*By Her Majesty's Command.*

The Ladies, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing Rooms, at Buckingham Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance,

and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to The Queen.

## PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented to The Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that a letter from the Lady who is to make the presentation, stating it to be her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's Command, that no presentations shall be made at the Drawing Rooms, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

It is not expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at the Drawing Rooms, except in attendance on the Ladies of their families.

The State apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court at two o'clock.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

#### PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

WHEREAS by "The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862," it is enacted, that "whenever it is made to appear to Her Majesty, that the rules concerning the measurement of tonnage of merchant ships for the time being in force under the principal Act, have been adopted by the government of any

"foreign country, and are in force in that country, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by Order in Council, to direct that the ships of such foreign country, shall be deemed to be of the tonnage denoted in their certificates of registry or other national papers, and thereupon it shall no longer be necessary for such ships to be re-measured in any port or place in Her Majesty's dominions, but such ships shall be deemed to be of the tonnage denoted in their certificates of registry or other papers, in the same manner, to the same extent, and for the same purposes in, to, and for which the tonnage denoted in the certificates of registry of British ships is to be deemed the tonnage of such ships." And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty, that the rules concerning the measurement of tonnage of merchant ships now in force under "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," have been adopted by the Government of His Majesty the King of Denmark, and are in force in that country, and that such rules came into operation on the first of October, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven.

Her Majesty is hereby pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to direct, that the ships of Denmark, the certificates of Danish nationality and registry of which are dated on and after the said first of October, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, shall be deemed to be of the tonnage denoted in the said certificates of Danish nationality and registry.

And whereas by the same Act it is also enacted that in relation to any Dockyard Port, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council from time to time, by Order in Council, to make regulations for all or any of the purposes therein particularly mentioned, and for such other purposes as from time to time seem necessary, with a view to the proper protection of Her Majesty's Vessels, Dockyards, or Property, or to the requirements of Her Majesty's Naval Service:

And whereas the Harbour of Queenstown is a Dockyard Port within the meaning of the said Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers in this behalf by the said Act or otherwise in Her vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. This Order shall take effect on the expiration of thirty days from its publication in the London Gazette.
2. On this Order taking effect, all rules, orders, and regulations of the Admiralty, relative to the matters comprised in this Order, shall cease to operate.
3. Terms used in this Order have the same meaning as in the said Act.

4. No merchant or other private vessel shall be moored, anchored, or placed within the space (to be called the Man-of-War Outer Anchorage) bounded as follows, namely:—

On the north by an imaginary straight line drawn from the Scotch Church well open to the northward of the Pile Lighthouse on the Spit Bank.

On the south by an imaginary straight line formed by the southwest end of Haulbowline Island and the Old Quay on Spike Island touching each other.

On the east and west by the contour line of three fathoms depth at low-water spring tides;

Or within the space (to be called the Man-of-War Inner anchorage) bounded as follows, namely:—

On the east by an imaginary straight line drawn from the Club House on the West Quay in a south-by-east direction by compass, forming a tangent with the east end of Spike Island.

On the west by an imaginary straight line drawn in a similar south-by-east direction from White Point towards the west end of Haulbowline Island.

On the north by the contour line of three fathoms depth at low-water spring tides.

On the south by low-water mark on Haulbowline Spit Bank;

which anchorages respectively are delineated and further described on the chart annexed to this Order; and those anchorages together shall be demed to constitute, for the purposes of the said Act and of this Order, the dockyard port of Queenstown (in this Order called the Port).

5. A fairway shall be kept clear to the eastward of the fairway buoys, as shown on the said chart, by all merchant and other private vessels.

6. No merchant or other private vessel shall, without licence in writing from the Port Admiral, Captain Superintendent, or Queen's Harbour Master, be moored or fastened to any of Her Majesty's moorings, buoys, piles, or vessels in the port, unless forced thereto by unavoidable accident.

7. No merchant or other private vessel shall, without licence as aforesaid, be moored, anchored, or placed in the port within one hundred yards from any part of Her Majesty's moorings, or from any of Her Majesty's docks, dockyards, arsenals, wharfs, vessels, or hulks, or be moored, anchored, or placed in the port in the fair way so as to obstruct the passage or entrance into the port, unless forced thereto by unavoidable accident.

8. If at any time any merchant or other private vessel hooks any of Her Majesty's moorings, the master of such vessel shall not proceed to unhook the same, but shall forthwith give notice to the Queen's Harbour Master, or to the Chief Officer of the nearest of Her Majesty's dockyards, in order that aid may be given for clearing the moorings without damage.

9. The master of every merchant or other private vessel to which this Order relates shall observe and cause to be observed the provisions of this Order as far as it relates to his vessel; and if any master or other person acts in any respect in contravention of any of the provisions of this Order, or fails to observe or cause to be observed in any respect any of those provisions, he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds.

