By the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

PRESENT,

WHEREAS by an Order bearing date the second day of October last, reciting certain provisions of the statute of the session held in the eleventh and twelfth years of Her Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, and that a contagious or infectious disorder, known or described as the Sheep Pox, or Variola Ovina, then prevailed among the sheep in a certain part of the United Kingdom, and that it was expedient to take measures for preventing such disorder from spreading; the Lords of the Council did make certain Orders and Regulations respecting sheep and lambs in the following places in the county of Chester: the farms in the occupation respectively of Cyrus Slater, James Brett, Thomas Hollinshead, and Samuel Boffey, in the parish of Brereton-cum-Smethwick; the farm in the occupation of Jonathan Yarwood, in the township of Sproston; the farms in the occupation respectively of Joseph Robinson and James Parrott, in the township of Holmes Chapel; the farm called High Smallwood, in the occupation of John Walker; and the farm called Pump House Farm, in the occupation of John Dale, in the township of Odd Rode; and the whole of the township of Over Peover; and it was ordered that that Order should continue in force until revoked:

And whereas by another Order, bearing date the first day of December last, the said Lords of the Council did, amongst other things, revoke so much of the said recited Order as related to the farm called High Smallwood, in the occupation of John Walker; and the farm called Pump House Farm, in the occupation of John Dale, in the township of Odd Rode; and the whole of the township of Over Peover:

And whereas it is no longer necessary that any part of the said Order of the second day of October last should continue in force:

Now, therefore, the Lords of the Council do hereby from and after the fourteenth day of

August instant, revoke so much of the said recited Order of the second day of October last, as was not revoked by the Order of Council of the first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six.

Provided, that such revocation shall not apply to or otherwise affect any proceeding or any Act commenced under the authority of the said recited Order of the second day of October last, and not yet completed, but the same may be continued to completion as fully as if this Order were not issued.

MY LORD, Athens, July 30, 1867.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT, 1858.

NOTICE OF ADOPTION OF ACT BY PART OF THE PARISH OF HORNSEY, IN THE COUNTY OF MIDDLESEX.

WHEREAS the Local Government Act, 1858, was, on the 28th day of June, 1867, duly adopted by all that part of the parish of Hornsey, in the county of Middlesex, not included within the district of the South Hornsey Local Board, within which district the Local Government Act, 1858, is already in force; and whereas notice of such adoption was duly given, in writing, to me, as one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, as required by such Act; and it has now been duly certified to me that a copy of such notice has been duly advertised and affixed to the principal doors of each church and chapel in such part of the said parish to which notices are usually affixed, and no appeal has been made against such adoption.

Now, therefore, I, as one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, do hereby give notice, that the Local Government Act, 1858, has been duly adopted within the aforesaid part of the said parish of Hornsey, in the county of Middlesex, and that, in accordance with the provisions thereof, the said Act will, at the expiration of two months from the date of the passing of the aforesaid resolution, have the force of law within all that part of such parish of Hornsey not included within the district of the South Hornsey Local Board aforesaid.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 41.)—MEDITERRANEAN—ADRIATIC.

Fixed Light at Cape Otranto.

THE Italian Government has given notice, that on and after the 15th day of July, 1867, a light would be exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected at Cape Otranto, Coast of Italy.

The light is a *fixed* white light, at an elevation of 196 feet above the mean level of the sea, and

in clear weather should be seen at a distance of 13 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses, of the fourth order.

The tower is said to stand in lat. $40^{\circ} 6' 23''$ N., long. $18^{\circ} 30' 37''$ East of Greenwich.

GULF OF TARANTO.

Fixed Light on San Paolo Islet.

Also, that on and after the 15th day of July, 1867, a new light would be established on San Paolo Islet, at the entrance to Taranto Harbour, instead of the present temporary light.

The light is a *fixed* white light, at an elevation of 66 feet above the mean level of the sea, and in clear weather should be seen at a distance of 10 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses, of the fifth order.

The tower is in lat. $40^{\circ} 26' 16''$ N., long. $17^{\circ} 10' 9''$ East of Greenwich.
