WHEREAS by an Order bearing date the thirty-first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, duly issued under the authority of the Act passed in the session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, continued by divers subsequent Acts, and lastly by an Act of the last session of Parliament, the Lords of Her Majesty's Council did, among other things, order that from and after the third day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, it should not be lawful for any person to remove cattle or other animals from any port or place in England and Wales to any port or place in Scotland :

And whereas provisions have been subsequently made by the Lords of the said Council authorizing the admission under certain restrictions of sheep into Scotland by divers Orders dated respectively the tenth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, which related to the movement of rams from the county of Northumberland into Scotland, the second day of October, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, which extended the provisions of such last-named Order to sheep and lambs, the thirtieth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, which related to the movement of cattle and other animals from the counties of Northumberland and Cumberland into Scotland, and the fourth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, which related to the movement of cattle and other animals from the county of Westmorland into Scotland :

And whereas it is expedient that the restrictions on the movement of sheep into Scotland from England and Wales should be rescinded :

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council do hereby order as follows :—

1. So much of the said Order of the thirty-first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and

sixty-six, as prevents the movement of sheep from any port or place in England or Wales into any port or place in Scotland is hereby rescinded.

2. This Order shall be construed in like manner as the Order issued by the Lords of the said Council under the Act aforesaid, bearing date the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six.

3. The word "sheep," for the purpose of this Order, shall also include rams and lambs.

And whereas by an Order bearing date the sixteenth day of February last, the Lords of the said Council did rescind the said Order of the eighth of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, in regard to the said county of Essex, and it is expedient that the said Order of

the eighteenth of September last also should be rescinded in reference to the said county :

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council do hereby order, that from and after this seventh day of August, the said Order of the eighteenth of September last shall be rescinded, and be no longer of force or validity in respect of sheep and lambs in the county of Essex, and the towns and boroughs therein contained, except in respect of any matter or thing commenced under it and not completed, or of any offence committed in contravention thereof and not yet punished.

Naples, July 31, 1867.

I HAVE the honour to report to your Lordship, that in consequence of the appearance of cholera in the province of Cosenza, Calabria Citeriore, a quarantine of fifteen days has been imposed on vessels arriving from all the ports and places situated on the eastern coast of that province between Roseto and Cariati.

A quarantine of seven days has also been imposed on vessels from Leghorn which sailed on or after the 30th instant.

The Vice-Consul at Gioja Tauro, in Calabria Ulteriore I^a, reports the appearance of cholera in the vicinity of Bagnara.

Agreement made and entered into this eighteenth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, between the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England of the one part, and the Reverend William Cockin, of Bishop Wearmouth, in the county of Durham, Clerk, Rector of the rectory of Bishop Wearmouth aforesaid (and hereinafter called "the said Rector"), of the other part.

WHEREAS by "The Bishop Wearmouth Rectory Act, 1867," after reciting (inter alia) a scheme of the Commissioners, and an Order of Her Majesty in Council confirming the same, dated the thirtieth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and forty-nine, and duly published in the London Gazette on the eleventh day of August, in the same year, by virtue of which scheme and order the rents, profits, and proceeds of certain wayleaves, staiths, and coal, belonging to the rectory of Bishop Wearmouth, and the benefit of any improvements which might be made during the incumbency of the Reverend John Patrick Eden, the then rector, in the annual income of a portion of the rectorial glebe known as the Rector's Park, were transferred to and vested in the Commissioners for the purposes and in manner therein mentioned; and reciting that the said William Cockin was the present rector of the said rectory. It was enacted (section 6), that upon the

