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The Speech of the Lords Commissioners to both Houses of Parliament, on Wednesday, August 21, 1867.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

AM happy to be enabled to release you from the labours of a long and more than usually eventful session, and to offer you my acknowledgments for the successful diligence with which you have applied yourselves to your parliamentary duties.

My relations with foreign countries continue on a friendly footing.

At the commencement of the present year great fears were entertained that the differences which had arisen between France and Prussia might have led to a war of which it was impossible to foresee the ultimate result. Happily the advice tendered by my Government, and by those of the other neutral States, aided by the moderation of the two Powers chiefly interested, sufficed to avert the threatened calamity; and I trust that no ground at present exists for apprehending any disturbance of the general peace.

The communications which I have made to the reigning monarch of Abyssinia, with a view to obtain the release of the British subjects whom he detains in his dominions, have, I regret to say, thus far proved ineffectual. I have, therefore, found it necessary to address to him a peremptory demand for their immediate liberation, and to take measures for supporting that demand, should it ultimately be found necessary to resort to force.

The treasonable conspiracy in Ireland, to which I have before called your attention, broke out in the early part of the present year in a futile attempt at insurrection. That it was suppressed, almost without bloodshed, is due not more to the disciplined valour of my troops, and to the admirable conduct of the police, than to the general loyalty of the population and the absence of any token of sympathy with the insurgents on the part of any considerable portion of my subjects. I rejoice that the supremacy of the law was vindicated without imposing on me the painful necessity of sacrificing a single life.

The bill for the abolition of certain local exemptions from taxation enabled me to avail myself of a liberal concession made, in anticipation, by the Emperor of the French, whereby several taxes were removed which pressed heavily upon British shipping.

I have concluded a postal convention with the United States of America, whereby the rate of postage between the two countries will be diminished by one-half, and further arrangements are in progress for increasing the intercourse between this country and the continent of North America.

The Act for the union of the British North American provinces is the final accomplishment of a scheme long contemplated, whereby those colonies, now combined in one dominion, may be expected not only to gain additional strength for the purposes of defence against external aggression, but may be united among themselves by fresh ties of mutual interest, and attached to the mother country by the only bonds which can effectually secure such important dependencies—those of loyalty to the Crown and attachment to British connection.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I thank you for the liberal supplies which you have voted for the public service.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I have had great satisfaction in giving my assent to a Bill for amending the representation of the people in Porliament. I earnestly trust that the extensive and liberal measure which you have passed may effect a durable settlement of a question which has long engaged public attention; and that the large number of my subjects who will be for the first time admitted to the exercise of the elective franchise may, in the discharge of the duties thereby devolved upon them, prove themselves worthy of the confidence which Parliament has reposed in them.

It is gratifying to me to find that the lengthened consideration which you have necessarily given to this important question has not prevented your entering on many subjects to which your attention was directed at the commencement of the Session, and particularly to such as have immediate reference to the well-being of the industrial classes.

I have had especial pleasure in giving my assent to Bills for extending to various trades, with such modifications as have been found necessary, the provisions of the Factory Acts, the success of which has proved the possibility of combining effectual protection to the labour of women and children with a due consideration for the interests of the trades immediately concerned.

I confidently anticipate from the operation of the present Acts the same improvement in the physical, social, and moral condition of the working classes, which has been found to accompany the application of the Acts to those trades to which they have been hitherto confined.

The restraints alleged to be imposed on workmen and their employers by trade unions and other associations appeared to me to call for inquiry; and the revelations derived from the examinations before the Commission, to which you gave your legislative sanction, have disclosed a state of things which will demand your most earnest attention.

The administration of the poor laws, which generally has conferred great benefit on the community, and especially on the poor themselves, requires constant supervision; and I have readily assented to a Bill which, applied to the metropolis alone, will tend to equalise the pressure of taxation, and improve the treatment of the sick poor, whose condition will be greatly benefited by your well-considered legislation.

The Bill for the regulation of the merchant shipping contains important provisions calculated to add to the health and comfort of those engaged

in the mercantile marine.

These and other valuable amendments of the law have been the result of your labours during the present session; and in returning to your homes you will carry with you the gratifying consciousness that your time and pains have not been misapplied, and that they have resulted in a series of measures which I hope, and earnestly pray, may contribute to the welfare of the country, and the contentment and happiness of my people.

that is to say: "We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirtyseven, of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the parish of Saint Andrew, Holhorn, in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London, out of the parish of Saint George the Martyr, in the same county and diocese, and out of the parish of Saint George, Bloomsbury, also in the same county and diocese.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said parish of Saint Andrew, Holborn, of the said parish of Saint George the Martyr, and of the said parish of Saint George, Bloomsbury, which are hereinafter mentioned and described (such portions not at present containing within their limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship) should be constituted a separate district in the manner hereinafter set

forth.

