WHEREAS Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, by an Order dated the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, reciting that, whereas it had been represented to Her Majesty that certain contagious or infectious disorders were then prevalent among cattle, in the dominions and territories situated in Europe, belonging to His Majesty the King of the Netherlands, and that there was danger of the said disorders being introduced into this country by means of cattle from such countries or places, did order, that on and after the twenty-eighth day of March then instant, no cattle should be imported or introduced into the United Kingdom, which should come from or should have been at any place within the aforesaid territories and dominions, situate in Europe, belonging to His Majesty the King of the Netherlands; and also that on and after the said twenty-eighth day of March then instant, no cattle should be imported or introduced into the United Kingdom which should be, or should have been, on board any vessels at the same time with any cattle which should have come from, or should have been within, the aforesaid territories and dominions:

And Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, did thereby further order that, in the event of any cattle being landed in any portion of the United Kingdom, contrary to the provisions of that Order, all such cattle, the importation or introduction whereof was thereby

prohibited as aforesaid, should, upon their arrival in this country, be destroyed or otherwise disposed of, as the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Customs might direct; and that that Order should continue in force until revoked by any further Order; and that the word "cattle" should include sheep as well as bulls, cows, oxen, heifers, and calves:

And whereas Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, did by another Order dated the twenty-seventh day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, revoke so much of the said recited Order as applied to cattle the produce of the provinces of Friesland and Groningen, parts of the said dominions belonging to His Majesty the King of the Netherlands, and did thereby authorize any such cattle to be imported into any port or place in Great Britain, from the ports of Harlingen, in the province of Friesland, and Delfzyl, in the province of Groningen:

And whereas it is advisable that the said Order of the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, should be further revoked or altered to the extent hereinafter set forth:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth hereby further revoke or alter, as hereinafter mentioned, so much of the said Order of the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, as would apply to cattle the produce of the provinces of Zealand, Overijssel, and that part of the province of North Holland which is situate to the north of the River Y, parts of the said dominions belonging to His said Majesty the King of the Netherlands, and doth hereby authorize any such cattle to be imported into any port or place in Great Britain, from the ports of Flushing, Zierikzee, and Brouwershaven, in the province of Zealand, Zwolle, and Kampen, in the province of Overijssel, and Nieuwe Diep, and Medemblick, in the province of North Holland, only, provided that no such cattle shall have been on board any vessel at the same time with other cattle which shall have come from or been within any part of the aforesaid territories or dominions belonging to His Majesty the King of the Netherlands, as to which the said Order of the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, remains in force and unrevoked, or any other dominions or places from which the importation of cattle into any port or

place of Great Britain is prohibited, subject nevertheless to all the regulations heretofore made and now in force, or hereafter to be made, by the Lords of the said Council, or by any Local Authority under the Order of such Lords, applicable to the importation of foreign cattle or sheep into any port or place in Great Britain.

And Her Majesty doth also, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, hereby revoke or alter as hereinafter mentioned so much of the said Order of the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, as would apply to cattle which shall pass through the province of Limburgh, part of the dominions of His Majesty the King of the Netherlands, from dominions or places beyond such province to dominions or places also beyond such province, in trucks or waggons on the Sambre and Meuse Railway, if such cattle shall have come from dominions or places from which the importation of cattle into Great Britain is not and shall not be prohibited, and shall have passed from such dominions or places to such other dominions or places than the province of Limburgh without any stoppage in any part of such province of Limburgh by the railway train conveying any such cattle as aforesaid.

