PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS doubts have arisen respecting the extent to which the law of England is in force in Gibraltar, and it is expedient that such doubts should be set at rest:

It is hereby ordered by Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, as follows:

1. The Ordinances enumerated in the annexed Schedule are hereby repealed.

2. Except in respect of matters which now are or hereafter may be provided for by any Order in Council or Local Ordinance other than those hereinbefore repealed, or by certain Letters Patent bearing date the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and thirty, and commonly called the "Charter of Justice," or by any Act of Parliament expressly or by necessary inference extending to Gibraltar, or by any Proclamation or other Instrument issued under authority of such Order in Council, Local Ordinance, "Charter of Justice," or Act of Parliament, the law of England as it existed on the twenty-second day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, shall be hereafter in force in Her Majesty's possessions of Gibraltar and its Dependencies, so far as it may be applicable to the circumstances thereof.

3. No Act or proceeding heretofore done or taken in Gibraltar in conformity with the law which then was or theretofore had been in force in England, and was supposed to be in force in Gibraltar, shall be deemed invalid, on the ground that such law was not really in force in Gibraltar, unless such Act or proceeding has been declared invalid by any competent Court of Justice before the passing of this Order in Council.

And the Most Noble the Duke of Buckingham and Chandos, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

Ordinance No. 9 of 1838.—An Ordinance to put in force within the garrison and territory of Gibraltar a certain Act of the Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, made and passed in the seventh year of the reign of His late Majesty King William the IVth, and in the first year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to amend the laws relating to burning or destroying buildings or ships."

Ordinance No. 10 of 1838.—An Ordinance to put in force within the garrison and territory of Gibraltar a certain Act of the Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, made and passed in the session holden in the seventh year of the reign of His late Majesty King William IVth, and in the first year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to amend the law relative to offences punishable by transportation for life."

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the Sanitary Order in Council, 1865, it is ordered by Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that it should be lawful for the Sanitary Commissioners

to defray out of the "General Sanitary Purpose Rates" the expenses therein mentioned, and it is expedient to make provision for raising money by loan to defray such expences as are now, or may hereafter be, chargeable by law on the said rates.

1. It is therefore hereby ordered by Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that this Order in Council shall take effect and come into operation forthwith.

2. In citing this Order in Council in other Orders in Council in local Ordinances, in all Notices and Proclamations published by, or by command of, or by or with the sanction of the Governor or by the said Sanitary Commissioners, and in all legal instruments and proceedings taken, made, or done in pursuance of or under the authority of this Order in Council, it shall be sufficient to use the words "The Order in Council for the raising Capital for 'Public Purposes' in Gibraltar, 1867."

3. The words "public purpose" shall include every purpose the cost of effecting which is or shall be by law chargeable, in whole or in part, against "The General Sanitary Purposes Rates."

4. The word "capital" shall mean and include every sum of money which the Commissioners may be by law authorised to raise for any public purpose.

5. And in every case in which the amount thereof shall not be expressly declared by law, the word "capital" shall mean and include every sum applicable to such public purpose as aforesaid, an estimate of which shall be made, published, and allowed in manner hereinafter mentioned, unless Her Majesty, Her heirs or successors, should be pleased by Order in Council otherwise to order.

6. Every such estimate shall be signed by the person making the same, and shall be certified, as being, in the opinion of the Sanitary Commissioners, correct, by the Chairman, under his hand and seal, and shall contain a separate and detailed estimate of the probable cost of the works required to be constructed for the public purpose in question, and also a separate estimate in gross of the probable amount, if any, which may be payable to Her Majesty as owner, and all persons as owners, lessees, or occupiers of premises in Gibraltar which would be required to be taken or used on account of such purchase for the purpose of, or as compensation for, the use or damage to such premises, and a separate estimate in gross of the probable cost of all accommodation works which may be required (if any).

7. And also a detailed estimate of the probable annual expenditure (interest upon capital excepted) to be occasioned by carrying such public purpose into effect.

