Legharne, March 10. The Great Duke is very well recovered of his late illness, and has given Audience to an Envoy from the Baffa of Tunn, who arrived here about the beginning of this Month: But the Business he is fent upon is not yet publickly known. to turn their greatest Force against the Venetians.

Danizick, March 16. They write from Poland, that the breaking up of the Diet, which was affembled at Grodno, without coming to a Determination in any of the matters that were proposed to them, has greatly disap-pointed the measures the King had formed for a vigorous Profecution of the War against the Turks; but that it was hoped things would be managed with a better temper in the Convocation appointed to be held at Warfam, and such Resolutions taken there, as may obviate the Inconveniencies the publick Affairs may otherwise suffer from this ill succeess of the Diet. That Prince James, the King's eldest Son, was gone to Lemberg, upon the Advice that came from the Frontiers, that the Tartars

Vienna, March 21. The Officers that had leave to come hither to make their Preparations for the Campagne, are most of them returned to their Commands, with Directions to have their Troops in a readiness to march upon the first Orders they shall receive for that purpose. The Regiments that are commanded towards Effecke will embark at Pest, and so pass down the Danube, while the Horse marches by Land. A Captain is arrived here from Effecke, who reports, that there was a very good Gari-fon in that place, with all things necessary for their de-tence. That leveral Turks, who deferted from allow Regalis, were daily taken by the Imperial Parties, and that upon their Examination they all declared, That the Garison of Alba Regala suffered very much through the scarcity of Provisions, but that the Balla endeavoured to encourage them with the Affurances of a speedy relief; and shewed, on all occasions, a Resolution to make a vigorous desence Besides the Regiment of 1500 Men; which the Elector of Saxony is to affif the Emperors with this Campagne, the Duke of Meckenburgh has agreed to fend a Regiment of 1000, and 2000 Men are expected from the Elector of Cologne, and 1 700 from the Landgrave of Heffe.

Vienna, March 25. The Duke of Lorrain is expected here in few days, for, according to the last advice we had from Inspruck, his Highness will part from thence to morrow, intending, after a very short stay at this Court, to continue his Journey to Hungary. The Troops begin to move towards Esseck, where a Camp is going to be formed for the execution of some great delign: We have an account from thence, that the Turks of Belgrade have put a small Convoy of Provisions and Ammunition, with Re-inforcement of 200 Janifaries into Illocke, which had formewhat encourages that Garifori, who were at work to fire gthen the place with feveral new Portifications: On Advice that came from the Frontiers, that the Tartars were not only preparing to put a Convoy of Provisions into Gaminico, but that they had likewife a design to make a great Incursion into the Province of Volhinia; for which purpose they were drawing together in very considerable numbers.

Madrid, March 11. The Count de Colobrat, Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor, is arrived here to acquaint his Catholick Majesty with the Coronation of the King of Hungary. We have an account from Carearant that a Vessel of Barbary was lately cast away on that Coast, and that of the Persons that were in her, 80 were taken

Men, from their Quarters in the Lower Hingary and the Neighbouring Countries. They write from Transilvan.a., that all Differences are adjusted between the Imperialists and the States of that Countrey; and that the former live in avery good Correspondence with Prince alagand his Subjects. We have Advice from Conft an aimple, by the way of Belgrade, that things continued there in much disorder; and that the Faction which endeavoured to depote the new Sultan, and to let up the Son of Ma-

bonnet IV. became every day more powerful.

Cologne, March 28. The Elector of Cologne recovers daily, and his Physitians give us great hopes that he will now very quickly be perfectly well. The 1500 Men, which his Electoral Highness is to send to the Assistance of the Emperor, are ordered to be drawn out of the Cavisons of Bonn, Rhinberg, and some other places, and will begin their march about the middle of the next Month. The last Letters from Hungary told us, the Balla of Alba Regalis was so far from hewing any Inclination to capitulate, that he had declared, upon the summons that was fent him by the Imperialitie. That he and the whole Garison were resolved to desend the place to the last extremity; and that they doubted not to convince those that should attack them, that they were not in so ill a Condition as was given out. The same Advices add, That General Caraffa had ordered three Regiments of Horse to march towards Cronstadt, to join with the Hospodars of Valachia and Moldavia, in case they perfissed in their resolution of putting themselves under the Emperor's Protection and declaring against the Turks: And that General Caraffa was marching himself with a strong Detachement towards Effeck, to observe the Enemies niotions, who are drawing together on that fide.

Hague, April 2. The States-General have named the Heer Van Duyvenvoorden, and the Heer Van Amer ngen, to go and meet and Complement, on their part, the Elector of Saxony, who is coming hither; and they will part from hence on Monday or Tuefday next. The Sieur Dieft, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Brandenburgh, has had a Conference with the Deputies of this State upon the Subject of his last Memorial. Prince Waldeske began his Journey yesterday for Cuylenburgh, from whence, after having dispatched some private Affairs, he intends to go to his Government of Maestriche, to give the necessary Orders about the new Fortifications that are making there; for the carrying on of which, the Countrey thereabouts is to furnish 9000 Crowns a year, till they have raised the Sum of 90000 Crowns, which, in the mean time, is taken up at Interest, that the said Fortifications may be finished out of hand.

Brussels, April 2. Our Governor-General, upon the Notice he received by the last Post from Holland, that the Elector of Saxony was expected in few days at the Hague, and that from thence he intended to come hither, has given Orders to have things prepared for his reception and Entertainment, which is defired to be at Tervenren We have an account from Liege, that the Elector of Cologne, who is now perfectly recovered, had fent to the Chapter of Liege, to let them know, that he had fome Matters to propole to them, and therefore required there to repair to Bonne presently after Easter; But that they had, on pretence of the Season, endeavoured to ex-cuse themselves from this Journey; Which, it was be-lieved, would hinder the Cardinal Coadjutor's going to Linge to foon as he before intended. We are likewife informed, that most of the Canons make a difficulty to declare in fayour of the Cardinal for the Coadjutorthip of Liege, till they have an Assurance, that the Pope will confirm his Eminence in that of Colome, which as yet there appears at Rome no great disposition to. They write from Germany, that the Treaty of Alliance lately concluded between the Crown of France and the House of Linenburgh is ratified, and the Ratifications exchanged.