This Order shall be construed as the said recited Order of the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, and shall continue in force until revoked.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS Her Majesty, at the Court held at Buckingham Palace, the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, by an Order reciting that whereas it had been represented to Her Majesty that certain contagious or infectious disorders were then prevalent among cattle in the dominions and territories situated in Europe belonging to His Majesty the King of the Netherlands, and that there was danger of the said disorders being introduced into this country by means of cattle from such countries or places, did order that, on and after the twenty-eighth day of March then instant, no cattle should be imported or introduced into the United Kingdom which should come from or should have been at any place within the aforesaid territories and dominions situate in Europe, belonging to His Majesty the King of the Netherlands; and also that, on and after the said twenty-eighth day of March then instant, no cattle should be imported or introduced into the United Kingdom which should be or should have been on board any vessels at the same time with any cattle which should have come from or should have been within the aforesaid territories and dominions;

And whereas by an Order, bearing date the twenty-seventh day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, Her Majesty, by and with

the advice of Her Privy Council, revoked so much of the said Order as would apply to cattle, the produce of the provinces of Friesland and Groningen, parts of the said dominions belonging to His said Majesty the King of the Netherlands, and authorized any such cattle to be imported into any port or place in Great Britain from the ports of Harlingen, in the province of Friesland, and Delfzyl, in the province of Groningen, only, subject nevertheless to all the regulations made by the Lords of the said Council, or by any Local Authority under the Order of such Lords, applicable to the importation of foreign cattle or sheep into any port or place in Great Britain;

And whereas by another Order bearing date the twenty-seventh day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, did order that on and after the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, no horn, hoof, raw or wet hide or skin of any such cattle as aforesaid should be imported or introduced into the United Kingdom which should come from, or should have been at, any place within the aforesaid territories and dominions, situate in Europe, belonging to His Majesty the King of the Netherlands, other than the said provinces of Friesland and Groningen; and also that on and after the said first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, no horn, hoof, raw, or wet hide or skin of any such cattle should be imported or introduced into the United Kingdom which should be, or should have been, on board any vessels at the same time with any cattle which should have come from, or should have been within, the aforesaid territories and dominions, other than the said provinces of Friesland and Groningen, and that in the event of the horn, hoof, raw or wet hide or skin of any cattle being landed in any portion of the United Kingdom, contrary to the provisions of that Order, such horn, hoof, raw or wet hide or skin, the importation or introduction whereof was thereby prohibited as aforesaid, should upon arrival in this country, be destroyed or otherwise disposed of, as the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Customs might direct; and that that Order should continue in force until revoked by any further Order:

And whereas by an Order, bearing even date herewith, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, hath further revoked or altered amongst other parts of the said Order of the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, so much thereof as would apply to cattle the produce of the provinces of Zealand, Overysse, and that part of the province of North Holland which is situate to the north of the River Y, parts of the said dominions belonging to His said Majesty the King of the Netherlands, and hath authorised any such cattle to be imported into any port or place in Great Britain from the ports of Flushing, Zierikzee, and Brouwershaven, in the province of Zealand, Zwolle, and Kampen, in the province of Overysse, and Nieuwe Diep, and Medemblick, in the province of North Holland, only, provided such cattle should not have been on board any vessel at the same time with other cattle which should have come from, or been within any part of, the aforesaid territories or dominions belonging to His Majesty the King of the Netherlands, as to which the said Order of the twenty-fourth March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, remains in force and unrevoked, or any other dominions or places from which the importation of cattle into Great Britain,

or any part thereof, is prohibited, subject nevertheless to all the regulations heretofore made and now in force, or hereafter to be made by the Lords of the said Council, or by any Local Authority under the Order of such Lords, applicable to the importation of foreign cattle or sheep into any port or place in Great Britain;

And whereas it has been represented to Her Majesty that it is advisable that certain provisions should be made with reference to the horns, hoofs, and raw or wet hides and skins of cattle to be imported from the said provinces of Zealand, Overysse, and that part of the province of North Holland which is situate to the north of the River Y, parts of the dominions and territories aforesaid, into the United Kingdom:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth hereby revoke and alter so much of the said Order of the twenty-seventh day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, as would apply to the horns, hoofs, and raw or wet hides and skins of cattle, to be imported from the provinces of Zealand, Overysse, and that part of the province of North Holland which is situate to the north of the River Y, provided such horns, hoofs, and raw or wet hides and skins of cattle shall not be imported from the said provinces and part of a province on board any vessel at the same time with cattle or sheep, or with horns, hoofs, raw or wet hides or skins of cattle, which shall have come from or been within any part of the dominions belonging to His Majesty the King of the Netherlands, as to which the said Orders of the twenty-fourth of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, and twenty-seventh of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, remain in force and unrevoked, or any other territory or place from which the importation of cattle, sheep, horns, hoofs, raw or wet hides and skins of cattle into Great Britain, or any part, is prohibited.