"And whereas certain hereditaments and premises situate within the said parish of Saint Andrew, Holborn, have become vested in us under the provisions of, and for the purposes of, the herein-mentioned Acts, and we have in respect of such hereditaments and premises agreed to make and pay out of the common fund created by the firstly herein-mentioned Act, to the minister of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, when he shall have been duly licensed in accordance with the provisions of the secondly herein-mentioned Act, and to his successors, a grant of two hundred pounds per annum, and also a further grant of one hundred pounds per annum so soon as a church shall have been erected within and for such district, and shall have been approved by us, and shall have been consecrated as the church of such district, and such grants as aforesaid will be made by an instrument or instruments to be executed by us under our Common Seal, in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and eleven.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Archibald Campbell, Bishop of the said diocese of London (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose, that all those portions of the said parish of Saint Andrew, Holborn, of the said parish of Saint George the Martyr, and of the said parish of Saint George, Bloomsbury, which are respectively mentioned and described in the schedule hereunder written, and which are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named The District of Saint John the Evangelist,

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from

recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

"All those portions of the parish of Saint Andrew, Holborn, in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London, of the parish of Saint George the Martyr, in the same county and diocese, and of the parish of Saint George, Bloomsbury, also in the same county and diocese, which are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Saint Andrew, Holborn, from the parish of Saint Giles in the Fields, in the county and diocese aforesaid, at a point in the middle of High Holborn near to the northern end of the passage leading to Lincoln's Inn Fields called 'The Great Turnstile,' and extending thence eastward along the middle of High Holborn aforesaid as far as a point opposite to the middle of the south-eastern end of Brownlow-street, and extending thence north-westward to and along the middle of the last-named street to the boundary at the junction of such street with Warwick-place, which divides the said parish of Saint Andrew, Holborn, from the new parish of the Holy Trinity, Gray's-inn-road, in the county and diocese aforesaid, and extending thence south-westward along the said boundary to its junction with the boundary in the middle of Red-Lion-street, which divides the said new parish of the Holy Trinity, Gray's-innroad, from the parish of Saint George the Martyr, aforesaid, and extending thence north-westward along the last-mentioned boundary as far as the junction of Red Lion-street aforesaid with Theobald's-road, and extending thence south-west-ward along the middle of the last-named road to the boundary at the junction of such road with Kingsgate-street, which divides the last-named parish from the parish of Saint George, Bloomsbury aforesaid, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Kingsgate-street aforesaid (following thereby in part the lastdescribed boundary) to the boundary at the junction of such street with High Holborn aforesaid, which divides the said parish of Saint George, Bloomsbury, from the parish of Saint Giles in the Fields aforesaid, and extending thence eastward along the last described boundary, following thereby the middle of High Holborn, to the junction of such boundary with the boundary dividing the said parish of Saint Andrew, Holborn, from the parish of Saint Giles in the Fields aforesaid, and continuing thence still eastward along the last-described boundary, still following the middle of High Holborn, as far as the firstdescribed point near- 'The Great Turnstile' aforesaid, where the said imaginary line commenced.'

And whereas a draft of the said scheme has, in accordance with the provisions of the said secondly-mentioned Act, been transmitted to the Patrons and to the Incumbents of the Rectories of the three parishes, out of which it is intended that the district therein recommended to be constituted shall be taken, and the said Patrons and Incumbents have respectively signified their assent to such scheme.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

'The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the eighth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for assigning certain lands and hereditaments as the permanent endowment of the see of Gloucester and Bristol.

"Whereas the Right Reverend Charles John, Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol, succeeded to the said see on an avoidance which happened after the passing of the hereinbefore mentioned Act, and all the lands, hereditaments, and emoluments belonging to the said see of Gloucester and Bristol (except all rights of presentation, and the residence of the bishop) are vested absolutely in us for the purposes, and subject to the provisions applicable to other hereditaments vested in us.

"And whereas the lands and hereditaments particularly described in the schedule hereto annexed, which are now vested in us, are, in the judgment of our Estates Committee, convenient to be held as the endowment for the said see, and are approved by the said bishop as suitable for that purpose, and will secure to the holder of the said see, as nearly as may be, after deducting costs of management, a net annual income of five thousand pounds, and no more, being the amount named for the bishop of the said see, by the Order of your Majesty in Council of the twenty-fifth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one, which Order is now in force.