And the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers in this behalf, by the said Act or otherwise in her vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. This Order shall take effect on the expiration of thirty days from its publication in the London Gazette.

2. On this Order taking effect, all rules, orders, and regulations of the Admiralty relative to the matters comprised in this Order shall cease to operate.

3. Terms used in this Order have the same meaning as in the said Act.

4. No merchant or other private vessel shall be moored, anchored, or placed within the limits following, namely,—

Within sixty fathoms from any part of the south-western shore of the Thames between the north end of the wharf of Her Majesty's Victualling Yard at Deptford and a spot on the same shore situate at a distance of forty fathoms below the lower side of the entrance of Deptford Creek.

5. No merchant or other private vessel shall be moored, anchored, or placed within forty fathoms from the entire of any of Her Majesty's moorings in any part of the Thames from the Nore upwards.

6. If at any time a merchant or other private vessel hooks any of Her Majesty's moorings, the master of such vessel shall not proceed to unhook the same, but shall forthwith give notice to the Queen's Harbour Master, or to the chief officer of the nearest of Her Majesty's dockyards, in order that aid may be given for clearing the mooring without damage.

7. No merchant or other private vessel, being light or drawing less than eight feet of water, shall anchor or moor in the mid-channel or fair stream of the tide in any part of the Thames from the Nore upwards, as far up as where any of Her Majesty's moorings are placed.

8. No vessel laid by or neglected as unfit for sea service shall lie within the limits prescribed in Article 4 of this Order.

9. The master of every merchant or other private vessel to which this Order relates shall observe and cause to be observed, the provisions of this Order, as far as relates to his vessel; and if any master or other person acts in any respect

in contravention of any of the provisions of this Order, or fails to observe or cause to be observed in any respect any of those provisions, he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds.

And the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

1. This Order shall take effect on the expiration of thirty days from its publication in the London Gazette.

2. On this Order taking effect, all rules, orders, and regulations of the Admiralty relative to the matters comprised in this Order shall cease to operate.

3. Terms used in this Order have the same meaning as in the said Act.

4. No merchant or other private vessel (except such as are engaged in the service of the dockyard) shall be anchored between the dockyard and any of Her Majesty's vessels moored off the dockyard.

5. No merchant or other private vessel shall, without licence in writing from the Superintendent of the dockyard, be moored or fastened to any of Her Majesty's moorings, buoys, piles, or vessels at or near the dockyard, unless forced thereto by unavoidable accident.

6. If at any time any merchant or other private vessel hooks any of Her Majesty's moorings, the master of the vessel shall not proceed to unhook the same, but shall forthwith give notice to the Superintendent of the dockyard, in order that aid may be given for clearing the mooring without damage.

7. A merchant or other private paddle-wheel steamer, while passing within the following limits, namely, between the north-west angle of the dockyard near Charlton Pier, and the eastern or lower end of the dockyard wharf wall, shall not proceed at a rate exceeding five miles an hour over the ground.

8. The master of every merchant or other private vessel to which this Order relates shall

observe, and cause to be observed, the provisions of this Order as far as it relates to his vessel ; and if any master or other person acts in any respect in contravention of any of the provisions of this Order, or fails to observe, or cause to be observed, in any respect any of those provisions, he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds.

And the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers in this behalf by the said Act or otherwise in Her vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :—

1. This Order shall take effect on the expiration of thirty days from its publication in the London Gazette.

2. On this Order taking effect all rules, orders, and regulations of the Admiralty relative to the matters comprised in this Order shall cease to operate.

3. Terms used in this Order have the same meaning as in the said Act.

4. For the purposes of the said Act and this Order, the limits of the Dockyard Port of Chatham and Sheerness (in this Order called the Port) shall be deemed to be as follows, that is to say :—

From the Great Nore up the Medway as far as the tide flows, namely, to the first lock on that river situate between Aylesford Bridge and Allington Castle.

5. All merchant and other private vessels at Sheerness shall anchor only at the following place, namely :—

To the westward of an imaginary straight line drawn from a white beacon situate at the Boat House on Cockleshell Hard, Grain Island, to a black beacon on Fleet Marsh, on the opposite side of the river, which beacons lie nearly N.N.E. and S.S.W. (magnetic). which line is delineated on the chart annexed to this Order.

6. No merchant or other private vessel shall, without licence in writing from the Port Admiral,

Captain - Superintendent, or Queen's Harbour Master, be moored or fastened to any of Her Majesty's moorings, buoys, piles, or vessels in the Port, unless forced thereto by unavoidable accident.