This Order shall be construed as the said recited Orders of the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, and the twenty-seventh day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, and shall continue in force until revoked.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by the three hundred and thirty-third section of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for every Pilotage Authority, by bye-law made with the consent of Her Majesty in Council, from time to time, to do within its district all or any of the things specified in that behalf in the said section:

And whereas by the thirteenth section of the Order set out in the schedule to "The Sunderland Pilotage Order Confirmation Act, 1865," it is provided that every vessel piloted and conducted into and out of the port of Sunderland shall pay the pilotage dues in that section specified, and

that, subject to the approval of the Board of Trade, the Commissioners (appointed under the Order set out in the schedule to that Act) may raise the pilotage dues payable inwards for vessels above five hundred tons' register, in addition to the dues specified, by any sum not exceeding one halfpenny per ton on the excess of register tonnage over and above that number of tons, and may subject the payment of such additional dues to such regulations as in their judgment will more effectually secure the boarding of such vessels before they arrive within six miles of the port:

And whereas the Sunderland Pilotage Commissioners, being the Pilotage Authority for the port of Sunderland within the meaning of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," have, in exercise of the powers in them vested by that Act and by the aforesaid Order, made and submitted for the consent of Her Majesty certain bye-laws and regulations, which are set forth in the Schedule I. hereunto annexed, with respect to pilots and pilotage in the Sunderland District; and have also, with the approval of the Board of Trade, made and submitted a regulation which is set forth in the Schedule II. hereunto annexed, with respect to the increase of the pilotage dues payable inwards for vessels above five hundred tons' register:

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that the said bye-laws and regulations are reasonable and proper:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Her by the said "Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to approve of, and signify Her consent to, the said bye-laws and regulations of the said Commissioners, with respect to the pilotage of the Sunderland Pilotage District.

SCHEDULE I. referred to in the above Order.

Bye Laws made by the Sunderland Pilotage Commissioners.

1. No one shall be eligible to receive a licence to act as a pilot before he is twenty-one years of age, or after he is thirty years of age. A candidate must be able to read and write distinctly, and have been at sea in cobles or ships five years, one year of such time to have been in sailing ships in the coasting or home trade. He will have to pass an examination before the Commissioners, and if approved will be eligible to receive a licence to conduct ships not exceeding one hundred and fifty tons register into and out of this port.

2. At the expiration of two years (his conduct having been satisfactory during that time) an applicant will, after passing a further examination before the Commissioners, be eligible to receive a licence to pilot all descriptions of vessels.

3. Each pilot boat shall be painted black outside, and equipped in accordance with law, and have the number, with the letter S, on each bow in white letters, and figures not less than ten inches long.

4. No pilots shall join the herring fishery without previously obtaining the consent of the Commissioners.

5. Any pilot wishing to leave the port for any other purpose, must also obtain the written authority of the Commissioners, or their Clerk or Ruler, before doing so.

6. When any ship receives serious damage, touches the ground, or happens any accident, in

charge of a pilot, the pilot must, as early after as possible, report the same to the Pilot Master.

7. Pilots must, at all times, be strictly obedient to the Pilotage Authorities, civil and respectful to those that employ them, and pay due and proper attention to the orders of the Dock and Harbour Masters and officers of Her Majesty's Navy and Customs.

8. Each pilot shall, at the expiration of every month, deliver to the Clerk of the Commissioners a correct account (on one of the forms provided for that purpose) of all vessels piloted by him during the month.