8. Every such estimate shall be published on two consecutive days in the Gibraltar Chronicle, or in such other manner as Government notices are, or usually may be, published, and shall, within the period of twenty days after the expiration of one month after the last of such days of publication, be delivered to the Governor, by whom the same shall be transmitted, together with such observations as he may think necessary, to one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State for the purpose of being submitted to Her Majesty.

9. If Her Majesty shall, at any time within twelve months thereafter, be pleased to sanction and allow such estimate, whether subject to amendments or otherwise, such sanction and allowance shall be signified to the Governor by one of Her Principal Secretaries of State, and by him published by proclamation in the Gibraltar

Chronicle, or in such other manner as Government notices are or usually may be published.

10. And thereupon the amount sanctioned by Her Majesty shall and may be raised, and shall be subject to the several provisions in this Order in Council contained.

11. It shall be also lawful for the Commissioners to include in, and raise as part of, the capital authorized, all their costs, charges, and expenses in and about the making of any and all such estimate and estimates, and in preparing and making all necessary surveys, valuations, plans, and books of reference, for the public purpose to which such estimate relates; provided that an account thereof shall have been duly rendered to the Sanitary Auditor, and certified by him to be correct within three months after Her Majesty's sanction of the estimate or estimates shall have been published as aforesaid.

12. It shall be lawful for the Commissioners to take up at interest on the credit of the general sanitary purposes, rates, and all other rates which they now are, or at any time may be authorized to assess and levy, and all other moneys which they may be authorized to take, have, and receive, of and from any public or private body or corporation duly enabled in that behalf, and willing to advance the same, the capital authorized to be raised for the several public purposes hereinbefore mentioned and for securing the repayment thereof, together with interest thereon, not exceeding six dollars per centum per annum, the Commissioners may mortgage and assign the said rates and moneys respectively to the person or persons who shall advance such moneys, as a security for the repayment thereof, and for the payment of the interest thereon.

13. The capital shall, unless it shall be by Order in Council otherwise ordered, be repaid by such equal annual instalments as the Commissioners shall order and determine, being not more than thirty yearly equal instalments nor less than twelve such instalments, unless such capital shall not amount to 2,000 dollars, in which case the same may and shall be repaid by not less than five such instalments, and in every case, together with annual interest thereon, payable half-yearly from and out of the general sanitary purposes rates.

14. The Commissioners may, subject to the provisions of this Order in Council, if they think fit, fix a period or periods for the repayment of the principal money and moneys so borrowed, either in one sum or by instalments, and in every such case the Commissioners shall cause such period or periods to be inserted in the mortgage, and upon the expiration thereof shall, from and out of the general sanitary and purposes rates, pay, on demand, to the party entitled to such mortgage the principal sum secured thereby, or the instalment or balance thereof then due and payable, together with all interest and arrears of interest thereon.

15. And every payment of interest, and every repayment for and on account of any such principal money shall be made at the principal office of the Commissioners, and not elsewhere.

16. Subject also as aforesaid, it shall be lawful for the Commissioners to re-borrow any sum or sums of money, or any part thereof, which may have been already borrowed and paid off under the provisions hereinbefore mentioned.

17. Every such mortgage shall be, by deed under the common seal of the Commissioners, in which the consideration shall be truly stated, and may be according to the form No. 1, in the Sche-

dule to this Order in Council, or to the like effect, and shall not contain any declaration of trust.

18. The respective mortgagees shall be entitled one with another to their respective proportions of the rates and assessments and other property comprised in such mortgages, according to the respective sums in such mortgages mentioned to be advanced by such mortgagees respectively, and to be repaid thereof the sums so advanced with interest, without any preference one above another by reason of priority of advancing such moneys or of the dates of any such mortgages respectively.

19. A register of mortgages shall be kept by the Secretary or Chief Clerk of the Commissioners; and, within fourteen days after the date of any such mortgage, an entry or memorial, specifying the number and date of such mortgage and the sums secured thereby, and the names of the parties thereto, with their proper additions, shall be made in such register, and such register may be perused at all reasonable times by any mortgagee of the Commissioners, or by the transferee and actual owner of any mortgage, or by his attorney or agent duly authorized in writing, and producing such writing.