"Now, therefore, with the consent and approbation of the said Charles John, Lord Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol, testified by his having signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal, we humbly recommend and propose, that upon the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly published Order, the lands and hereditaments particularly described in the schedule hereto annexed, with their appurtenances, and all our right, title, and interest therein, save only as is hereinafter

saved and excepted, together with the benefit of the perpetual land tax, if any, charged upon the same premises, which has been redeemed, shall be assigned as the endowment of the said bishoprick of Gloucester and Bristol, and shall, subject always and nevertheless to the liabilities and charges to which the said lands and hereditaments are now specifically liable, become and be absolutely vested in the said bishop, in as full and ample a manner as if the same had formed part of the ancient possessions of the said see; save and except, and always reserved unto us, our successors, and our and their lessees, tenants, and assigns, all and singular the mines, quarries, and beds of coal, stone, clay, sand, minerals, and metalliferous substances of all descriptions, therein or thereunder; with full and exclusive authority to sink, win, work, get up, and carry away the same, in, under, out of, and from the said lands and hereditaments, or any other lands and hereditaments, according to the course and practice at present or hereafter to be used or adopted in the counties wherein the said lands and hereditaments are situate, or according to the most approved mode which may from time to time be used or invented, and to enter upon, take, use, and occupy from time to time, and for such time and in such manner as we, our successors, and our and their lessees, tenants, and assigns shall think fit, so much of the said lands and hereditaments as we or they shall deem necessary, proper, or convenient for all or any of the aforesaid purposes, making full compensation for any injury thereby occasioned; and save and except, and always reserved, full and exclusive authority for us, our successors, and our and their lessees, tenants, and assigns, or persons acting under our or their authority, and whether in reference or respect to-lands held by or under us, or any other property, to make, grant, and use any way or ways upon, across, under, or through the said lands and hereditaments, for the purposes aforesaid; provided always, and we hereby further recommend and propose, that nothing in the foregoing exception and reservation shall operate in any manner to prevent the said Charles John, Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol, and his successors, from taking and using from, off, or under the said lands and hereditaments, all such stone, clay, sand, and gravel, as may be required hereafter for repairing and amending the buildings, fences, roads, or ways, now being in, upon, or about the said lands and hereditaments, or any part thereof, and also for erecting, making, and repairing any buildings, fences, roads, or ways, which may require hereafter to be erected or made in, upon, or about the said lands and hereditaments.

"And we further recommend and propose that the said bishop shall become entitled to the rents, profits, and proceeds of the lands and hereditaments, hereby proposed to be assigned as the endowment of the said see as from the twenty-fifth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, and that the money payment payable by us under the provisions of the Order of your Majesty in Council of the twenty-eighth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, shall as from the said twenty-fifth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, cease and determine.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in conformity with the provisions of the said hereinbefore mentioned Act, or of any other Act of Parliament.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Henry, Bishop of the said diocese of Worcester (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient, firstly, that all that part of the said parish of Kidderminster, which is described in the first schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed and numbered 1, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint George, and that the same should be named ' The District Chapelry of Saint George, Kidderminster;' and secondly, that all that other part of the same parish of Kidderminster, which is described in the second schedule hereunder written, all which lastly mentioned part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth upon the other map or plan hereunto annexed and numbered 2, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint John the Baptist, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint John the Baptist, Kidderminster.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight, and of another Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, sections two, three, and twenty-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain property formerly belonging to the bishoprick of Rochester, and now vested in us.

"Whereas on the vacancy of the said bishoprick which occurred on or about the sixth day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, by the decease of the Right Reverend Joseph Cotton, the late Bishop of Rochester, all the lands, tithes, tenements, hereditaments, and endowments formerly belonging to the said bishoprick (except rights of patronage and the episcopal house of residence, situate at Danbury, in the county of Essex) became absolutely vested in us for the purposes and subject to the provisions applicable to other hereditaments vested in us.

"And whereas the lands, tithes, tenements, hereditaments, and endowments aforesaid consist to a considerable extent of reversions expectant upon grants and leases for lives and years, and produce during the subsistence of such grants and leases only small annual revenues, and on that account, and in some instances on account of the character or situation of the property are unsuitable or inconvenient to be assigned as an endowment for the said bishoprick, or to be held or applied for the other purposes for which estates vested in us are applicable under the Acts by which our proceedings are governed.