7. No merchant or other private vessel shall, without licence as aforesaid, be moored, anchored, or placed in the Port within one hundred yards from any part of Her Majesty's moorings, or from any of Her Majesty's docks, dockyards, arsenals, wharfs, vessels, or hulks, or within two hundred yards from any of Her Majesty's powder magazines, or be moored, anchored, or placed in the port in the fairway, or across the stream of the Medway, so as to obstruct the passage or entrance into the Port, unless forced thereto by unavoidable accident; but nothing in this Order shall prohibit or interfere with the mooring or placing of vessels in any place or manner authorized by or under any Act of Parliament relating to Sheerness Pier.

8. If at any time a merchant or other private vessel hooks any of Her Majesty's moorings, the master of such vessel shall not proceed to unhook the same, but shall forthwith give notice to the Queen's Harbour Master or to the chief officer of the nearest of Her Majesty's Dockyards in order that aid may be given for clearing the mooring without damage.

9. No merchant or other private vessel shall take on board in the Port within two hundred and fifty yards from any of Her Majesty's docks, dockyards, arsenals, powder magazines, or wharfs, gunpowder exceeding five pounds weight in the whole, or come within that distance having on board gunpowder exceeding the said weight; and any such vessel having so come within that distance under stress of weather shall unship and deliver any gunpowder on board exceeding the said weight, if so required by the Queen's Harbour Master.

10. No merchant or other private vessel shall be breamed in the Port within two hundred yards from any part of the powder magazines at Upnor, or within one hundred yards from any of Her Majesty's docks, dockyards, arsenals, wharfs, vessels, or hulks.

11. No fire shall be kept on board any merchant or other private vessel (except steam vessels) in the Port within two hundred yards from any of Her Majesty's docks, dockyards, arsenals, powder magazines, or wharfs, between eleven o'clock in the evening and five o'clock in the morning from the first of October to the thirty-first of March inclusive; or between eleven o'clock in the evening and four o'clock in the morning from the first of April to the thirtieth of September inclusive.

12. No pitch, tar, rosin, turpentine, grease, tallow, oil, or other combustible matter shall be boiled or heated on board any merchant or other private vessel in the port within two hundred and fifty yards from any of Her Majesty's vessels, or from any hired vessel in Her Majesty's service, or from any of Her Majesty's docks, dockyards, arsenals, powder magazines, or wharfs.

13. No ship's gun on board any merchant or other private vessel lying in the Port within the last-mentioned distance shall be kept loaded, nor shall any such gun on board any such vessel lying there be discharged before sunrise or after sunset.

14. No merchant or other private vessel shall be moored, anchored or placed within two hundred yards from any of the wharfs on the Medway belonging or attached to Upnor Castle, or from any part of Her Majesty's powder magazines at Upnor; and every merchant or other private

steam vessel when passing any part of those magazines shall keep as close as navigation will permit to the opposite bank of the river.

15. No merchant or other private steam vessel between Garrison Point, Sheerness, and the Town Pier of the Town, shall proceed at a greater rate of speed than five knots an hour over the ground.

16. The master of every merchant or other private vessel to which this Order relates shall observe and cause to be observed the provisions of this Order as far as it relates to his vessel; and if any master or other person acts in any respect in contravention of any of the provisions of this Order, or fails to observe or cause to be observed in any respect any of those provisions, he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds.

And the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

1. This Order shall take effect on the expiration of thirty days from its publication in the London Gazette.

2. On this Order taking effect, all rules, orders, and regulations of the Admiralty relative to the matters comprised in this Order shall cease to operate.

3. Terms used in this Order have the same meaning as in the said Act.

4. For the purposes of the said Act and this Order, the boundaries of the Port of Portsmouth shall be deemed to be as follows:—

On the east an imaginary straight line drawn from the Coast Guard station at  $1\frac{1}{2}$  nautical miles to the westward of Eastoke Point, and running eastward of the Dean Tail Buoy and Nab Light Vessel in a direction  $S. \frac{3}{4} W.$  (true) for a distance of  $7\frac{1}{2}$  nautical miles.

On the south a like line passing southward of the S.E. buoy of the Princessa Shoal, in a direction  $W. \frac{1}{4} N.$  (true) to high-water mark at Culver Cliff, on the eastern side of the Isle of Wight.

On the south-west the high-water mark of the eastern and northern shores of the Isle of Wight, from Culver Cliff to Old Castle Point.

On the west an imaginary straight line drawn from Old Castle Point to Hill Head Point.

On the north the line of high-water mark between Hill Head and the Coast Guard station near Eastoke Point;

which boundaries are delineated on the chart annexed to this Order.

5. For the purposes of this Order, the seaward boundary of the Harbour of Portsmouth (in this Order called the Harbour) shall be deemed to be as follows; namely:—An imaginary straight line drawn from Gillkicker Point to the Spit Buoy, and thence to Southsea Castle, which boundary is delineated on the said chart.

6. No merchant or other private vessel shall be moored, anchored, grounded, deposited, or run on shore in the fairway of the channel of the Harbour, or the passages leading into that fairway, between the Spit Buoy and Blockhouse Point on the west side, and between the buoy of the Boyne, Southsea Castle, and the Round Tower, on the east side.

