

removal of any such cattle from beyond those limits, except upon production to the person granting such licence of a certificate of an Officer of Customs at the said port, certifying that they are then healthy and free from the Cattle Plague.

4. All cattle within the said defined part of the port No. (2.) shall be subject to the same regulations as foreign cattle landed within such part of the port, and shall not be removed out of the same except after undergoing quarantine in the same manner, and upon production of a certificate of the same description, as is hereinbefore prescribed with respect to foreign cattle.

THE Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, and under and in pursuance of The Consolidated Cattle Plague Order of August, 1867, do hereby define the part of the Port of Cowes, in the Isle of Wight, within which foreign cattle may be landed, as follows:—

All that space in the town of Cowes, in the Isle of Wight, lying between the River Medina and a line drawn from the said river in a south-westerly direction along the north-western boundary of the Medina Brewery and across the road or street to the north-western corner of the public-house, called the Duke of York, in York-street, thence in a southerly direction two hundred feet along the eastern side of York-street, thence eastward in a straight line to the said River Medina at the most southerly point of the river frontage of the Medina Commercial Tavern Wharf, which space is coloured green on the plan of part of the port of Cowes, deposited at the Privy Council Office, a copy of which is deposited at the office of the Clerk of the Peace for Hampshire; and do prescribe as follows:—

1. All foreign cattle landed within the said defined part of the port shall be slaughtered within four days after the landing thereof, exclusive of the day of landing, unless they are taken to a licensed market or sale within that defined part within such four days, and they shall be so taken if a market or sale is held there within the said period of four days, but if there is no such licensed market or sale within that defined part, or if no such market or sale is held there within the said period of four days, then all such foreign cattle shall be slaughtered within that defined part within the said period of four days.

2. Cattle other than foreign cattle within the said defined part shall not be removed therefrom alive.

THE Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, and under and in pursuance of The Consolidated Cattle Plague Order of August, 1867, do hereby define the parts of the Port of Shoreham, in the county of Sussex, within which foreign cattle may be landed, as follows:—

All that space in the parish of Aldrington, in the county of Sussex, bounded on the north by the cliff forming the northern boundary of Wish Wharf, on the south by the Aldrington Basin, on the east by a straight line running due south from the north-east corner of the Adur Hotel to the Aldrington Basin, and on the west by a line running due north from the south-west corner of the North Landing Wharf at Aldrington, to the aforementioned cliff, which space is edged green on the plan of the landing wharf, Aldrington, deposited at the Privy Council Office, a copy of which is deposited at the office of the Clerk of the Peace for the county of Sussex:

Also all that space in the parish of Southwick, in the county of Sussex, bounded on the north by the cliff forming the northern boundary of Nicholson's Wharf, on the south by the east arm of New Shoreham Harbour, on the east by a straight line running due north from the eastern end of the Quay Wall of Nicholson's Wharf to the cliff forming the northern boundary of that wharf, and on the west by a straight line running due north from the western end of the Quay Wall of Nicholson's Wharf to the said cliff, which last mentioned space is coloured green on the plan of part of the parish of Southwick, also deposited at the Privy Council Office, a copy of which is deposited at the office of the Clerk of the Peace for the county of Sussex; and do prescribe as follows:—

1. All foreign cattle landed within the said defined part of the port shall be slaughtered within four days after the landing thereof, exclusive of the day of landing, unless they are taken to a licensed market or sale within that defined part within such four days, and they shall be so taken if a market or sale is held there within the said period of four days, but if there is no such licensed market or sale within that defined part, or if no such market or sale is held there within the said period of four days, then all such foreign cattle shall be slaughtered within that defined part within the said period of four days.

2. Cattle other than foreign cattle within the said defined part shall not be removed therefrom alive.
