HER Majesty in Council was this day pleased, on a representation of the Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Council on Education, to appoint the Reverend Frederick Wilkinsoñ, of Corpus Christi College, Cambridge, M.A., to be one of Her Majesty's Inspectors of Schools.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by Orders of Her Majesty in Council, made respectively on the tenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and on the ninth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, by virtue of a certain Act of Parliament passed in the session holden in the third and fourth years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for the appointment of convenient places for the holding of Assizes in England and Wales," it was amongst other things ordered that the Assizes and Sessions holden under Commissions of Gaol Delivery, and other commissions for the despatch of civil and criminal business for the county of York, theretofore holden at York, should thereafter be holden on the same Circuit at York and Leeds, in the said county; and that the said county should be divided for the purposes of carrying the said Act and the said Orders into execution into two Divisions, which should respectively be called "The North and East Riding Division," and "The West Riding Division;" and that the said "North and East Riding Division" should include and consist of the whole of the North and East Ridings of the said county, and the said "West Riding Division" should include and consist of the whole of the West Riding of the said county:

And whereas by the first section of the said Order in Council of the ninth day of July, one

thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, it was provided that, "in all cases of commitment for trial, or of recognizances to appear and prosecute, or give evidence, or answer at the Assizes for any offence supposed to have been committed in the said 'North and East Riding Division,' such commitment shall be either to the Castle of York or to the Gaol or House of Correction in Northallerton, or to the Gaol or House of Correction in Beverley, and the recognizances shall be taken to appear and prosecute or give evidence, or to appear and answer at the Assizes at York as heretofore, and for any offence supposed to have been committed in the said 'West Riding Division,' the commitment shall be either to the Borough Gaol in Leeds, or to the Gaol or House of Correction in Wakefield; and the recognizances shall be taken to appear and prosecute or give evidence, or to appear and answer at the Assizes at Leeds, unless the Justice or Justices of the Peace making any such commitment or taking such recognizance shall, under the special circumstances of the case, think fit to make such commitment for trial or recognizance to appear and prosecute or give evidence, or to appear and answer at the Assizes to be holden in either of the said Divisions, other than that in which the offence shall be supposed to have been committed, in which case such commitment shall be made and recognizances taken, and such trial shall take place accordingly:" And whereas by the second section of the said Order in Council of the ninth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, certain provisions were made for the removal to, and trial at, Leeds, of prisoners in custody in the House of Correction at Wakefield, for offences appearing, by their respective commitments, to have been committed within the said "West Riding Division:" And whereas it is expedient to alter and amend the same, and to make further provision with respect to the commitment for trial of prisoners charged with the commission of offences within the said "West Riding Division," and with respect to the removal of prisoners now or hereafter committed to the House of Correction at Wakefield, for trial at the Leeds Assizes.

It is, therefore, ordered by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue of all powers vested in Her Majesty by the said recited Act of Parliament or otherwise,

enabling Her Majesty in that behalf as follows (that is to say):—The said first and second Sections of the said Order in Council of the ninth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, shall be amended and altered, and the same are hereby respectively amended and altered as follows:—

I. In all cases of commitment for trial, or of recognizances to appear and prosecute, or give evidence or answer at the Assizes for any offence supposed to have been committed in the said North and East Riding Divisions, such commitment shall be either to the Castle of York, or to the Gaol or House of Correction in Northallerton, or to the Gaol or House of Correction in Beverley, and the recognizances shall be taken to appear and prosecute, or give evidence, or to appear and answer at the Assizes at York as heretofore; and for any offence supposed to have been committed in the said "West Riding Division," the commitment shall be to the Gaol or House of Correction in Wakefield, and the recognizances shall be taken to appear and prosecute, or give evidence, or to appear and answer at the Assizes at Leeds, unless the Justice or Justices of the Peace making any such commitment, or taking such recognizance, shall, under the special circumstances of the case, think fit to make such commitment for trial, or recognizance to appear and prosecute, or give evidence, or to appear and answer at the Assizes to be holden in either of the said divisions other than that in which the offence shall be supposed to have been committed, in which case such commitment shall be made and recognizances taken, and such trial shall take place accordingly.