7. No merchant or other private vessel shall make fast or lie at any of the buoys marking the Harbour channel.

8. No merchant or other private vessel shall, without licence in writing from the Port Admiral, Captain Superintendent, or Queen's Harbour Master, be moored or fastened to any of Her Majesty's moorings, buoys, piles, or vessels in the Harbour, unless forced there by unavoidable accident.

9. If at any time any merchant or other private vessel hooks any of Her Majesty's moorings, the master of the vessel shall not proceed to unhook the same, but shall forthwith give notice to the Queen's Harbour Master, or to the chief officer of the nearest of Her Majesty's Dockyards, in order that aid may be given for clearing the mooring without damage.

10. All merchant and other private vessels using the Harbour shall anchor, moor, or lie on the shore only at the following places within the Harbour, namely,—

On the Gosport shore, on that part of it which lies between an imaginary straight line drawn true east from the Hard at Gosport, and another such line drawn true east from the north corner of the wharf at Stony Steps, and extending into the Harbour to within 50 fathoms from the centre of any of Her Majesty's moorings:

On the Portsmouth shore, east of an imaginary straight line drawn from the low-water mark of the Point, Portsmouth, to within 30 fathoms from the Ordnance Buoy off the Gun wharf, leaving a passage for vessels to enter or come out of the Gun wharf Camber, and not approaching the piles in front of the Gun wharf nearer than forty feet.

11. Small vessels may discharge by permission of the Queen's Harbour Master between the Common Hard and that part of the Timber Pound called the Logs.

12. Masters of vessels in the service of Her Majesty's Government, or having Government cargoes on board, are, immediately on arrival, to report themselves to the Queen's Harbour Master, and take the berth assigned to them by him.

13. Pilot and fishing boats which frequent the Harbour shall occupy the south side of the first bend in Haslar Creek, or that part of the Gosport shore which lies between Blockhouse Point and

the Gosport pier; provided that they do not interfere with any of Her Majesty's vessels, moorings, or buoys, and that they leave a clear passage for any vessel into or out of the Creek at Haslar.

14. Yachts having the privilege of laying up in Haslar Creek shall so moor as to leave the channel clear, and the anchors by which they are moored shall be buried.

15. Merchant and other private vessels having jibbooms or running bowsprits shall run them in on entering the Harbour within Blockhouse Point, and keep them in until the day of their leaving the Harbour.

16. Any merchant or other private vessel above 5 tons compelled or allowed to anchor in or near any of the navigable channels of the Harbour shall not be left at any time without a ship-keeper.

17. Any merchant or other private steam vessel when within the Harbour inside Blockhouse Point shall not proceed at a greater rate of speed than five knots an hour over the ground.

18. No merchant or other private vessel shall be breamed in any part of the Harbour, except on the beach at Gosport or Blockhouse, at a distance of at least two hundred yards from any of Her Majesty's vessels or moorings.

19. No pitch, tar, rosin, turpentine, grease, tallow, oil, or other combustible matter shall be boiled or heated on board any merchant or other private vessel in the Harbour within two hundred and fifty yards from any of Her Majesty's vessels, or from any hired vessel in Her Majesty's service, or from any of Her Majesty's docks, dockyards, arsenals, powder magazines, or wharfs.

20. No fire shall be kept on board any merchant or other private vessel (except steam vessels) in the Harbour within the last-mentioned distance between eleven o'clock in the evening and five o'clock in the morning from the first of October to the thirty-first of March inclusive, or between eleven o'clock in the evening and four o'clock in the morning from the first of April to the thirtieth of September inclusive.

21. No ship's gun on board any merchant or other private vessel lying in the Harbour within the last-mentioned distance shall be kept loaded, nor shall any such gun on board any such vessel lying there be discharged before sun-rise or after sun-set.

22. No merchant or other private vessel shall come into the Harbour laden with gunpowder, or having on board any quantity of gunpowder exceeding five pounds weight in the whole; and all gunpowder exceeding that weight on board any such vessel coming into the Harbour shall be deposited at Blockhouse Fort, on the western side of the entrance to the Harbour.

23. No vessel laid by or neglected as unfit for sea service shall lie within any part of the Harbour except on the shore between the point lying due east (true) of Whale Island and Kingston Cemetery Wall.

24. The master of every merchant or other private vessel to which this Order relates shall observe and cause to be observed the provisions of this Order as far as it relates to his vessel, and if any master or other person acts in any respect in contravention of any of the provisions of this Order, or fails to observe or cause to be observed in any respect any of those provisions, he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds.