first avoidance of the rectory of Bishop Wearmouth, the glebe lands, tithes, tithe rent-charges, mines, minerals, messuages, tenements, and hereditaments of or belonging to the rectory (including the Rector's Park, and the manor known as the Bishop Wearmouth Rectory Manor, and including the said rents, profits, and proceeds of wayleaves, staiths, and coal, so far as such rents and hereditaments, and every part thereof, and interest therein, were not already vested in the said Commissioners, but excepting the parsonage house and the grounds then occupied therewith, which said parsonage house and grounds were particularly described in the schedule thereto and excepting the parish church of Bishop Wearmouth with its appurtenances) together with all monies and securities for money, and all stock in the Government funds, or elsewhere, standing in the name of the Accountant-General, or in any other name or names, for or to the credit or for the benefit of or in trust for the rector of Bishop Wearmouth and his successors, whether for the purpose of being laid out in land or otherwise, should vest in the Ecclesiastical Commissioners, their successors and assigns for the purposes, and subject to the provisions in the said Act mentioned. And it was enacted (Section 7) that in case the then present rector of Bishop Wearmouth, at any time before his avoidance of the said rectory should signify his willingness to accept a fixed annual sum of two thousand pounds in lieu of his income from the glebe lands and premises aforesaid, it should be lawful for the Ecclesiastical Commissioners to agree with the said rector for the payment to him of such fixed annual sum, and thereupon an instrument (in writing) containing the terms of the said agreement, and under the hand of the said rector, and the common seal of the said Commissioners should be registered in the Registry of the diocese and published in the London Gazette, and from and after the date of such publication the said agreement should be binding, and the glebe lands and premises aforesaid should, without any further conveyance, be vested in the said Commissioners for the purposes, and subject as therein mentioned; and it was further enacted (Section 18) that the annual sums, payable under the provisions of that Act to the rector of Bishop Wearmouth and the incumbents or ministers of the district churches or chapels therein mentioned, should respectively be payable in moieties on the first day of May and the first day of November in every year; and on every vacancy, the then current half-yearly payment should be paid to the successor in full, who should be bound to account to the predecessor or his representatives for a proportionate part corresponding to the portion of the half year before the vacancy took place. And whereas the said rector has signified to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners his willingness to accept a fixed annual sum of two thousand pounds in lieu of his income from the glebe lands and premises mentioned or referred to in the said recited Act. Now these presents witness, that in pursuance of the power conferred on them by the seventh section of the same Act, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners do hereby agree with the said rector that they, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, will pay to him during his incumbency in the said rectory the fixed annual sum of two thousand pounds, by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November in each year, the said annual sum to be payable as from the date of the publication of this agreement in the London Gazette, and a proportionate part thereof to be paid for the period which shall elapse between such date of publica-

tion, and the day of payment next ensuing thereafter; and the said rector doth hereby, on his part, agree with the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England to accept the said annual sum of two thousand pounds payable as aforesaid, to the intent that the said glebe lands and premises (except as aforesaid) may, as from the date of the publication of this agreement in the London Gazette, be absolutely vested in the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England by virtue of, and in accordance with, the provision in this behalf contained in the eighth section of the said Act. It being expressly agreed by the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, that the said Rector shall be entitled to a proportion of all the revenues arising from the said rectory to the day of the publication of this agreement in the London Gazette.

Advertisement of Alterations in proving Breech loading Military Small Arms in respect to which the existing Rules and Regulations of Proof are insufficient.

New Rule and Regulation for the proof of breech-loading barrels for military small arms, for which the proof as stated in Schedule B to "The Gun Barrel Proof Act, 1855," annexed, is deemed insufficient, made under the authority of the Act by the two Companies in the Act called "The Gunmakers' Company" and "The Birmingham Company," with the approval of the Right Honourable Sir John Somerset Pakington, Bart., Her Majesty's Secretary of State for War, in the month of July, 1867.

WHEREAS under and according to the existing Rules and Regulations for the proof under the Act of barrels for small arms barrels for breech-loading arms are liable to provisional proof and also to definitive proof and after being duly proved are to bear proof marks denoting provisional proof and definitive proof respectively, according to the Rules and Regulations in Schedule B to the Act annexed.