9. When two or more cobsles are making for the same ship, the pilot nearest the ship shall hail her at a reasonable distance and lower his sail, so as to give himself time to board the ship in safety; and the other pilot or pilots in his wake shall not interfere or cause him to run any risk when in the act of boarding such ship.

10. Every pilot, when required to pilot any ship, shall, if under engagement to any other ship, forthwith make known such engagement, and specify the particulars thereof truly and faithfully to the person calling for or requiring such pilot's service, and in case of any concealment, misrepresentation, or falsehood in respect to such alleged previous engagement, the pilot offending shall be subject to a penalty not exceeding five pounds.

11. Every pilot shall from time to time, and at all times, in obedience to the order or summons of the Commissioners, under the hand of the Pilot Master, or Clerk of the Commissioners, duly delivered or offered to such pilot, or left a reasonable time at the usual or last place of residence of such pilot, attend the Commissioners at their Courts, Bye-Boards, or Committees, or their Pilot Master, or their Clerk for the time being, to answer any charges brought against him connected with the Pilotage service, and in default of such attendance, when so required as aforesaid, every pilot shall for the first offence forfeit a sum not exceeding forty shillings, and for the second and every subsequent offence a sum not exceeding five pounds.

12. No pilot shall add to or in any way alter his licence, or make or alter any endorsement thereon, nor be privy to his licence, or any endorsement thereon being altered.

13. Every pilot who shall observe any alteration in the sands or channels, or that any of the buoys or beacons, placed within the jurisdiction of the Commissioners are driven away, broken down, or out of place, shall forthwith deliver or send a correct statement thereof, in writing, to the Clerk of the Commissioners for the time being.

14. When anchors or cables are lost from any vessel, the pilot in charge shall immediately report the occurrence to the Pilot Master, the state of the weather, the direction of the wind, time of tide, quantity of cable riding by, and whether the cable was slipped or parted with, and the quantity lost.

15. The pilot who has brought a ship in shall be entitled to take her out.

16. Every pilot who shall offend against any of the foregoing bye-laws, rules, orders, regulations, and ordinances, shall for every such offence (whether the same shall subject him to any pecuniary penalty or not) be liable to have his licence annulled and forfeited, or suspended, at the discretion of the Commissioners.

17. If any dispute shall arise between any of the pilots in carrying out the above rules and regulations, the same shall be referred to the Pilot Master, who is hereby fully empowered to decide

the same; nevertheless, if any pilot feels himself aggrieved by such decision, he is hereby authorized to appeal to the Commissioners through their Clerk.

18. Besides conforming themselves diligently to the above bye-laws, rules, orders, regulations, and ordinances, the pilots licensed by the Commissioners are required to observe and obey the enactments and provisions relating to pilots and pilotage contained in Part 5 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1854 (a copy of which part of such Act has been delivered to each pilot), and also the provisions of any general Act of Parliament now in force, or hereafter to be passed, relating to pilotage or pilotage dues.

SCHEDULE II. referred to in the above Order.

Inward Pilotage Rate in respect of Ships above 500 Tons' Register.

