WHEREAS by an Order of Her Majesty's Privy Council, bearing date the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, duly issued under the authority of the Act, passed in the session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to prevent, until the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals," which Act has been continued until the first day of August next, and the end of the then next session of Parliament, by divers statutes, and lastly by an Act of the last session of Parliament, and made by the Lords of the said Council in relation to the contagious or infectious disorder generally designated as the "Cattle Plague," which then prevailed in certain parts of England, the said Lords of the Council did thereby make provisions to regulate the movement of cattle on any highway, and such movement without a licence as therein referred to and described in the schedule thereto annexed, was prohibited, except for a distance not exceeding five hundred yards from one part of the same farm to the other:

And whereas by another Order, bearing date the eighth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, so much of the said Order of the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, as contained the forms of licence to be given for moving cattle was rescinded and certain forms called respectively the "Fat Stock Licence," and the "Store Stock Licence," were substituted:

And whereas the said licence, called the "Store Stock Licence," can be signed and issued only by

a Justice of the Peace having jurisdiction in the place from which the cattle are to be moved:

And whereas the said cattle plague still exists in some parts of England:

And whereas it is expedient to make further regulations with regard to the signing and issuing of such last-mentioned licence:

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Council do hereby order as follows:—

1. Any Local Authority may appoint any person, other than a Justice of the Peace, to sign and issue the licence in the said Order of the eighth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, called the "Store Stock Licence," and any such licence so signed by any person so appointed as aforesaid shall, for the purposes of any Order of the said Lords of the Council, issued under the authority of the said Act, be available as a Store Stock Licence signed and issued by a Justice of the Peace, under the said Order of the eighth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, but the form of the said licence must be altered accordingly.

2. Provided that it shall not be lawful, under any such licence so signed and issued under the authority of this Order, to move any cattle out of the district of the Local authority in which the same shall be at the time when the licence is granted, except into a district of a Local Authority adjoining the district from which it is desired to move such cattle, and no such movement shall be lawful except with the consent of such adjoining Local Authority, to be signified by indorsement in writing by some person appointed by such Local Authority for this purpose.

3. The Local Authority appointing any person to issue such licences under this Order shall give notice to the Privy Council of the appointment of such person, and it shall be competent, at any time, for the said Lords of the Council to rescind any such appointment so made by the Local Authority, and no licence signed by such person after the said Lords shall have rescinded his appointment shall be valid.

4. This Order shall be construed in like manner as the Order of the twenty-fourth of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six; and all the provisions therein contained relative to the offences for the contravention thereof, and the penalty for the same, and the provisions of the

said Order in regard to the powers of officers employed under that Order and all other provisions of that Order, and the subsequent Orders altering the same now in force and not inconsistent with anything herein contained, shall in respect of every matter to which they may be applicable, apply to the regulations contained in this Order and the enforcing of the same.

THE Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs has received, from Her Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires at Florence a Despatch, of which the following is a copy:—

Florence, July 13, 1867.

OFFICIAL information having been received here of the breaking out of Cholera in Montenegro, orders have been issued from the Department of the Interior subjecting to quarantine of observation for fifteen days all vessels that have left any places on the coast of Dalmatia and Albania, between Spalatro and Durazzo—those two ports not included—after the 5th instant.

HER Majesty's Ambassador at St. Petersburg has transmitted to Her Majesty's Government the following notice, issued by the Russian Government, and published in the Journal de St. Pétersbourg of the ^{20 June} ~~11 July~~, 1867, relative to the Passports of Foreigners arriving in Russia or wishing to leave the country:—

Le 22 mai dernier, S. M. l'Empereur a daigné sanctionner la décision suivante du Conseil de l'Empire, rendue sur la proposition du Ministre de l'Intérieur:—

“I. Les articles 469 à 472 du règlement sur les passeports, t. XIV du corps des lois, sont remplacés par les dispositions ci-dessous: 1° Les passeports à l'étranger se délivrent aux particuliers de toute condition sous la forme de livrets avec deux talons, dont l'un est coupé à la douane, au moment de la sortie du voyageur du territoire, et l'autre lorsqu'il y rentre en revenant de l'étranger; 2° chaque passeport doit mentionner les noms de baptême et de famille ainsi que la condition de son porteur, la désignation de l'autorité qui l'a délivré, la date de cette délivrance et son numéro, et doit en outre contenir un abrégé imprimé des règles en vigueur sur les passeports à l'étranger; 3° le passeport commence par les mots: *Le porteur du présent*, et se termine ainsi: *En foi de quoi et pour sa libre circulation a été délivré le présent passeport avec apposition du sceau.* A.....le.....18... après quoi vient la signature; 4° les passeports sont écrits en trois langues: russe, française et allemande.

“II. La rédaction des §§ 1, 13, et 14 de l'annexe à l'art. 436 (observ.) suppl. de 1863 du même règlement, est amendée ainsi qu'il suit: § 1. Les étrangers sont admis en Russie, soit avec les passeports prescrits par les art. 486 et 498 du présent règlement, soit avec leurs passeports et leurs livrets (*Wanderbücher*) nationaux visés par les légations et consulats de Russie, sans en excepter ceux sur lesquels, pendant leur séjour antérieur en Russie, aurait été inscrite la mention que d'après ces documents il avait été délivré des

permis de séjour russes, pourvu que ces passeports et livrets soient encore valables. Pour rentrer en Russie avec un permis de séjour encore valable, un étranger n'a pas besoin du visa de nos légations et consulats. Les étrangers sortant de Russie avec des passeports russes spéciaux pour l'étranger doivent, pour rentrer en Russie, se faire délivrer à l'étranger des passeports de leur gouvernement et les faire viser par nos légations et consulats. § 13. Pour obtenir un passeport à l'étranger, tout étranger qui demeure dans un chef-lieu de gouvernement ou dans son district, doit se présenter en personne à la chancellerie du gouverneur, et, sans être obligé d'en faire la demande par écrit, présenter le passeport en vertu duquel il séjourne dans l'empire, ainsi que son passeport national s'il en possède un, et déposer 50 cop. pour coût de la formule imprimée du passeport, ainsi qu'un certificat de la police constatant qu'il n'y a pas de motif légal de s'opposer à son départ. L'étranger reçoit alors un passeport à l'étranger ou un visa sur son passeport national pour autoriser sa sortie du territoire, en observant les formalités prescrites aux étrangers pour le renouvellement des passeports autorisant leur séjour dans l'empire. § 14. Pour obtenir un passeport à l'étranger, l'étranger domicilié dans un district doit en adresser la demande par écrit, sur papier libre, à la police locale du district ou de la ville, en y joignant le passeport en vertu duquel il séjourne dans l'empire, ainsi que son passeport national s'il en possède un, et 50 cop. pour la formule imprimée du passeport. A la suite de quoi, on lui délivre un passeport à l'étranger, ou on lui restitue son passeport national avec un visa qui tient lieu de passeport, en observant les formalités prescrites aux étrangers domiciliés dans les districts pour le renouvellement des passeports autorisant leur séjour dans l'empire, sauf toutefois que dans son rapport au chef de la province la police doit certifier qu'aucun obstacle légal ne s'oppose au départ de Russie de l'étranger."

Cette décision a été promulguée par un oukase du sénat dirigeant du 23 juin courant inséré au *Bulletin des Lois*.

No personal application can receive attention.