And whereas since the passing of the Act, a practice has arisen of converting barrels originally made and intended for muzzle-loading arms (commonly called and known in the gun trade as muzzle-loaders) into barrels for breech-loading arms (commonly called and known in the gun trade as breech loaders).

And whereas it commonly happens in the process of so converting barrels, that the provisional proof mark borne by the barrels before their conversion, disappears by reason of that portion of the barrel whereon the provisional proof mark is impressed, being cut off, and under the Act barrels so converted are liable after conversion to be proved, provisionally as well as definitively, whether they have or have not been so proved theretofore, but it is inexpedient that barrels so converted, and which before the conversion have been submitted to and have stood the test of provisional proof, and thereupon received provisional proof marks, should be again submitted to that proof.

And whereas danger may arise to persons using breech-loading military arms upon the faith of the guarantee afforded by the proof mark thereon, without reference to the fitness of the cartridge with which such arms are used, and that in consequence accidents may happen whereby the value of the proof mark may be improperly and unfairly deteriorated, unless public notice is given of the extent to which the proof mark upon breech-loading military arms can be safely relied on as a guarantee for the safe user of such arms.

And whereas breech-loading military barrels, of the 1853 pattern, made for the use of Her Majesty's Forces, are now in use, and are proved at the Government Factory at Enfield, according to certain scales and rules of proof, and a particular description of cartridge which are deemed by the Director of Small Arms sufficient as a test or security for the safe user thereof, and it is deemed expedient to assimilate the proof of breech-loading military barrels by the two companies to the same description of cartridge and the same weight of gunpowder as are now used, or may hereafter be used at the Government Factory, at Enfield, for the proof of similar barrels.

And whereas by section 95 of the Act power is given to the two Companies from time to time,

should they deem the proof as stated in Schedule B to the Act annexed insufficient, with the approval or Her Majesty's Secretary of State for War, to make any new Rules and Regulations in that behalf.

Now, therefore, the two Companies, with the approval of the Right Honourable Sir John Somerset Pakington, Baronet, Her Majesty's Secretary of State for War, such approval being expressly subject to the condition imposed by the proviso lastly hereinafter contained, do make the following new Rule and Regulation; that is to say:—

Whenever any military barrel duly marked under the Act with the provisional proof mark of either of the two Companies, and not being a breech-loader is brought to the Proof House of the Company by which the barrel was provisionally proved, accompanied by a statement in writing made or purporting to be made by or on behalf of the owner or owners of the barrel, that the barrel is intended to be converted into a breech-loader, the Proof Master of either Company or the duly appointed officers in that behalf of the "Gunmakers' Company" or the Assistant Proof Masters of the "Birmingham Company" as the case requires may efface all existing proof marks from the barrel, and where it is not necessary that the barrel be again submitted to provisional proof may and shall impress a new provisional proof mark at a proper and convenient distance higher up on the barrel without subjecting the barrel to any new or further provisional proof.

After conversion when the breech-loading action

is attached and complete the barrel still bearing such new provisional proof mark shall be subject to definitive proof.

Provided always that neither of the two Companies shall definitively prove or mark as proved any barrel unless that Company proved the barrel provisionally.

It shall be sufficient for the two Companies from time to time to prove all breech-loading military barrels in the same manner as breech-loading military barrels made for the use of Her Majesty's forces, and with the same weight of gunpowder and the same description of cartridge as are now used, or from time to time shall hereafter be used in the proof of similar barrels at the Government Factory at Enfield.

Provided also, that in the public notice of this new rule and regulation to be given by the two Companies, pursuant to section 95 of the Act, it shall be stated that the proof marks upon the barrels of breech-loading military small arms are intended to be and in fact are a guarantee for the safe user of such arms so long only as the same description of cartridge is used as is now in use, or may hereafter be used at the Government Factory at Enfield for the proof of breech-loading military small arms.