II. All prisoners now or hereafter in custody in or committed to the said Gaol or House of Correction at Wakefield, for trial at the next or any subsequent Assizes or Gaol Delivery to be holden at Leeds after the date of this Order, shall be tried at Leeds, and shall in due time, and from time to time without writ of habeas corpus or other writ or order of Court for that purpose, be removed by the gaoler or keeper of such Gaol or House of Correction, with their commitments and detainers, to the Borough Gaol at Leeds, in order that they may be tried at the Assizes to be holden there under Commissions of Gaol Delivery and other Commissions for the said "West Riding Division." Every prisoner so removed shall for and during the time of such removal, and for and during the time of his being removed back to the said Gaol or House of Correction at Wakefield, when and as often as he shall for any reason be so removed back, and also for and during such time as he may be so detained in the said Borough Gaol, and until he shall have been delivered by due course of law, be deemed to be and shall be to all intents and purposes in the proper legal custody. And the keeper of the said Gaol or House of Correction at Wakefield shall deliver or cause to be delivered to the Judge of Assize at every Assize and Gaol Delivery to be hereafter holden at Leeds, a calendar of all prisoners in custody for trial at such Assizes, as by law required, and shall cause to be inserted in one or more of the newspapers published in the said county a list of the names of all prisoners who are to be tried at Leeds (so far as the said list can then be made out), with a short statement of the offences with which they are charged, together with a notice that all persons bound by recognizance to appear and prosecute, or give evidence against or for such prisoners so to be tried at Leeds, shall appear and give evidence at the then next Assize or Gaol Delivery to be holden at

Leeds, and the persons so bound shall so appear and prosecute and give evidence accordingly.

III. This Order, and the said Orders of the tenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and of the ninth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, shall henceforth be in force and take effect in the same manner as if the first and second sections of the said Order of the ninth day of July had been originally contained therein in the terms of the said several sections as hereby amended, and in all other respects, save as they are hereby amended and altered, the provisions of the said Orders of the tenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and of the ninth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, shall remain and be in full force and effect.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England, beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-ground or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require), that after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time, as circumstances may require;—provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes herein-after mentioned, ten days' previous notice of

his intention to make such representations, did make representations stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes and places without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State ;

And whereas Her Majesty has been pleased, by Her Orders in Council, to give notice of such representations, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and such Orders have been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act ;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground be opened in the undermentioned parishes and places without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State :—

Haverhill, Liversedge, Herne Bay, Stanwell, East Grinstead, St. George Gloucestershire, Bishops Cleeve, Hound (Hants), Wrentham (Suffolk), Leighton Buzzard, Great Driffield, St. Luke Bristol, Woodford (Essex), Witton-cum-Twambrooks, Harbledown (Kent), Clifton - on - Teme, Featherstone, Levenshulme, Epsom, Burton Overy, Kempsey, Ribchester, Denton (Kent), Christ Church Portwood, Windlesham, Calverley, Weston-under-Lizard, Blyth (Notts), Loughton (Essex), Warfield (Berks), Gellygare, Coyty (Glamorganshire), Newcastle (Glamorganshire), Thornley (Durham), Stoke-under-Hamden, Newchurch (Isle of Wight), Radcliffe-upon-Trent, Middleton-in-Teasdale.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS the Right Honourable Gathorne Hardy, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has, under the provisions of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, burials should be discontinued in the undermentioned parishes, with the following modifications ; viz.:

**ASHTON-UNDER-LYNE.**—Forthwith wholly in the church of Saint Peter, and in the churchyard, except for the burial of the members of the families of the owners of family graves and vaults possessed before the first day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, that no coffin be buried in an earthen grave less than four feet below the surface, or within one foot of a previously buried coffin ; and that every coffin buried in a vault or walled grave be embedded in

charcoal, and separately entombed, that is, enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented ; and that on or before the day preceding the intended burial of any deceased person, the Sexton shall inform the Town Clerk of Ashton-under-Lyne of the name of such deceased person, and of the alleged relationship of such person to the owner of the grave or vault in the churchyard, and of the time of the intended burial.

**LLANGEFNI.**—Forthwith wholly in the parish church, and in the churchyard, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, in which each coffin shall be separately entombed by being enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the sixteenth day of January next :

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette ; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before the said sixteenth day of January.

All that space known as Buisson's Wharf, situate in River-road, in the parish of Littlehampton, in the county of Sussex, bounded on the southwest by the River Arun, on the northeast by the highway called River Road, on the northwest by premises belonging to Thomas Isemonger, and in the occupation of the said Thomas Isemonger and Edward Stephen Corney, and on the southeast by a public footpath leading from the said River-road to the river, which wharf has a frontage on the River Arun of eighty-five feet or thereabout, and a depth from the River Arun to the road of sixty-five feet or thereabout ; all which space is coloured green on the plan of part of the Port of Littlehampton deposited at the Privy Council Office, copies of which are deposited at the offices of the Town Clerk of the borough of Arundel, and the Clerk of the Peace for the county of Sussex ;

And do hereby prescribe as follows :—

1. All foreign cattle landed within the said defined part of the port shall be slaughtered within four days after the landing thereof, exclusive of the day of landing, unless they are taken to a licensed market or sale within that defined part

within such four days; and they shall be so taken if a market or sale is held there within the said period of four days, but if there is no such licensed market or sale within that defined part, or if no such market or sale is held there within the said period of four days, then all such foreign cattle shall be slaughtered within that defined part within the said period of four days.