"And whereas by the last-mentioned Act power is given to lessees holding under us in the event of our declining to enter into a treaty for the sale of our reversions, or for the purchase of the leasehold interests, to require us to purchase such leasehold interests at a valuation.

"And whereas it is expedient that such of the aforesaid lands, tithes, tenements, hereditaments, and endowments lately belonging to the See of Rochester (either with or without other property vested in us, as the case may require) as in the judgment of our Estates Committee, and subject to the approbation of the Bishop for the time being, shall be deemed convenient to be held as an endowment for the said See, and as will secure a net annual income of five thousand pounds, being the income named for the Bishop of Rochester, and his successors, by the Order made by your Majesty in Council, on the twenty-fifth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one, which Order was duly published in the London Gazette, on the ninetcenth day of September following, should be assigned as the endowment of the said See, and that for that purpose, as well as with a view to the more advantageous appropriation of the remainder of the said lands, tithes, tenements, hereditaments, and endowments, or of the proceeds thereof, for the ultimate improvement of our common fund, we should be empowered to dispose of our interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, and in such manner as shall appear to us advisable.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorising the sale and disposal of certain property formerly belonging to the precentorship of the cathedral church of Lincoln, and now vested in us.

"Whereas by the decease of the Reverend Richard Pretyman, precentor of the said cathedral church, which occurred on or about the twenty-fifth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, all the lands, tenements, hereditaments, and endowments theretofore belonging to the said precentorship, or to the Prebend of Kilsby, in the said cathedral church,

which prebend was annexed to the said precentorship (except any rights of patronage), became, by virtue of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, absolutely vested in us for the purposes, and subject to the provisions, applicable to other hereditaments vested in us.

"And whereas the lands, tenements, hereditaments, and endowments aforesaid consist, to a considerable extent, of reversions expectant upon leases for lives and years, and the same produce to us during the subsistence of such leases only small annual revenues, and partly on that account, and in some instances on account of the character or situation of the property, are unsuitable or inconvenient to be held or applied for the purposes for which estates vested in us are applicable under the Acts by which our proceedings are governed.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter 96, for the regulation of the duties of postage certain scales of weight and rates of postage were fixed and made chargeable and payable upon, for, or in respect of letters, newspapers, Parliamentary proceedings, and printed papers transmitted and forwarded by the post, and various regulations were made for facilitating the transmission of such letters and papers by the post, and by the same Act powers were given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury from time to time and at any time thereafter by Warrant under their hands to alter and fix any of the rates of postage therein mentioned.

And whereas further powers are given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury by another Act of Parliament passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter 85, for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes re-

lating to the Post Office.

And whereas it is expedient to authorize the transmission of certain packets by the post between the United Kingdom and the several countries and places hereinafter mentioned, and for that purpose to fix certain rates of postage, and make certain regulations in the manner hereinafter set forth.

Now, we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers reserved to

us in and by the said hereinbefore recited Acts of Parliament, or one of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners (by the authority of the Statute in that case made and provided) order, direct, and declare as follows:—

1. All packets consisting of printed papers (other than newspapers) or consisting of patterns or samples of merchandize of no intrinsic value respectively, posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to any place in Borneo, Japan, or the Philippine Islands, or posted in any place in Borneo, Japan, or the Philippine Islands, addressed to the United Kingdom, may be transmitted by the post between the United Kingdom and any place in Borneo, Japan, or the Philippine Islands, direct or viā Singapore or Hong Kong, and either viā Southampton or Marseilles (the sea conveyance being by British or French packet boat) subject to the several rates of British postage hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

On every such packet, if not exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged and taken an uniform British rate of postage of fourpence, if such packet shall be transmitted viâ Southampton; and if such packet shall be transmitted viâ Marseilles, an uniform British rate of postage of sixpence.

And on every such packet, if exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged and taken for such transmission thereof respectively as aforesaid, the several further and additional rates of postage hereinafter mentioned.

2. All packets consisting of printed papers (other than newspapers) or consisting of patterns or samples of merchandize of no intrinsic value respectively, posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to any place in Réunion or Madagascar or posted in any place in either of such countries addressed to the United Kingdom, may be transmitted by the post between the United Kingdom and any place in Réunion or Madagascar, respectively, direct or by way of Mauritius, and either viâ Southampton or Marseilles (the sea conveyance being by British packet boat) subject to the several rates of British postage hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:—

On every such packet, if not exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged and taken an uniform British rate of postage of fourpence, if such packet shall be transmitted vid Southampton; and if such packet shall be transmitted vid Marseilles, an uniform British rate of postage of sixpence.