In addition to the Pilotage dues payable inwards authorized by the first and second paragraphs of the 13th section of the order set out in the schedule to "The Sunderland Pilotage Order Confirmation Act, 1865," the rates for ships above five hundred tons register shall be raised one halfpenny per ton on the excess of register tonnage over and above that number of tons, provided always that the pilot board the ship not less than six miles outside of the district.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the eleventh day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Silas, situate within the limits of the district chapelry of Saint Paul, Prince's-park, some time part of the district parish of Saint John the Baptist, Toxteth-park, in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Chester.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said district chapelry of Saint Paul, Prince's-park, and of the parish of Walton-on-the-Hill, in the county and diocese aforesaid, which lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such district chapelry and parish respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said district chapelry of Saint Paul, Prince's-park, and of the said parish of Walton-on-the-Hill, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Silas, situate within the limits of such district chapelry as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend William, Bishop of the said diocese of Chester, with the consent of John Shaw Leigh, of Luton Hoo, in the county of Bedford, Esquire, the patron of the cure of the said parish of Walton-on-the-Hill, and with the consents of Edward Cropper, of Swaylands, near Tunbridge Wells, in the county of Kent, Esquire, of John Campbell, of Liverpool, in the said county of Lancaster, Esquire, of Mark Wilks Collet, of the city of London, Esquire, of Thomas Darnley Anderson, of Liverpool aforesaid, Esquire, and of Robert Cochrane Crosbie, of Liverpool, Esquire, the patrons of the perpetual curacy of the said district chapelry of Saint Paul, Prince's-park (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said district chapelry of Saint Paul, Prince's-park, and of the said parish of Walton-on-the-Hill, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Silas, situate within the limits of such district chapelry as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Silas, Toxteth-park,' and that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of such consolidated chapelry should belong to and be exercised by the Reverend Hugh McNeile, Canon of Chester, Doctor in Divinity, the said Thomas Darnley Anderson, the said Mark Wilks Collet, Francis Hamilton, of Liverpool aforesaid, Esquire, and the said Robert Cochrane Crosbie, in whom as trustees such right of presentation and appointment as last aforesaid is vested, under and according to the provisions of a certain deed or articles of agreement, bearing date the twenty-seventh day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, made pursuant to the hereinbefore-mentioned Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy, and to the Act of the eleventh and twelfth years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and deposited in the Registry of the said diocese of Chester, in which deed or articles of agreement are contained provisions for appointing, as occasion may from time to time require, trustees in the room of the said Hugh McNeile, Thomas Darnley Anderson, Mark Wilks Collet, Francis Hamilton, and Robert Cochrane Crosbie, or of any or either of them.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Silas, Toxteth-park, being:—

"All that portion of the district chapelry of Saint Paul, Prince's-park, sometime part of the district parish of Saint John the Baptist, Toxteth-

park, in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Chester, which is situate to the north-west of an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides such district chapelry from the said district parish at a point in the middle of High-park-road, opposite to the middle of the south-western end of South-street; and extending thence north-eastward to and along the middle of such street to the boundary at the junction of such street with Tan-yard-lane, which divides the said district chapelry from the parish of Walton-on-the-Hill, in the county and diocese aforesaid.

"And also all that portion of the said parish of Walton-on-the-Hill which is bounded on the south-west by the above-described portion of the district chapelry of Saint Paul, Prince's-park aforesaid, and upon all other sides, that is to say, upon the south-east, upon the north-east, and upon the north-west, by an imaginary line commencing upon the last-described boundary at the junction of South-street with Tan-yard-lane as aforesaid; and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the said street to its junction with Devonshire-road; and extending thence northward along the middle of the said road to its junction with Prince's-road at the Prince's-park entrance; and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named road, for a distance of three hundred and sixty yards or thereabouts, to a point opposite to the middle of the north-eastern end of North Hill-street; and extending thence south-westward and in a straight line (following the line of the proposed continuation of such street), for a distance of seventy yards or thereabouts, to the boundary at the junction of the said North Hill-street with Tan-yard-lane aforesaid which divides the said parish of Walton-on-the-Hill from the district chapelry of Saint Paul, Prince's-park, as aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Chester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty, and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the sixth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"Whereas it is by the said Act enacted, that it shall be lawful for the dean of any cathedral church, under the authority therein referred to, that is to say; a scheme prepared by us, and ratified by an Order of your Majesty in Council, to purchase any house being contiguous or near to the cathedral church, and to apply the site of such house, or any part thereof, by and with the authority aforesaid, to the improvement of the cathedral or the precincts thereof.

"And whereas the house and premises described in the schedule to this scheme are situate near to the cathedral church of York, and are contiguous to the deanery house of the said church.