20. Any party entitled to any such mortgage may by deed, wherein the consideration shall be truly stated, and not otherwise, transfer the same, and all his rights and interest thereunder and therein, to any other person; which deed shall not contain any declaration of trust, nor assign, nor purport to assign, the same upon trust or otherwise than absolutely, and may be according to the form 2 in the Schedule to this Order in Council, or to the like effect.

21. Nothing herein contained shall prejudice or abridge the rights of any person to declare or to enforce a declaration of any trusts expressed by any separate and distinct instrument, but every such trust and every declaration of such trust shall be valid and effectual to all intents and purposes between the parties and privies thereto: Provided always, that it shall not be lawful for the Commissioners to take any cognizance whatever of any such trust or declaration of trust, whether expressed or implied; nor shall it be lawful for any person to make the Commissioners parties to any equitable or legal proceedings by reason of any notice, or with any process, bill, plaint, petition, or other legal instrument, with intent to affect them with any such trust or declaration of trust, and the same shall be utterly void to all intents and purposes; and every such person serving any such notice, process, bill, plaint, petition, or other legal instrument, or privy to such service, shall forfeit and pay to the Commissioners a sum of money equal to the amount secured by every mortgage specified or referred to in such notice, or in such process, plaint, bill, petition, or other legal instrument, to be sued for and recovered, with full costs of suit, in an action at law at the suit of the Commissioners.

22. Within ten days after the date of every such deed of transfer, if executed in Gibraltar, or otherwise within thirty days after such date, or within ten days after the arrival of such deed of transfer in Gibraltar, whichever may first happen, it shall be produced to the Secretary or Chief Clerk of the Commissioners, who shall thereupon cause an entry or memorial thereof to be made in the same manner as in the case of the original mortgage, and after such entry, and not previously or otherwise, every such transfer shall entitle the transferee to all the rights, powers, and authorities, interest, property, possession, and benefits of the mortgage so transferred in all respects and as if

his name had been originally inserted therein, and no party having made such transfer shall have power to make void, release, or discharge the same, or any money thereby secured; and for every such entry or memorial the Commissioners shall be entitled to demand and receive any sum not exceeding one dollar nor less than half a dollar.

23. From and after the fixed day for the payment of any principal or instalment of any principal, interest shall cease to accrue thereon, unless the Commissioners shall refuse or neglect to pay, on demand, the principal money secured thereby, or the instalment thereof then due and payable, and the interest or arrears of interest or part thereof, in which case interest shall accrue from the time of such demand until payment of the whole of the principal or instalment of principal and arrears of interest due thereon.

24. If the Commissioners shall neglect or refuse to pay any principal or interest on the day fixed in any such mortgage, it shall be lawful for them at any time thereafter to give notice to the party entitled thereto, that they are willing to pay him, on a day therein named, the amount of principal and interest which will then be due and payable, together with a further reasonable sum therein mentioned, not exceeding the amount payable for six months' interest as compensation for their default, and thereupon further interest shall cease to accrue in such principal unless the Commissioners shall neglect or refuse, upon the expiration of such notice, to pay when demanded the principal, interest, and compensation mentioned therein; provided always, that if the party thereto shall be dissatisfied with the amount of such compensation, it shall be lawful for the Supreme Court, upon petition in a summary way, to make a decretal order for the payment by the Commissioners of such further sum not exceeding, together with that mentioned in the notice, and whether the same shall have been paid and received or not, six months' interest, as to the Chief Justice may seem reasonable and just, together with the costs of, and occasioned by, the application.