And on every such packet, if exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged and taken for such transmission thereof respectively as aforesaid, the several further and additional rates of postage hereinafter mentioned.

3. All packets consisting of printed papers (other than newspapers) or consisting of patterns or samples of merchandize of no intrinsic value, respectively posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to any place in New Caledonia, may be transmitted by the post from the United Kingdom to any place in New Caledonia, direct or by way of Australia, and either viâ Southampton or Marseilles (the sea conveyance being by British packet boat) subject to the several rates of British postage hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:—

On every such packet, if not exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged and taken an uniform British rate of postage of

fourpence, if such packet shall be transmitted · · · viâ Southampton; and if such packet shall be transmitted via Marseilles, an uniform British rate of postage of sixpence.

And on every such packet, if exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged and taken for such transmission thereof as aforesaid, the several further and additional rates e of postage hereinafter mentioned.

All packets consisting of printed papers (other than newspapers), or consisting of patterns or samples of merchandize of no intrinsic value, respectively posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to any place in St. Domingo, Martinique, Guadaloupe, Cuba, Porto Rico, or Mexico, or posted in any place in either of such countries addressed to the United Kingdom, may be transmitted by the post between the United Kingdom and any place in St. Domingo, Martinique, Guadaloupe, Cuba, Porto Rico, or Mexico, direct (the sea conveyance being by British packet boat), subject to the several rates of British postage hereinafter mentioned, that is to say :-

On every such packet, if not exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged and taken an uniform British rate of postage of

And on every such packet, if exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged and taken for such transmission thereof respectively as aforesaid, the several further and additional rates of postage hereinafter mentioned.

5. All packets consisting of printed papers (other than newspapers) or consisting of patterns or samples of merchandize, of no intrinsic value, respectively posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to any place in St. Martin's or French Guiana, or posted in any place in either of such countries, addressed to the United Kingdom, may be transmitted by the post between the United Kingdom and any place in St. Martin's or French Guiana, respectively (the sea conveyance being partly by British and partly by foreign packet boat), subject to the several rates of British postage hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

On every such packet, if not exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged and taken an uniform British rate of postage of

threepence.

And on every such packet, if exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged and taken for such transmission thereof respectively as aforesaid, the several further and additional rates of postage hereinafter mentioned.

6. All such respective packets so transmitted as hereinbefore, in the five preceding Clauses of this Warrant respectively mentioned, if exceeding four ounces in weight, shall be subject to the several further and additional rates of postage hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

On every such packet, if exceeding four ounces, and not exceeding eight ounces in weight, there shall be charged and taken two rates of postage.

And on every such packet, if exceeding eight ounces, and not exceeding twelve ounces in

weight, three rates of postage.

And on every such packet, if exceeding twelve ounces, and not exceeding sixteen ounces in

weight, four rates of postage.

And for every additional four ounces in weight, of any such packet, above the weight of sixteen ounces, there shall be charged and taken one additional rate of postage, and in charging any additional rate of postage, every fractional part of such additional four ounces in weight, shall be charged as an additional four ounces in weight, and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this Clause, shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such packet would be charged with under this Warrant if not exceeding four ounces in weight.

7. Every packet consisting of printed papers (other than newspapers) which shall be transmitted by the post under the authority of this Warrant shall be sent open at the ends or sides, and either without a cover or in a cover or envelope open at the ends or sides, and there shall be no written letter either closed or open nor any written communication in the nature of a letter either closed or open (whether such letter or communication be addressed to or intended for the person to whom the packet shall be directed or any other person) nor any enclosure sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, nor any other enclosure not authorized by this Warrant sent in

or with any such packet.

8. Every packet consisting of printed papers (other than newspapers) which shall be transmitted by the post under the authority of this Warrant may contain any number of separate books or other publications, prints, or maps, and any quantity of paper, parchment, or vellum, and the books or other publications, prints, or maps may be either printed, written, or plain, or any mixture of the three, and all legitimate binding, mounting, or covering of a book, publication, print, or map, or of a portion thereof, shall be allowed to pass by the post whether such binding, mounting, or covering be loose or attached, as also rollers in the case of prints or maps, markers (whether of paper or otherwise) in the case of books and whatsoever is necessary for the safe transmission of literary or artistic matter, or usually appertains thereto, but no packet shall consist of or contain any photographs, drawings, prints, or other contents which may be obviously of an obscene character.
