poses, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Silas, situate in Penton-street as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Archibald Campbell, Bishop of the said diocese of London, as such bishop, with the consent of the Reverend Robert Maguire, the incumbent of the perpetual curacy of the parish of Saint James, Clerkenwell, and as such incumbent the patron of the perpetual curacy of the said new parish of Pentonville, and with the consent of the Reverend John Rooker, the incumbent of the perpetual curacy of the district parish of the Holy Trinity, Islington, and as such incumbent the patron of the perpetual curacy of the said new parish of All Saints, Islington (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient, that all those contiguous portions of the said new parish of Pentonville, and of the said new parish of All Saints, Islington, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Silas, situate in Penton-street as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Silas, Penton-street," and that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of such consolidated chapelry should belong to, and be exercised by, the said Archibald Campbell, Bishop of the said diocese of London, and by his successors bishops of the same see, for

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Silas, Penton-street, being:—

"All that portion of the new parish of Pentonville, in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London, which is situate to the northeast of an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish from the district parish of Saint Mark, Clerkenwell, in the county and diocese aforesaid, at the point where Penton-street joins Pentonville-road; and extending thence, westward, along the middle of the said road to its junction with Hermes-street; and extending thence, northward, along the middle of the said street to its junction with John-street; and extending thence, westward, along the middle of the last-named street to its junction with Rodney-street; and extending thence, northward, for a distance of four chains along the middle of the last-named street to a point (at the junction of the same street with Rodney-street, North) upon the boundary dividing the said new parish of Pentonville from the new parish of All Saints, Islington, in the county and diocese aforesaid.

"And also all that portion of the said new parish of All Saints, Islington, which is situate to the south-east of an imaginary line commencing at the last-described point situate at the junction of Rodney-street with Rodney-street, North, as aforesaid; and extending thence, northward, for a distance of two chains or thereabouts along the middle of the last-named street to its junction

with Wynford-road; and extending thence, first eastward and then north-eastward, along the middle of the last-named road to its junction with the street or road called or known as Half Mooncrescent; and extending thence, northward, along the middle of the last-named street or road to its junction with Payne-street; and extending thence, north-eastward, along the middle of the last-named street to the junction of the same street with Copenhagen-street upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of All Saints, Islington, from the consolidated chapelry of Saint Thomas, Islington, in the county and diocese aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.