25. If the principal, instalment of principal, or interest due and payable in any mortgage or mortgages, the aggregate amount of principal secured whereby shall not be less than five thousand dollars shall be due and unpaid for a period of six months after demand, in writing, under the hand of the party or parties entitled thereto, made at the principal office of the Commissioners, between the hours of eleven o'clock in the forenoon and three in the afternoon, it shall be lawful for them, by themselves or conjointly with any others, or for any persons whatever entitled to any such mortgage or mortgages, the aggregate amount of principal secured whereby shall not be less than five thousand dollars, without prejudice to any remedy either by writ of mandamus in cases wherein such writ is issuable or otherwise, to enforce payment of the principal and interest then and thereafter payable, by applying for the appointment of a receiver in manner hereinafter mentioned.

26. Every application for a Receiver shall be made to the Supreme Court, by petition to the Chief Justice, whereupon process shall be issued by and under the seal of the said Court, requiring the Commissioners to be and appear before the said Court on a certain day therein mentioned. The Chief Justice, after hearing all that may be alleged by and on behalf of the petitioner or petitioners, and the Commissioners respectively, shall, if he be satisfied with the truth of the

allegations in such petition, by Decretal Order to be entered and enrolled in the records of the Court, appoint some fit and proper person to receive the whole or a competent part of the rates, assessments and other moneys liable to or charged with the payment of such principal and interest, until the whole amount of principal and interest due and payable on the mortgages, and the costs of petitioner or petitioners, including the charges of receiving the said rates, assessments, and other moneys be fully paid.

27. The Chief Justice may, from time to time, if he shall think fit, remove the receiver and appoint any other fit and proper person in the room of the person so removed.

28. It shall be in the discretion of the Chief Justice, if he shall be satisfied that the non-payment of such principal and interest was caused by the wilful default or neglect or other improper conduct of the Commissioners, or any of them, by his said Decretal Order, to order that all the costs, charges, and expenses of the Commissioners occasioned by any such application, and also the costs of the petitioner or petitioners, including the charges of receiving the said rates, assessments, and other moneys, be paid by the Commissioners, personally or by one or more of them, named on such order, and in such proportion as he may think fit, and to issue process accordingly; but unless he shall be so satisfied, then the whole of the said costs, charges, and expenses of the Commissioners, and of the petitioner or petitioners, shall, being first duly taxed and ascertained, be included in the charges of receiving the said rates, assessments, and other moneys, and be, and by Decretal Order of the Court adjudged to be, part of the costs, charges, and expenses of the Commissioners in carrying this Order in Council into execution, and paid and defrayed accordingly.

29. The schedule to this Order in Council annexed is, and is to be deemed and taken to be, part of this same Order.

30. The Commissioners shall keep a separate and distinct account to be called the "Capital Account" of all receipts and disbursements of the capital which they may raise or be authorised to raise in such manner and form as the Governor shall from time to time by warrant under his hand and seal direct; and so far as such warrant and the directions therein contained shall not extend, they shall keep such capital account according to the most approved system of book keeping, and the capital account shall be subject to all the provisions of the Sanitary Order in Council, Gibraltar, 1865, relating to accounts, and to the collection, receipt, expenditure, or payment of money by the said Order in Council payable to or receivable by the Commissioners and to the examination, audit, allowance, or disallowance, of their accounts.

31. And the said Sanitary Order in Council, Gibraltar, 1865, is hereby ordered to be and to be deemed and taken to be, to all intents and purposes incorporated with, and to be construed and read together with the provisions herein contained as one Order in Council.

And the Most Noble the Duke of Buckingham and Chandos, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions accordingly.

WHEREAS by "The Law Procedure Act, 1854," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, from time to time, by an Order in Council, to direct that all or any part of the provisions of the said Act shall apply to all or any Court or Courts of Record in England and Wales, and that within one month after such Order shall have been made and published in the London Gazette, such provisions shall extend and apply in manner directed by such Order, and that any such Order may be, in like manner, from time to time altered and annulled; and that in and by

such Order Her Majesty may direct by whom any powers or duties incident to the provisions applied under the said Act shall and may be exercised with respect to matters in such Court or Courts, and may make any orders or regulations which may be deemed requisite for carrying into operation in such Court or Courts the provisions so applied;

And whereas it has seemed fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that certain of the provisions of the said Act should be extended and applied to all the Courts of Record established under the provisions of "The County Courts Act, 1846," and also to the City of London Court of Record, as constituted by "The County Courts Act, 1867."