And the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

**W**HEREAS by "The Dockyard Ports Regulation Act, 1865," it is enacted (among other things), that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council from time to time by Order in Council to define the limits of a Dockyard Port for the purposes of that Act :

And whereas by the same Act it is also enacted that in relation to any Dockyard Port it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council from time to time by Order in Council to make regulations for all or any of the purposes in the said Act particularly mentioned, and for such other purposes as from time to time seem necessary, with a view to the proper protection of Her Majesty's Vessels, Dockyards, or Property, or to the requirements of Her Majesty's Naval Service :

And whereas the Port of Plymouth is a Dockyard Port within the meaning of the said Act :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers in this behalf by the said Act or otherwise in Her vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered as follows :—

*Preliminary.*

1. This Order shall take effect on the expiration of thirty days from its publication in the London Gazette.
2. On this Order taking effect, all rules, orders, and regulations of the Admiralty relative to the matters comprised in this Order shall cease to operate.
3. Terms used in this Order have the same meaning as in the said Act.

## PLYMOUTH SOUND.

4. Her Majesty's vessels of war shall exclusively occupy the Outer Anchorage in Plymouth Sound within and near the Breakwater.

5. Merchant and other private vessels shall occupy the Inner Anchorage in Plymouth Sound, within a space (to be called the Merchant Vessels' Anchorage), bounded by the following imaginary straight lines, namely :—

To the northward of a line drawn from Ram's Cliff Point, towards the west :

To the southward of a line drawn from Mount Edgcumbe House, through the Canteen on Drake's Island, to the eastern shore of Plymouth Sound :

To the eastward of a line drawn from the east end of Windsor-terrace, in the town of Plymouth, to the Trinity Obelisk on the Hoe, and continuing through the whitewashed sea-mark on the rocks, to the before-mentioned line drawn from Ram's Cliff Point :

which anchorage is delineated and further described on the Chart annexed to this Order.

6. No merchant or other private vessel shall be anchored or placed in the navigable channel on the west side of the Inner Anchorage aforesaid.

7. No merchant or other private vessel shall be anchored or moored between the Island and Main at a less distance than fifty fathoms to the southward of the Transporting Buoy within the Island, or in any place off the east end of the Island, near the Buoy of the Asia Shoal, or between it and the Buoy of the Winter, or near the Fair Way, or in any place to the eastward of

an imaginary straight line drawn from the Asia Buoy to the Melampus Buoy.

## HAMOAZE.

8. For the purposes of this Order the harbour of Hamoaze shall be deemed to be comprised within an imaginary straight line drawn from the Old Block House on the Devil's Point the south end of the battery on Wilderness Point, which line is drawn on the chart annexed to this Order.

9. A merchant or other private vessel shall not be anchored or moored in the Fair Way between the Queen's moorings in the Harbour of Hamoaze, or in Barnpool, within 50 fathoms from the centre of any of those moorings, or within that distance from any of Her Majesty's vessels, floating magazines, or hulks lying thereat, or in the front or abreast of any of Her Majesty's Docks, Arsenals, or Dockyards, or of Her Majesty's Gun Wharf, or between the same and the eastern line of hulks, unless she is forced thereto by unavoidable accident or is consigned to the Dockyards or Gun Wharf, and in the latter case she shall be subject to the directions of the Queen's Harbour Master.

10. No merchant or other private vessel shall be made fast to or be moored or secured by any of the mooring anchors or chains to which access can be had when the tide is out on either the eastern or the western shore of the Harbour of Hamoaze, or be made fast to any of the buoys or piles belonging to Her Majesty within the Harbour in front of any of the Arsenals, Docks, or Dockyards, or of the Gun Wharf, or of the buildings or lands connected therewith respectively, or be anchored or moored so as to swing within fifty fathoms of any of the said buoys or piles.

11. No merchant or other private vessel shall be anchored or moored in any place within the Harbour of Hamoaze except on the eastern side of Stonehouse Pool, and not further to the westward than an imaginary straight line drawn from the south-west pier of the entrance to the basin in the Royal William Victualling Yard to the granite steps near the south-west corner of the premises directly opposite, at Richmond Walk ; and a channel for boats and barges shall be kept clear from Hamoaze to the Admiral's Hard, and up Stonehouse Creek to the Royal Naval and Military Hospitals above Stonehouse Bridge.

12. No merchant or other private vessel shall be anchored, moored, or placed nearer any of the wharfs of the Royal William Victualling Yard than sixty fathoms, or within the line of mooring buoys as laid down at the date of this Order or at any time thereafter.

13. Nothing, however, in the foregoing provisions shall be deemed to exclude such vessels as require admission to the wharfs, docks, and other establishments at Mutton Cove, North Corner, New Passage, and elsewhere, for loading and unloading cargoes ; and all such vessels shall continue to enjoy their accustomed privileges in this respect as fully as if this Order had not been made, provided they do not impede or interfere with the navigation of Her Majesty's vessels.

14. No merchant or other private vessel shall be breamed in any part of the Harbour of Hamoaze, except on the shore of Stonehouse Pool or at Frank's Quarry, or to the northward of the Queen's moorings.

