WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, intituled "An Act to prevent, "until the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and to the end of the then "session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, "and other animals," and from time to time continued until the first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, and the end of the then next Session of Parliament, by divers Acts, and lastly, by an Act in the last Session of Parliament, it is (amongst other things) enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time, to make such Orders and Regulations as to them may seem necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal to or from such parts or places as they might designate in such Order or Orders, of sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals, or of meat, skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals, or of hay, straw, fodder, or other articles likely to propagate infection, and to make any other Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations; and that

all provisions for any of the purposes aforesaid in any such Order or Orders contained shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in the said Act:

And whereas divers Orders have been made by the Lords of the said Council from time to time, in relation to the contagious or infectious disorder generally designated as the "Cattle Plague," which has lately appeared and now prevails amongst cattle in some parts of England, which Orders were consolidated and amended by an Order bearing date the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, which Order regulated the movement until the first day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, of cattle brought by sea into England:

And whereas by an Order bearing date the twenty-sixth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, the time limited in the said Order of the twenty-fourth day of March was extended until the Lords of the Council should otherwise order, and it was further ordered that all cattle brought by sea from any place out of the United Kingdom, except the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man, and landed at any place in the United Kingdom, should be taken forthwith to the market held and duly licensed by the Lords of the Council for the sale of cattle, for immediate slaughter, if any such there should be within the said place, which should be held within four days from the landing of such cattle; and if there should be no such market duly licensed within such place, or if the market duly licensed should not be held within four days from the landing of such cattle, that such cattle should be slaughtered at such place before the expiration of such four days; and that all lambs, sheep, goats, and swine brought by sea from any place out of the United Kingdom into any town or place in the United Kingdom, in the same vessel with any foreign cattle, should be dealt with in all respects as such foreign cattle, and should be subject to all the regulations appli-

cable to such foreign cattle brought by sea into any such town or place :

And whereas the said regulations have been altered and amended by divers Orders, dated respectively the twenty-seventh day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, relating to cattle brought by sea from any place out of the United Kingdom to any place on the Rivers Thames or Medway, westward of the Nore Light, the twenty-third and twenty-ninth days of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, relating to cattle brought by sea from any place out of the United Kingdom to Southampton, and the eleventh day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, relating to cattle brought by sea from any place out of the United Kingdom to Harwich, in regard to cattle brought to a certain market for the sale of cattle in the parish of St. Mary, Islington, in the county of Middlesex, known as the Metropolitan Cattle Market :

And whereas by another Order, bearing date the twenty-seventh day of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, the Lords of the said Council did make certain further regulations with regard to cattle so taken to the said Metropolitan Cattle Market as aforesaid, and did, amongst other things, order that cattle brought by sea from any place out of the United Kingdom, except the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man, and landed at any place in England, should not be moved from the landing place where landed for the period of twelve hours from the time of landing, but should remain for such period in some lair or other proper place adjacent to such landing place to be provided for their reception, for the purpose of being inspected by a competent inspector, and no cattle should be landed from any vessel until such lair or other proper place should have been provided :

And whereas it has been represented to the Lords of the said Council that Cattle Plague exists among cattle in certain parts of the Empire of Russia which are situated in Europe :

And whereas the vessel "St. Petersburg," has arrived at the port of London, from Cronstadt, with a cargo of cattle :

And whereas it is expedient that certain further regulations should be made with regard to such cargo of cattle :

Now, therefore, the Lords of the said Council do hereby order as follows :

1. All cattle which have formed a part of such

cargo, and which have been landed at the Victoria Dock, or at any place on the banks of the River Thames or of the River Medway, or at either of the ports of Southampton, and Harwich, as aforesaid, for the purpose of being conveyed to the Metropolitan Cattle Market, situate in the parish of Saint Mary, Islington, in the county of Middlesex, under the sanction or authority of any Order of the said Lords of the Council, shall, before being moved to such market, remain at the landing place, where the same shall have been landed, for the period of seven days from the day of landing, and shall remain for such period in some lair or other proper place adjacent to such landing place to be provided for their reception, and shall from time to time during such seven days be examined by a competent inspector ; and no such cattle shall be moved therefrom until they shall have been inspected, and the Inspector shall have certified that they may be moved with safety.

2. If upon any such inspection any cattle so landed shall be found to be in such a state that in the judgment of the Inspector it would be unsafe that such cattle should be moved from the port or place where the same shall have been landed, such cattle shall, with all convenient speed, be slaughtered at such port or place, or at the nearest slaughter-house.

3. All the restrictions and regulations in force with respect to the movement of foreign cattle taken to such market shall apply to the aforesaid cargo of cattle so detained at the place of landing under the provisions of this Order, at the expiration of the said period of seven days.

4. All lambs, sheep, goats, and swine brought in the same vessel with any such cattle shall be dealt with in all respect as, and shall be subject to all the regulations applicable to, such cattle so landed as aforesaid.

5. The words herein contained shall be construed as in the said Order of the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, and all the provisions therein contained, relative to the offences for the contravention thereof, and the penalty for the same, and in respect of the powers of officers employed under it, and all other provisions of that Order, and the subsequent Orders altering it, now in force, and not inconsistent with anything herein contained, shall in respect of every matter and thing to which they shall be applicable, apply to the regulations contained in this Order, and the enforcing the same, and the officers employed under it.