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the provisions contained in sections fifty, fifty-one, fifty-two, fifty-three, fifty-four, sixty, sixty-one, sixty-two, sixty-three, sixty-four, sixty-five, sixty-six, sixty-seven, eighty-three, eighty-four, eighty-five, and eighty-six of "The Common Law Procedure Act, 1854," shall apply to the said Courts of Record.

And Her Majesty is further pleased, by and with the advice aforesaid, to direct that the powers and duties incident to the above-mentioned provisions of "The Common Law Procedure Act, 1854," with respect to matters in the said Courts of Record, shall and may be exercised by the Judges of the said Courts respectively, or their respective deputies; and to order that the statutes, rules of practice, orders, and forms, in force and used in the said Courts of Record, shall be adopted with reference to proceedings had in such Courts under the above-mentioned provisions of "The Common Law Procedure Act, 1854," so far as the same are applicable *mutatis mutandis*.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, by an Order dated the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, reciting that it had been represented to Her Majesty that certain contagious or infectious disorders were then prevalent among cattle in the dominions and territories situated in Europe belonging to His Majesty the King of the Netherlands, and that there was danger of the said disorders being introduced into this country by means of cattle from such countries or places, did order that on and after the twenty-eighth day of March then instant, no cattle should be imported or introduced into the United Kingdom which should come from or should have been at any place within the aforesaid territories and dominions situate in Europe belonging to His Majesty the King of the Netherlands; and also that on and after the said twenty-eighth day of March then instant no cattle should be imported or introduced into the United Kingdom which should

be or should have been on board any vessels at the same time with any cattle which should have come from or should have been within the aforesaid territories and dominions :

And Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, did thereby further order that, in the event of any cattle being landed in any portion of the United Kingdom contrary to the provisions of that Order, -all such cattle, the importation or introduction whereof was thereby prohibited as aforesaid, should, upon their arrival in this country, be destroyed or otherwise disposed of as the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Customs might direct; and that that Order should continue in force until revoked by any further Order; and that the word "cattle" should include sheep as well as bulls, cows, oxen, heifers, and calves :

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Thomas Legh, Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester, with the consent of the Right Reverend Samuel, Bishop of the said diocese of Oxford, and also with the consent of Stewart William Jenney, of Drayton Lodge, Drayton Beauchamp aforesaid, Esquire, and of Arthur Henry Jenney, of Great Yarmouth, in the county of Norfolk, Esquire, the patrons of the rectory of the said parish of Drayton Beauchamp (in testimony whereof the said parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation), with the consents of the dean and chapter of the cathedral church of Christ, Oxford, the patrons of the perpetual curacy of the said parish of Tring, and with the consents of the master, fellows, and scholars of the college of the Holy and Undivided Trinity, within the town and university of Cambridge, of King Henry the Eighth's foundation, the patrons of the vicarage of the said parish of Marsworth (in testimony whereof the said dean and chapter and the said master, fellows, and scholars have respectively affixed their common or corporate seals to this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Tring, of the said parish of Marsworth, and of the said parish of Drayton Beauchamp, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church situate at Long Marston aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Long Marston,' and that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of such consolidated chapelry should belong to and be exercised by the Reverend Henry Auber Harvey, the present incumbent of the said perpetual curacy of the parish of Tring aforesaid, and by his successors, incumbents of the same benefice, for ever.