15. No merchant or other private vessel shall come into the Harbour of Hamoaze being laden with gunpowder, or having on board any quantity of gunpowder exceeding five pounds weight in the whole ; and any gunpowder exceeding that quantity on board any ship intending to come into the Harbour shall be deposited at a depôt established

for that purpose on St. Nicholas' Island at the entrance of the Harbour.

16. Every merchant or other private steam vessel when passing the Powder Magazine at Bull Point shall keep as close as navigation will permit to the opposite bank.

17. Nothing in this Order shall affect the authority of the Pier Master at Mill Bay Pier or of the Dock Master of the Great Western Docks under the respective Acts of Parliament relative thereto.

#### CATWATER.

18. All fore-and-aft-rigged merchant and other private vessels taking shelter in Catwater, and drawing less than eleven feet of water, shall anchor either on the flat in Clovelly Bay or above Turnchapel Rock, and shall place buoys on their anchors, and moor with a kedge, and rig in their jibbooms.

19. Merchant and other private vessels, if drawing eleven feet of water or upwards and less than sixteen feet, shall moor on the flat between Turnchapel Rock and Mount Batten; if drawing sixteen feet of water or upwards, shall moor in tiers below and above Turnchapel Rock with their stern cables made fast to the shore and their jibbooms rigged in, yards topped, and spritsail yards fore and aft.

20. An open channel of not less than fifty fathoms in width on the north side of the Harbour shall be kept clear for the navigation of vessels from the entrance of Catwater up towards the Bear's Head and Turnchapel Rock, and as far as Her Majesty's Breakwater Establishment at Oreston; and no merchant or other private vessel shall anchor in or obstruct this channel.

21. Merchant and other private vessels frequenting the Port of Plymouth and anchoring in Deadman's Bay shall leave a clear passage of fifty fathoms at least open between them and the sailing vessels occupying the south side of the Harbour.

22. The limits of Catwater for the anchoring and placing of vessels shall be marked out as follows:—

To the eastward of an imaginary straight line from Fisher's Nose to the west point of Mount Batten.

To the southward of another such line from Fisher's Nose to Queen Anne's Battery.

#### Penalties.

23. The master of every merchant or other private vessel to which this Order relates shall observe and cause to be observed the provisions of this Order as far as it relates to his vessel; and if any master or other person acts in any respect in contravention of any of the provisions of this Order, or fails to observe or cause to be observed in any respect any of those provisions, he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds.

And the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers in this behalf by the said Act, or otherwise, in Her vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. This Order shall take effect on the expiration of thirty days from its publication in the London Gazette.

2. On this Order taking effect all rules, orders, and regulations of the Admiralty relative to the matters comprised in, this Order shall cease to operate.

3. Terms used in this Order have the same meaning as in the said Act.

4. A merchant or other private vessel shall not be moored, anchored, or placed in the Harbour of Pembroke (in this Order called the Harbour) within the following limits namely:—

An imaginary straight line extending from the shore at the north-west angle of Fort Pater to the White Buoy at the Carr Spit, and thence eastward to the Red Buoy at the Dockyard Bank, and thence to the Black Buoy on the Dockyard Bank, and thence to the south shore at the Camber in the Dockyard, near its eastern extremity,—

unless she is forced thereto by unavoidable accident, or unless she is consigned to the Dockyard (in which latter case she shall be subject to the directions of the Queen's Harbour Master).

The limits of the Harbour are delineated on the Chart annexed to this Order.

5. The Queen's Harbour Master may direct the removal of any merchant or other private vessel that is at any time so moored, anchored, or placed in the North Channel off the Dockyard as to obstruct the passage of any vessel employed by Her Majesty's Government in the conveyance of troops or of stores or other things between the Dockyard and Hobbs Point, or of any of Her Majesty's vessels.

6. No merchant or other private vessel shall be made fast to, or moored, or secured by any of the mooring anchors or chains to which access can be had when the tide is out, or be made fast to any of the buoys or piles belonging to Her Majesty within the Harbour, in front of the Dockyard or property belonging to it, or be anchored or moored so as to swing within any of the said buoys or piles.

7. No merchant or other private vessel shall be breamed in any part of the Harbour of Milford except on the shore at Pembroke, or to the westward of the Pennarmouth and eastward of Pembroke Ferry.

8. No merchant or other private vessel shall come into the Harbour above Milford laden with gunpowder, or having on board any quantity of gunpowder exceeding five pounds weight in the whole; and all gunpowder exceeding that weight on board any such vessel shall be deposited at the



depôt established for that purpose on board Her Majesty's vessel *Andromache* (or other vessel for the time being set apart for the purpose), moored to the eastward of the quarantine ground, nearly opposite the town of Milford, which vessel may be distinguished during the day by wearing a red burgee.

