AT the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 23rd day of July, 1867.

By the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

PRESENT,

Lord President.
Lord Robert Montagu.

WHEREAS by Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, bearing date the twenty-fourth day of March and the eleventh day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six respectively, reciting certain provisions of the Act of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, which has been continued by divers Acts, and lastly by an Act of the last session of Parliament, until the first day of August next, and the end of the then next session of Parliament, and the appearance and prevalence of a contagious and infectious disorder, generally designated the "Cattle Plague," amongst cattle in England and Wales, and sundry other matters, the said Lords did, in exercise of the powers given by the said Act so continued as aforesaid, make divers rules and regulations, and did, among other things, order that until the first day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, all cattle brought by sea from any place out of the United Kingdom into any town or place in England and Scotland should be marked, by clipping the hair off the end of the tail; and that no such cattle should be removed alive from such town or place, except by sea:

And whereas by a subsequent Order bearing date the twenty-sixth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, the time so limited was extended until the Lords of the said Council should otherwise order, and certain other provisions were made in respect of cattle brought by sea from any place out of the United Kingdom and landed at any place therein:

And whereas the disease commonly termed the "Cattle Plague" still exists in certain parts of England:

And whereas it is expedient that further regulations should be made in regard to the marking of such cattle so brought by sea and landed at any place in Great Britain:

Now therefore the Lords of the Council do hereby further order as follows:—

1. All cattle brought by sea from any place out of the United Kingdom, except the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man, and landed at any place in Great Britain, shall, within twelve hours of such landing, in addition to being so marked as aforesaid, be branded by the owner or person landing the same in such manner as the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Customs shall from time to time direct.

2. This Order shall be construed in like manner as the said Orders of the twenty-fourth day of March and the eleventh day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six; and any person who shall have in his or her possession, or on whose premises there may be found any such cattle so branded, in contravention of the provisions of any Order of the Lords of the said Council, shall be deemed to be guilty of an offence against the said Orders of the twenty-fourth day of March and the eleventh day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six respectively, and be punishable as therein provided.

3. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

4. This Order shall take effect on and after the first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven.

WHEREAS by an Order of Her Majesty's Privy Council, bearing date the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred

and sixty-six, duly issued under the authority of the Act passed in the session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to prevent, until the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals," which Act has been continued until the first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, and the end of the then next session of Parliament, by various statutes, and lastly, by an Act of the last session of Parliament, it was ordered, that no market, fair, auction, exhibition, or sale of cattle should be held until the first day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, with this exception, that markets might be held, with the licence of the Privy Council, for the sale of cattle intended for immediate slaughter; and by a subsequent Order of the said Council, bearing date the twenty-sixth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, the time limited in the said first-mentioned Order was extended until the Lords of the Council should otherwise order:

And whereas by an Order of the said Council, bearing date the seventh day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, reciting, among other things, the said regulation, it is ordered that, from and after the eighth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, markets may be held, with the licence of the Lords of the said Council, for the sale of animals, whether intended for immediate slaughter or otherwise, in any county in England and Wales, provided that no such licence shall be granted unless their Lordships shall be satisfied that no case of cattle plague has occurred in the county where such market is to be held, within one calendar month prior to the date of such licence, nor unless the market is situated at a distance exceeding ten miles from any place declared to be infected according to the provisions of the said Order of the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six; and in such recited Order of the seventh day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, it is provided that no licence shall be granted under that Order permitting any market to be held in any port or other place into which animals are imported from any country not part of the United Kingdom:

And whereas by another Order of the said Council, bearing date the thirteenth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, reciting, among other things, the said recited Order of the seventh day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, the holding of markets with the licence of the Lords of the said Council, for the sale of animals, otherwise than for immediate slaughter, at any port or other place in England or Wales into which animals may be imported from any country not part of the United Kingdom was authorized: but it was provided that in ports or places in which licences to hold such markets as aforesaid should be granted, no cattle brought by sea from any place out of the United Kingdom, except the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man, should be landed, except at some part of such port or place to be defined in some Order or Orders of the Lords of the Council, nor until some such Order or Orders shall have been so made, and that when landed, they should not be moved from such part of such port or place, except to be taken to the nearest shed or slaughter-house in such port or place, which should have been duly

licensed by the Lords of Her Majesty's Council for the reception or slaughter of foreign cattle, and it was ordered that they should be there slaughtered within four days from the day of landing, both days inclusive:

And whereas the port of Penzance, in the county of Cornwall, is a port into which animals have been and can be imported from countries not parts of the United Kingdom, and it is advisable to make provision for the same as hereinafter contained:

Now, therefore, the Lords of the Council do, by this their Order, set forth and define the part of the said port at which cattle brought by sea from any place out of the United Kingdom, may be landed, in manner following, that is to say:

All that part of the Albert Pier in the said port of Penzance, extending from the jetty near the southern end of the said pier for a distance of one thousand and sixty feet northward, and on a portion of which a shed has been erected for the reception and slaughter of foreign cattle:

And the said Lords do hereby further order, that all cattle brought by sea from any place out of the United Kingdom, so landed at the port of Penzance, shall be slaughtered within such part of the said port as defined as aforesaid, and not elsewhere; and that no cattle brought within such part of the said port shall be removed therefrom alive:

And further, that all the regulations of the said Order of the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, now in force, and not inconsistent herewith, shall apply to this Order; and that any contravention of any provision herein contained shall be deemed to be an offence within the operation of the said Order of the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, and be punishable as therein provided:

And further, that the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Penzance, shall publish this Order by causing a copy thereof to be advertised in some newspaper circulating in the said borough, and by causing a copy thereof to be affixed in some conspicuous place of the port aforesaid.

THE Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs has received, from Her Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires at Florence a Despatch, of which the following is a copy:—

Florence, July 17, 1867.

BY order of the Minister of the Interior, all vessels that may have left any part of the Coast between San Vito (Province of Abruzzo Citeriore) and Termoli (Province of Molise) will be subjected to fifteen days' quarantine, on account of the appearance of cholera at Vasto.

It has likewise been notified, that the Order already issued for quarantine on vessels arriving from the town of Catania is to be extended to vessels from any of the ports of that province, cholera having broken out in several places belonging to it.

Vessels arriving at Catania after the 14th instant are to be admitted to pratique even though they may have foul bills for cholera, provided that no cases of sickness or death have occurred during the voyage.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires at Lisbon, transmitting a copy of a Portuguese Law, dated 2nd July, 1867, of which the following is a translation:—

Art. 1. The import duties fixed in the general tariff for the following articles are reduced to five per cent. ad valorem, namely:—

Steel in bars.
Cast iron, raw
Forged iron and rolled iron, plain.

Art. 2. The import duty marked in the general tariff for plain wire drawn iron, the diameter of which shall not be more than two millimetres, is likewise reduced to ten per cent. ad valorem.

Art. 3. The Government is authorized to change the ad valorem duties laid down in the 1st Article into an equivalent fixed duty, taking as a rule the average price of iron; a raw material which is generally imported into our market.

Art. 4. All legislation to the contrary is revoked.