We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Long Marston, being :—

"All that portion of the parish of Tring, in the county of Hertford, and in the diocese of Rochester; and also all that detached portion of the parish of Marsworth, in the county of Buckingham, and in the diocese of Oxford, situate near Long Marston Church, which said two portions of such parishes are comprised within, and are co-extensive with and together constitute, the hamlet of Long Marston.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that we may be authorized and empowered, by instrument or instruments in writing, duly executed according to law, from time to time, to sell or dispose of, and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, with the consent of the respective holders (if any), to be testified by their being made parties to such instruments, all or any of the said lands and hereditaments heretofore belonging to the said Principal and Commonalty of Vicars, and so vested in us as aforesaid, with their appurtenances, and all our estate, right, title, and interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same, and his, her, or their heirs, executors, administrators, or assigns, or otherwise as he, she, or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall, upon due calculation and inquiry, appear to us to be just and reasonable.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said

scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Chichester.

Birmingham Proof House.

(Repeal of "The Gun Barrel Proof Act, 1855;" constitution of new body corporate for control of Proof House; vesting of lands and property; register of Birmingham gun trade; annual meeting and extraordinary meetings of Birmingham gun trade; ordinary and extraordinary meetings of the body corporate; bye-laws; annual reports; officers and servants, and their duties; Proof House to be maintained, and others may be erected; the proving of gun barrels; penalties and misdemeanors; search warrants, and detention of barrels; accounts; application of moneys; auditors; foreign proof marks.)

A PPLICATION is intended to be made to Parliament in the session which will be holden in 1868, for an Act to repeal so much of "The Gun Barrel Proof Act, 1855," as relates to the Birmingham Company and to the Birmingham Proof House, and to effect the following purposes, or some of them, namely:—

To incorporate a body, which shall be called "The Guardians of the Birmingham Proof House," or by some other appropriate name corporate, under whose control and direction the proving of the barrels of small arms in Birmingham shall be placed after the passing of the proposed Act; and which body shall consist of all Justices of the Peace for the borough of Birmingham, and of all other Justices residing within seven miles of the said borough, and also of twelve or more members who shall be elected by the Birmingham gun trade.

To vest in the said body corporate all lands, buildings, and other property now vested in the Birmingham Company.

To define the qualifications of the elected members of the said body corporate; the qualifications of those who constitute the Birmingham gun trade; and the manner of claiming to be members, of objecting to any such claims, of revising claims and objections, and of completing the register of the Birmingham gun trade.

To define the time, place, and manner of the annual meetings of the said body corporate and of the Birmingham gun trade, and the business to be done thereat; and also the manner of holding special meetings of the Birmingham gun trade, and the business to be done thereat.

To define the manner of choosing, in the first instance, the elected members of the said body corporate, and the conditions and manner of the elections to be held to fill annual and other vacancies.

To require an ordinary meeting of the said body corporate to be held once in every month, and to provide for the holding of extraordinary meetings.

To define the powers and duties of the said body corporate; and to enable them to appoint and remove officers and servants, including a proof master, assistant proof master, accountant, and law clerk.

To enable the said body corporate, at special meetings of the body, and under other defined conditions, to make bye-laws for regulating the manner of transacting business; the duties of all officers and servants, and the amount of their salaries, except such as shall, in either case, be set forth in the Act itself; the manner of proving guns; the determining of the fees to be paid for such proving; and for all other purposes to which bye-laws are applicable in carrying out the powers and duties of the said body corporate.

To require the said body corporate to prepare and present to the annual meeting of the Bir-

mingham gun trade, a report of all the proceedings of the past year, showing details as to barrels proved, and as to guns exported, together with full financial particulars.

To prohibit any elected member of the said body corporate from having any interest in any contract made with the body corporate.

To enable a fixed sum to be divided among the elected members of the said body corporate attending at each ordinary meeting of the said body corporate.

To define certain duties and powers of the proof master and assistant proof master, and to fix the limits of the salary of the proof master.

To impose penalties upon the officers and servants of the said body corporate for certain specified offences.

To enable the said body corporate to grant retiring pensions or gratuities to their officers and servants.

To require the said body corporate to maintain a proper Proof House; and to enable them to alter existing buildings, or erect others; and to enable them to acquire and hold additional land for these purposes.