But this provision does not apply to any vessel having on board gunpowder not exceeding two tons in weight, and keeping to the northward of the beacon on the Carr Rocks, or having on board gunpowder not exceeding one ton in weight for the use of the stone quarries and town of Pembroke, and passing up Pennar Pill.

9. Any quantity of gunpowder exceeding five pounds in weight in the whole, shall not be landed between the town of Milford and Lawrenny Ferry, or below Bentlass in Pennar Pill, or from any part of the south side of the Harbour of Milford above Bullwell.

10. The master of every merchant or other private vessel to which this Order relates, shall observe and cause to be observed, the provisions of this Order, as far as it relates to his vessel; and if any master or other person acts in any respect in contravention of any of the provisions of this Order, or fails to observe or cause to be observed in any respect any of those provisions, he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds.

And the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

**W**HEREAS, by "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," it is enacted that "Her Majesty may, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, reduce all or any of the dues for the time being payable in respect of existing or future lighthouses, buoys, or beacons, for the time being under the management of the General Lighthouse Authorities" therein mentioned (that is to say, the Corporation of the Trinity House of Deptford Strond, the Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses, and the Port of Dublin Corporation); "and may also, by and with the like advice, from time to time, increase or vary any of such dues, so that no dues payable in respect of any lighthouse, buoy, or beacon existing at the time when the said Act came into operation, should be made to exceed the amount which had at any period previous to such time been received in respect thereof, or to which the said dues might, during any part of such period as last aforesaid, lawfully have been raised:"

And whereas by an Order in Council made in pursuance of the said Act, on the first of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, Her Majesty approved of certain new consolidated tables of light duties, together with certain abatements, regulations, and exemptions contained therein, and in such tables it is directed that until Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, may see fit otherwise to determine, there should be allowed to every person paying such tolls as

are specified in the said tables, an abatement or discount upon the amount payable by him, of sixty per cent. in the case of every over-sea vessel and of every coasting vessel:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," and of every other power enabling Her in this behalf, and, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to determine and direct that, on and after the first day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, the abatement or discount to be allowed upon the amount of tolls specified in the said new tables of consolidated light duties mentioned in the said Order in Council of the first day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and upon the amount of tolls specified in the said other Orders in Council hereinbefore referred to, shall, in the case of every over-sea vessel, and of every coasting vessel, be fifty per cent. and no more.

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter sixty; of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a representation, bearing date the twenty-eighth day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter sixty; of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty,

chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish of the Holy Trinity, Batley Carr, and of the consolidated chapelry of Saint Mark, Dewsbury, both in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the eleventh day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-two, and published in the London Gazette on the twenty-fifth day of October, in the same year, a part of the parish of Dewsbury, in the said county and diocese, was assigned as a district chapelry to the church of the Holy Trinity, situate at Batley Carr, in the same parish, and such district chapelry was named 'The District Chapelry of the Holy Trinity, Batley Carr.'

"And whereas the said district chapelry of the Holy Trinity, Batley Carr, has, under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, since become a new parish of the character contemplated by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven.

"And whereas by the authority of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the twenty-eighth day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, and published in the London Gazette on the first day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, certain contiguous portions of the said new parish of the Holy Trinity, Batley Carr, and of the said parish of Dewsbury, were assigned as a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Mark, situate in the said new parish of the Holy Trinity, Batley Carr, and such consolidated chapelry is called 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Mark, Dewsbury.'

"And whereas it has been proposed to us and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of the Holy Trinity, Batley Carr, and of the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Mark, Dewsbury, should be respectively altered in manner and from the date hereinafter mentioned.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Robert, Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon, as such Bishop, and also as patron, in right of his See, of the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Mark, Dewsbury, and with the consent of the Right Honourable Edward Geoffrey, Earl of Derby, First Lord of your Majesty's Treasury, acting on behalf of your Majesty as the patron in right of the crown of the vicarage of the parish of Dewsbury aforesaid, and with the consent of the Reverend Arthur Drummond Wilkins, Clerk, the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Dewsbury, and as such vicar or incumbent, the patron of the perpetual curacy of the said new parish of the Holy Trinity, Batley Carr, and with the consent of the Reverend Samuel Vaughan, Clerk, the incumbent of the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Mark, Dewsbury (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent that, in our opinion, it would be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of the Holy Trinity, Batley Carr, and of the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Mark, Dewsbury, should without any proceeding or any assurance in the law other than this representation, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, be respectively altered so as to dis sever from the said new parish, and annex to the said consolidated chapelry, all that part of the said new parish of the

Holy Trinity, Batley Carr, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed and is thereon coloured green, provided that such alteration, severance, and annexation, shall take effect upon and from the day of the date of the avoidance which shall next hereafter take place in the incumbency of the said new parish of the Holy Trinity, Batley Carr, and not sooner.