2. Cattle other than foreign cattle within the said defined part shall not be removed therefrom alive.

of the Town Clerk of the borough of Dartmouth and the Town Clerk of the borough of Totnes;

And do hereby prescribe as follows:—

1. All foreign cattle landed within the said defined part of the port shall be slaughtered within four days after the landing thereof, exclusive of the day of landing, unless they are taken to a licensed market or sale within that defined part within such four days, and they shall be so taken if a market or sale is held there within the said period of four days, but if there is no such licensed market or sale within that defined part, or if no such market or sale is held there within the said period of four days, then all such foreign cattle shall be slaughtered within that defined part within the said period of four days.

2. Cattle other than foreign cattle within the said defined part shall not be removed therefrom alive.

**T**HE Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, and under and in pursuance of The Consolidated Cattle Plague Order of August, 1867, do hereby define the part of the Port of Penzance, in the county of Cornwall, within which foreign cattle may be landed, as follows :—

All that part of the Albert Pier, in the port of Penzance, which extends from the line of the northern side of the jetty situate at the southern end of the said pier, for a distance of one thousand and sixty feet northward, and includes a shed which has been erected for the reception and slaughter of foreign cattle; all which space is coloured green on a plan of part of the port of Penzance, deposited at the Privy Council Office, a copy of which is deposited at the office of the Town Clerk of the borough of Penzance;

And do hereby prescribe as follows :—

1. All foreign cattle landed within the said defined part of the port shall be slaughtered within four days after the landing thereof, exclusive of the day of landing, unless they are taken to a licensed market or sale within that defined part within such four days, and they shall be so taken if a market or sale is held there within the said period of four days, but if there is no such licensed market or sale within that defined part, or if no such market or sale is held there within the said period of four days, then all such foreign cattle shall be slaughtered within that defined part within the said period of four days.

2. Cattle other than foreign cattle within the said defined part shall not be removed therefrom alive.

**T**HE Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, and under and in pursuance of The Consolidated Cattle Plague Order of August, 1867, do hereby define the part of the Port of Sunderland, in the county of Durham, within which foreign cattle may be landed, as follows :—

All that space in the port and borough of Sunderland, being a part of the South Dock property of the River Wear Commissioners, lying between the German Ocean and a line commencing on the sea at the north-eastern end of the South Pier, at the mouth of the River Wear, and running in a direction generally towards the south-west, along the southern side of the River Wear to the Tide Gauge at the north-eastern point of the entrance to the Tidal Harbour, thence in a southerly direction along the eastern side of the waters of

the Tidal Harbour, of the North Half Tide Basin, and of the South Dock, to No. 4 Gates, at a point twenty yards due south of the south-western corner of the Dockmaster's House, thence in an easterly direction along the northern side of the water of the South Half Tide Basin and of the New South Harbour, to the sea at the south-eastern end of the New North-East Pier; all which space is coloured green on the Ordnance Map of that part of the county of Durham, which includes Sunderland, deposited at the Privy Council Office, a copy of which is deposited at the office of the Town Clerk of the borough of Sunderland;

And do hereby prescribe as follows :—

1. All foreign cattle (unless they are re-shipped in accordance with Article 2 of this Order) landed within the said defined part of the port shall be slaughtered within four days after the landing thereof, exclusive of the day of landing, unless they are taken to a licensed market or sale within that defined part within such four days, and they shall be so taken if a market or sale is held there within the said period of four days, but if there is no such licensed market or sale within that defined part, or if no such market or sale is held there within the said period of four days, then all such foreign cattle shall be slaughtered within that defined part within the said period of four days.

2. Foreign cattle landed within the said defined part may, under such regulations as the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Customs from time to time prescribe, be re-shipped therefrom and conveyed by sea direct to the port of Newcastle-upon-Tyne, North Shields, Hartlepool, or Middlesborough.

3. Cattle other than foreign cattle within the said defined part shall not be removed therefrom alive, and cattle so re-shipped shall continue to be deemed foreign cattle.

## TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed  
in the fourth year of the reign of Her present  
Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of

the duties of postage," power is given to the  
Commissioners of Her Majesty Treasury from  
time to time, by Warrant under their hands, to  
alter and fix any of the rates of British postage  
payable by law on the transmission by the post of  
foreign or colonial letters or newspapers, or of  
any other printed papers, and to subject the same  
to rates of postage according to the weight thereof,  
and a scale of weight to be contained in such  
Warrant, and from time to time, by Warrant as  
aforesaid, to alter or repeal any such altered rates,  
and make and establish any new or other rates in  
lieu thereof, and from time to time, by Warrant  
as aforesaid, to appoint at what time the rates  
which may be payable are to be paid.

And whereas further powers are given to the  
Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury by  
another Act of Parliament passed in the eleventh  
year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled  
"An Act for giving further facilities for the  
transmission of letters by post, and for the  
regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for  
other purposes relating to the post office."

And whereas it is expedient to alter the rates  
of British postage now payable upon certain  
letters in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

Now, we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's  
Treasury, in exercise of the powers vested in us  
in and by the said recited Acts, and each of them,  
and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf,  
do, by this Warrant, under the hands of two of  
us, the said Commissioners, by the authority of  
the statute in that case made and provided, order,  
direct, and declare as follows;—

1. On every letter not exceeding one half of  
an ounce in weight, transmitted between the  
ports of Trieste and Alexandria by Austrian  
packet boat, and further transmitted between  
Suez and any port in the East Indies, China,  
Australia, or New Zealand, by British packet  
boat, and on every letter not exceeding one half  
of an ounce in weight, posted at the Austrian  
Post Office in Alexandria, addressed to any place  
in the East Indies, China, Australia, or New  
Zealand, or posted in any place in the East Indies,  
China, Australia, or New Zealand, and forwarded  
from thence in a mail addressed to Trieste or the  
Austrian Post Office in Alexandria, and trans-  
mitted by British packet boat between Suez and  
any port in the East Indies, China, Australia, or  
New Zealand, without in any of such cases passing  
through the United Kingdom, there shall be  
charged, taken, and paid, for such transmission  
thereof respectively between Suez and any port  
in the East Indies, China, Australia, or New  
Zealand, an uniform rate of British postage of  
sixpence.

2. On every letter so transmitted as herein-  
before mentioned, exceeding one half of an ounce  
in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid  
the several further and additional and progressive  
rates of British postage, according to the scale of  
weight and number of rates hereinafter mentioned;  
that is to say:—

On every such letter exceeding one half of an  
ounce in weight, and not exceeding one ounce  
in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and  
paid two rates of postage;

And on every such letter, if exceeding one  
ounce, and not exceeding one ounce and the  
half of another ounce in weight, three rates  
of postage;

And on every such letter, if exceeding one  
ounce and the half of another ounce, and not  
exceeding two ounces in weight, four rates  
of postage;



And for every additional half of an ounce in weight of any such letter above the weight of two ounces, there shall be charged, taken, and paid one additional rate of postage; and every fractional part of such additional half of an ounce in weight shall be charged as an additional half of an ounce in weight; and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this Warrant shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such letter would be charged with under this Warrant, if not exceeding one half of an ounce in weight.

3. Nothing herein contained shall be construed in anywise to annul, prejudice, or affect any of the exemptions or privileges granted by the said first hereinbefore recited Act, or to annul, prejudice, or affect any of the privileges which seamen and soldiers employed in Her Majesty's Service are now by law entitled to of sending and receiving by the post, letters not exceeding one-half of an ounce in weight, subject to the regulations and restrictions made and in force for the time being in respect of the same.

4. The term "East Indies," used in this Warrant, shall be construed to mean every port or place in Her Majesty's dominions in Asia (except Australia and New Zealand), and the several other terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as they would have had if inserted in the said first hereinbefore recited Act.

5. The rates of British postage fixed by this present Warrant, on the letters transmitted as herein mentioned shall be in lieu of those now chargeable thereon, under or by virtue of a certain Warrant of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury bearing date the 22nd day of December, 1865, which last mentioned rates shall be and the same are hereby revoked and repealed.

6. The Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury, may by Warrant under their hands, duly made at any time hereafter, alter, repeal, or revoke any of the rates of postage hereby altered or the regulations hereby made, and may make and establish any new or other rates or regulations in lieu thereof, and from time to time may appoint at what time the rates which may be payable are to be paid.

7. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight.
