1845, and an Act to amend and enlarge some of the provisions of the Great Western Railway Company, and for other purposes, the account of the dean and canons of Windsor.

"And also the sum of forty-four pounds thirteen shillings and ten pence, Three pounds per centum Reduced Bank Annuities standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery to the credit of an account exparte the Great Western Railway Company, in the matter of the Great Western Railway Amendment and Extension Act, 1847, and the Great Western Railway Branches Act, 1853, and the Acts incorporated therewith, the account of the dean and canons of Windsor.

"And also the sum of two thousand nine hundred and seventy-six pounds eighteen shillings and eleven pence, Three pounds per centum Reduced Bank Annuities, standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery to the credit of an account exparte the Mayor and Commonalty and Citizens of the City of London, in the matter of the London (City) Improvement Act, 1852, the account of the dean and canons of Windsor.

"And also the sum of two thousand six hundred and eighty-five pounds fourteen shillings and three pence, Three pounds per centum Reduced Bank Annuities standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery to the credit of an account exparte the Dagenham (Thames) Dock Company, in the matter of the Dagenham (Thames) Dock Act, 1855, the account of the dean and canons of Windsor."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Oxford.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit;

And whereas Orders in Council have been made, directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyards and burial-grounds hereinafter mentioned, from the time specified in such Orders; and whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the time for discontinuing burials in the said churchyards and burial-grounds be postponed:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyards and burial-grounds be postponed as follows; viz.:

In the churchyard of Holy Trinity, Springfield, Essex, to the twenty-seventh day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven.

In the churchyard of Newland, Coleford, Gloucestershire, to the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven.

WHEREAS the Right Honourable Gathorne Hardy, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representations, has, under the provisions of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes, without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that interments in the same

should be discontinued, with the following modifications; viz.:

COTTINGHAM, YORKSHIRE.—Forthwith wholly in the parish church, and in that part of the churchyard which lies to the south and west of the church, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, and in the rest of the churchyard, except in graves not less than five feet deep, and which can be opened without the exposure of coffins or the disturbance of bones.

CHEWYND, SALOP.—Forthwith wholly in the old churchyard, except in now existing vaults which belong to the Borough, Pigott, and Ryland families, in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal and separately entombed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the eighth day of August next:

JAMES HUDSON, an Apprentice of the "Maid of Orleans," of Ardrossan; and

The following is an account of the services in respect of which the decorations have been conferred:—

The "Marmion," of North Shields, on the 17th March last, drove from her anchors and was stranded on the Cornish Coast at Gylynvase, near Pendennis Castle, Falmouth. The wind at the time was blowing strong with squalls,—the tide was first quarter flood. At ten A.M. the ship was in the midst of breakers, and often entirely covered with surf, and no communication with the shore appeared possible. The master and one of the crew died on board from exposure and exhaustion.

After an ineffectual attempt had been made to communicate with the shore by means of a line tied to a stool and thrown overboard from the ship, JAMES HUDSON, a youth of seventeen, an apprentice belonging to the "Maid of Orleans," then lying at Falmouth, volunteered to swim off to the vessel. He was at first dissuaded from the attempt, for it was thought that he would lose his life. But he persisted, and the Coast Guard attached to him their life lines and guided him afloat. He had neither jacket nor belt on. He was soon in the midst of a heavy sea, and in a short time got to the stern of the vessel, and after three attempts to reach the deck swung himself on board by the aid of a spar hanging over the side. The line attached to HUDSON effected a communication between the ship and the shore, and six of the crew were rescued by a hawser and running gear then set up.

HUDSON was compelled, by his want of clothing, to return when he had been about a quarter of an hour on board. His distress in returning was great. He expected to have been pulled on shore, but the running gear had fouled and he was obliged to pull himself hand over hand along the hawser to the shore. He was very much exhausted, and without assistance would probably not have succeeded in landing himself upon the beach.

There still remained one man alive on board, but he was too weak to fasten around himself the cork jacket with which he had been supplied. In this emergency THEOPHILUS JONES, who had a line but no jacket or belt on, threw himself into the sea, and after two or three unsuccessful attempts, reached the vessel, and was lifted on board by the waves and by the aid of a spar which hung over the side.

He succeeded in fastening a cork jacket round the seaman and pushed him overboard, and this man too was saved. JONES was some time in the surf; he was very much benumbed and exhausted when he arrived on shore.