"And we humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration; and to make such Order in respect thereto, as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The territory proposed to be annexed to the consolidated chapelry of Saint Mark, Dewsbury (sometime part of the new parish of the Holy Trinity, Batley Carr, in the county of York and in the diocese of Ripon, and of the parish of Dewsbury, in the same county and diocese), being:—

"All that part of the said new parish of the Holy Trinity, Batley Carr, which is bounded on the south-east, and on the greater part of the south-west, by the consolidated chapelry of Saint Mark, Dewsbury aforesaid, and on all other sides, that is to say, on the remaining part of the south-west, on the north, and on the east, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said consolidated chapelry from the said new parish, at the junction of that part of the Wakefield and Halifax turnpike-road which is called Maulkroyd-lane with the footpath leading to Upper Boothroyd; and extending thence, northward, for a distance of one chain, or thereabouts, diagonally across the said turnpike-road, to a boundary stone inscribed 'D. St. M. C. FELLING (COUNTY DURHAM).—ORDER SETTLING THE BOUNDARIES OF A FELLING DISTRICT, IN THE COUNTY OF DURHAM, FOR THE PURPOSES OF THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT, 1858.

WHEREAS a Petition has been duly presented to me, as one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, from ratepayers resident within such part of the district chapelry of Christ Church, Felling, in the township of Heworth, in the county of Durham, as is not situate in the borough of Gateshead, as set forth in such petition, praying me to settle and fix the boundaries of a district to be styled the "Felling District," for the purposes of the Local Government Act, 1858.

And whereas the said petition was duly signed, as required by the said Act, and set forth, likewise, the proposed boundaries of the district sought to be formed under its provisions; and inquiry has now been duly made by Arnold Taylor, Esquire, the Inspector appointed by me for such purpose, and he has reported to me thereon.

Now, therefore, I, as one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State as aforesaid, having

taken the said petition and report into consideration, do hereby, in pursuance of the powers vested in me by the Local Government Act, 1858, make order as follows:—

1. That from and after the date of this present order, the boundaries hereinafter set forth and described and delineated on the plan referred to in and accompanying the said Inspector's report to me, bearing date the 3rd day of March, 1868, form and constitute the boundaries of the district to be called the Felling District, for the purposes of the Local Government Act, 1858, and that the parts included in such boundaries so described and delineated shall, for the purposes of such Act, be deemed to be a place having a known and defined boundary, and may adopt the said Act accordingly.

The aforesaid boundaries commence at the point A, on the aforesaid plan, on the easterly boundary line of the borough of Gateshead, and passes thence in a northerly direction, and along such boundary line, to the point B on the River Tyne, near the Friar's Goose Ferry, and at the point of low water of lowest spring tides; thence, in an easterly direction, along such line of low water mark to the point C, at or near Heworth Shore Ferry; thence, southerly, along and including the passage or way leading from such last-named ferry to the point D, on the north side of the Felling Shore-road; thence, easterly, along and including such last-named road to the point E, at Stony Gate-lane End; thence, southerly, along and including such last-named road to the point F, on the south side of the turnpike road leading from Sunderland to Gateshead; thence, westerly, along and including such last-named road to the point G, at Holly Hill road; thence, westerly, along and including such last-named road to the point H; thence, in a straight line westerly, and crossing Windy Nook-lane to the point I, on the footpath on the south side of Split Crow-lane; thence, westerly, along and including such last-named road, but excluding the footpath on the south side of the road, to the starting point at A, so completing the boundary of the proposed district of Felling.

2. That W. W. Pattinson, Esq., of Felling aforesaid, be Summoning Officer, and take forthwith all such steps as may be necessary under the hereinbefore recited Act for convening a meeting of the ratepayers of the said district of Felling, to decide as to the adoption of the Local Government Act, 1858, within the boundaries of such district as fixed and settled by this present Order.

(No. 14.)—BELGIUM.

### *Alteration of Lights in the Schelde River.*

THE Belgium Government has given notice, that, during the month of January, 1868, the following alterations of lights in the Wieling channel, at the mouth of the Schelde river, would take place:

1. The light vessel near the Paadmarkt bank has been removed.
2. The temporary light on the point Nieuwe Sluis has been discontinued.
3. A light vessel, in lieu of the Paadmarkt light vessel, has been placed, near the black buoy No. 2, in  $4\frac{3}{4}$  fathoms water in a line with the towns of Lissewege and Bruges, from which a light will be exhibited.

The light is a *red flashing* light, elevated 39 feet above the level of the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 9 miles.

The vessel is painted *red* with the word *Wielingen* in large white letters on both sides; during the day two distinguishing pyramidal truncated cones will be hoisted below the lantern. In foggy weather a bell is sounded on board.

4. At the same time, two lights will be exhibited from the sea bank at Nieuwe Sluis.

The lights are *fixed* white lights bearing from each other W. by N. and E. by S., distant 1,110 yards.
