

*Grodno, March 9.* On Wednesday last the Deputies of the Palatinates of *Sandomiria* and *Masovia* took their Leaves of the Dyer, in order to their return home: And the Friday following the Dyer it self broke up. Since the arrival of the Crown-General, there is a Convocation appointed to meet at *Warsaw*, which is to rise again in 14 days. By the Mis-carriage of this Meeting, the Subsistence of the Army is left unprovided for, for want of those Subsidies, which were expected to be here granted. The Court is gone into Mourning for the Death of the Chancellor, who married the Queen's Sister: When he found himself past hopes of recovery, he ordered Publication to be made through *Warsaw*, by sound of Trumpet, that whoever had any Debts to pretend from him, should immediately bring in their Accounts, and receive Satisfaction. His eldest Son, who had been married but a Month, going to take Possession of his Government of *Cracow*, fell ill of a Fever, and died 8 days after his Father, in the 22d Year of his Age.

*Vicna, March 14.* The later Advices from *Sclavonia*, take much off from the Apprehensions that the former Representations of their great Numbers had begun to raise, for now it is said they were not above 3000 Men, and that those had repulsed the *Save*. However, this Alarm has been of that use; to hasten the ordering of Supplies to those places which may secure them from any future Attempts. The *German Troops*, which are to reinforce *Essecke*, (as the *Croatians* do *Possessa*) are to begin their march thither the 20th Instant; and we do promise our selves, that if those of *Alba Regalis* depend upon any Relief to be sent from *Belgrade*, that will find themselves disappointed, and that all the Passes between them will be so possess, as to cut off all Entercourse; and upon any Notice of their marching in a Body on such a Design, the *Imperialists* will be so disposed, as to be able to assemble in proportionable Numbers to oppose them. Prince *Herman* of *Baden* having found so little Encouragement at *Alba Regalis*, is returned thither, and he is preparing now to go to *Ratisbonne*, with the Character of first Commissioner from his Imperial Majesty to the Dyer. We hear that the Princess *Ragorski* is come as far as *Presburg*, and that she is expected here every day; she hath, by a submissive Letter, recommended her self and Children to the protection of the Cardinal Nuncio. By what is written from *Transylvania*, it does not appear that the moving of the Troops, and that Shew of the Artillery, was to any other purpose, than to expedite the new Agreement (or rather, a more favourable Explication of the old one) with Count *Teleki*; for by the first Treaty with Prince *Abaffi's* Deputies, it being expressed in general Terms, that the *Transylvanians* should furnish so many Measures of Corn monthly; and there being some difference between the measures of that Country, and those of *Germany*, which last are the larger; the Difficulty arose, of which of the two Measures the Article was to be understood; And Count *Caraffa*, carrying it for his own Interpretation in the most beneficial Sense, hath demanded that what remains due to the Troops by this proportion for the Four Months past, should be paid in Money. He hath establish'd his Residence at *Hermanstadt*, as well to exact the performance of these Agreements, as for the conveniency of his Situation, to take an account of the other Imperial Garrisons, and to remedy any Disorders that may arise amongst them, as between the Inhabitants. It is said that this General hath the Offer of the Commissary General's place, but that he declines accepting it, unless he can have it with all the Powers that Count *Rabata* had, some of which the Council of War proposes to curtail and regulate. The Duke of *Lorraine* is expected here next Week.

*Brussels, March 26.* Yesterday died here the Count *de Bossu* and Prince of *Chinay*, to which Principality he succeeded, not long since, upon the Death of the late Viceroy of *Navarre*, the last of the House of *Croy*, whose Family enjoy'd that Title above 200 Years, by the Gift of the Emperor *Maximilian I.* The Letters from *Madrid*, of the 11 Instant, mention, That the Councils there were very intent upon making such Regulations as are necessary for establishing the Revenue, and supplying it, for the future, in its proper Channels. It is added, that Recruits are making for the old Regiments and the Garrison Companies: That the Cavalry of *Catalogne* is to be re-mounted: And what more immediately concerns these Countries, it is said, that a certain Fund is established for more Regular Returns of Money to be made thither. It is advised also, that the Emperor of *Morocco* had had great Success against those he was in War with in *Africa*; and that it was believed he would now turn his Arms against the Spaniards; and it was supposed that he would begin with the attack of *Larache*, a Town in the Kingdom of *Fez*, lying towards the *Atlantic Ocean*; but that they were so well provided, as not to fear his

coming: We hear from *Cologne*, by Letters of the 23d Instant, that the Elector (notwithstanding the Physicians reported him out of danger;) still keeps his Bed. And they had an account there, that the Dutchess Dowager of *Simmeren*, a Province of the Empire in the *Lower Palatinate*, was lately dead at *Creutznach*.

*Exeter, March 21.* Yesterday the Mayor of this City brought thither the New Charter lately granted by His Majesty, which was received with all humble Duty and Loyal Acknowledgments of His Majesties Gracious Favours to this place: The Mayor was met at *Honiton*, 15 Miles from hence, by several of the Principal Inhabitants of the City; and, as he drew nearer, by some hundreds more, with many of the Gentlemen of the Country, who took this occasion to shew their Zeal for His Majesty's Service, and their Affections to this Corporation; At the utmost Bounds of the City there was a concourse of great multitudes of People, who all attended the Mayor in very good order to the *Gustahab*, amid't the loud Acclamations of such as expressed their great Satisfaction in the present Conjunction. The Charter being read, the Company was entertained in the Hall, from whence they conducted the Mayor to his own House; and nothing was omitted, either there or in other parts of the City, to demonstrate a publick Rejoicing on this occasion.