"Whereas, under and by virtue of the provisions of a certain lease of the rectory and parsonage of Cartmel aforesaid, bearing date on or about the fourth day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and twelve, which was granted by the Right Reverend Bowyer Edward, then Bishop of Chester, for a term of three lives and the longest liver of them, of which lives one now survives, the Most Noble William, Duke of Devonshire, is, on any vacancy in the incumbency of any or either of the said churches of Cartmel, Flookburgh, Field Broughton, Lindale, Cartmel Fell, and Staveley, which may occur during the subsistence of the said lease, entitled to present a spiritual person or persons thereto.

"And whereas the churches aforesaid are all of them ill endowed,

"All that part of the parish of Willesden, in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London, which is comprised within and is bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides such parish from the new parish of Saint Mary, Kilburn, in the same county and diocese, at a point in the middle of the Edgware-road, opposite to the middle of the eastern end of Mapes-lane; and extending thence westward to and along the middle of the said lane as far as a point opposite to the middle of the northern end of the

- (9.) At *Brantevik*, a fishing village, $\frac{1}{2}$ mile south of Cimbritshamn, with a rocket apparatus;
- (10.) At the town of *Calmar*, with lifeboat;
- (11.) At *Gräsgård*, a village on the south-east coast of Öland, with lifeboat;
- (12.) At *Fahludden*, on the south-east coast of Gotthland, with lifeboat and rocket apparatus; and
- (13.) At *Ekevik*, on the north coast of Gotthland's Färö, with lifeboat.

In the event of vessels stranding near any of the said places, the shipwrecked ought to observe, and strictly to comply with, the notices and directions hereinafter contained.

A life-boat will be sent off to assist the shipwrecked, if the stranding takes place near a station provided with such boat, and if circumstances admit of making use thereof. Otherwise the rocket apparatus will be employed; in which case the following rules are to be observed:—

1. A rocket with a thin line attached having been fired across the stranded vessel, the people on board shall get hold of the line. Whereupon, and after having secured the line, the service of the saving apparatus on shore shall be informed thereof by signals, as follows:—if in the daytime, one of the crew, separated from the rest, waves his hat or his hand, or a flag or a handkerchief; and if at night, a shot or a rocket is fired, or a light is displayed over the side of the ship and directly again concealed.

2. When it is observed on board that one of the men on shore, separated from the rest, waves a Red flag, or when, if at night, a Red light is shown and then concealed, the crew is to haul

upon the rocket line until they get on board an accompanying tailed block with an endless fall rove through it.

3. The tail-block is to be made fast to a mast about 15 feet above the deck, or, if the masts are gone, to the highest secure part of the vessel. When the tail-block is made fast, the signal required by the Article 1 above is to be repeated.

4. As soon as the signal is seen on shore, a hawser will be bent to the whip-line and hauled off to the ship.

5. The hawser last above mentioned ought to be made fast at once at the same part of the ship as the tailed block is made fast to, only about 14 foot higher, taking care that there are no turns of the whip line round the hawser. Thereupon the signal mentioned above is again to be repeated.

6. The men on shore will then heave the hawser taut, and by means of the whip line will haul off to the ship a sling or cot called a saving-chair, and running on the hawser by means of parrels, into which chair the person to be hauled ashore is to get, and then the signal directed above shall be repeated; whereupon the people on shore will haul the person in the chair to the shore, and when he has landed will haul the empty chair back to the ship. The said operation will then be repeated in respect of every body on board, until all shipwrecked persons are brought ashore.

7. If, as it may sometimes happen, the hawser cannot be hauled taut, the person to be saved will be hauled through the surf immediately, instead of along the hawser; in which case the saving-chair is to be considered as a life buoy.

Finally, it should be borne in mind that success in the saving operations in a great measure depends upon the coolness of the shipwrecked, and their strict attention to the rules here laid down, especially to those respecting the signals; and on these occasions all women, children, other passengers, and helpless persons, should be landed before the crew of the ship.