To enable the said body corporate to provide and maintain Branch Proof Houses in Birmingham, or within ten miles thereof, with all necessary appurtenances to the use thereof.

To require the said body corporate to prove all barrels brought to any Proof House within their jurisdiction, subject to defined rules, regulations, and a scale of proof; and further to require them to put the proof mark on every barrel that has passed through and stood the proof.

To enable the said body corporate to charge fees upon proving barrels, according to defined rules, and within defined limits.

To define the cases in which proof of barrels shall be necessary, both in the first instance and under altered conditions; and to impose penalties for dealing with small arms having unmarked barrels, either by way of sale, pledge, or exchange, and for fraudulently obliterating or defacing any mark.

To define the cases in which the wrongful possession of or dealing with any stamp or mark shall be deemed a misdemeanor.

To define the cases in which a search warrant may be granted in respect of any forged stamps or marks, or any barrels not bearing the Proof House marks.

To empower the detention of barrels brought to the Proof House wrongfully marked, and the summoning of the owners thereof to appear and be dealt with before the Justices.

To enable the said body corporate, on proof of the offence, to sell goods seized on search, or detained at the Proof House, and to retain the proceeds.

To require that the accounts of the said body corporate shall be regularly kept, and in such a manner as shall plainly set forth the details of the different classes of receipts and the different classes and items of expenditure; that a statement of account shall be laid before every ordinary meeting of the said body corporate; that an annual account shall be made up ending on thirty-first December in each year; and that a copy of every annual account shall be sent to every member of the Birmingham Gun Trade within six weeks after the thirty-first December.

To define the manner in which moneys received for proof of barrels shall be applied.

To require the appointment by the Birmingham Gun Trade of two Auditors at each annual meeting; of whom one shall be a professional Accountant, and the other shall be a member of the Bir-

irmingham Gun Trade, but neither of them shall be a member of the said body corporate; and to enable remuneration to be paid to the said Auditors.

To define the duties of the said Auditors.

To require the Proof Master to keep a register of foreign proof marks, which shall be lodged with the said body corporate; and to require the said body corporate, on receiving any application to register a foreign proof mark, to give notice thereof to the Gunmakers' Company of London.

To maintain in office the present Guardians of the Gun Barrel Proof House of Birmingham, until the said body corporate shall have been appointed under the proposed Act; and to maintain the scale of Proof now in force, and the bye-laws of the said present Guardians for six months after the passing of the proposed Act, or until such other time as shall be therein appointed.

To provide for the payment of the costs attending the application for and obtaining of the proposed Act.

IT is intended to introduce into Parliament in the next Session thereof, a Bill for the following, or some of the following, among other purposes:—

1. The establishment and maintenance within the limits of the Metropolis as defined by "The Metropolis Local Management Act, 1855," or in some parish immediately adjoining such limits of a market or markets, for the sale of cattle brought by sea from any place out of the United Kingdom, and of other animals imported with such cattle; and for the establishment and maintenance of the necessary market-places, market-houses, slaughter-houses, stalls, lairs, roads and other approaches (whether by tramway or otherwise) and conveniences connected with such markets, not only for the sale of such cattle and other animals, but for the slaughtering thereof and the sale of meat; and also for the construction and maintenance of wharfs, either contiguous to such markets or otherwise, for the landing of the said cattle and other animals.

2. The taking of tolls, rates, rents, and stallages for the use of the said markets, slaughter-houses, stalls, lairs, wharfs, and conveniences, and the making of bye-laws and other provision for the good government and regulation thereof, and

of the persons frequenting and using the same, and for enforcing such bye-laws by penalties:

3. The purchase of lands, houses, and other property by compulsion or agreement for the purpose of the said market-places and wharfs, and the approaches thereto, and the slaughter-houses, buildings, and works connected therewith, and for all or any of the other purposes of the said Bill, in such places within the metropolis, or in some parish immediately adjoining the metropolis as shall from time to time be approved by one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, by way of Provisional Order or otherwise, subject to the ultimate approval of Parliament.
